THE EDITOR'S PAGE

SAFETY first, that much-abused phrase, is being given a new value by Uncle Sam in radio-aviation fields. On July 1 the government takes over the work now carried on by the Guggenheim Fund for the Promotion Aeronautics, in the broadcasting of weather bulletins at Los Angeles and Oakland airports, as well as Livermore, Livingston, Tejon, Concord and Saugus. The airport bureaus will now furnish weather reports to airport radio stations by means of the teletype or automatic printer. This information will be broadcast hourly to passenger and mail planes equipped with radio. Pilots will know every hour of the day and night what is ahead of them. The service will save thousands of lives by preventing pilots from running into unexpected conditions.

The plan to broadcast the proceedings of Congress promises to have an unexpected backwash. But it will be a backwash which the average Congressman little anticipates. It will reveal, for the first time, to millions of listeners just which of the national law-makers is worth his salt in the job for which he has been selected. Congress is noted for wasting time, with getting into useless, involved discussions. People read about it, throw the paper aside and forgat it in their own affairs. But when they listen to it over the radio they will be more critical. The backwash will come at the polls. Congress cannot stand the spotlight of microphone publicity and continue to dilly-dally around the way it does now.

The American Academy of Arts and Letters of New York has made an award to an announcer for good diction. This is a great forward step in bringing home to every citizen the need for speaking his own language properly. Radio is daily reaching more and more homes, until it will be safe to say that the day will come when hardly a home in the country but will have some form of radio receiver in it. The diction of the announcer, if of the best, will make the listener self-critical and aid in the general work of correct speech. The men who greet the radio audience every day have this in their hands. When announcers will strive for a prize for good diction it is a hopeful sign.

Experiments which are now being conducted in the General Electric laboratories with colors indicate that the advertising illumination of the future will be a rare display of beauty, instead of the gawkish, glaring, winking of the present-day signs. In the laboratory is being produced, by reflection, shifting gamuts of melting colors that defy description. Glowing gas in tubes gives the various effects and the color changes are secured by changing the values of the current supplying the tubes. Kaleidoscopic spectrum effects are produced, one color gliding into another, one tone superceding another, until the whole is a riot of effect. The possibilities for show window and building illumination promise an era of beauty to supercede the present unbeautiful illuminations which are limited in "color calories" and thereby cancel the natural values of fabric and architecture.

E ARE certainly getting ahead—or something. The Radio Manufacturers' Association, in session at Cleveland recently, set its face against using the air as a sales ground for products—at least to the detriment of the industry. They urged broadcasters to cut out the details and confine themselves to an opening and closing announcement.

* * *

These are the men who make the receiving sets. They are beginning to get the public reaction. The dear old abused public is getting tired of being sold every few minutes. The dear old abused public stands for just so much and then it gets up on its hind legs and roars. It is beginning to roar.

Nobody objects to a little advertising on the program, provided it is done in such a way that it is not offentive or ludicrous. We don't mind being told that the Jones company, which sells wagon spokes for farm vehicles, just let us hear their orchestra. If we liked the orchestra we will, whenever we buy a farm wagon, probably insist that it have Jones spokes. We will remember, the instant we see a farm wagon, that Jones makes superior wagon spokes. We will feel kindly to Mr. Jones.

But if the Jones Wagon Spoke Company, between every musical offering, halts the program to tell us the mileage of Jones spokes, the kind of wood of which they are made, the way the hub caps are snapped into place, and how the tires are sweated on the wheels, another thing happens. Whenever we see a Jones wagon we say: "There goes one of those consarned wagons whose spokes broke up that program last Friday!" We develop irritation with old man Jones for letting his son get into the wagon spoke We may even refuse to buy a farm for fear it will have Jones spokes on its wagon wheels, as a constant reminder that we had a good radio program ruined.

The sponsor of today's radio programs, in the majority of cases, is making a grave mistake. He is trying to obtain advertising over the air instead of publicity. Publicity has to do with reputation. Advertising with salesmanship. Better the Jones Company gave us programs which built up a kindly feeling to the Jones Company than to tell us,

every ten or fifteen minutes, that they "grow the oak for the wagon spoke" in Wautucket, Ia., and that they have a message for us about the "Buckboard Five," the latest of the Jones Rolling Tire family and all the other hooey.

* * * *

When big concerns grow wise enough to keep their advertising ideas off the air, and let their publicity ideas thrive and blossom, they will see the strange spectacle of the public rushing to meet them. Aimee Semple McPherson might have advertised until the cows came home and nobody would have known her outside of the state. But the spotlight of publicity was turned on her, and the wires all over the world sagged with the stories of her doings.

We have a feeling that the Jones Company is beginning to see the advantage of publicity and disadvantages of advertising. Cold advertising is salesmanship and we don't like to have a concern stick its foot in the door and insist on its wares when we say "no." But a concern who pleases us, who gives us something worth while, who has a policy and sticks to it—who intrigues rather than bludgeons us—that is the one that gets our business and our approval.

Mr. Jones undoubtedly knows the Jones wagon business from tailboard to forelock or whatever it is a wagon has in front. Mr. Jones evidently can, on the slightest provocation, write us a message on anything about the Jones wagons from rivets to fifth-wheel. Doubtless Mr. Jones has so cut his spokes that he gets less shavings to the whittle and more curves to the lump. Granted all this. The truth is—we don't give a darn!

We sit down to listen to some music after a hard day's work and all of Mr. Jones' hired help clutter up the air, making their pretty little speeches—trying to entertain, rest and cheer us? No. Trying to sell us a mess of Jones wagon spokes. Confusing advertising with publicity. Ruining the program. Making us peeved, and sore and irritated with not only the Jones spokes but all spokes. And "pop" goes the button on the radio and we go to bed, or drag out the bridge table.

We wonder if Mr. Jones ever listens in himself?



ATHLEEN MANNING of Hollywood is another song writer of California who is harvesting various brands of success in her work. Already such luminaries as Paul Althouse, Arthur Hackett, Alice Mock, Elsa Alsen, Luella Melius and Claudia Muzio are singing her dashing and sophisti-

cated songs.

Alice Seckels, sponsor of many San Francisco musical series, has left for a month's vacation in Honolulu, combining rest with the interests of several of her artists.

Howard Hanson, director of music of the Eastman School of Music, whose idealistic aim is to assist gifted students through free scholarships, will conduct auditions for these scholarships in Southern California during the summer, it has been announced.

Maria Jeritza recently sang in concert a number of the songs of Kurt Mueller, Los Angeles composer.

Aileen Fealy, whose two-piano work with Phyllida Ashley has won national distinction, is enjoying the pleasant fruits of her recent solo recital, under the Seckels management, following her return from several months' work in Italy with her former teacher, Maria Carreras.

Sigismond Stojowski, composer-pianist, will hold monster classes in Portland during June and July, following two lecture recitals before the Oregon State Teachers' Music Association.

The teaching staff of the summer school of music, drama and art at Mills College, headed by Dr. Aurelia Reinhardt, will include in its faculty of twenty-eight persons Luther Marchant, director of music; Samuel Hume, director of drama, and Ralph Johnston, director of art.

Virgilio Lazzari, basso with the Chicago Civic Opera Company, has been engaged by Robert Everhart of the Proschowski School of Singing of Oakland to conduct special classes in voice culture and opera coaching in the fall of the year.

The Los Angeles Opera Association, under direction of Merle Armitage, with ballet direction by Pavley-Ourainsky and Armado Agnini, promises nine operas for its sixth season, beginning in October. An outstanding musical promise.

Arthur Friedheim, famous exponent and interpreter of Liszt, now living in Los Angeles, will offer a limited number of free competitive scholarships for his summer master classes.

Arthur Johnson, tenor, and May Van Dyke, composer-pianist, musicians of Portland, are scheduled to appear in a recital in New York.

The Columbia Phonograph Company has again put its shoulder to the wheel of musical progress and development in delegating a \$50,000 fund, operative in yearly awards for ten years for "the greatest service in the cause of music." Its operative methods will closely resemble those of the Nobel Prize awards, which held no restrictions as to age, sex or nationality. Otto H. Kahn is chairman of the council for 1929.

Out of ninety-two registered artists who filed with the Hollywood Bowl audition board, Marguerite le Grande, pianist; Fritz de Bruin, baritone, and Alexander Borisoff, violincellist, were selected to appear as soloists during the summer season.

Among the pupils of Annie Mottram Batten, vocal instructor in the college of music at the University of California, who have been raised to high harmonic places, are Betty Humphrey, appointed assistant instructor with Louis Graveure at Michigan State College, and Roena Bickelroy, who has been appointed head of the vocal department of Lincoln University of Missouri.

By holding some of its audition hearings in San Francisco, the National Music League makes it possible for finished performers to avail themselves of the special national league opportunities without traveling to New York to qualify. One such hearing—the second—was held in San Francisco on April 26.

THE Graf Zeppelin, giant German dirigible, will be en route to America by the time this goes to press, if present plans are carried out. Powerful radio apparatus has been installed, and in tests the Zeppelin has already attempted to communicate with an Atlantic seaboard naval station from Germany during its test flights. It is planned to give hourly reports of the giant air craft's journey, and radio listeners may have an opportunity of hearing, via the networks, the announcements direct from the Zeppelin itself. This will depend on whether or not the dirigible carries a voice transmitter with its powerful apparatus.

The Radio Manufacturers' Association, comprising the makers of most of the radio products of the country, have at last taken a decisive stand against the barrage of advertising over the radio. Resolutions deploring the present excessive commercialism were passed recently at Cleveland, in the interest of greater public enjoyment and more consistent returns. Broadcasters were urged to confine their advertising announcements to the names of sponsors without details or other advertising matter.

German scientists are experimenting with twelve-inch waves which they find may be directed readily to any other station as desired. The work of experimentation is being carried on under direction of the German Ministry of Traffic. The apparatus for generating the tiny waves is no larger than an ordinary receiving tube.

Down on 16.88 meters, a new broadcast station has joined the international family. It is at Huizan, Holland, and operates under the call letters PHOH1. It uses 130,000 watts of power and broadcasts only on Wednesday night. The balance of the week it uses code for a service with the Dutch East Indies and general commercial work. In the broadcast field it is one of the most powerful in the world.

Professor Reginald A. Fessenden, one of the early wizards of radio, whose remarkable apparatus in the infancy of the science was far ahead of its time, has joined the research ranks of television engineers to aid in the monumental task of solving sight transmission. Fessenden's station at Brant Rock, Mass., was famous in the "old days." His work in the more modern field is anticipated with interest because he is one of the few genuine experts which this country affords.

The National Broadcasting Company announces the addition of WFJC at Akron, Ohio, to its network chain. This staiton operates on 1450 kilocycles and is the fifth NBC station in the state.

A campaign has been launched by radio manufacturers to supply every child in the United States over 12 years of age with a radio set as an educative measure. "The world for a classroom" is to be the slogan of this newest drive.


British aviation interests see in a radio a means of lowering the insurance rates on persons and property. Planes equipped with radio add the safety element to air transportation, it is held. No plane leaving on a long trip will be permitted to depart without adequate wireless apparatus aboard, according to present plans.

On June 30 all European stations "shook up" their wave lengths. This affected twenty-seven telegraph administrations, and put into effect the Prague plan by which nine kilocycles separated between stations using medium waves down to 216 meters is accepted. Russian stations are so grouped as to avoid objectionable heterodyne features which have materially interfered with European broadcasts.

Switzerland, the land of mountains, tourists and clocks, now claims to have 70,000 radio receivers in operation. Because of its location Swiss listeners can tune in all over Europe with comparatively simple sets. The crystal set is still the prime favorite, although quite a number of American-made sets are in operation.

Fearful of private control of radio broadcasting the United Farmers, a powerful Canadian organization, has petitioned the Dominion Government to take over the control of all radio affairs in the country. The organization believes private control of radio would be a menace to the coöperative movement which forms the principles of the United Farmers of Canada.

Mothers who wish to keep in touch with their daughters while at work should train them for radio broadcasting, according to Rhena Marshall, staff artist at KOMO, who bases her observation on her recent experience.

Rather suddenly one day she made up her mind that she would like to visit her mother up in Vancouver; perhaps it was just a bit of home sickness. Arrangements were made for her to be relieved of her microphone appearances late in the afternoon so that she might board a stage for Vancouver, spend the night and the next morning with her mother and be back in Seattle in time for her microphone appearance for the following evening.

It was to be a surprise visit, but the surprise came to Rhena Marshall rather than her mother, for when she arrived at the stage depot her mother was there to meet her.

When Rhena Marshall recovered from her astonishment enough to talk she inquired how mother knew she was coming.

"Very simple," Mrs. Marshall replied. "I didn't hear your voice on KOMO after 3 o'clock in the afternoon and at first I thought perhaps you were taken ill. Then an intuition, a mother's intuition, you know, came to me and I called our stage terminal here to see if there were any buses leaving for Vancouver about 3 o'clock. They informed me that there was one at 3:15, so here I am."

"Isn't that just like a mother?" Rhena Marshall added in telling the story.



HELEN TROY---KYA

BELIEVE it or not, Helen Troy is Helen Troy's real, bona-fide name. This sweetest singer of popular songs on KYA and the ABC chain was handed the name she uses on the air when she was too young to protest-or realize what a whiz of a radio name it was. Her legion of admirers may not all know about the thousand-ship episode of ancient times in connection with a certain Helen who resided in Troy when the news

of her beauty and charm had to be broadcast by word of mouth, but they do all of them know that Helen Troy of San Francisco has a voice that is at once seductively charming and alive with exuberance. In case that final word seems a trifle exotic, just translate it as "pep." And her diction, too, is outstanding. As a matter of fact, if you are searching for flaws you will have to turn the dial from this young lady's singing.

Yes, Helen is just the sort of a young lady you would guess her to be from her work on the

air. She combines her sweetness, charm and modesty with rather a devastating capability. She is ambitious, conscientious, frank, and not without a sense of humor. most important from the masculine point of view, she has that elusive something about her that might be called feminine appeal.

Helen began at KYA as studio accompanist. At present her duties are rapidly enveloping both vocal and dramatic work in addition. With her youthful partner, the actor-singer-scribe, John Patrick, she participates in the Cecil and Sally sketches. These sketches have attracted much attention among those who are fond of fresh, live and interesting humor springing from present, every-day situations. Her work in them has been natural and convincing-quite a contrast to much of the stilted, oratorical type of acting one hears on the air. The feature will shortly be on the ABC chain, where it deserves to be.

Helen was born in San Francisco shortly before the big shake-up which started the conflagration of 1906. She doesn't remember this catastrophe. Her uncle was G. Late Silver, a Keith circuit headliner in his day, and he introduced Helen to the footlights at the tender age of five. For two years she

traveled with him, singing her winsome songs in his act.

So many successful musicians have been schooled in convents. Helen attended Sacred Heart Convent at Traverse City, Mich., until she was seventeen. By the time she had reached the seventh grade she was the school and chapel organist. Following graduation and a short course of study for theater work in Chicago she tackled her first

job—organist in a Grand Rapids,

Mich., theater.

But she was really too young to leave the scenes of her youth without succumbing to chronic nostalgia. Her companions back home were calling to her-there was the skating, tobogganing and other sports in the winter; the long, lazy summers. She was really far too young to be ambitiously inclined in a big city and so she returned to the home town. She organized a dance orchestra. For the following two years the young people of the neighborhood moved their feet

in rhythm and their hearts in tune to the song hits of the day played under her leadership.

When she was twenty ambition perked up its head. It began to seem to be worth while to do a little world conquering. So she packed up her music, tooth brush, wool socks (and other incidentals) and went to Detroit, where she played theater organ for a year. From Detroit she returned to "the place where she was born in." Helen has played at numerous San Francisco theaters, though principally at the Imperial when it was a West Coast house. A year ago she joined the KYA staff as studio accompanist.


One of Helen's principal sources of pleasure outside of her work is in piloting her car about town and countryside. She enjoys dashing hither and yon, and doesn't become bored with the machine-motion contrast to her musical work. Swimming she likes, too, and horseback riding. Ball games and dancing, particularly the latter, are also included in her itinerary whenever her work permits the leisure.

Her ambition is to sing and play better and better every day. Her remarkable rise in the public's estimation, due to the great


