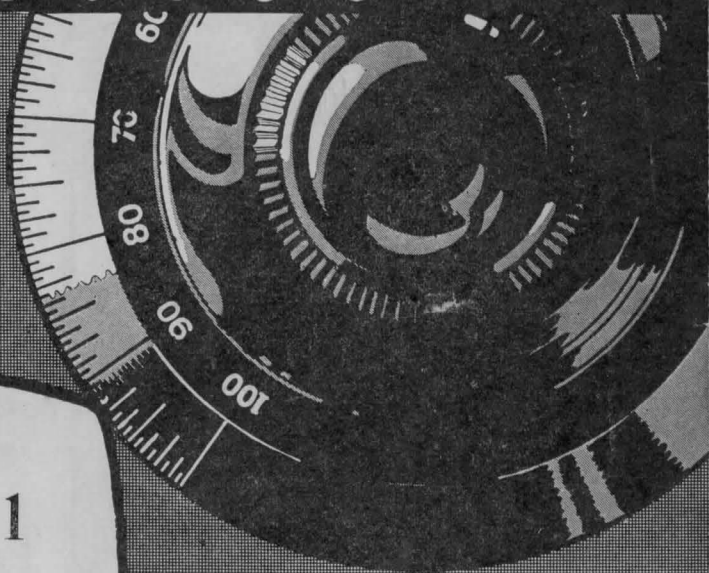

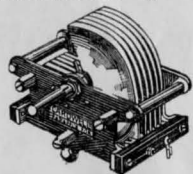

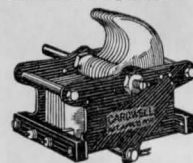

The Need for Interference Prevention Associations

ONE unanticipated effect of Congress' failure to pass a radio law has been the withdrawal of interference investigations by U. S. radio inspectors. This means that there is no official to whom interference to broadcast reception may be reported and no government employee concerned with its investigation and possible mitigation. Notice to this effect has been received at the office of each district radio supervisor.

So, in addition to having no authority to designate station wavelengths, power or time of operation, the Department is no longer charged with the duty of helping to prevent interference from radiating receivers, sparking motors or power lines. The only remaining curb on interference is a clause in the license granted to a radio operator stating that he "shall not wilfully or maliciously interfere with any radio communication from another station."

While this provision may help to prevent one station from appropriating a wavelength which interferes with that of another, it is powerless against the many forms of annoying man-made static, which are seldom "wilful or malicious".

Furthermore the personnel of the local supervisor's office has recently been reduced, notwithstanding an increase of \$110,000 just granted the Department. In the

San Francisco office, for instance, which supervises the radio conditions in California, Nevada, Utah, Arizona, New Mexico, and Hawaii, one inspector was dropped on July 1st and another is to be transferred to Los Angeles where he is to open up a new and needed office so as to be more closely in touch with conditions there. This makes a total of four men to inspect and license all ship and commercial and stations, examine applicants for commercial and amateur licenses, and, unofficially to arbitrate differences between broadcast stations in accordance with the voluntary request of the broadcasters as arranged by the Pacific Radio Trade Association.

Manifestly, the need for local interference prevention associations, so frequently advocated in these columns, is now greater than ever. In fact the only present remedy against bothersome interferences is either individual or associated listener investigation and correction. Those listeners who are thus troubled should organize a neighborhood or town association with sufficient funds to hire a competent investigator and with sufficient influence to bring moral pressure to bear upon offenders. Incidentally such associations could materially assist in impressing Congress with the necessity of a new law to replace the antiquated Radio Act of 1912, under which radio is now regulated.

The Loud Speaker

The musician who plays in a radio orchestra has to be a fast-handed Henry to hold his job. He not only doubles in brass, but he triples in voice and quadruples in wind, hammers and kitty gizzards. He must have musical ability, a school girl complexion, deep-set eyes, and a knowledge of everything from a jew's harp to a pipe organ.

Modern music has worked a complete change in the personnel of the orchestra. For instance, ten years ago, when an orchestra played a light cavalry overture the hard-working drummer clacked a couple of coconut shells on a piece of marble, and imitated a horse's hoofs. We all thought that was wonderful and said to each other with wonder in our faces "Hear those horses, will you?" But now—all is changed.

When an orchestra plays a light cavalry overture, it starts with an imitation of a brigadier general at Washington cutting off red-tape with a pair of army shears, done by the oboe player. Then the clarinets depict an army buyer looking over some likely nags in a corral and dickering with a horse dealer for bargain prices. The viola comes in with a section during which the whole cavalry troop is enlisted and the uniforms picked. This brings the piece to the declaration of war by the violins and the saxophones.

Then four boys on the end of the orchestra arise and depict the pathos of corned recruits leaving their sweet mammas to do or die in a pathetic little ballad entitled: "Be true to pappa while pappa's at the war, or pappa's gonna come home and bust you in the jawr!" The bugle does a couple of blasts, the cellos present the bootlegger's obligato, the drummer lays down all his weapons and beats a flock of oil-cans to death, the entire orchestra rises and shouts "WHOA!"—and it's all over.

This is called "musical picturization." Another word for it is "syncopated apple-sauce." It takes the place of music and because it sounds something like it, it comes

over the air in good shape especially if there is a leaky insulator, or a lot of static around. As can be easily understood, it takes a different type of musician to play this stuff from the musician who used to play purely music. Any good prize fighter, plumber, boiler-maker and auto-repairman, used to hammering and pounding, can get a good job these days in a radio orchestra.

Only a week ago a hospital steward got a good orchestra job. He can't play a single instrument, but he can imitate a dying man and an operation for appendicitis and they have got him in a dress suit. He does his stuff in a theater under a red light, with a lot of boys behind him with nickel plated horns, and a microphone in front of him. When he illustrates the death of the King of Morovia with musical accompaniment stolen from Brahm and played on washboards, the fans simply go wild over him.

One of the best of the modern musical "acts" is a gent with an anvil. He is supposed to be a blacksmith's son who at the age of 50 suddenly remembers that he has a mother who must be lonely for him (God knows why). He tells the world all about it as he beats on his anvil—wham, wham, wham! He gets \$500 for letting his voice break at the right moment, wham, wham, wham! . . . The orchestral obligato is a locomotive whistle to represent the squeak of the old screen door, on the family kitchen.

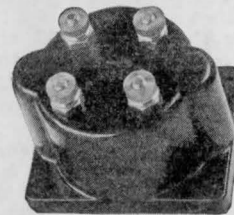
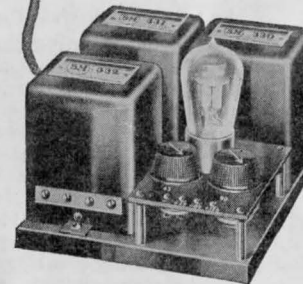

Questions and Answers

Questions not requiring diagrams will be answered without charge in these columns. Where personal answer or circuit diagrams are desired, a charge of 25 cents per question must accompany the letter in order to receive consideration.

Have just had a one-tube home-made receiver given to me, and the batteries are mounted in the cabinet, in a rather crowded position. One of the "A" batteries is placed horizontally across the "B" batteries. Is there any harm in this?

Mrs. A. G. C., Berkeley, Calif.

It is not considered the best practice to mount dry cells horizontally, for they will deteriorate sooner than if placed in a vertical position. If a piece of heavy cardboard or other insulation is placed between the "B" batteries, and the dry cell "A" battery, no harm should result due to short circuits.

What is the best value of resistance to connect across the fixed tickler coil in my SC four tube receiver. I have a 50,000 ohm Centralab potentiometer in the circuit now, and the regeneration control is in the first eighth inch of the range of the dial.

R. C. G., San Diego, Calif.

A 25,000 ohm variable resistance is normally specified for this circuit, but a potentiometer having a resistance of only 2000 ohms is ample, and oscillation occurs about half way around the dial, giving smooth control of regeneration, and making the operation of the receiver very simple.

I have a five-tube receiver which is apparently in trouble. The loud speaker will work only when I touch the plate and "B" positive binding posts of one of the audio transformers. What could be the trouble?

Probably the primary winding of one of the audio transformers is burned out. If possible, remove the transformer from the set, and test both primary and secondary windings with a pair of headphones and a dry cell battery placed in series. If a click is heard in the phones, the windings are O. K., but if no click is heard, the circuit is open and probably burned out.

Which is more selective, a variometer or variocoupler when used in a crystal circuit? Has KFUU shut down?

G. L., Oakland, Calif.

A variometer used as an antenna tuned circuit is not selective enough for present day broadcasting, and it would be prefer-

able to use a variocoupler, with the secondary tuned with a variable condenser. Station KFUU is temporarily shut down.

What kind of a solution can I use in the Duthoid Chemical Rectifier when the regular solution is not obtainable?

R. W., San Francisco, Calif.

As a temporary solution, dissolve common borax in distilled water until the solution is saturated. It is a good plan to heat the water slightly so that on cooling, a small amount of the salts will crystallize out, and insure a concentrated solution at all times.

I wish to light the filaments of 8 type C-299 tubes in my superheterodyne, from the 110 volt d.c. lighting mains. I have a set of storage "B" batteries, so do not wish to use the lighting circuit to furnish "B" supply.

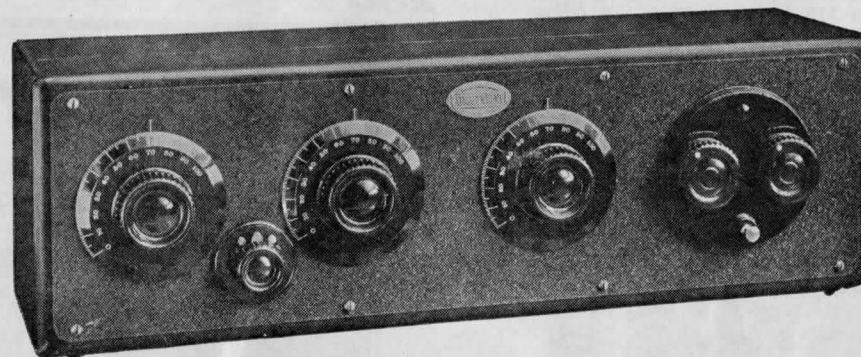
Connect the negative "A" binding post to the negative d.c. line. A voltmeter is necessary to determine the polarity of the power line, and an ordinary "B" battery tester having a 150 volt scale will do. Between the positive "A" binding post and the positive d.c. line, connect a 50 watt Mazda lamp, which will limit the total current to approximately .5 ampere. It is a good idea to retain the voltmeter mounted on the panel, for it will indicate the filament voltage and show any line fluctuations which might damage the tubes.

I have a Raytheon type "B" eliminator which has no means for turning the power on or off. Does it harm the outfit to leave it connected to the power line when the radio set is not in use?

There will be a steady drain of several milliamperes from the rectifier tube as long as the power is on, even though the receiving set is turned off. This will shorten the life of the tube a small amount, and of course will consume several watts of power from the lighting mains. Why not place a Cutler-Hammer Feed-Through switch in series with the flexible cord connecting the "B" eliminator to the power outlet?

rubbers and runs up and down the keyboard of a piano and you guessed what he was playing. If you did not care to guess, you could invite in a few friends and dance to the music. It is all the same to him. He gets his \$100 a week just the same. And twenty-five sleek-haired boys keep time to his ramblings with a lot of fancy brass plumbing, a couple of sirup kettles and a seasonal contract.

Do you suffer from asthma? Don't waste it. Book it with a radio orchestra. Now is the psychological time!

RADIOCAST ITEMS

The Navy is testing a 100 k.w. tube set at San Diego to replace the arc set that has caused interference to local listeners.

A 100-watt station at Tia Juana, Mexico, operated by El Correo de Norte, a newspaper, has been testing on about 232 meters. It will soon be on the air regularly with music from a number of cabarets.

Changes in wavelength since the failure of Congress to pass the radio bill include KTAB to 302.8 meters, KFWM to 325.9 meters and KQW to 333 meters. Many other stations have advised the Radio Supervisor that they will make no change without consulting him.

If changes in wavelengths of old stations or wavelengths of new stations that may be licensed are found to heterodyne with the wave already used by a station abiding by the allocation given by the Department of Commerce, it is possible that the old station will bring suit to enjoin the interfering station from operating. This would probably apply only to stations whose wave produces an actual whistling note and is not likely to apply to inability to tune out an offending station when received on a non-selective set.

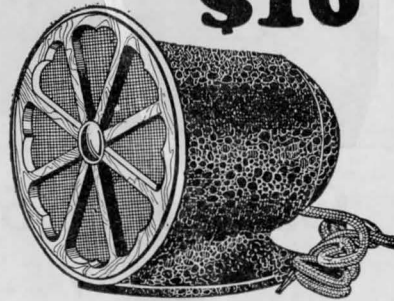
WGY TO OBSERVE DX NIGHT

Every Monday evening, beginning August 2, will be observed as silent night by WGY, the Schenectady station of the General Electric Company. Exception to this rule will occur only when outstanding programs are possible, such as an address by the President of the United States, or the Governor of the State.

WGY, like most stations, has received a great many letters from listeners within a fifty mile radius of the station, requesting

that transmission be suspended one night in seven, that they might dial distant stations. While owners of selective sets have experienced no difficulty in tuning out the high powered WGY at will, others have complained that the signal of WGY could not be entirely eliminated. It is to meet the requests of ambitious distance dialers that WGY is voluntarily leaving the air Monday nights.

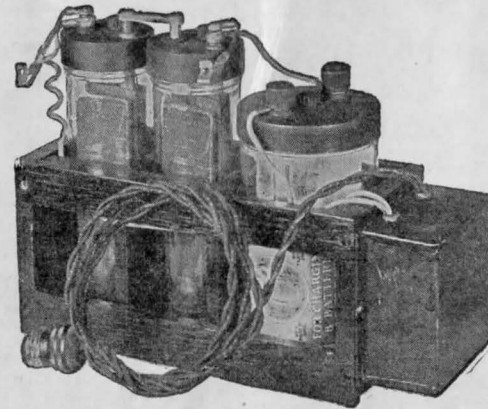

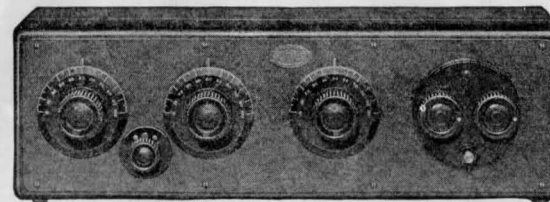

CHAOS IN RADIO CAN BE PREVENTED ONLY BY HARMONY AMONG BROADCASTERS

The recent decision of the Department of Justice, holding the Department of Commerce without controlling power in the assignment of broadcasting licenses and wavelengths, puts the broadcasters more than ever on their mettle, according to Martin P. Rice, director of broadcasting for the General Electric Company

"Broadcasters are somewhat accustomed to self government inasmuch as the radio conferences called by Mr. Hoover have been conducted on that plan," states Mr. Rice. "It is not surprising that laws enacted in 1912 when radio consisted of dot and dash communication from ship to ship and ship to shore should not provide suitable regulation for the great system of radiophone broadcasting which has since developed. It is surprising that more than five hundred stations with various interests should agree on essential regulations which have advanced broadcasting to its present standard and saved it from utter chaos.

"Broadcasters have known for some time that they were not really bound by all the

regulations which they observed and it has been so stated at the radio conferences, but broadcasters have also known that harmony and progress could only be maintained by mutual agreement. The decision of the Department of Justice puts broadcasters on their mettle more than ever. Probably a few here and there will grasp the opportunity to seize privileges which have heretofore seemed impossible to give them. If this movement becomes at all general, broadcasting will be utterly destroyed until new legislation is enacted. It is hoped that a realization of this fact will induce all to be patient until the problem is worked out.

"Interferences may be caused by relatively low power stations, in view of the fact that the carrier wave extends far beyond the range of modulated transmission. If a low power transmitter attempts operation on the same frequency of wavelength used by a distant higher powered station, reception difficulties will develop.

"The immediate locality served by the low power station will receive good service from the local station, but receivers between two stations using the same frequency will lose the service from the distant station because of the heterodyning between the two carrier waves. The result will be a constant whistle in the receiver."

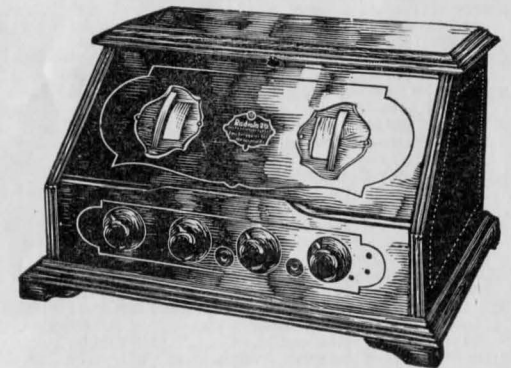

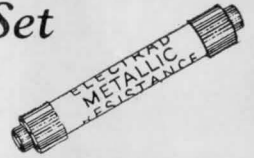
