Segregate High-Power Channels

CONCENTRATION of all high-powered stations in a single portion of the broadcasting band has been recommended to the Federal Radio Commission by E. N. Nockels, general manager of Radio Station WCFL, Chicago.

Granting of high power to a few stations, while requiring the remainder of the 600-odd broadcasters to continue with their present powers, the commission was told, will tend to destroy the value of the channels used by the latter. If the commission permits high power on all forty of the cleared channels, it is declared, those channels should be grouped, with no stations of lower power between.

"Although Station WCFL has made an application for 50,000 watts of power," Mr. Nockels said in a letter to the commission, "Labor has tried to make its position clear to your commission that Labor is asking this power only in order to enable the labor movement of this country to compete with the super-power stations now in existence. Labor believes that as a fundamental principle in the distribution of broadcasting wavelengths, your commission will make possible a better use of all of the frequencies if you will restrict the use of super-power. The continued increase in the grants of high power to individual broadcasting stations helps to destroy the value of the remaining channels.

"Should your commission, however, determine to continue a policy of granting permits for 50,000-watt stations, Labor respectfully suggests that you place all of these high

power stations in a single portion of the radio spectrum, and that you leave no regional- or local stations on any intervening channel between them.

"Particularly does Labor suggest, if your commission should decide to allocate eight 50,000-watt stations to each zone—thus turning forty cleared channels over to such high-powered stations—that these forty cleared channels be grouped in that portion of the dial lying between 1110 kilocycles and 1500 kilocycles, inclusive. If the testimony of the engineers which has been given before your commission in behalf of these high-powered stations is correct, and if there is no harmful effect upon adjoining channels from the use of such high power, the stations placed in this band can have no complaint. Particularly should it be true that they will have no effect upon other high power stations comparable to the damage which they would do to low power stations placed between them.

"Labor respectfully suggests that if the high power stations object to this grouping, that it should be taken as an admission on their part that they have no faith in the testimony of their engineers. Surely the lower power stations should not be made to suffer.

"Should any of the present cleared channel stations who are asking for higher power object to a change in their present wavelengths, it should not be difficult for your commission to inform them that the grant of additional power can be made only if they are willing to take a wavelength in the super-power band."

BEHIND the MIKE with DOBBSIE

PROSPECTIVE radio talent of today cannot be picked for voice quality alone. You can't look for the Tetraxis, the Melbas, the Tibbetts, the McCormacks; for after you've found them, you still have the great and already established stars themselves to compete with on the air.

"When I look for new talent, I don't look for beautiful tone production or the artistry of technique. I look for some homely quality that will endear the artist to the radio audience. Something that will make his popularity endure."

Thus Dobbsie summed up in two paragraphs what has seemed to others an almost uncanny ability to pick comparatively unknown singers and players and build them into great stars of the air—an ability that has gained him nation-wide fame as "the Ziegfeld of radio."

"Scores of artists with ambitions for the radio come to me," Dobbsie continued. "And many of them cannot understand why, before I have even heard them perform, I ask them such apparently inconsequential questions as 'Where were you born? What schools did you go to? What are your ambitions?' and many other similar queries. As a matter of fact, I'm much more interested in those things than I am in their actual ability as an artist. For in these things can I see them as individuals, their personality and their character—something that can be transmitted over the microphone which will mirror in the listener's mind a definite pleasing something about the performer."

"When such an artist is found, his instructions are to 'be yourself!' When his turn before the microphone comes, I try to give the Happytime listeners a word picture of him, tell something about him that will give them an inner view of the performer. When the audience understands the artist as an individual, it is ready to accept him and, in most cases, like him, too," Dobbsie concluded.

That the Shell Happytime mentor's psychology is right is seen in the many "discoveries" he has given to the radio via Shell Happytime.

Even when Dobbsie first began his radio work back in 1925 he had very definite ideas about what was needed to attract the fancy of the radio audience. So when he began looking around for a pianist to take part in his broadcasting, he interviewed more than a hundred applicants before he came across one who measured up to his requirements. That one was William H. Hancock, a rather bashful young man who had been playing for years

in Y. M. C. A. and lodge work, but, up to that time, had not made any particular fame for himself. No one had seen the lovable "Wee Willy" character lying dormant in Hancock's personality. But Dobbs saw it and recognized its possibilities. Today more than a million radio fans love the "Wee Willy" which Dobbs found that day.

Sambo and Ed are another example of Dobbsie's unusual ability to "pick 'em." The blackface team had been a fair success on the vaudeville stage, but one day found themselves in San Francisco with their con-

tract expired—and no one anxious to renew it. Naturally, their eyes turned to the radio and they began a round of the broadcasting stations in an effort to get “on the air.” But numerous tryouts before program directors of most of the city’s big broadcasters failed to get them a job. No one could see anything above the ordinary in their act.

When they finally appeared for an audience before Dobbsie, they were a pretty disconsolate pair. Dobbsie talked with them for more than a half hour and at the end of that time gave them one of the biggest surprises of their lives. “From now on,” he said, “you are the ‘Beloved Vagabonds of Radio,’ and within a year you are going to be one of the greatest blackface teams in western broadcasting!” Dobbsie saw in them a natural ability to create for radio an informal, humorous presentation that had been overlooked by the others. He encouraged them to “be themselves,” rather than the set, stagey routine act they were then presenting.

Today Sambo and Ed are known and loved throughout the West for their unique singing and playing and their simple, unaffected portrayal of the southern dinky. Besides their work over the Pacific Coast network of NBC during the Shell Happytime, Dobbsie’s “Beloved Vagabonds of the Air” are now featured in a daily recording which is released over sixty-five of America’s greatest broadcasters!

Several years ago Annabelle Lee, now one of radio’s prime favorites, came to Dobbsie for an audition. The Shell Happytime director

listened to her play and sing several popular tunes and then began his usual “character and individuality quiz,” as he calls it. The conversation divulged the fact that Miss Lee had composed words and music for several songs. “Oh, they’re such silly little things that I’m sure you wouldn’t even be interested in hearing them,” Miss Lee explained. But Dobbsie was interested and prevailed upon her to play them. Dobbsie decided the numbers weren’t “silly little things” at all, but had just the right touch of that certain something that would “click” with the public. Miss Lee recently exchanged one of those same numbers for a fat check for \$5000.

Dobbsie cannot be credited with “discovering” Lee S. Roberts, the nationally famous composer, but he must be given credit for foreseeing Roberts’ possibilities as a radio performer and inducing him to appear as a featured artist on the Shell Happytime. So tremendous was Roberts’ success before the microphone that he has become one of the bright spots of radio and is gaining additional fame as director of “Sperry Smiles.”

Captain Dobbsie possesses a natural ability to judge what the average American radio fan wants and enjoys. His is not the flashy type of showmanship, but rather a program of understanding and sincerity, presented not to a massed audience of a million or more, but to a group of two or three persons sitting around the radio in thousands of western homes.

Sydney Charles, newest tenor on the KFRC staff, comes from the land of song, Wales, where almost everyone sings and the church congregational singing is unequaled any place in the world. Mr. Charles has won many prizes and had many triumphs during his musical career, but the one that gave him the greatest satisfaction was winning the Royal National Eisteddfod of Wales, during a special leave from the army during the Great War. On his return to France he was hailed with great joy by his fellow soldiers in camp. He has sung for the British Broadcasting Company, Ltd. He toured America as principal soloist with the Mountain Ash Male Choir, giving 582 concerts.

Ted Weems, heard in the Florsheim Frolic which is presented through the NBC network every Tuesday evening, is said to be the only dance orchestra leader in the country who uses the RCA theremin with his orchestra. The new Russian instrument, invented by Alexander Theremin, played by the motion of the hands in the air above the instrument, is sometimes called a "refined radio squeal," but Weems defends it as a music-maker.

Frank Galvin, regular staff announcer of KJBS, is an old-timer in the theatrical game. He has a particularly pleasing voice and plays a 'wicked' banjo. KJBS listeners hear his songs each Wednesday afternoon from 3 to 3:30, at which time he teams up with Art Fadden.

It was a pig that started George Davis, KFRC noonday announcer of the Sherman, Clay & Company concerts, on his musical career. At a very early age he traded a pet pig named Jenny for a zither. Having mastered the zither he studied piano and later vocal work. And so he went from pig to zither to piano to voice. While employed by Sherman-Clay to give duo-art concerts he was chosen to conduct the noon broadcast over KFRC.

Jean Wakefield, one of the most outstanding personalities on the air, and a regular KROW feature, tells this story on herself: Her first public appearance as a vocalist was to be made at Stanford in the big musical show of the year. Jean was convinced she would stop the show, and this literally took place, as right in the midst of the most important scene the prompter fell out of the fireplace. Jean lost her chance to "bring down the house"; but she did bring down the curtain.

Thousands of radio fans are welcoming June Pursell, famous "KNX girl," who has returned to the air over the Hollywood broadcaster after a number of months' absence during which she was appearing exclusively in the talking picture studios.

You can't do two jobs and do both well. Al Schuss, KJR and Northwest Broadcasting System announcer, not only refutes the adage, but goes it one better. His O'Dea High School (Seattle) football team just won the city football title. He is coach of the University of Washington Freshman basketball team. Besides, he is a staff announcer at KJR. Schuss not only performs one job well, but all three. The truism that one man can't serve two masters isn't true, so far as Al Schuss is concerned.

Mahlon Merrick, director of the Pacific Vagabonds, began his career at the ripe age of seven, when he made his first appearance in a theatrical orchestra, as drummer. But he had been studying music for two years, so he was a seasoned performer.

Eugene Heyes, KFRC's concert master, is a collector of unique cigarette cases. During his travels over the world he has collected a number from each country, most of them from the Orient. One of his most prized cases is a damascene from Japan, with the gold inlays of the signatures of the members of an orchestra he directed in Shanghai. His boyhood days were spent among the pines and firs of Idaho's timberland, and he could ski almost as soon as he could walk, for there was snow on the ground there seven or eight months out of the year. His father had to import a teacher from "outside" to teach Jack and his sister and the children of three other families connected with the mine. From that isolated life he turned straight to newspaper reporting, and then he turned again, from writing stories of murders to telling fairy tales to children as Big Brother at KPO. It was much later that he was permitted to forget the gnomes and elves and concentrate on sports at NBC.

Ernie Smith, KFRC's exuberant football announcer, who weekly describes the big games for the Don Lee chain, lays claim to possession of the largest dog in the world. At least the dog will be the largest in the world when he gets his growth. Prince Igor is his name and he weighs in the neighborhood of 185 pounds. 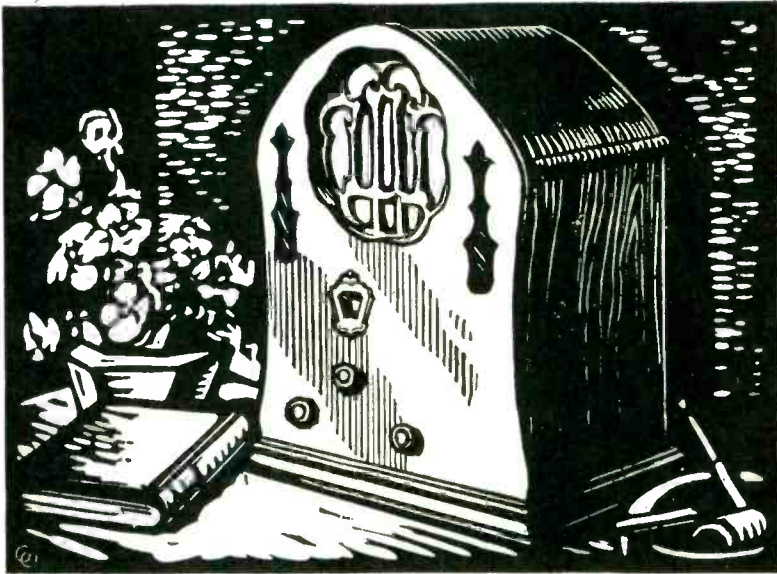

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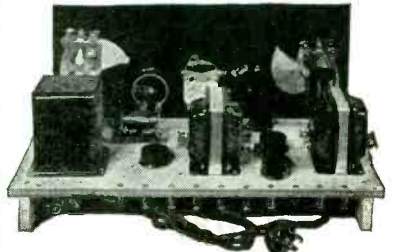

Of course, the Jamboree is very much all right! You'd go a long way before you'd find a program containing more laughs and more really good talent. As for Cecil Wright—well, we've never heard too much of him as yet, and we don't think we will. Don't let them kid you, Cecil; more power to you!

Yes, Al Pearce is clever! But has anyone noticed that in addition to his ability to "whistle his s's" and harmonize with Cal Pearce, he sings very good solos. Why don't we hear him oftener? We working people, who only get a chance to hear the Happy-Go-Lucky-Hour on holidays, rarely hear him more than once a week.

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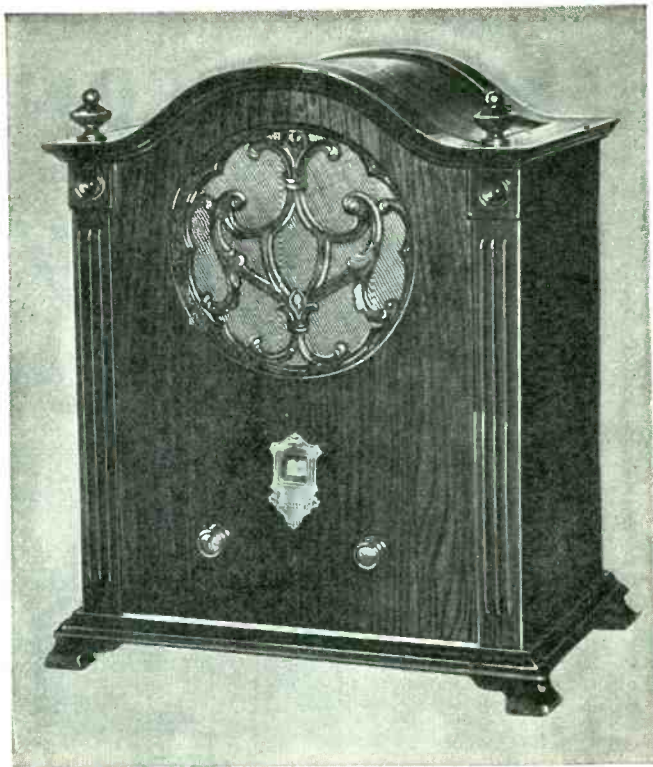

BENNIE WALKER, NBC

“KEEP that old smile smiling . . .” That’s Bennie Walker’s slogan in the NBC studios and outside. “More than 200 pounds of good humor” rightly describes the genial editor of the “Woman’s Magazine of the Air.”

Bennie leaves the message about smiles with his morning audience and hundreds of the feminine listeners turn right around and send it back, with heart-warming comments about how much good some of this aerial happiness has radiated.

Walker McLaughlin and that I’ve two of the handsomest kids you ever saw and a great little woman.”

Then he goes on:

“And tell them that the funniest thing of all to me is the time I spend being ‘Little Bennie.’” Picture this 200 pounds imitating a five-year old! “But I’ll do anything—you know I’m all the animals on the program, too—excepting the canaries.”

When he’s not doing those things Bennie sings, and announces the morning programs every day. Oftentimes he’s heard at night in various roles with the National Players and during quartet and ensemble singing.

Bennie discovered he liked the stage when he was 13 years old.

“An enthusiastic father staged benefit entertainments in our home town for everybody from the firemen to the Methodist Church. I played in them,” Bennie explains. “Meanwhile I learned Dad’s trade. He was a baker.”

But when he grew up, the World War came along and Bennie enlisted from Des Moines, Iowa, where he had gone from his native city, Slatington, Pa. After a bitter period of “K.P.,” Bennie had an opportunity to demonstrate his ability at biscuit making

and immediately he became camp cook.

“And that’s where I began to get . . . stout,” he laughs.

After the Armistice, Bennie came west and spent several years in Los Angeles singing with the California Male Quartet, at the Mission Play in San Gabriel and appearing as character man in prologues at Sid Grauman’s original “Million Dollar Theater.”

Bennie came to NBC when the “Rounders,” a recording quintet, was signed.

With the organization of the “Woman’s Magazine of the Air,” Bennie took the editorship . . . “because I once worked on a newspaper in Des Moines, maybe,” he volunteers.

Josephine Bartlett, who is Helen Webster, was the staff. Now Bennie presents a big staff and a galaxy of artists and musicians. At first his magazine was “published” only twice weekly. Now there’s an edition every day.

Despite his moving about, Bennie found time for romance as Mrs. McLaughlin and Jean and Harry attest. Mrs. McLaughlin is a violinist and formerly directed a feminine orchestra in Philadelphia. The junior members of the McLaughlin family also are musical. Jean plays the piano and Bennie is instructing her and Harry in voice.

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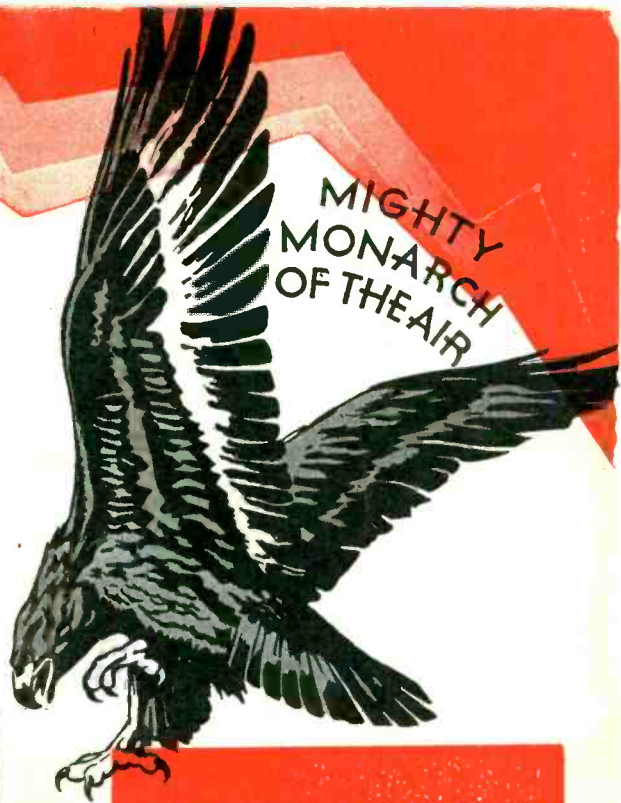
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
