First International Restoration Contest


ast March saw the conclusion of the first international restoration competition inaugurated by the Quebec club SQCRA under Serge Hainault's responsibility. Practically all the antique radio clubs of the world were invited to participate. A dozen on three continents accepted to participate and eight presented participants.

This was a big challenge, establish the rules, evaluation criteria, transfer of data from participants to judges, ensuring that the judges understood and used the evaluation criteria all in the same manner. Serge rose handily to the challenge! The participants presentations are very detailed, some containing up to 50 pages, so here we will only present a short resume.

Here are the results based on eight criteria.

The winner, Dan Koczur of the Mid Atlantic Antique Radio Club (MAARC), presented an Atwater Kent 708.



The receiver was missing many parts, there is only a base, a front panel and the rusted chassis. To fabricate of the missing cabinet parts Dan had to find other collectors via the Internet to get close up pictures of moldings, arch supports etc. Rust was removed from the chassis then refinished with a Caswell nickel plating kit. All resistors were replaced by

new ones hidden in molded ceramic tubes painted to the color code of the era and the tips finished with molten lead like the originals.

The flexible resistors were all open and were reproduced using a nichrome wire. All the capacitors were emptied and refilled with new ones, hidden in the old casings. Since the paper capacitors had their connecting leads coming out of the sides, when emptied the ends broke, so new paper ends were made.

The open speaker's field coil was repaired and its cone was replaced by a homemade version. The only negative point is a RF coil which seems to be defective causing one short wave band to have a weak reception. So all in all a devilish challenge!

In second place John Dodgshun of the New Zealand Vintage Radio Society (NZVRS) presented an American Philco 18 with tuning indicator. The front is delaminated and missing some veneer and the chassis is very rusted. The electronics are all there but the primary of the oscillator and mixer coils are open as is the tuning indicator coil. After stripping, the chassis and speaker were sent to a plating shop while the cabinet was restored.






The delaminated front piece is re-glued, a new veneer piece installed and the remaining finish is removed by scraping and the missing moldings fabricated. The reassembling of the chassis meant emptying all the capacitor cans and the Bakelite blocks to fill them with new capacitors. The primaries of the damaged coils were rebuilt. The rebuilding of the tuning indicator required 10,800 turns of 0.071 mm wire and the adjustment of the movement was a challenge.

Two minutes after powering it up, the output transformer fried and had to be rewired. During the restoration an earthquake caused the receiver to fall from workbench to the floor, which added to the repairs.

In third place Elmo Giovanetti of the California Historical Radio Society (CHRS) presented a Remler 72. The cabinet, although in bad shape, is complete but for a missing grill element. As for the electronics, it is obvious that this receiver as been used as a parts donor to fix many radios. The complete magic eye assembly was missing as well as the speaker, output and power transformers! All the tubes are missing and the rectifier socket is broken. The dial is peeling and a pilot lamp holder is missing. This is more a reconstruction than a restoration!

A new decal of the dial is transferred on an acrylic piece to restore the dial. Most of the missing parts came from Elmo's and CHRS stock, the speaker was found on the Internet, the power transformer came new from Hammond Electric in Ontario. Since the field coil has a higher impedance than the original the circuit required some adjustment with the aid of a few resistors.





The chassis was painted after cleaning, capacitors emptied and refilled with new ones. A set of knobs was borrowed from a friend and used to make molds which were used to make new ones.

In fourth place Daniel Labelle of the Société Québécoise des Collectionneurs de Radios Anciens (SQCRA) presented an American Philco 80 (junior). The cabinet was partially delaminated, some pieces of veneer, knobs and speaker were all missing. The chassis is dirty, tubes and a shield are missing. After cleaning it is noted that the chassis is so rusted that light is visible through holes in the chassis.






After cleaning and stripping the chassis is treated by reverse electrolysis for 27 hours in a solution of water and sodium carbonate at 12 volts and 1.5 amps to remove all the rust. Then the holes are filled with touch up putty, then primed and painted with chrome color Krylon paint.

All the capacitors were refilled with new ones and one bad resistor replaced with one NOS. During reassembly the secondary of the antenna transformer and the oscillator coil were found open. Another reasonably priced Philco 80 in poor shape with a good chassis was purchased... the temptation was strong to use it, but since most of the circuitry was already reinstalled on the original chassis only the coils, knobs and the speaker were used to complete the restoration.


In fifth place Dan Merz of the Antique Wireless Association (AWA) presented a Heacock Radiophone R12 from the early 20's. The receiver had been modified many times since it was customary in those years to modify every time a new circuit became available.

The main tuning coil was damaged it could be fixed, but it was decided to replace it since a plastic tube of the proper size was available as well as the cotton insulated wire. All the modifications were removed, the chassis cleaned up and varnished and two type CH sockets installed as well as an audio transformer and an RF coil of the Acme brand just like the one used originally. The tuning coil was rewired on the plastic tube after grooves were made to help hold the wire in place like it was customary to do thus eliminating the use of glue, 100 turns of 24 gauge with 8 taps. For the wiring 14 gauge wire was used after removing the modern markings with acetone.




Half a dozen holes had been drilled through the front panel over the years, they were filled with a mixture of epoxy and black paint powder.

In sixth place, the team from L'Association Radio Club du Bassin D'Arcachon (ARCBA) presented a French Lafayette model T-536.




A wood worker, member of the team, restored the cabinet while the others stripped the chassis to clean it and repaint it. The electronic restoration was easy. Most of the efforts were put on fabricating a new dial glass with some very special techniques.

In seventh place the team of the Society for the Preservation of Antique Radio in Canada (SPARC) presented a Canadian General Electric model 66. The receiver had passed decades in a garage after having it's cabinet ''restored'' with a disc sander and covered with polyure-thane! The restoration of the cabinet was a long love affair, sanding just enough to remove sander scratches without sanding through the veneer. The knobs were missing so a set was used from an identical radio in display at the museum to make molds from which new knobs were molded. The chassis was cleaned and the electronics restored easily.



In eight place Walter Krieg of the Club Histoire et Collection Radio (CHCR) presented an American RCA Gloria, Export model. The cabinet was restored without great difficulty except for the replacement of the front moldings. The chassis was stripped, cleaned and painted.

The power transformer had to be re-winded. On the variable capacitor shaft a nylon disc was installed to receive the dial string thus giving it a reduction factor of 1/15 to provide more precise tuning. A very nice restoration by this 92 years young passionate collector.



This is only a resume of the presentations of the participants, some 50 pages long, but if you wish to read them they are available on our website at WWW.SQCRA.CA. We hope that this presentation will convince many more to accept the challenge and enter the contest.

Tips for New Collectors

ith another year of radio meets just around the corner. I thought I'd take a few lines to provide encouragement to our newest friends who will be attending a radio meet for the first time hoping to successfully embark on rewarding and satisfying careers as radio collectors. We "old-timers" go about our business at the meets looking over the items available and going through mental checklists that, through experience, clue us in to the item's physical and, sometimes electrical condition as well as its completeness and its appropriate price range. We who do our own repair work (and I speak for myself here) especially forget to recall how it may feel to be a novice who is looking for a reasonably priced "treasure" that is likely to work reasonably well when taken home and will not catch the house on fire. The novice may well feel alone at the meet trying to decide what to pick out among the vast sea of radio and what-nots spread out before his or her eyes. While it is true that almost every seasoned radio enthusiast is happy to impart to the newcomer some help and guidance, the novice may yet feel bewildered and overwhelmed in reaching spending decisions. It is to our newest friends in the hobby that I direct this primer.

HAIL TO THE NOVICE!

1. MAKE SURE IT HAS A CORD! AC cords seem to have a nasty habit of disappear-



ing when the insulation becomes so brittle as to crumble when bent. If the cord is still there but crumbling just remember that those little electrons

coming out ot the wall aren't very friendly to each other should the wires meet along the way. Cloth covered wires with deteriorated internal insulation on the wires will make a crackling sound when bent. Even if the cord seems fairly fresh and pliable be sure to inspect the points where it enters the chassis and where it enters the wall plug. These points are most often the first to fray when the cord is twisted. If a replacement plug has been installed check to see that the wire ends are carefully trimmed and positioned so they do not touch. If a new cord has been spliced to the remains of the old one coming out of the set, beware! This is indicative of shortcut servicing. It may be safe. It may not. Obviously a missing cord renders the set unusable, at least for a while. A missing AC cord may mean any one of the following conditions: 1. Only the cord was bad. 2. The radio may have severe internal problems such as short circuits or burned out transformers, etc. 3. The radio may be battery operated only.

2. CHECK TO SEE IF TINY VISITORS MADE IT THEIR WINTER HOME. Radios provided "cruise ship" accommodations for small visitors such as mice, roaches,

spiders and other unwelcome critters. I figure the mice enjoyed the warm living quarters after the set had been turned off and the listeners left the room. After the radio had been



retired and put in the barn, the buffet began. Cloth insulation was generous and tasty for the mice. Not unusual is looking through the front of a console and seeing a big hole where the speaker cone and grille cloth used to be, and, although wax covered capacitors weren't on their list of favorite entrees, I did recently find a third of a .05/600v tubular completely chewed away. Yummy! Fortunately coils inside the chassis are not on the menu, but I have seen a couple cotton wound coils that had been gnawed upon. Be prepared for anything when you see a patch of rust on the chassis. When I refer to the radio as being their home, they do include using it as a bathroom. Another tell-tale sign of rodents is shreds of paper emanating from the bottom edge of the chassis. A friend brought to me his 12 tube Zenith to restore. I saw the signs and after making sure we were standing upwind. I turned over the chassis. The nest filled one half of the chassis - the size of a football. I've pictures to attest to it.

Roaches, live or dead, are quite disgusting. Enough said. Spiders have a habit of leaving their concentrated "cottony" web remnants in interesting places. I've dug out large chunks from the holes in the tops of IF cans, from between plates of the tuning capacitor, from inside RF and antenna coils, and from many locations throughout the cabinet. Although I don't expect that these presumably harmless remnants disturb the performance of the radio, I don't take the chance. Also, if I can spot the white chunk, the owner might see it as well.... not good restoration work in my opinion.

3. CHECK TO SEE IF THE STEERING WHEEL IS THERE. Seriously, it is easy to look a radio over several times, feel satisfied that it is a good buy, plunk out the hard earned



sweepstakes money, tote it home, and later find that the set is missing a part or two. Even the most seasoned collector can fall prey to failing to notice, during the heat of the hunt, that the prize catch

was not quite complete. On one occasion, I studied a nice little late forties plastic set I favored, purchased the set and later discovered why I found it so easy to examine the inside of the set while at the meet. The loop antenna and back were missing. DUH! That scenario is probably not rare. Even some plastic sets had no backs and the antenna was a little coil on the chassis. Metal Arvins and Silvertones are typically configured

that way. Fortunately for those of us who have amassed piles of old chassis and extra parts, this situation may not cause any great concern other than recognizing our carelessness. For the new collector, it can be a sad disappointment and a source of great heartburn at the seller and perhaps at the club that hosted the meet.

It is, at this point, most prudent to mention to the novice that sellers at radio meets may or may not have much technical background pertaining to radio servicing and maintenance. Even those who do have such experience may not have even checked out the items available at his or her table. You are, in nearly all cases, buying the set AS IS, without warranty or testimonial as to its condition. Do bear in mind however that radio collectors are, by far, truly an honest and honorable lot. If the seller tells you that the radio has indeed been serviced or is otherwise ready-to-go, you can feel relatively comfortable that the set should perform reasonably well with a fair expectancy of safety. If no such assurance is made or if the seller says that the set has not been tested, you may wish to apply your consideration of the set based on other merits such as cabinet style, external condition, etc. On the PLUS side of the ledger, remember that almost any radio can be brought back to life by a good repairman.

With this in mind, here is a handy checklist of what to be looking for as you survey the radio you can't live without:

ARE THERE ANY NAKED TUBE SOCK-ETS? Tubes are not generally hard to find..... YET! On radios made from the

mid 1930s, tubes are still abundant and can be had without great expense. With the exception of a 6T5 eye tube, you shouldn't have any difficulty scrounging plenty of good, and possibly new-oldstock (NOS), replacement tubes at any well-attended meet. If you favor the earliest AC radios, using such tubes as an 81, a 10, or



a 50, you should certainly check to see that the tubes haven't been snatched or that duds or improper tubes haven't been put in the sockets. Replacements can cost way more than the tank of gas it took to get you to the meet. If you have a sweet tooth for Federals and other extremely early sets, be prepared for sticker shock regarding these tubes also. Keep in mind that, regardless of the vintage. some radios require tubes that are very specific and unique to that radio and manufacturer. Substitution is often not an option. Additionally, bear in mind that a common tube such as a 6A8 can come in a variety of shapes and sizes and will not necessarily fit in the radio you are studying. A good example is trying to put a 6A8 metal tube into a 1937 Philco chassis. It can't be done without chewing up the tube socket. A 6A8GT will fit, however the wire that attaches to the cap on top of the tube may not reach due to having to stretch over the edge of the metal shield. Ack! - another consideration. A reverse of the problem would be trying to put a 6A8G into an RCA chassis using metal tubes. The wire might be too short to reach the cap on the taller tube. AND, since the "G" is not shielded like the metal tube, performance problems accompanied by weird sounds are sure to occur. A dealer who specializes in selling tubes should be well versed in the subject. A person with a table full of Philcos or RCAs, etc. is surely a good guide too. Ask around.

On many sets, the speaker cable plugs into a tube-like socket on the backside or top of the chassis, near the rear. If you notice such a socket without the cable plugged in, check to see if the speaker itself is there. Noticing whether or not the speaker is there may seem a bit obvious but remember the missing loop antenna? Also, some wood table models, notably certain Zeniths and Philcos, have the entire speaker area masked by a massive loop antenna incorporated into the cabinet back. Small sockets are often used for connecting such antenna assemblies. On many floor models a loop antenna, resembling a car muffler standing on end, is mounted near the speaker. On others, a loop is stapled above the chassis and the wires are soldered to appropriate connections or a plug and socket is provided. If there is a small three, four, or five pin socket, about the size of a dime, left unattended, search for the antenna. Without this essential part the set won't play at all. Each radio is equipped with a specific antenna designed for that set.

2. ARE THERE ANY TUBE SHIELDS MISSING? Radios of the early 30's through the early 40's used metal tube covers to prevent tubes from electrically interacting with each other in unfavorable ways. The covers are usually made in the shape of cylinders that slip over the tubes and are held in place by clips or specially shaped bases that hold the shields firmly in place while, at the same time, providing a ground path for undesired signals radiating from the tubes themselves. Other styles of tube shields, such as those used in many Philco cathedrais, cover several tubes at once and are held in place by a small clip at one end and by a screw at the other. Tube shields used by one manufacturer may not necessarily fit in a set made by another. An RCA 1940's battery set used cardboard tubes. much like toilet paper roll, lined with copper foil on the inside. A spring clip protruded from the grounded pin #1 and pressed against the foil when the shield was placed over the tube. Most importantly, shields have a purpose and are essential to the proper performance of the set. If you are peering into the back of that monstrous, but fetching, cathedral and envisioning it sitting in your new "radio room" take note as to what might be missing. Once you leave the meet, it's a bummer to find out the iconic Philco 90 you lovingly acquired will have a tough time making pleasing sounds until the shield is in place.

3. ARE THERE ANY DANGLING OR BARE WIRES? Be especially alert to wires that emanate from the chassis. If you see two wires coming out the back it is entirely possible that they are the ground and antenna wires. especially if there is no antenna assembly evidenced. ALL OTHER WIRES MUST GO SOMEWHERE. Note if the insulation is in good shape. A number of companies used rubber insulated wire during the thirties and forties. Zenith sets employing push button tone controls are undeniably prone to weathering of the insulation. Considering the high voltage running through the wires to the pushbuttons it is imperative that the insulation be intact. Replacing the wiring is a nasty and heavily time-laden job. Wires coming out of the top of metal cans on the chassis, connecting to the caps atop tubes, must not short out to any shields or other metal surfaces. Though voltage present, by design, is miniscule, but the signal is in the wire. Short it out to the metal and your signal is no longer available. By the same token, wires going to the pilot lamps are often in equally poor shape. The heat of the lamps tends to destroy the insulation over the years. Even if the insulation seems ok, observe if the wires are about to break loose from the sockets. They have likely been tugged many times as bulbs are replaced. The voltage is not usually high, but should the wires short to the chassis or lamp mounting brackets the result will be the same: A radio 'Bar B Oue'!

4. DOES THE TUNING DIAL MOVE FREELY? Though not usually a "biggie", a non-working or missing dial pointer can lead to frustrating and exasperating moments for even the most adept technician. Dial string becomes stiff and susceptible to breaking as it ages. A broken string commonly ends up in a pile having slipped off the myriad of pulleys and shafts at the front of the set. Some sets have highly complicated dial string systems and unless you have a guide to restringing that particular set, or have a good idea of how it should go your neighbors can be in for an evening of real entertainment. European-made sets (Grundig, Telefunken, Saba, et al) are true nightmares to restring. Your wife dreaming of a vacation to the Bahamas, conflicting with your plans to stay home to restring the Emud, makes for the ultimate in Reality TV. Also, check to see if the pointer is still there. I bought a splendid deco-styled table model once, only to notice later the pointer had long left the building.

5. CHECK THE CABINET FOR SIGNS OF DEMOLITION. Crosleys are my favorite. The wood glue used in these sets tends to allow the cabinet to fall apart. The same can happen to radios of other manufacturers, particularly if the wood has dried out appreciably.



Some chassis are extremely heavy, especially in early model cathedrals and tombstones, and if due care is

not exercised in carrying the radio, disasters can happen. You'll notice that smart folks never lift a Philco 90 by the inside of the arched top.

Don't take chances. Gravel on a parking lot can take big bites of an otherwise pristine finish. Always support the bottom of the cabinet. Heavy speakers mounted on the front, above the chassis, can break loose. Check that too. Another thing to look for in wood sets is the condition of the veneer. Generally, slight separation of the veneer front from the underlying plywood is not difficult to fix, provided glue can be inserted from a nearby edge of the cabinet. Speaking of edges, check the back surfaces for separation. Perhaps it is due to the heat escaping around the back of the set, but the edges seem to delaminate and can easily be snagged on clothing and the veneer torn as a result. Again, careful regluing does helps eliminate the problem. If an edge is loose, a couple layers of masking tape may sustain you until the radio is safely home.

On plastic sets, check the chassis mounting holes or the bottom inside of the cabinet for signs of over-torquing of the screws. The same can be said for handles and other places where mounting screws are employed. Painted cabinets were common in the forties and early fifties as an inexpensive way to offer a variety of sets to the public. Very small nicks in the painted finish can be touched up. Often the paint cannot be feathered to blend into the cabinet. Over-painting only leaves blemishes in the finish. Where there are major scratches and peeling paint it can be stripped and repainted. I have had tried-an-true success stripping paint from bakelite, and even catalin, using ordinary paint stripper.

OK, so you're ready to make a decision; and you'd like to take your prospective treasure for a test run. You and perhaps a knowledgeable accomplice are ready to plug in the set and anxiously wait for tubes to light and

sound to spew forth. Here are some observations you should make ahead of time that can help you render your final decision. I'll talk about transformer sets first. Power transformers, common in large table models and most consoles, are used in AC only radios. If a plate or paper affixed to the radio specifies AC only, you have such a set. Power transformers are designed to handle the work very easily but can take a beating when other components begin to fail. If there is an odor from the transformer, even when cold, something else created the situation and the transformer is probably "toast". If there is no odor but a lot of goo around the bottom edges, it still might be "toast". Rust and flaking paint is normally of no concern.

Watch carefully for any tubes that begin to glow cherry red. This is a sure sign of a power supply defect which, depending on whether or not the power transformer is shot, could mean that significant restoration is needed. A frying sound from the transformer is a no-no. Smoke is surely about to make an appearance and is an obvious sign the transformer is done. Shorted electrolytic capacitors and other capacitors, as well as tubes, will quickly ruin a replacement transformer. If the transformer doesn't exhibit problems, but you hear a loud hum or absolutely no sound, it may be caused by nothing more than a defective tube. Other components may, and probably, have failed as well. ANY of these symptoms is an alert to pull the plug immediately.

A slight bluish glow on the glass wall of tubes not uncommon and does not necessarily indicate a deficiency in the set or in the tubes.

A very slight hum perceived only at close proximity to the speaker is generally of no great concern, although the filter capacitors may be starting to go south at which time attention will be warranted. Transformerless, or AC/DC sets with a loud hum most likely have filtering problems. However, since there is no power transformer to ruin, the defect is usually more of an annoyance than a real danger. Additionally, power supply parts for AC/ DC sets are generally less expensive than for transformer-operated sets since the operating voltages are lower. Transformerless sets' tubes are wired in series, meaning that if one burns out they all go out. In very early sets the tube filaments are fed through a special resistance wire located within the AC line cord. If that wire is broken the tubes will not light. Such wires sometimes can be repaired if the

break is at one end of the cord or the other but replacement cords are scarce and, even if found NOS, are not safely usable. There are remedies, and many solutions are cast on the internet. If you don't feel comfortable doing it yourself or don't want to invest the coin to have it done, the radio may only serve as decoration. Considering how neat many of those little sets are, that is often not such a bad situation.

All radios may give the following symptoms:

A crackling sound from the speaker may be caused by a defective tube or corroded tube pins and or sockets. Such sounds are often created by dirty volume, tone and bandswitch controls. Either situation can usually be easily remedied. A nastier malfunction that has much the same sound is a shorted IF transformer or output transformer. An internally shorted intermediate frequency (IF) transformer will short out the signal. All you hear is a loud crackling sound. Strangely, the problem may disappear for a few moments and all seems fine. Then... If the cause is due is due to dirty tube contacts, a gentle rocking of the tubes in the sockets while the set is on will indicate this trouble. If the radio was parked in a barn or attic for a few generations, you might see rust and oxidation on the tube pins and socket. They can be sprayed with contact cleaner and buffed to a shine with a brass brush. Dirty controls will show up as culprits as the controls are turned. Pushbuttons are frequent trouble-spots as well. Again, contact cleaner is a good remedy and is available about everywhere.

Tuning controls that crackle are often caused by the plates of the tuning capacitor making contact with each other. The stations may pop in and out as you turn the dial as a result. On dials that have a pointer that slides along a metal guide, dirt and goo may also create noise. The chassis should be removed to correct either condition. Should the set have very weak volume or sensitivity, the problem could range from bad tubes to poor alignment of the circuit adjustments to an open antenna coil or to any number of capacitors and other parts hidden under the chassis. Touching the antenna terminal or putting your hand over the loop antenna will normally boost the volume if a few adjustments are all that is necessary.

I hope I have taken some of the trauma out of starting your radio collection or finding just the one radio you remember as a youngster or was told about by a grandparent. Remember, each of us veteran collectors was a "newbie" at one time and can easily recall being overwhelmed at seeing a vast sea of radio offerings at our first meet. It is a great hobby and is the only one I can think of that can provide evenings of nostalgia and listening entertainment from now on. Think of those little signals floating around your head, from Cuba and South America, from the Middle East, from Russia, from Oslo, from Belgrade, from Taiwan, and from the greatest station of all: WOWO in Ft. Wayne.

I welcome you to the hobby and that you get the most enjoyment possible from attending radio meets and picking up those darling little sets that are just waiting for you. As you discover the thousands upon thousands of radios, each with a unique style and charm, you will surely and unwittingly become an enthusiastic and savvy collector. I only ask you to save those 60's GE clock radios for me. Thanks.
