

Radio Industry Looking to Prosperity

ADVENT of 1931 models of radio sets indicate that the industry firmly believes that the depression which has marked 1930 is about to be dissipated and that the coming winter will see a return to more normal conditions. Reports indicate that the "weak sisters" have been about eliminated and that the set manufacturers who remain are fully able to finance their activities and carry on the determined effort which appears to be getting under way to overcome the inertia of the very slack summer through which the country has passed.

The new sets represent considerable improvement over former models, but little or nothing of a radical nature has been introduced, leaders in the industry believing that it is better to advance gradually than to bring out new types which would cause upheaval.

The battle for control of the radio market, it is held, will narrow down to a few able and well-financed manufacturers who can build up the most efficient distributing services. Opinion differs as to whether cost will be a predominant factor. Some manufacturers profess to see a trend toward lower costs, while others assert that prices are due for an upswing.

The new models come on the market at a time when the heavy inventories with which some manufacturers were caught have been worked out. The field, therefore, is clear for a fresh start and the industry, thoroughly familiar with the financial situation and industrial prospects, is attesting its belief in the basic soundness of conditions by getting into production on a large scale.

With thousands of workers again finding employment in the radio industry, it is hoped, added impetus may be given to the recovery of business generally. The industry plans to reverse the usual process of manufacturing to meet the demand, and this year will create the demand for its production.

If every manufacturer in the country would go ahead, and increase his working force and try to sound out his market without waiting for someone else, conditions might improve. We think it is time to set the ball rolling, and we can't expect the working man to buy merchandise unless he has wages to buy them with,

No Quarter for Radio Pirates

ACING the necessity of reducing the number of broadcasting stations in some of the zones so as to make actually effective the equitable distribution provisions of the Davis amendment to the radio law, the Federal Radio Commission will show no leniency to "pirate" stations, of which it is estimated about fifty are in operation. "Pirate" stations are stations which operate without license from the commission and are, therefore, violating the radio law and rendering themselves liable to the penalties provided for unlicensed transmission.

For some months the commission, through the agents of the radio division of the Department of Commerce, has been quietly checking up on unlicensed stations and in a number of instances has secured evidence believed sufficient to secure a conviction. which has been turned over to the Department of Justice with a view of prosecuting the offenders. If necessary, the commission is determined to bring a case against every unlicensed operator found on the air, but it is not believed that this will be necessary, as the greater number will undoubtedly be scared off as soon as one or two cases are initiated and it becomes evident that the Government means business.

The Government has already successfully terminated one case of this nature, an unlicensed operator in St. Louis, found to be an alien, having chosen deportation in preference to a jail sentence following his conviction on charges of operating an unlicensed station and with rebroadcasting the program of licensed stations without authority. It is probable that other cases will be ready for presentation in the Federal courts by the time their fall terms open.

The situation with respect to station congestion is losing none of its difficulty, the records of the commission indicate. With some zones already using more than their quota of the broadcasting facilities, there has been no let-up in the flood of applications for new stations. The more than six hundred stations now legally operating have imposed upon the broadcasting-frequency band a burden fully as great as it can bear, and there are few places in which additional stations can be injected without jeopardizing the entire set-up. If, in addition, unlicensed operators are permitted to continue on the air without any restrictions whatsoever, it is pointed out, chaos only can be the result, and it is this threat that has stiffened the commission's determination to wipe out all pirate stations.

The commission is making no secret of the fact that it is studying ways and means of reducing the number of stations in overquota zones and has no intention of making the situation more difficult by licensing additional broadcasters in such areas. "At the present time," it was declared by the commission recently, "overcongestion exists in numerous communities and rather than increase this by alloting additional facilities, the commission is in duty bound to effect a reduction in the number of certain types and classes of stations."

Definite action toward bringing about actual equalization, however, will probably not be taken by the commission until it becomes definitely apparent whether the Couzens legislation proposing a permanent communications commission will be enacted at the short session of Congress next winter. The probabilities are that it will not be, since the session is limited to three months and the legislation contains provisions of a controversial nature on which a great deal of time will probably be spent in debate.

New Distributors For Howard Radio Appointed

NNOUNCEMENT has just been made that the Pacific Wholesale Radio Co. has taken over the distribution of Howard radios for northern California. L. H. Reyburn, manager, states that he chose this line after careful consideration of a number of receivers. The fact that the Howard radio has been known nationally since 1921, coupled with its present enviable reputation, were the contributing factors which decided him on this line.

"Howard sets are not built to a price," states .Reyburn, "but built to a standard." Limited production enables them to do this," he further states.

Experiments are being made at KJBS with an electric piano pickup which gives promise of developing into a new type of musical instrument. The results obtained so far give a sound which is like a combination of the harp and piano. Using the new pickup, a pianist must be sharp and clean cut in his fingering, for the instrument will detect an error in a glaring way, but entirely new effects are possible with a musician who studies its tone. It is entirely possible that the "Electrochord," as it has been dubbed, will provide future orchestras with something novel and entertaining in the way of diversity.



Ted White, KHJ

T'S an ill wind that anybody blows through a saxophone, according to some cynics, and after hearing Chic Sale's stirring sermon on "The Saxophone versus the Zither," Ted White legged right down to the music shop and traded in "that instrument of the devil," the saxophone, on a hand engraved Swiss zither, and learned to yodel 'til the cows came home. And that may explain the press comment after Ted's first song program over KHJ, which said he had the "old 'come hither' quality" in his singing.

Whatever the quality may be, it gets results. And it not only causes the hearts of women to palpitate, but it also gets under the skins of most men. Chas. McGurk, writing in the Liberty Magazine, referred to White as "the most romantic singer I ever heard." This was in an article about Reno, where Ted was singing in a night club, "The Willows," which he affectionately calls the "Woman's Exchange." This rendezvous of the rich and famous who have the Reno habit was Ted's haunt for seventy-six weeks, preceding his KHJ experience. Ted was sort of official Dan Cupid for these divorcing couples and many's the time they've rushed back into each other's arms and hearts after hearing White croon "Look Down, Look Down That Lonesome Road, Before You Travel On," with all vocal vox humana and aeolian stop on SWELL.

Ted White was brought to Hollywood to play and sing the part of a cabaret entertainer in the movies, but after he arrived he found that the screen story had cut out all the cabaret scenes. The blow was so great that our hero decided not to show his face again, so he started radio singing. And nobody will let him guit, even though he might want to—which he doesn't.

Ted used to be in musical comedy and vaudeville. "Wendell and White" were known on the Keith and Eastern circuits as "The Impressario and the Girl." and then, alone, Ted sang in "The Connecticut Yankee," "Present Arms." and "Just a Minute."

This young man started in life as a newspaper reporter on the United Press Association, but after several Press Club vaudeville performances he deserted one muse for another. He says about the greatest difference he has found in radio and cabaret singing is that the former brings "mash notes" and the latter "bank notes."

Monster Tubes for New 400,000 Watt KDKA

WO giant tubes, each standing six feet high and requiring the passage of five tons of cool water through their water jackets every hour, are the "nerve centers" of the new KDKA, which has practically been completed by the Westinghouse Company at Saxonburg, near Pittsburgh. Rated at 200,000 watts each, the tubes are 200 times as powerful as those in use in the average broadcasting station and more than 50,000 times as powerful as those used in the average electric radio receiving set.

Instead of stepping up its power to 400.000 watts immediately, the operators of KDKA propose to go gradually to 50,000 watts, the maximum power now allowed by the Federal Radio Commission. And instead of making a sudden transition to the new transmitter, they have asked the Commission to authorize the use of the old KDKA at East Pittsburgh simultaneously with the new for a period of three weeks, during which the old transmitter's output will be decreased gradually and the new one's increased.

The old and new stations will operate in synchronization with one another during the transition period. Thus the station's listeners will not suffer the inconvenience of adjusting their receiving sets to the new volume expected from the new station. The Westinghouse Company has asked the Commission for authority to operate experimentally after midnight this fall and winter with its maximum power of 400,000 watts, the highest power any station in the world has ever undertaken to use. For normal operations, the power will be held to 50,000 watts, as required by the Commission, in spite of the eightfold greater capacity of the station,



Radio Growth Most Rapid of Any Industry

HE place that radio has taken in the world of industry is evidenced substantially by the Pacific Coast Division headquarters of the National Broadcasting Company, which have been located in San Francisco slightly more than three years.

Spending approximately \$1,500,000 annually in this city and representing an investment of well over \$200,000 in studios and equipment, the institution remains the only one maintained on the Pacific Coast by a nation-wide broadcasting system, though representative stations of other networks have been established.

Headed by Don E. Gilman, vice-president of NBC, the western division celebrated its third anniversary this spring by announcing the inauguration of a regular weekly schedule of transcontinental sponsored programs originating in San Francisco. This, Gilman characterized as concrete recognition of the importance of the West's contribution to radio programs and an expression of faith in the stability of radio broadcasting nationally. Two NBC sustaining programs also are built at San Francisco for Eastern distribution.

The Pacific Coast unit of the transcontinental network has enjoyed spectacular growth since the inauguration April 5, 1927. From a hotel suite, the organization has grown to require the entire top floor and much of the twenty-first floor of the Hunter-Dulin Building.

This expansion, which is continuing, is characterized by Gilman, as a definite example of the acceptance of radio in industry as an important and stable item as well as its acceptance by the public as a cultural, educational and entertainment medium which has become a necessary element.

"The growth of radio is perhaps the most rapid that can be cited by any industry," Mr. Gilman pointed out, adding:

"The rapidity of development precludes a definite forecast as to what will come for there is no indication that the present tempo will slacken. Three years ago, no one would have guessed that this new industry would hold its present position today."

He did venture, however:

"The volume of business which radio is doing is increasing and indications are that

more network stations will develop in the West as presentations from this section become increasingly significant in the East as well as in our own area."

Programs already sent East from the San Francisco studios will be increased in number with completion of the fall schedule which is now being worked out, Mr. Gilman believes. Under the present set-up, more than 150 broadcasts are built and released weekly from the San Francisco studios to the stations affiliated with NBC in the Pacific Coast and Rocky Mountain areas. Approximately sixty others are received from the Eastern NBC studios for distribution through the coast chain.

Cost of the production work, rents, salaries and supplies bring the expenditures by NBC at the division headquarters to approximately \$1,500,000 per year, Gilman estimated. The investment includes three modern studios and a rehearsal room, engineering equipment valued at more than \$35,000, and a music library of thousands of orchestrations the value of which is declared to be between \$75,000 and \$100,000.

About \$250,000 is paid annually to musicians alone, the salary schedule reveals. Fees to singers, actors and producers are not included in this budget, which allows for several concert and dance orchestras in the studios.

The present personnel includes more than 150 musicians, singers and actors and a force of office employees raising the total to around 300, regularly engaged at the Pacific Division headquarters.

Radio Census Delayed

PROBABLE delay of more than a year in the compilation of the census of radio receiving sets, taken recently as part of the population census, is reported from the U. S. Census Bureau. This will be a disappointment to broadcasting stations eager to have official data on their "circulation areas," to manufacturers desirous of having an accurate market index and to the Federal Radio Commission, which wants the figures in order to allocate broadcasting facilities more equitably.

Northwest Broadcasting System \$300,000 Investment Program

NNOUNCEMENT of a program which contemplates the eventual investment of \$300,000 in new equipment for Northwest Broadcasting System stations KJR, Seattle; KEX, Portland, and KGA, Spokane, was made Thursday afternoon by A. E. Pierce, new president of the Pacific Northwest Radio Company following a meeting of the board of trustees.

Two other features marked the special meeting. L. N. Rosenbaum, New York City, and Pacific Northwest capitalist, announced that he will be taking a more active interest in the Northwest Broadcasting System. New officers were elected.

A. E. Pierce, who has been taking personal interest in the development of the Northwest Broadcasting System, was named president. Other officers are Robert Grass, vice-president; Thomas F. Smart, secretary and general manager, and R. A. Provine, treasurer.

Members of the board of trustees are Mr. Rosenbaum, Mr. Pierce, Mr. Smart, Mr. Grass, and K. A. Pierce.

Immediate investment of \$75,000 in new equipment for KJR is provided in the building plans when the Federal Radio Commission grants a construction permit which the Seattle station applied for some time ago. Installations in the other stations will advance as rapidly as plans mature.

In becoming president, Mr. Pierce gave views which were in line with the recently announced program of KJR, which gave the Seattle station all-live talent programs from 7 a. m. to 12 o'clock midnight.

"I see in the Northwest Broadcasting System a great opportunity in furthering our aims for the greater development of Pacific Northwest industry," Mr. Pierce said.

"We shall press all our resources and pledge ourselves to aid in developing the Pacific Northwest.

"We are continuing with our policy of giving our listeners the best programs obtainable, using the best Pacific Northwest talent and artists."







War Control of Radio Is Problem

HE tremendous growth of radio communication facilities in the past decade is causing much concern among military strategists in planning for the next war, for no matter how peaceful times may be the military experts of all the large nations are preparing plans for defense and offense in anticipation of the next outbreak of hostilities, and revising them repeatedly to take advantage of new developments in the gentle art of warfare.

During the World War, the control of radio was more or less simple, for there were only a few radio stations and broadcasting as we have it today was still a thing of the future, so that it was possible without difficulty to prohibit radio reception by the public. Today, however, the situation is vastly different.

In long distance communication, one station usually is within the jurisdiction of a different country from that controlling the other station on the circuit. Thus, in the event of war between those nations, communication immediately would be severed and each belligerent then would be limited to operation with other stations of its own or with neutral stations. Communication with neutral stations, however, is neither sure nor satisfactory, since the transmission or reception of messages unfriendly to either of the belligerents might immediately become a cause of a declaration of war.

With this in mind, the leading nations of the world have attempted to draw up rules of international law for the government of both belligerents and neutrals in the use of radio in time of war. A set of twelve such articles has been drafted by a commission set up by the Conference on the Limitation of Armament held in Washington in 1922, but have not yet been ratified by the participating governments.

With respect to broadcasting, a very difficult situation has arisen, particularly in Europe, where national areas are small and the programs of most stations usually penetrate one or more foreign countries. Even in time of peace, the various governments are greatly concerned over the reception within their borders of propaganda broadcasts from other countries. In the event of war it is very likely that participating countries would endeavor to blanket the signals from enemy stations, while at the same time penetrating his territory with propaganda of their own, in addition to the probable absolute prohibition of the use of broadcast and amateur receiving sets, which in most of the European countries are licensed.

In the United States, conditions are somewhat different. There is little fear here of foreign propaganda by radio from foreign countries and traitorous stations within the country could readily be detected and eliminated. This, of course, if broadcast reception was permitted to continue, as military experts generally believe it would be.

With ten to twelve million receiving sets in use, it is generally conceded that prohibition of reception would be impossible, while, at the same time, it is believed that it would be better to utilize the capabilities of broadcasting to mold public opinion, convey information to the people and keep up morale generally. Further, the uses of broadcasting in the event of invasion are highly valuable, as a means of issuing warnings to the threatened areas. Mobilization announcements and other military intelligence could also be laid before the people en masse without delay, should need arise.

Undoubtedly, in the event of war. all broadcasting would come under the strict control of the government, which, should an enemy approach our borders, would have to devise methods of preventing his use of American receiving sets for propaganda messages and instructions to spies among our population. This, however, is a matter which is not being overlooked by Army and Navy officials in Washington, although, naturally, they are not making public the steps they have taken to deal with a situation which seems highly improbable today but might become uncomfortably real tomorrow.

Rush For Short Waves

America's Contribution to Sea Safety Is Beacon

HE radiobeacon is America's contribution to the safety of life at sea and is one of the most outstanding developments perfected during the 141 years in which the government has operated a lighthouse service.

The protection of navigation along our coasts was one of the first undertakings of the initial Congress of the newly fledged United States when, in 1789, an act was passed providing that all expenses involved in rendering navigation safe should be borne by the United States Treasury, according to Harold D. King, deputy commissioner of the Bureau of Lighthouses. The bureau itself, however, was not established until 1910, when it was made a part of the Department of Commerce.

"Of the countless contributions of science to the work of the Lighthouse Service during our present generation," Mr. King declares, "the adaptation of radio to the safeguarding of life and property on the sea is easily the most outstanding."

The modern lighthouse, it is explained by the deputy chief of the service, contains considerable radio equipment. Radiobeacon transmitters, with automatic code devices for both radiobeacon and fog signal, which latter may be a powerful siren or diaphone or perhaps an electric oscillator, are considered among the most important adjuncts to the light for which the station was erected. The radiobeacon broadcasts its identifying signal for fifteen minutes out of every hour. Originally installed for use during fogs and bad weather, mariners have demanded that the radio signal be available at all times, so that they may have the benefit of protection at a distance much greater than can be covered by even the most powerful light.

The newest equipment in many stations is distant-control radio apparatus by means of which two lighthouses can be operated by one crew, the light and fog signal at the second station, possibly miles away, being started and stopped by means of an electric impulse to which the machinery responds.

Radio Aids Ship-to-Shore Mail

R ADIO played a stellar role in the experimental mail delivery by plane from the steamship Bremen to Boston, which may result in the inauguration of a regular ship-to-shore service at that point, according to officials of the aeronautics branch of the Department of Commerce.

Loaded with mail, a plane was catapulted from the Bremen at a distance of 350 miles off the Atlantic coast, and two-way radio communication was established between the plane and the Boston airway radio station within fifteen minutes after the flight was begun. Weather reports were transmitted to the plane and the plane's position rereceived at half-hour intervals as the plane approached the coast.

The tremendous value of radio communication as an aid to flights of this nature was evidenced during the trip when, a landplane operating in the vicinity of the terminus of the Bremen's plane being forced to make a landing in the water close to the area in which the mail was to be landed, it was necessary suddenly to make a change in the landing plans. Instructions were immediately transmitted to the pilot of the Bremen's plane, advising him that the area previously designated for his landing had been changed to another location which would be marked by a large checkered flag and painted float.

Half an hour before landing, the plane requested radio-compass bearings. which were obtained from the Boston Navy Yard radio station and transmitted from the airway station. The excellent radio service which they had been afforded, it was declared by the crew of the plane, had been invaluable in making the trip successful.

An airway radio range beacon is located at the East Boston airport to guide planes on the route between Hartford and Boston. This was not used in connection with the flight from the Bremen, but arrangements are being made to provide a course which will adequately serve ship-to-shore and shore-toship flights in the future. ombining the best of materials with most expert workmanship

Commission Enforcing Regulations

ETERMINED to force rigorous compliance with its regulations, the Federal Radio Commission has placed thirty-one broadcasters throughout the country on a temporary basis and with the advent of cooler weather will hold formal hearings at which they will be required to justify their failure to adhere to the commission's requirements.

The specific charges against the individual stations have not yet been made known but will be announced in each case as it is placed on the calendar. They include, however, deviation from assigned frequency, operating without a licensed operator, failing to announce phonograph records as such, and failure to announce the call letters and location of the transmitter every fifteen minutes. In some instances, also, in the opinion of the commission, stations are not operating in the public interest but for private gain.


The stations are scattere dthrough nineteen states, and the filing of the charges follows a comprehensive survey of conditions throughout the entire country by the commission and the radio division of the Department of Commerce, in the course of which complaints against nearly 100 stations were investigated. Most of the charges were found to be of minor character and were adjusted without difficulty, the citations against the thirty-one stations comprising the most serious violations which came to the attention of the commission during the inquiry.

While most of the broadcasters cited are low power stations, the list includes several which are over wide areas. The most powerful station under consideration is KTNT, 5,000 watts, but there are also included WDAE and WODA, 1,000 watts, and WCOA, WEVD, WHEC, WLTH, WSMB, KFUL, KGBZ, KMPC, KTRH and KVOA, 500 watts.

Chinese Radio Being Developed

REMENDOUS rivalry is being displayed between the United States and European countries for radio connections with China, in anticipation of the return of normal conditions some time in the future and the resumpton of trade on a large scale. China being one of the most important markets of the world for a variety of products, as well as a source of supply for many important commodities, the countries having direct communications services will naturally benefit over those whose communications must pass under the scrutiny of a competitor. While American interests, in coöperation with Chinese, are planning to open a transoceanic radio service to China within the next few months, Germany is bending every effort to build up a similar service and has laid the groundwork not only for a service to China, but for one to Japan as well. At the same time it is proposed to establish a service with France, so that when all the work now planned is completed, China will have direct communication with San Francisco, Paris and Berlin, from which points messages will be distributed.


