

# The Editor's Page

AHE incorrect broadcasting of time signals by radio stations has reached a climax in the move taken by Congress toward the prosecution of sponsors who transmit "phony" time as an advertisement, and the cancellation of station licenses of broadcasters who permit it. The air has been cluttered for months with "standard time" signals, none of which were standard time. It appears that this is a violation of the federal regulations and at least one concern, under indictment, has brought a bunch of trouble to a number of stations by involving them in this spurious time service for the purpose of selling a few watches. Standard time is broadcast from only one place, on this coast at least, and that is Mare Island Naval Observatory. And only those stations which broadcast by direct wire from Mare Island can be rightly called "standard time."

HE Department of Commerce estimates that radio dealers will, during the year 1930, do a business of \$645.000,000. This ought to encourage a lot of concerns that have pinned crepe on their faith in sales conditions returning to normal. With 122,-000,000 persons in the United States, of whom only one-four have radio sets, it would appear that there were still a few more sets to be sold, and a few more customers to be served. Even a sailor can't expect a smooth ocean all the time and a new industry is subject to more violent fluctuations than an old one. Radio is the biggest demand of human existence aside from purely physical needs, that the world has yet seen.

**P**ROMISE of a new radio network with WOR, New York, as the key station, to operate in competition to the National Broadcasting and Columbia networks, has come out of the East. WOR was formerly allied with the Columbia chain, but severed this connection and entered the field as an independent. It now purposes network connections of its own. This is a good move. Competition in the entertainment field is more to be desired than centralization and monopoly. A smaller network, competing with the larger ones, is apt to stimulate better programs all around.

HE courts seem to be able to block the administration of laws about as effectively as they enforce them. The Federal Radio Commission ordered KFKB, Milford, Kan., the "goat gland" broadcaster, off the air because of offensive medical publicity. The station secured an injunction in the federal court, and the station is back on the air again and will remain there, shooting its junk, until attorneys can argue the matter late in the year before the court. Congress could have equipped the Commission with adequate authority in the first place to prevent the four-wheeled brakes of an injunction tying its hands.

ANHATTAN is going to have a radio city. It is to be a sixty-story building when finished, and every inch will be devoted to radio. The plan is to gather all the misery in one place. Announcers, sponsors, air advertisers, sopranos, service men—all will be kept inside the building. Relatives may go and see them on Saturdays. There will be an auditorium where they can all gather on Sundays and yell their heads off.

The idea is to be financed by John D. Rockefeller, Jr., and a group of tired business men who like to sit at home and read the evening paper in peace. They are going to make this new insane asylum comfortable and all that, but they will curb the nut output just the same.

Radio listening is not incurable. Sometimes people have a light attack and get over it. Others are affected for months or years. At the radio city the inmates will be examined and each given the work to do for which he is best suited. He can build sets, or solder wire, or take a radio set apart, or sit in a room and listen to a crooner. Scientists will squirt a ray on him while he is doing it in the hope that he will get better.

Incurables will be given responsible positions in the radio city, the management making use of their disability for the benefit of the rest of humanity. Violent cases will be allowed to broadcast to each other. Padded rooms for announcers, orchestra lofts for nusicians who have microphonitis and other modern scientific equipment is to be featured.

\* \* \*

Radio weddings will be permitted. Families can be raised in the radio city, but all babies must be portable. Cats or other pets will be permitted, but only with proper voice modulation with power detector input. Suppressors will be used everywhere to insure conformity with city rules. Nothing will be charged, the entire institution being run on a cash a. c., basis. Dynamic results are expected.

Television is to be used so that people may see how they look when they do what they are doing. This, it is believed, will cure a lot of folks who never know what they are doing until it is done. There will be no privacy in the city because an electrical eye is in every room, and a man can't even change his shirt without everybody in the auditorium seeing him.

Much thought has been given to the needs of the modern man in outlining the curriculum of the city's intensive educational phases. Courses in jackstraws, loud-speaker smashing, hit-running, and bigamy have been suggested. High speed divorces, synchronized by legal escapements, and radioactive bigotry may also be available when the city is fully established.



## "Phony" Time Signals Bring Federal Penalty

ONGRESS has taken steps at last to halt "phony" advertising on the air. It is also moving to stop the broadcasting of "bogus standard time signals," a practice followed by many stations regardless of the truth. Full information of these two activities has been requested by Congressman Frank Reid of Illinois of the Federal Radio Commission.

The investigation deals particularly with one watch concern which is under federal scrittiny. In the order to the Commission, the Federal Trade Commission, the Attorney General, the Secretary of Labor and the Secretary of the Treasury, Congress asks for information regarding the smuggling and uncervaluation of watches by thirty-three individuals, already indicted, and fourteen watch companies caught in violations of custom laws.


The Radio Commission comes into the picture because one of the watch companies has been using a radio network to advertise its wares. The radio advertising of this company was made the subject of an investigation by the Better Business Bureau, and a report was sent to the Radio Commission.

One of the radio advertisements of the company consisted of an exhortation to "listen in nightly for 'blank' time" which was represented as being given from the company's observatory. Federal operatives discovered the "observatory" to be a five by eight foot room on top of a building and the time given instead of being observatory time, was taken from the Western Union time service by various broadcast stations.

The Radio Commission has full authority under the law to cancel the operating license of any station which broadcasts misinformation or false and misleading statements. The habit that operators have had of 'filling in' local time from Western Union wires, and purveying to the public as "standard time" is a violation of this regulation and stations which have been following this practice may have their license cancel.ed.

Just what action the House of Representatives intends to take in the matter seems to be speculative at Washington. Congressional action may force cancellation of station license of those who have violated the above regulation as a means of enforcing the law, and of letting additional new stations on the air.

## Atwater Foundation Announces 4th National Radio Audition

HO have the best young singing voices in Northern California?

Opportunity will be offered them to participate in the distribution of \$25,000 in cash awards and to obtain at least a year's scholarship in some great American conservatory music or under a world-renowned of teacher, according to plans for the Fourth National Radio Audition which has been announced by the Atwater Kent Foundation, of Philadelphia, through its Northern California Headquarters at KPO, San Francisco. In 1927, 1928 and 1929 the Foundation conducted nationwide searches for the best young men and young women, with the result that more than 150,000 youthful songbirds competed. In all three years California singers placed first, second or both, bringing fame and glory not only to themselves, but to the State of California, with the result that the Golden West again looks to its young singers to uphold the honor already established by its former winners.

With this in mind and a greater number of contestants expected, every village town and large city in Northern California will soon be hastening plans for local auditions. A young man and a young woman, between the ages of 18 and 25 years, are selected by competition in each city or community. These compete in a state audition which will be held over KPO Monday evening, October 20, 9 to 12 o'clock, in which one young man and one young woman are selected to participate in the District Audition also held over KPO, Monday, November 17, in which winners from nine western states will compete for the honor of representing the Fifth District at the Final Audition to be held at New York in December, in a coast to coast broadcast. The District Audition originating in the studios of KPO will be broadcast over the Pacific Coast network of the National Broadcasting Company.

The prizes to be awarded at the National Finals are:

First place (one boy and one girl), \$5000 each and two years' tuition in an American conservatory.

Second place (one boy and one girl), \$3000 each and one year's tuition.

Third place (one boy and one girl), \$2000 each and one year's tuition.

Fourth place (one boy and one girl), \$1500 each and one year's tuition.

Fifth place (one boy and one girl), \$1000 each and one year's tuition.

Accoridng to latest word from Northern California Headquarters the State Committee of Sponsorship will soon be released for publication together with the various local audition centers and the dates the auditions will be held.

## Commission Prepares for Summer

NLY routine matters will be handled by the Federal Radio Commission during the next two months, and no further radical changes in allocations will be considered before September.

July and August will see the work of the Commission at its low point, as commissioners and such employees as can be spared leave sweltering Washington for cooler climes. Most of the time, however, it is expected that there will be at least one commissioner in Washington who, under an agreement reached by the commissioners, will take action on routine matters, such as renewal applications, requests for modifications of construction permits or licenses to cover permits, and applications for approval of voluntary assignments, and also will deal with any emergency which may arise.

While Commissioner Lafount contemplates an inspection trip through his district and Commissioner Sykes will hold some hearings in the field, it is not planned to undertake any extensive activities during the summer, but the engineering and legal divisions, it is understood, will prepare data and plans for changes contemplated by the Commission to eliminate cross-talk interference, the first moves in which were held up by court orders this spring, and to comply more closely with the "equitable distribution" clauses of the radio act, when the Commission resumes its activities next fall.

## New Air Safety Network to Aid Flyers

S TIMULATED by the excellent radio work done by the plane, Southern Cross, in its trip across the Atlantic, and other developments in aircraft signaling, the Government is planning on an elaborate program of radio facilities for aviation protection with the next federal budget.

The program includes a nation-wide system of route-marking, weather forecasting and report distribution, compass and beacon installations, and ground to plane telephone service. The program represents the accumulation of five years of experimentation by a dozen branches of the government toward safe national flying. Protection of planes while in flight, to prevent them running into unexpected fogs and storms, apparatus by which planes off course may find their way back again, and emergency equipment designed to get immediate aid for flyers down in isloated sections, are all included in the federal plans.

There is practically no other means of communicating with planes in flight save by radio. The great development of the flying art in the past year, the growth of commercial lines, the heavy mail sent by air carriers, and all the tremendous expansion of the flying calls for a corresponding accompaniment of radio activities. As nearly as possible airplane radio devices must be automatic, both in transmission and reception. They must produce visual indications for the aviator and immediate connections for ground stations, so devised as to show graphically a plane's position at any hour. Toward this end every technical facility of the government and a score of radio laboratories is being bent.

Two-way phone communication between planes and ground has been worked out, on frequencies set aside by the Federal Radio Commission, together with a special frequency for distress signals to which are tuned "listening posts" that are at all times, "on the air" for calls for help.

In conjunction with these developments, receiving sets for planes have been developed and are in use, by which pilots not only follow radiobeacon signals to a safe landing but get phone messages from ground stations as well. Many planes are already equipped to talk by phone and many more are in process of so being equipped.

Through governmental frequency allocations and airport connections, it will shortly be possible to talk to a passenger in a plane anywhere in the country, from a home telephone.

## Sunshine Program Popular

EN STUART'S Thirty Minutes of Sunshine program, broadcast every evening, except Sunday and Monday, beginning at 10 o'clock, is bringing sunshine into the homes of many Pacific Northwest homes 24 hours a day.

A pot-pourri of music by the Sunbeams Orchestra, piano solos by Ivan Ditmars and songs, humor, philosophy and the reading of letters and original verse from listeners by Stuart make up the Sunshine program.

Stuart's Sunshine, broadcast for a yearand-a-half has become popular with shutins. Actually the program is bringing happiness to Pacific Northwest shut-ins in two ways.

The program itself is entertaining the shut-ins, and by means of the program he is raising money for radio sets for shut-ins unable to own receivers so that the invalids can listen all day long.

Stuart has organized the 1930 Sunshine Club, and since its inception, only a short time ago, has placed 35 sets in the homes of shut-ins and blind persons.

Listeners are mailing in dollar subscriptions to become members of the Club. This money is used to change battery sets to electric receivers. The transformation is being done by a Seattle radio firm at the cost of the material.

Stuart's work with the Sunshine Club has grown out of broadcasting for the Sunshine and Smiles Society during the last Christmas season when he sold hundreds of boxes of cards for the famous Seattle shut-ins relief organization.

The program is broadcast over KJR and Northwest Broadcasting System stations.

## Improved Equipment Requires Greater Station Separation

A S T improvement in transmitting equipment is still to be desired, it is demonstrated by studies recently made by the Federal Radio Commission into the mileage separation necessary between broadcasting stations operating on close frequencies.

Pending the development of apparatus which will narrow the wave emitted by transmitting stations, elimination of crosstalk and heterodyne interference can be accomplished only by providing wide separation of stations not widely separated in frequency.

The need for greater separation between stations, it is explained by officials of the commission, was the underlying reason for its attempt this spring to shift twenty-six stations and re-assign several cleared channels, enforcement of which was held up by restraining orders secured by three of the broadcasters involved in the reallocation.

The original belief that stations in the same city but separated by 30 kilocycles or more would not interfere with each other has been discarded as a result of studies by the commission's experts, who now claim that two stations using as low as 50 watts power and separated by 30 kilocycles should be at least twenty-two miles apart to be absolutely free of interference from each other. This mileage-separation requirement, of course, increases as the power grows greater but, fortunately, not in proportion, and 500-watt stations on a 30-kilocycle separation are all right if ninety miles apart. Stations of 25,000 to 50,000 kilowatts power should be from 260 to 300 miles apart on a 30 kilocycle separation. Under the tables which have been worked out, the separation for stations on the same frequencies is ten times that required when they are 30 kilocycles apart.

Abandonment of the view that a separation of 30 kilocycles was sufficient for stations in the same city not using very great power, it is explained, is due to the great improvement in transmitter design and equipment. When the original allocations were made, the separations then provided were adequate, but since then the efficiency of transmitting equipment has been so increased that stations using modern apparatus have a much greater field without using increased power. This has caused interference between stations which originally had no difficulty along this line, and has necessitated a total revision of the commission's ideas regarding mileage separation.

Further increase in the mileage separations may be necessary in the near future, it is indicated by Commissioner Harold A. Lafount. Pointing out that sunspots have been found to have an actual and measurable influence upon reception in the East of western radio programs, Mr. Lafount predicts that by the end of next year eastern listeners will be receiving with good volume western stations which they now cannot pick up.

"Nine years ago, when the radio broadcasting was just starting," Mr. Lafount declared, "we were in a minimum of solar activity—a sunspot minimum—and reception in the East from western stations was at its maximum. For the past several years we have been passing through a maximum of sunspots. Measurements made by Dr. Greenleaf Whittier Pickard at Newton Center, Mass., have shown low field values from western stations, in consequence of which but slight heterodyne interference has existed between East and West coast stations.

"Scientists tell us we are now rapidly passing through the sunspot maximum or period, with the result that field strength of West coast stations is increasing in the East, and an extrapolation of the curve indicates that within a year we shall again have high field strength from western stations."

## Lifts Radio Embargo

Once treated as contraband of war, radio equipment is now welcomed in China. The Chinese ministry of communications is building many new broadcasting stations, mostly with imported apparatus, and will soon begin encouraging those who can afford them to purchase radio receiving sets.

## "Statue" of "Amos Jones"

If the letters Bennie receives paint a true picture of the attitude of the WMA audience, it wouldn't be fair not to offer first a profile of that genial studio personality—The Editor.

"Keep That Old Smile Smiling . . . !"

How well NBC dialers know that slogan. It is identified with Bennie in the studio and outside. "More than 200 pounds of good humor" rightly described him. As the slogan suggests, he radiates happiness everywhere he goes. His eyes always are laughing and he refuses to take even an interview seriously.

"Tell the folks my name's really Ben Walker McLaughlin and that I've two of the handsomest kids you ever saw and a marvelous little wife. Oh yes, and that one of the funniest things of all to me is the time I spend being Little Bennie . . . picture 200-pound me imitating a five-year old!"

Ben has been identified with the theatre since he was 13 years old.

"An enthusiastic father staged benefit entertainments in our home-town for everybody from the fireman to the Methodist Church and I played in them," Bennie confesses. "Meanwhile, I became a baker. That was fortunate for when the World War was declared—and I enlisted—I was all equipped to bake biscuits for the doughboys. Just one officer had to test one of my biscuits, I was made camp cook."

After the Armistice, Bennie came West. He sang at the San Gabriel Mission Play and toured with various vocal groups coming to NBC with one of these—The Rounders. With the organization of the Woman's Magazine of the Air, he became editor really a master-of-ceremonies. His business is to present the various performers and this week he has an unusual galaxy of stars to offer.

The list includes Annabelle Jones Rose, Irving Kennedy, Mary Groom, Harold Dana, Harold Peary, Peggy Chapman, Gwynfi Jones, Eva Gruninger Atkinson, Gail Taylor and Austin Mosher.

Peggy Chapman is the only one of the group who offers popular songs exclusively. She has been singing them through the air since the earliest days of radio, when she made her debut in Los Angeles. Afterward Peggy starred on Radio's Broadway in New York City with Major Bowes' Capitol Theatre Family and Roxy's gang.

Miss Chapman is a native of San Francisco. Besides singing, she is an arranger and won no little success as a song writer with publication last year of "I'll Only Remember Your Love." Peggy wrote the music and Bennie, the lyric. She has made many records, too, among them, "I Can't Give You Anything But Love, Baby," "I Must Have That Man" and "Forgive Me."

Gwynfi Jones, on the Thursday program with Miss Chapman, is an inveterate motion picture fan. He probably hasn't missed a "four-star" picture this year.

Jones has been singing before a microphone since the inauguration six years ago of KGO. Before that, he devoted himself to concert singing in the United States and abroad.

## Church Stations Giving Way

**B**ROADCASTING stations owned by religious institutions are gradually yielding their places in the radio spectrum to commercial interests. In recent months, no less than seven church stations were sold and the transfer of their licenses ratified by the Federal Radio Commission.

Efforts of other church groups to find a lodgement in radio are almost invariably resisted by the Commission, which has shown a decided preference for stations furnishing an all-round program service rather than for those with highly specified messages. However, even before the Commission came into being there were about fifty stations owned by churches, theological schools or evangelists.

The ranks of the fifty are slowly being depleted, though some of the religious stations, notably those owned and operated by evangelists, show no disposition whatever to abandon radio. For the most part, churches are depending for radio outlets upon affilia-

tions with their local broadcasting stations while their national organizations are being heard over the radio networks.

Most church stations are local, lowpowered affairs. Among the sects represented in the list of those remaining are the Baptists, Methodists, Presbyterians, Catholics, Congregationalists, Lutherans and Seventh Day Adventists.

Only a few of the church stations themselves "sell time" to commerical sponsors of programs. Except for the evangelists, who often solicit funds for their stations over the air, the church stations have found the economic burden of operating a broadcasting station too great for them. This accounts for the willingness of many of them to sell out. On the other hand, others, like the Peoples Pulpit Association and Wilbur Glenn Voliva, have persistently sought better wave lengths and more time on the air from the Federal authorities.
