TUBE TECHNOLOGY

Testing Tubes for Radio Service— Part I

B ack in the good old days, when a radio or TV wasn't working right, my dad took suspect tubes to the drug store where he could find a self-service walkup tester, much like the ones shown in Figure 1. It wasn't always the tubes that were at fault, of course, but often replacing one or two would get the set working again and dad saved a few dollars on a service bill. For the collector who likes to do his or her own simple repairs, testing the tubes is a good place to start when going over an old set. To help you out with this aspect of restoration, this two-part series will present

an overview and tips on testing tubes. In Part I we'll concentrate on some background on vacuum tubes, what they are, and why it's important for the average radio collector/restorer to know how to test one. You don't have to have a degree in electronics engineering to do the basic tests and to be able to find the duds in your sockets—you just need to know a little bit about tubes and have a tester handy.

Since the early days of telephone service when human speech was first carried over wires, something was required to strengthen electrical signals, some kind of device or means of making a small signal bigger without otherwise changing it. Before the vacuum tube there was no electronic means to do that. One interesting early device was a sort of telephone receiver mechanically coupled to a telephone transmitter (microphone). A carbon button microphone has a certain amount of gain in that small vibrations from sound waves control the battery-supplied current in the telephone circuit. For a mechanical amplifying device the frequency range was very limited and the distortion and noise that was added by the sum of the parts was so excessive as to make the device impractical for anything




Figure 2. Bell model 3A mechanical repeater.

but limited usage.¹ Figure 2 is a picture of a Bell Model 3A mechanical repeater which went into service about 1914. When Lee de-Forest demonstrated his crude vacuum tube triode amplifier to Bell Telephone in 1912 the pioneering company immediately saw its potential in long-distance telephony. Figure 3 illustrates an early deForest single-wing Audion tube, so called because it has only one plate. Later versions had two plates, one on each side of the filament.

Magic in Glass




Figure 4. Electron flow within a vacuum tube (see text).

But just what is a vacuum tube and why is it such an interesting little character? A vacuum tube is a device that controls a large current with a very small voltage. It does this by controlling a stream of electrons from a heated metallic surface, called a cathode, on their way to a cold metallic surface, called a plate. In between there is a metallic screen, called a grid, that the electrons have to pass through on their way from the cathode to the plate. A small electrical charge on the grid has a great affect on the huge number of electrons that must pass through it. The more negative the charge on the grid the fewer electrons that can squeeze through. This makes the grid a type of electrical aperture or throttle valve. In this way a small signal on the grid can produce a much larger signal on the plate. Figure 4 illustrates the action of the charge on the grid in pinching off the electron stream from the filament to the plate in an Audion. The tube can be connected in various ways to amplify small signals or to produce signals for radio broadcast and reception.

Most tubes must operate in a very good vacuum. Air or other gasses interfere with the stream of electrons and reduce a device's effectiveness as an amplifier. The elements of the tube are placed inside a glass or metal envelope and as much of the air is pumped out of it as possible. In order to preserve the quality of the vacuum a silvery metallic coating, called a *getter*, is flashed onto the inside surface of the glass. The getter collects and holds any gas molecules that escape from the parts of the tube after the envelope has been sealed off.

One exception is the type 00A tube. The 00A is a simple triode with a filament, grid, and plate like the 01A, but it was designed especially for use as a detector of AM radio signals. After the tube was evacuated a small amount of gas or vapor was put back in. This made the tube more sensitive as a detector. I have run tests on an 00A, and it is as good as

a modern semiconductor diode as a detector.

Other tubes have gasses or vapors inside to impart special characteristics. Mercury vapor rectifiers like the type 83 are a good example. The tube is first evacuated and then a small amount of mercury is put inside the envelope. During operation, the mercury vapor ionizes, which helps support the electron conduction and allows higher currents with a lower voltage drop than a vacuum rectifier. This has its value in rectifiers but not in amplifying tubes.

Other examples include thyratron tubes, like the popular 2D21, which contain gasses such as mercury vapor, hydrogen, argon, or xenon. Thyratron tubes are used as switches. A small amount of voltage on the grid switches the tube from a non-conducting state to a fully conducting state, much like a relay. Once in the conducting state the gas inside ionizes, as does the gas n a glowing neon lamp, and the grid loses control over the electron flow. The electron flow can only be shut off by removing the voltage from the plate and allowing the ionized gas to revert to the non-conducting state again. Thyratron tubes are used as controllable rectifiers in DC power supplies, for high-speed switching, and for operating solenoids or relays from a small current source, such as a photocell.

Even though vacuum tubes have been largely replaced by semiconductor devices they are still in demand for certain applications, such as amplified musical instruments, high-quality home audio systems, high-power industrial and broadcast applications and, of course, antique radio restoration, Unlike transistors, vacuum tubes contain consumable components and eventually wear out or fail with normal use.

Testing and Restoration

In order to do service work on a vacuum tube-based piece of equipment a means of testing tubes is necessary to separate the good tubes from the bad ones.

Since most of the tube types that were used in the various radio circuits years ago are a fixed commodity and their numbers are limited to what is left from old stock there's a real need to conserve them for future generations. Back when tubes were cheap and plentiful, repair shops replaced them even when they were still functional because it was better to charge another dollar and a half for a tube while a set was already in the shop than have the same set come back a few months when another aging tube failed and the customer was irate about a second service bill. We don't have that luxury now.

Of the billions of tubes manufactured over the years eventually the supply will run out as they fail from use or are discarded as trash-This is why tube testing is probably more important now than it was in the heyday. Even the types popular in the later years of tube-based consumer entertainment electronics, such as the miniature version of the "All American 5" lineup of 12BA6, 12BE6, 12AV6, 35W4 and 50C5, now in relatively plentiful supply, will eventually become scarce. Many people still enjoy using the tube radios in their collections. Figure 5 shows a 1941 Crosley model 63TA, "Victory Model," radio in my office that I turn on every morning at work and which runs eight hours a day,

Everyone has their favorite tube tester and discussions go on and on about the merits of this make and that model, but essentially for service work they all do pretty much the same thing. Often personal preferences and budgets guide the choices, Service testers are designed and sold to test tubes for the purpose of culling the bad ones from the good ones based on industry-accepted standards of performance.

Industry standards generally suggest when a tube has reached the end of its useful service life based on the degree of the decline in the number of electrons it will supply from the cathode, called the *emission*, and the ability of the grid voltage to control the plate current, called the *transconductance*, as compared to the average design values for a new tube. These numbers are guidelines, not rules, and in practice, barring catastrophic failure, any sample tube placed in a circuit may or may not provide acceptable performance depending on the demands of the circuit and the requirements of the user.

The final test is whether or not the tube in question works to the satisfact.on of the user in the socket of the set you want to restore. A tester may tell you a tube is good but it won't work in some specific radio because that radio requires more of the tube thar the generally accepted industry minimum. A good example of this is the 1L6 converter tube used in certain models of the Zenith Trans-Oceanic portable dry battery-operated radio. Some Trans-Oceanic radios, like the model G500 shown in Figure 6, are finicky, especially if the batteries are a little low, and the shortwave bands don't work with a marginal 1L6.

Conversely a tube can test bad and still work. This is probably more common because most radios will tolerate a weak tube and still function on some level with reduced performance that is not necessarily noticeable, especially for local station reception. If a weak tube still provides acceptable service then it is not necessary to replace it based solely on a tester reading. If the tube has suffered a catastrophic failure such as shorted elements, lost vacuum, or open filament/heater, or it simply fails to work satisfactorily in the socket, then it needs to be replaced.

The Crosley radio in my office is a good example. It ran for 12 years, eight hours a day, five days a week with the same tubes that were in it when I got the radio. One day it faded out and quit. After testing each tube on a servicetype tube tester I found the filament in the 5Y3 rectifier had opened. Replacing the 5Y3 brought the radio back to life. There was no question that it needed to be replaced since the set was dead because of it. Testing the rest of the tubes showed that many of them indicated bad or weak, except for the 6K6 audio output tube, but the radio still provided what I would judge acceptable performance for my needs. Replacing all of them would not have given me anything I didn't already get from the radio by bumping the volume control up a little.

In Part II I'll talk more specifically about how tubes fail and how to determine whether one needs to be replaced or not. I'll cover various test methods, the types of tube testers that would be appropriate for a collector/restorer to use, and why tube testers cannot be used for matching audio tubes.





RADIO RESTORATION

A Fairbanks-Morse Project

his set was a new one for me. While I had heard of Fairbanks-Morse radios. I had never seen one before the spring of 2010; in fact I never even came across a photo of one in any of the Bunis or Slusser books on collectible radios. That spring, however, I picked up a table model that was in really bad shape, although it was obviously a high-quality set when it was new. It was a 1936 model 8A, whose chassis was also used in floor models. Unfortunately, my job as a driver's license examiner for the DMV had kept me away from the bench-and the Fairbanks-Morse-and didn't have a chance to even look at the set closely until I retired this past August. When I did finally examine it, I saw that I had much work to do. But in nearly four decades of restoring radios, I'd yet to go a single year without at least one project to occupy me, and I didn't want 2011 to be the first. Despite its condition, I felt that it would likely be worth the trouble, so I rolled up my sleeves and began a task which would end up costing way more than I had budgeted and would take upwards of 140 hours plus!

Cosmetics Confusion

The radio proved to be a challenge both cosmetically and electronically. I needed a new dial glass and escutcheon bubble, the latter of which I could have had made if I had to. I immediately began my parts search and was lucky to have a very nice man in Wisconsin quickly respond to my want ad in Antique Radio Classified. He seemed confused, however, when I told him I needed the glass dial scale ("the part with the numbers on it"). He sent me the dial scale, but it was some sort of celluloid material that employed lighting from the back, not from the top, bottom, and sides like glass scales. This meant that there were two versions of dial display in one model number! No wonder he got confused. It also meant, of course, that I would have to retrofit my chassis for this other method of dial display. This gentleman then sent me the mounting hardware off the junker chassis he-so fortunately for me-still had around. I then found a perfect replacement dial belt for tuning from the Adams Company (www.adamsradio.com).

Electronics Challenges

It wasn't too hard to coax the Fairbanks-Morse to at least receive and amplify before I embarked on the full restoration procedure. There was, however, a worrisome problem that I chose to solve first, a puzzler that I'd never before run into. The radio pulled in AM, but not shortwave. The AM I did receive had static, and a scope showed that the RF coil was the source of the static.

Most air transformers, such as this, have low impedances/DC resistance. This one had about 400 ohms, however, making it a wire wound resistor, so to speak, but with very

fine wire. These sets had to have been prone to overheating and opening up. Sure enough, the primary winding in the RF transformer for the shortwave frequencies was open. So, again, the fellow in Wisconsin sent me the coil he had, which had all three (AM, police and SW) primaries open. He also had a second 8A chassis lying around and sent me the coil from that one as well. This one was a small, generic coil replacement from the 1960s, which I doubt ever worked in that chassis. I was beginning to see why the 8A was not in any of the collector's books and why I hadn't run into these radios previously: most of them were likely trashed long ago. No RF coil means no reception, and with the very thin glass Fairbanks-Morse used for the cosmetics, these radios were likely candidates for the curb.

Next on deck for the restoration was the RF amp circuit, which is there to boost antenna sensitivity. I tried to simply omit this stage (6K7 tube and its coil) and make it a typical seven-tube superhet. I bypassed and removed the tube and coil, and ended up with a very sensitive receiver on all three bands, requiring only minimal (by ear and tuning eye) alignment. So, with another year's project complete, on December 31, 2011, I placed my newly restored set where my Zenith had been for a long time. I opened a bottle of chardonnay, broiled some lobster tails, and my wife and I had one of the best New Year's Eves ever, listening to that radio. We were in absolute awe of the warm, rich sound that came from that old Fairbanks-Morse 8A in the living room as it once again played songs from the 1940s through the early 1960s with, it seemed to us, almost magical enthusiasm.

I encourage anyone who runs across a wellbuilt Fairbanks-Morse radio to grab it, pay for it, run, and ask questions later. I'm so glad l did.

MEET THE CLUB

The Greater New York Vintage Wireless Association— Simply Successful

The Greater New York Vintage Wireless Association is an antique radio organization covering the New York City, Long Island, and lower New York State area. It shares some members and geographic area with the New Jersey Antique Radio Club. But this club is different from many of the other clubs we've featured in recent months. There are no officers, regular meetings, membership dues, newsletter, museums, or auctions—it's simply a bunch of collectors who have a swap meet on the first Sunday of each month.

The swap meet is held outdoors in the parking lot of a commuter railroad station isn't in use on Sunday mornings and offers a quiet, spacious venue. There is no cost to buy or sell. Whether the temperature is 20 degrees or 90 degrees the meet takes place. The only time no one shows up is when it rains. Usually there are 15 to 20 cars and about 50 people turn out to buy, sell, and socialize. It starts at sunrise and is usually over by 11 a.m. It's a bare-bones event and everyone always has a lot of fun.

The Overview

The GNYVWA has been meeting at various places on Long Island, New York, since the late 1970s, according to long-time member Chris Bacon. It started with some collectors getting together informally at a diner or elsewhere just to discuss antique radios. In the early 1980s the swap meets started. Over the years, the meets have been held in the parking lots of businesses and even in the large yard of a member's house.

It was only in April 2011 that the club created its first web site. In keeping with its informal structure, GNYVWA's website is also bare bones, but serves the purpose of keeping members connected between gatherings. Each month photos of latest meet are

posted on the site and dates of future meets are listed. The club also sends out a monthly email and post card reminding members of the next meet date.

While they are minimal, there are still costs incurred with a simple organization like this. The website domain name costs about \$15 a year to register, and it's about \$60 a year for a server to host the site, for a total annual cost of approximately \$75. Sending out email is free, except for the cost in time of the volunteer. The mail post cards cost \$.32 per card for postage plus a very small cost for post card paper stock. The post card is printed through a regular computer printer. There is no cost for the parking lot. On cold winter mornings, club members agree that it might be nice to have an indoor location to meet, and then wistfully say, maybe someday. They'll simply see how things evolve.

The Lesson

The GNYVWA is a great example of how a club can get off the ground and succeed for decades in this case—without a complex infrastructure. The members have enjoyed the monthly swap meets for approximately 30 years, without ever having to pay membership dues!

Interested in starting your own bare-bones club? Almost any small local or regional group of collectors can get together once a month, have a good time, and swap equipment and stories. You probably already have in your circle at least one computer-savvy hobbyist who can set up a simple website and send out the emails and/or post cards.

Why not give it a try. It's that simple.
