

The Editor's Page

NHE United States Bureau of Education has just made a salient announcement. Says the bureau: "Too many persons are talking over the air who are not properly equipped for either radio speaking or announcing." When it gets to the point where the government notices it, the situation is pretty terrible. And the statement is undoubtedly true. Not only are too many people on the air who are not fitted for it, but there are a lot of them who ought to go back to school-start in about the third grade and learn to speak the language. And after that-stay away from a microphone forever. But, then, there are too many people talking everywhere, in street cars, hotels. street corners, Congress-who are not equipped for it. That seems to be one of our national faults-too much blab on too little provocation.

UNICIPALITIES everywhere a r e taking steps to curb the summer loud speaker nuisance, otherwise known as "radio insomnia" and the bane of many a neighborhood. It remained for New York City, however, to fine a man \$50 for disturbing the quiet of his neighbors by persistently and loudly playing his radio while his windows were up. The Federal Radio Commission has a model ordinance covering the loud speaker nuisance. New York City's ordinance is part of the sanitary code of its board of health and reads as follows:

"No person owning, occupying or having charge of any building or premises or any part thereof in the city of New York shall cause, suffer or allow any loud, excessive or unusual noise in the operation or use of any radio, phonograph or other mechanical or electrical sound making or reproducing device, instrument or machine, which loud, excessive or unusual noise shall disturb the comfort, quiet or repose of persons therein or in the vicinity." Some of our own Pacific Coast cities might do well to pass such an ordinance and enforce it.

REECE has granted a concession to install, erect and operate its entire national broadcast system, the nucleus of which is to be a 25,000-watt station at Athens. The concession runs for twenty years and is the first concession on record, of a national type, turning over everything to American interests in order to get the best. Taxes on receiving sets will pay for the upkeep. The station will be heard all over Europe, it is believed. The next Thermopylae will have its own Graham McNamee and we'll know what the weather was during the battle, at any rate.

THE man who pays Will Rogers about \$500 a minute for his weekly network appearances tells this story: A certain midwestern preacher, complaining of a decrease in attendance at his Sunday night services, made inquiries of his congregation. They didn't want to miss Will Rogers, he learned. So he had a radio receiving set installed in the church, takes time out for Will Rogers' talks, and all's well again.

ADIO waves are now being used by doctors to cure disease. Instead of writing out a prescription, the doctor pushes a button and the patient gets a couple of kilocycles for his liver. Instead of a thermometer the office nurse now uses a catwhisker. When a patient is all run down the doctor sells him a battery.

* * *

In some of the more expensive offices, where there are crystal controlled doctors, a sick man can buy waves so short he can never pay for them. Once a doctor had to have a medical certificate. Today all he needs is a power house and a good antenna. If the patient dies, the coroner puts down "static" as the cause of death and the doctor is safe on third.

Radio waves jazz up the electrons in the blood stream. They speed up circulation. They wind up the spring, and throw in the clutch. Old men with rheumatism get a good broadcast and start playing football. One shot with the bob-tail waves, and the baldheads break out in flowing locks. Doctors say two volts will do more than six

pills, and taste the same.

The treatment is simple. The doctor takes the patient's bank book at the door. Then he puts the victim on an insulated table. After that he goes behind a screen and points a radio squirt-gun at the sufferer. Tubes light, dials turn, and the patient's temperature rises. When he begins to see fifteen blonde chorus girls on pink clouds the doctor shuts off the juice, adds \$25 on the bill, and sends the patient away happy.

The Germans discovered the use of radio for disease—by accident. A German engineer, married three times and completely discouraged, happened to walk in front of a high-powered transmitter. His spine straightened, his jaw set. He dashed out, got a divorce and married his stenographer. The government immediately ordered the set turned off while they did some research. As a result radio-therapy was given to the world. There are some things that cannot be cured by radio. It will positively not cure a wife's habit of talking back. Even short waves, which travel 180,000 miles a second, are too slow to keep pace with the feminine tongue. When his head was turned the politician swiped the machine and donated it to his home town to get votes. The doctor went back to pennyroval.

Despite the improvement of radio over the old pill days, children will continue to have measles, mumps and whooping cough, radio or no radio. You can't cheat a child out of staying home from school by a couple of tubes and a transformer. No matter what science has done, he still likes licorice in his cough syrup.

At first doctors can use only a small amount of power. But after they get used to kilowatting out an appendix or shifting a tonsil into a new location without knives and saws, they invariably ask for more power. In a few years we'll see tall lattice masts on the downtown office buildings and we can all sit at home with a crystal set and keep fit on a two-meter health wave.

One nice thing about radio waves, if they are strong enough, they cook what they are pointed at. That stops all argument. Today when a doctor cuts out a man's heart, or his brain, the patient insists on carrying off the spare part for a souvenir. This is often embarrassing to a doctor, as a chisel sometimes slips. But the radio waves just fry things up and no patient will ever bother to ask for a cinder.

Doctors will have to have shielded offices, all enclosed in metal to keep some other doctor from squirting a wave through the wall and operating on patients for the wrong thing, just by way of professional jealousy. A doctor will also have to wear a badge. What with rubber gloves and insulated shoes nobody will be able to tell him from a burglar.

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

Lieutenant Charles E. Saltzman, son of Major General Charles McK. Saltzman, former chief of the Army Signal Corps, and now chairman of the Federal Radio Commission, has resigned from the Army Engineering Corps to join the staff of the New York Telephone Company. Lieutenant Saltzman is a 1925 graduate of Cornell and was Rhodes scholar at Oxford from 1925 to 1928. He was serving as White House aide when his resignation became effective last week.

Electrical Review of London reports that photoradio services, already available between New York and London, are entering the practical stage for transmission along the British beam wireless circuits. The sending of photographs between London and Capetown and between London and Australia is the beginning of an Empire system which will enable England and its colonies to exchange pictures for newspaper publication and otherwise almost instantaneously.

Scotland Yard "Goes Modern"

UTHORS of mystery stories featuring the amazing exploits of mythical Scotland Yard inspectors will have to revise their technique somewhat when the 'Yard'' gets its own radio service established, which will be accomplished in the near future, according to reports to Washington.

Three transmitting stations are planned, one in London, another probably in Birmingham, and the third in Scotland, with receiving sets in all British cities, through which Scotland Yard, whose jurisdiction is not confined to London, but extends throughout the entire island, will be able to draw still closer the tight net which, according to our favorite author, is cast around the criminal so careless as to arouse the interest of the famous manhunters by popping off Lord Somebody or stealing Lady Somebody-Else's famous pearls under the most tremendous handicaps.

But better still from the standpoint of the "shilling shocker" are the plans of the Ontario Provincial Police, who have inaugurated a radio network linking up district police stations with the department headquarters. Here, all messages will be in secret code and on a wavelength to be known only to police officials. The Canadian criminal in future tales will have to be possessed of "a very small but extremely efficient" receiving set, which he will have probably secured from an equally criminal radio expert after discovering the secret wavelength and solving the code. Unless so equipped, we fear the Canadian "master mind" will pass from our literature, sunk without a trace.

M. Lecoque, the urbane head of the French Surete, whose gallic clairvoyance always brings the international ring to justice on page 312, also will trap his victims by radio without leaving his desk, by using the short-wave station in the Eiffel Tower, which is to communicate with police throughout the country and at border towns and seaports under a system of communication now being established.

The way of the transgressor becomes harder and harder, but modern science is certainly going to be a boon to the book business.

To Increase Top-Power Stations

BIG increase in the number of broadcasting stations with 50,000 watts power —the highest power now granted—is provided for in orders adopted by the Federal Radio Commission. Issued as "restricting" to four the number of cleared channels in any zone which may be used by stations of this power, the commission's order is considered the first step toward providing increases in the maximum power of a number of stations,

Color is given this presumption by the fact that at the present time there are not more than ten 50,000-watt stations in operation, while the new rule will provide a maximum of 20 channels for such broadcasters, upon which, of course, more than 20 stations may be placed by requiring some to share time. A number of applications for the maximum power are pending before the commission, upon which decisions will probably not be rendered before autumn, and the inference drawn from this recent action is that several of them will be granted.

The commission's order was adopted by a vote of four to one, the dissenting ballot being cast by Commissioner Ira E. Robinson, who has been consistently opposed to high power on the ground that better service could be secured by restriction, and who unsuccessfully sought to have the commission adopt a policy of limiting power to 25,000 watts.

The commission is also engaged upon another effort to carry into effect the "equalization" provisions of the radio law, and has evolved an intricate method of rating stations upon a "unit" system, with 1000-watt stations as the basis, the computation involving such factors as the number of stations operating simultaneously on the same frequency, the distance of separation between such stations, hours of operation, etc., which, when completed, will show just what each zone has. The commission has already figured out the relative facilities of the different zones by several methods, always getting the same answer, but the summer is long and another calculation will help to pass the time.



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Be Careful What You Write to an Airplane

The breach of promise case in which radio figures is not far off.

"He wrote me when I was 7000 feet up, over Idaho, that he loved me," testifies the fair maiden.

"Where was he?" asks the court.

"In Chicago, your honor."

"And where did he promise to marry you "

"Above the Grand Canyon. I have his radio letter."

It can be done, and that at the present time. Tests, just completed, show that a man may write a letter to a friend in an airplane, or someone flying over the Rockies can write home to the folks, and the letter, with a facsimile reproduction of the original writing, transmitted and received by radio. All that is necessary is the proper apparatus installed in plane and ground station.

In the tests, a message was written with an ordinary lead pencil on a sheet of paper. The paper was wrapped around a cylinder which revolved in front of photo-electric cells. A similar cylinder in the receiving plane received the impulses from the ground transmitter, and a stylus reproduced the writing on a cylinder rotating in the plane. Photographs and printed matter were sent in the same way.

The use of this new system in business is highly important, according to radio engineers who are trying to perfect the system. A business man may write a communication direct to his associates. Received in his own handwriting, it will never be questioned, where a radio message might be open to doubt or misconstruction. For war purposes, it permits coded diagrams, pictures and messages being transmitted by observation planes.

The most important development, however, and this is the one which the device was originally perfected to make possible, is the transmission of maps by camera planes. Photographs of troop movements, of supply trains, of fortifications and trenches, taken from the air, can be transmitted, in the ultimate development of this system, to ground stations far away without the plane bringing back the original pictures. This the war department considers of immense importance.

KFRC Files Application for 50 KW.

DON LEE INC., rejoined the ranks of applicants for 50-kilowatt stations on June 20 by asking the Federal Radio Commission to authorize an increase in the power of KFRC, San Francisco, from 1-kilowatt to 50-kilowatts on 610 kilocycles. At the same time Don Lee's Los Angeles station, KHJ, sought authority to increase from 1-kilowatt to 5-kilowatts on 610 kilocycles.

The applications followed close upon the decision of the Federal Radio Commission. limiting the number of maximum powered stations to four to each zone, or twenty for the entire country. At present there are only eight in operation and six others have been authorized, the only one in the fifth zone of Rocky Mountain and Pacific Coast states being KNX, Los Angeles.

As far as the Pacific Coast is concerned. the way has been opened, largely through the efforts of Commissioner H. A. Lafount, for its obtaining at least four full-time channel assignments for 50,000 watters. One has been assured KNX, which is now building to that power. Stations KFI and KGO have made the proper applications, so that the way is left open for one more cleared channel station in the fifth zone to procure maximum power now allowable. The eight stations now operating with 50-kilowatts are WEAF, York; WTIC, Hartford. Conn.; New WENR, WBAP, Fort Worth; WGY, Schenectady; KDKA, Pittsburgh; WLW, Cincinnati, and WTAM, Cleveland.

If Lucile stood behind him well, you just couldn't find her, that's all.

Miss Taylor you all know as the soprano soloist of the Eastman program and Gwynfi Jones as a Welsh tenor whose voice is heard in concert as well as through the air. Easton Kent, one of the best known of the NBC troupe, has the distinction of a performance at the Metropolitan Opera House, New York. William Powers is a high-ranking Western colored tenor. Harold Dana, Eileen Piggott and George Eldredge, others on the WMA "honor role," are just as well known and exceedingly popular with the NBC audience.

A New Tube Checker at a Popular Price

VERY accurate and effective tube checker to sell at a popular price is announced by the Jewell Electrical Instrument Company, 1650 Walnut Street, Chicago, Ill. This instrument operates on 50-60 cycle, 110-120-volt alternating current, and no batteries are needed.

The Jewell Pattern 209 Tube Checker, as it is called, consists of a Jewell Pattern 88 Direct Current Meter with six tube sockets, in a case of molded bakelite. The sockets provide filament voltages of 1.5, 2.5, 3.3, 5, and 7.5 to four-prong sockets, and 2.5 to a five-prong socket.

Two terminals giving three volts are provided for tubes such as the older Kellogg that have heater terminals on top. A jack



and suitable lead are provided for a grid control connection.

The actual grid test is accomplished by shifting the grid from one position in the network to another, thereby giving a definite change in plate current corresponding to the difference between the two grid polarities. Expected values of the first plate current reading are given in an engraved chart on the face of the tube checker together with the expected increase in plate current when the button is pressed. The base plate carries detailed instructions.

The meter used in the Pattern 209 is a Jewell Pattern 88 with the 50 division scale, $2\frac{1}{16}$ inches long. The instrument is accurately calibrated to two ranges of 10 and 50 milliamperes full scale. The 10 milliampere range is read by a push button switch which does

not add series resistance, but accurately calibrates the instrument to the 10 milliampere scale.

Filament voltages are obtained from a full size transformer, with turns very accurately adjusted, so that at 115 volts input the various filament values are exactly as marked. The wire is designed to carry the heavy filament currents without heating.

A vitrified porcelain resistor is supplied in the circuit large enough to prevent damage in most cases of short circuited tubes, but of a sufficiently low value to avoid affecting the readings.

The Pattern 209 Tube Checker is a very high-grade development, and will be found more accurate and more satisfactory for tube testing than any equipment heretofore available at a comparable price.


Pirate Broadcaster Exiled by United States

EOGRE W. FELLOWES of St. Louis had a broadcast station but no license. He had a microphone but no orchestra. He had ambition but no scruples. And so—George "swiped" his programs from the big stations—hooked them off the air, as it were, and rebroadcast them to his dissatisfied customers.

To add a touch of verisimilitude to his offerings, George would "cut" the program just before the big station announced and make his own announcements. Now and then, when business was dull, George hooked his telephone into his "mike" and let the world hear him talk to his best girl. All of which aroused Uncle Sam's wrath and broke a lot of radio laws.

So-the St. Louis grand jury indicted George. He was tried and found guilty. The court sentenced him to a year and a day at Leavenworth, in no sense a luxury, and then suspended sentence while immigration officials looked him up. Last week Uncle Sam deported George, the free-lance broadcaster—sent him back to England where he belonged, and St. Louis' unsponsored, bootleg concerts were over.

The penalty is the first assessed for this offense.
