

Many Cases For Hearing By Commission

ELL over 100 cases have been scheduled for hearings before the Federal Radio Commission during the next two months, as the commission undertakes the huge task of clearing the calendar which has piled up during the summer.

A large percentage of the cases involve applications for construction permits for new stations, ranging in power from five watts to 30,000 watts. Others involve the renewal of licenses, revoked for one cause or another, and the rest are concerned with changes either in location, time, power or frequency.

The most interesting group of cases is that to be heard within a few weeks, comprising applications for 50,000-watt transmitters which have been filed by a number of broadcasters as a result of intimations that the commission was prepared materially to increase the number of channels on which top power could be used.

Orders paving the way for an increase in the number of 50,000-watt stations were issued by the commission last June, when the number of cleared channels in any zone which may be used by stations of this power was "restricted" to four. Inasmuch as at the time the order was issued there were less than a dozen station operating on that power, the purpose of the move was indeniably to provide a maximum of twenty hannels for such broadcasters. In announce g the new order, the commission made it nown that only one vote, that of Commis-

sioner Ira E. Robinson, was cast in opposition. Commissioner Robinson has been consistently opposed to high power on the ground that better service could be secured by limitation of strength, and has attempted to have the commission go on record as limiting top power to 25,000 watts.

For convenience the commission has divided its applications by zones and will hear all cases from each zone consecutively, in order to secure all the information at one time, as it will probably be impossible to grant all the applications which have been filed from each of the five zones, there already being a number of stations using maximum power. There are pending 27 applications for top-power stations, nine of which come from the fourth zone alone.

In the fourth zone considerable competition is being manifested for these favored channels, with five of the Chicago broadcasters seeking position. Applicants from this zone are stations WCFL, Chicago, 1500 watts; KYW-KFKX, Chicago, 10,000 watts; WMAQ, Chicago, 5000 watts; WGN, Chicago, 25,000 watts; WBBM, Chicago, 25,000 watts: WHO-WOC, Des Moines, Iowa, 5000 watts; KTNT, Muscatine, Iowa, 5000 Watts; WTMJ, Milwaukec, Wis., 1000 watts, and WCCO, Minneapolis, Minn., 7500 watts. Applications from the fifth zone have been filed by stations KGO, San Francisco, 7500 watts; KHJ, Los Angeles, 1000 watts; KFRC, San Francisco, 1000 watts, and KOA, Denver, Colo., 12,500 watts.

General Allocation Order Again Attacked

NOTHER attack upon General Order No. 40, providing for the method of allocating broadcasting stations followed by the Radio Commission, and one of the most interesting cases yet evolving from allocation, is pending in the District of Columbia Court of Appeals, where it will probably be brought up during the fall term.


The case—it is really two cases—was brought by station WTMJ, Brookfield, Wis., operating on 620 kilocycles, one of the regional channels, contesting the commission's action in placing WFLA-WSUN, Clearwater, Fla., on that channel on the ground that the Florida station would cause interference with its service, and also complaining that an increase in the power of station WLBZ, Bangor, Maine, from 250 to 500 watts would also cause interference.

The 620-kilocycle channel, it is pointed out by the commission, is one of the regional frequencies on which heterodyne interference somewhere is to be expected, but it is

not believed by commission engineers that operation of the other stations as licensed will cause any undue interference with WTMJ.

"If such an appeal as this is recognized by the court," members of the legal staff declared, "it will be necessary for the commission to withhold action on a large number of renewal applications, although it is satisfied that the granting thereof will serve public interest, convenience and necessity. It is essentially unfair to require the commission to file a record and full statement of facts and grounds for its decision in each case so appealed. No such practice is con templated by any provision of the act, and to recognize a right of appeal under suc circumstances will inevitably tend to br den the court with litigation which, in a event, must ultimately be remanded to commission for hearing under General der No. 15."



JESS NORMAN, KPO

ECESSITY made a saxophone player out of Jess Norman, KPO's handsome sheik of reed instruments. "It was during my Stanford days," says Norman Jess Nathanson, for that is his true monicker, "that a craving for food made me forsake the violin and take to the sax. Why did I give up the fiddlelack of time for practice-and in those days the saxophone was in great demand. I had had a few lessons on the clarinet so that the saxophone was

easily learned. That was back in the days when the Stanford campus resounded with the tramp of trudging feet—when the shadow of war cast a shroud of expectancy over embryo officers—and what's more, that was my chief ambition—never realized because

I was a musician."

"It was like this," says the stalwart Jess, who measures six feet in his stockings, has intriguing brown eyes and weighs two hundred pounds, shownig the result of being a corn-fed "cornhusker" from Omaha, Nebraska, the place he was born—the 8th of September, 1899, "down on the campus Major Parker sent out a call for band players—I didn't respond because I wanted to receive a commission—but Major Parker ran across me during inspection, remembered my name was not included in the list of available musicians, so he ordered me to organize a band and organize it I did, and there I remained until the end of the war 'tootin' the sax' and leading the band."

"Perhaps it was just as well," says Jess, reminiscing. "I might have received worse casualties than I did." You were a casualty, he was asked—"oh yes—we were loading cases of pineapple for the commissary one afternoon when a case dropped on my foot, mashing my big toe and putting me on a different footing for a time."

"Then one day, while I was instructing in bayonet practice, a student misunderstood the maneuver, with the result that I was hit over the head with his bayonet. It did little more than muss up my hair comb, but I was in the hospital for a week. It could have been worse, if it had been in action—so leading the band wasn't so bad after all."

Jess came to California with his parents to satisfy a mother's desire that he be educated at Stanford University. He completed high school at San Jose, where he identified himself with the musical activities of the school, graduating in 1915.

During his college days after the war, Jess reorganized the Stanford Band, which he managed through 1920 and 1921.

Patrons of the "Hoo-Hoo House," the old organ building of the Panama-Pacific Exposition building, which was

moved down to Los Altos and transformed into an amusement establishment—and "Babylon," the Ohio Building of the Fair, which was floated down the bay and set up on piers on the marsh at San Carlos and which went on the "rocks" because of inadequate roads, will remember Jess. It was he who directed the orchestras of both places—the money from which put him through college.

Before he received his degree of "Bachelor of Arts" in Economics he had made quite a name for himself at Stanford. He directed a number of the college's musical productions—taught the saxophone at Menlo Junior College—(it was known as the William Warren School then).

After leaving school Jess took to composing—vaudeville and moving picture work. One will recognize him as a co-writer of the popular "Sailing On" which created a decided hit several years ago.

His hobbies lean toward the manly arts, boxing and football. He was never a star of the gridiron, although he managed to be "the drawback" of the team he states—and boxing, "I thought I was going to be pretty good as a mittologist," states Jess, "until one day one of the boys disconnected me from the idea that I was a champion—a knockout—a broken nose and sore ribs—and I decided to stick to my saxophone."

Besides his regular broadcasts as director of the "North Americans," 7 to 8 o'clock, and "Jess Norman's San Franciscans," which are also heard daily from KPO 12:05 to 1 o'clock, Jess is often heard in special broadcasts.





IRVING KENNEDY, NBC

ERE we have the viaduct." "Why a duck?" "There's water there, so we must have a viaduct." "Why a duck, why not a boat?" etc., etc., until all the seats are empty. Everyone is rolling around in the aisles. Meanwhile Irving Kennedy, tenor, is waiting in the wings until the Marx Brothers have both the gag and the audience limp and lifeless, to come bounding out on the stage in a bell boy's uniform. It is his job to revive the assembled



multitude with the sentimental ballad "In the Lovely Land of Florida."

That must have been about four years ago. The Cocoanuts broke up in San Francisco, the four brothers with most of the company trickled back to Broadway, but Irving Kennedy decided to remain on the coast. Through his friendship with Max Dolin he made a connection with KFI in Los Angeles. Two and one-half years ago he was signed as staff tenor by the NBC in San Francisco. There he has remained ever since.

Irving Kennedy hails from Brooklyn, where his parents have lived for fifty years in the same house. He was born on the Fourth of July, 1897. After high school Irving held many jobs, but none of them were to his liking. So he decided to study law. He was deep in the pages of Blackstone when a cousin, Olga Cook, the prima donna, paid the family a visit. While entertaining the famous lady in the parlor somebody suggested that Irving sing a song. Cousin Olga was so struck by the quality of the young man's voice that she recommended they have it cultivated. The family was so struck by the quality of the young lady's enthusiasm that they did have it cultivated. Irving Kennedy immediately began studying with the only vocal teacher he ever had, Francis Stewart. That was thirteen years ago. He says that he realized then that he could only be happy in an artistic career.

His first engagement on the stage was with the light opera, "Wildcat," in 1920. Then he was in vaudeville, both in quartet work and as a comedian, over the Loew and Keith circuits. He was in Irving Berlin's

Music Box Review and worked for Publix out of New York City. He has sung in all of the New York movie houses of any size. Finally he joined the Marx Brothers show, Cocoanuts, which brought him to the Coast, and radio. On the whole, he likes radio better than the stage. Although there are some things one misses, the joy of working for an immediate audience and the applause, he says that other things more than compensate for this. First, there is the fact that

radio work gives one a permanent home. Secondly, radio work is infinitely more interesting. It demands a much wider range of activity. A tenor doesn't sing the same group of songs every day as he would on the stage. He sings different songs every day. If he is capable, he may even sing songs ranging from "There's a Wa Wa Girl in Caliente" to "Vesta La Giuba," with a parody on the Stein Song tossed in. This is just what Irving Kennedy does during his five weekly appearances before the NBC microphone. In addition he does character work in the plays and skits. He is Ikey Lechinsky in School Days on the Spotlight Revue on Saturday nights and often works in Walter Beeban's show on the same night. He works on any program that requires imitations of pelicans, dogs, sea lions or chickens.

Irving Kennedy is of good average American size-5 feet 91/2 inches and 155 pounds. He has blue eyes and blond hair. His face has that blend of sadness, quizzicalness and pretended vacuity, present in various degrees at different times, that belongs to the natural comedian. There is also a certain likable simplicity and naturalness about him. He strikes you as being the sort of fellow small boys would trust implicitly. You can see them trudging along confidently by his side, on a fishing or hunting trip. Whether any small boys were along or not, we can't say, but we have it from his own lips that he has fished or hunted in every state of the union but four. He has fished for everything from deep sea fish to mountain trout. He has hunted deer and bear in Canada, New York State and Penn-

sylvania. He took advantage of the fact that the show business jockeys its followers about the country. And Irving Kennedy isn't the sort of chap who sits still between engagements, or even between shows. He likes to be doing something all the time. Fishing and hunting are his greatest loves, but if it is impossible to fish or hunt he will play golf, read detective stories, go to a show—he sees them all—or take off with his friend Bill Royle of the NBC in his plane. He has 640 hours in the air and did considerable flying himself back in 1919 and 1920. He thinks fast, talks fast and moves fast. There is apparently some hidden reservoir of energy inside him which keeps him always active and interested. He likes lots of power under the hood of his car, too, and has owned many cars.

In the way of quieter things, he is fond of flowers. Mozart is his favorite composer. Pagliacci his favorite operatic role. He believes "The Merchant of Venice" is Shakespeare's best play and despises turnips and parsnips. He is not married.



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

Television Not Expected to Supersede Theater

ELEVISION will never replace the theater as a means of entertainment, it is believed by leaders in both the radio and film industries. But television in the home, it is firmly held, will bring about a tremendous world cultural development which will be reflected in the advancement of the entertainment field to new heights.

"Mechanically, artistically, psychologically, the public theater as a focal point for mass entertainment promises to continue as a permanent factor. In keeping with this, four theaters are planned as a major part of the immense "Radio City" which is to be developed in the heart of New York within the next few years.

There is no "saturation point" in entertainment. Entertainment in the home is only a phase of the movement toward the expansion of recreation, and one of its important results will be the pressure upon the theater to scale new heights in artistry to live up to the much higher standards which will be the natural development of television, as higher standards of music are resulting from broadcasting.

The tremendous competition of the various types of amusement may force television inventors to devote themselves to the development of equipment which will transmit the pictures of living actors and actual scenes, rather than motion pictures, even

before television becomes a commercial proposition. This will be due to the fact that home motion picture equipment is already available at moderate cost, and that sound equipment for home pictures is also beginning to come into the market. Thus, television may be forced to explore new paths if it is to offer something new to compete with services which will be already established when it appears upon the scene.

It is pointed out that movies, bringing well-known actors to the smallest hamlets in the country, developing new stars and building up a new technique, practically eliminated the legitimate theater. But they did not kill the theater itself; merely brought about a new phase.

But television, it is firmly believed, offers no threat. The gregarious instincts of man will always lead him to desire to share his pleasures with his fellow men. Space and mechanical limitations will always restrict the opportunities of the home in the elaborateness of entertainment features, and this limitation will become more apparent as the theater continues to improve its methods. One of the greatest advances of the theatrical screen will be brought before the public generally in the near future-wide-screen projection, with lifelike backgrounds and perspective. By constant advances of this nature, it is asserted, the theater will always hold its own.

Announcers Specialists Now

VEN radio announcers are becoming specialists and the modern broadcasting station has its own "clinic," offering advertisers not only special programs to meet their particular needs, but also specialists to announce them.

No longer will an announcer start his day by conducting setting-up exercises, then "cover" a home economics program, followed by an afternoon concern of "high brow" music by unpronounceable composers, and winding up with a blow by blow account of a prize fight.

Instead, studios are now dividing their announcers so as to give each man a particular type of program, thus following the lead of the newspapers, which have their police reporters, sporting editors, political writers, dramatic critics, etc.


The new plan is already in effect at Station WABC of the Columbia Broadcasting System, where it has been found to work out very successfully.

"Naturally," it is pointed out by Jack Ricker, director of production for the Columbia System, "a good sports announcer cannot be expected to turn in as good a job on a grand opera concert. Then, on the other hand, would you expect a slow, deliberate, but highly trained man, who knows classic music from beginning to end, to go out on the football field and give you a good radio picture? Radio has progressed to the stage where specialized announcing is absolutely necessary."

Radio Stations That Roam the Land

LL unknown to the general run of radio listeners, hosts of perambulating radio stations—no less than one thousand of them—are roaming the highways and byways of the land on missions of various sorts.

More than half of them are being transported from place to place, mainly in the southeastern states, by scientists in the employ of oil companies who have enlisted the aid of radio for geophysical explorations for oil and minerals. One leader in this field has estimated that more than \$100,000,000 worth of new oil deposits have been located by means of radio.

Other such stations are employed for a miscellany of uses—aeronautical and television experiments, emergency communications along power lines, directing of motion pictures in the making, field tests for locating broadcasting and other stations, and a variety of other purposes. Most of the stations are licensed for temporary periods to operate in the so-called mobile band of 1600 to 3000 kilocycles (187.4 to 99.94 meters).

Most are of extremely low powers. Of the numerous portable stations that were licensed to the Byrd Antarctic expedition, for example, the highest powered was 500 watts. Most of the dog-sledge transmitters were of 50 watts and several of only 7½ watts.

Several universities have licenses for portables which are used for student instruction in field strength measurements and wave propagation. Bell Telephone Laboratories has a number of portables in the field in Maine and on the Pacific Coast to find suitable locations for the erection of new transatlantic and transpacific radiotelephone stations soon to be built.

Herbert Hoover, Jr., has several portables, one of 1000 watts. He frequently rigs up his short-wave set in his hotel rooms while on trips to communicate with the aeronautical radio stations he supervises for Western Air Express. Various wireless companies use groups of portables for their field tests.

Signals Replace Verbal Orders

HE ever-increasing sensitivity of the microphone, sending out on the air the faintest sound made in the broadcasting studio, has taxed the ingenuity of studio staffs, who must give and receive orders necessary for the conduct of the program without letting the radio audience behind the scenes.

Probably every radio set owner at one time or another has picked up something which was not intended for his ears. Situations embarrassing to stations have occurred from time to time, when something not on the program inadvertently was broadcast.

To prevent occurrences such as this, as well as to expedite the handling of the program and the changes of microphones which must be made, some of the stations are adopting the sign language, something in the same manner as a baseball catcher signals to his pitcher.

An elaborate set of signals is being worked out in the main studios of the Co-

lumbia Broadcasting System in New York, where they have been found not only to reduce the delays in making changes, but also to eliminate the occasional noises made as members of the staff tiptoe from one point to another to give and receive instructions

Control of the program is vested in the production man, who has his station in a glass-cased soundproof booth. From this he gives the announcer and musicians their instructions. When the music diminishes in volume gradually, preparatory to a station break or announcement, its timeliness is not due entirely to perfection attained by rehearsal, for nothing is left to chance, but a wordless signal has been given the musicians by the production man. Other signals indicate whether the fade-out is to be fast or slow, if the current is to be turned off or a microphone moved, or whatever else is necessary for the smooth and silent conduct of the program.



Automobile Traffic Versus Radio Tube Traffic

HE recent hot spell once again emphasized the congested traffic conditions prevalent in metropolitan centers. Automobilists and train riders rushed off to cooler quarters and set up a new problem for the traffic cops.

However this great traffic problem is but a drop in the bucket to the traffic problems encountered in electronic fields, particularly in radio tubes, states an engineer of the Arcturus Radio Tube Company, Newark,

New Jersey.

When the filament or the cathode of a tube gets hot from the applied electrical voltage, electrons, which are the inhabitants of these two elements, become nervous and restless and rush away at a tremendous speed to a haven of resort—the plate.

What a rush! The smallest heat wave of electricity, one milliampere of plate current, means over six thousand million millions of electrons per second speeding up the highway. For instance, in the Arcturus Screen Grid Tube this means 24,000,000,000,000,000 electrons. In an Arcturus Power Tube, Type 145, two hundred thousand million millions of electrons rush off every second.

To obtain a better mind picture of this great quantity, it is ninety million times as many as there are stars visible to the average naked eye on a clear night, or ten to fifteen million times the entire population of the earth.

If the "mileage" covered by the electrons in an average radio receiver were extended on a straightaway, these atoms would go around the world fifteen thousand times each second. And yet with this tremendous velocity the total mass of these tiny vacationists would not disturb a flea.

A radio tube also has its "traffic cop" in the form of the grid. This element acts as a "stop and go" control and either holds up or speeds along the tremendous traffic stream.

Seek Financial Data On Stations

ADIO stations of all types which do a commercial business will be required to file financial statements with the Federal Radio Commission in the same manner as the railroads and telephone and telegraph companies are required to report to the Interstate Commerce Commission. The underlying motive for this procedure, however, differs between the two organizations, the Interstate Commerce Commissionn needing the information as a guide in making rate changes while the radio commission desires merely to be kept in touch with all phases of the radio industry.

At the present time, the commission is collecting financial data from broadcasting stations, and later other classes of stations will be similarly surveyed. Information regarding the financial operations of broadcasters was asked of operators once before and a report, based on incomplete information, was submitted to the Senate last year, but the present plan contemplates a thorough survey of the entire industry from which the commission expects to secure much valuable information regarding both the business as a whole and each of its various branches.

The information to be gathered will include not only the expenses of operating the mechanical equipment of the stations, but also the various sources of income and expenditures for talent, etc. The figures of the individual stations will be kept confidential, but the commission is expected to issue an analysis of the financial operations of the broadcasting industry as a whole.
