Radio Tax Held Invalid

STATE laws imposing taxes upon radio receiving sets are unconstitutional as an interference with interstate commerce, according to a decision of the Federal District Court in South Carolina in a test suit brought to determine the validity of the South Carolina statute imposing such a tax, the first law of its kind to be passed in the United States.

In order to test the validity of the law, suits to restrain the collection of the tax were brought by a North Carolina broadcasting station, a radio dealer in South Carolina and a South Carolina owner of a receiving set. The decision just rendered was in the case brought by the broadcasting station, which contended that radio is interstate commerce and therefore not subject to taxation by a state.

The court held that communication by radio constitutes interstate commerce although, it was pointed out in the decision, "it is not inconceivable that radio communication may in the future be so perfected that it may be confined strictly intrastate."

"Certainly," the decision continued, "under the facts of the present case the plaintiff, through its broadcasting plant, is engaged in interstate commerce. The receiving sets in South Carolina are essential to the reception of the communication by the South Carolina audience. In other words, the receiving sets are absolutely essential instrumentalities of the interstate commerce in which the plaintiff is engaged.

"The tax is not a general property tax, but a license tax for the privilege of using an instrument of interstate commerce. Nor can it be sustained as a matter of local regulation, for the subject is national, and admits only of one uniform system or plan of regulation. Nor can it be sustained as a police regulation with an incidental tax to pay the expense of the regulation, for it has no elements of police and, moreover, the tax is frankly devoted to the uses of a state institution. Nor can it be sustained as an aid of interstate commerce, nor on the ground that its effect is merely incidental."

"The tax here," the court concluded, "is directly laid upon a necessary instrument of interstate commerce, imposes a burden upon that commerce, and the act of the legislature imposing it is therefore in conflict with the constitution of the United States and null and void."

The South Carolina law, imposing a graduated tax upon owners of radio receiving sets ranging up to a maximum of \$2.50 per set, was passed last year. The decision of the court is of great importance to both the radio industry and the general public throughout the country, since a decision that the tax was valid would have opened up an entirely new field of taxation to the states, many of which are looking for new sources of revenue,

When it came time to go on that night he noticed that Doakes and Doakes wasn't on the bill. Finally the manager came around to see about it and he explained he had no notice that Doakes and Doakes were playing there. Gibson had assumed there was only one vaudeville house in the town. There were two. He was in the wrong one.
- Tom Mitchell, entertainer extraordinary on the fifteen-minute program over KGO for Rainier Lime Rickey (Monday at 8:15, Wednesday at 9:15, and Saturday at 8:15), is instituting a new type of radio divertisement. His work in the studio is strictly of an informal tone and his intimate way of greeting his audience has an appeal that cannot be questioned.
- • Bob Bence, "Professor Bob," has inaugurated a new frolic hour for the entertainment of KPO dialers. Bob and his gang of whoopee vendors hold forth every afternoon, 3 to 4, with exception of Mondays, when they wax enthusiastic 2 to 2:55 o'clock.
- • Ron Myron, director of KOIN's feature program "Sperry's Scrap Book of the Air" and junior announcer, is somewhat of a curious mixture, being a scientist and artist. Whenever Myron takes time off from his announcing activities and Scrap Book dissertations, he hies himself to his laboratory for a good work-out in the study of bacteriology.
- • Chuck Darling, KROW harmonica player, comes from Santa Barbara, California, put four years in the navy; also spent some time in Wyoming, Utah and Nevada, where he learned something about cattle. This is making time, as Chuck is only twenty-one years old now. He can get some of the most awful squawks out of a harmonica of any harmonica player now in

captivity. He has now been playing with Bill Simmons "nigh onto two years," eats, sleeps, drinks, and has habits same as humans.

• • William Pinkerton Day, known up and down the Pacific Coast as "Pinkie" Day, vaudeville and radio headliner, has joined the Northwest Broadcasting System announcers' staff and will be stationed at KEX, Portland.

Day for years was a headline attraction on the Fanchon and Marco and Pantages circuits. He later became a favorite with Pacific Northwest listeners through his work on Pacific Northwest radio stations.

He has a deep baritone voice and sings semi-classical and popular songs.

- • Bill Tucker, KFWB's concert pianist and half of the piano team "Nip and Tuck," claims Mt. Vernon, Illinois, as his birthplace, and was quite the child prodigy of the town. He still chuckles when he thinks of the time that he went to hear one of Paderewski's concerts in St. Louis, and then came home and obliged the Ladies Uplift Society with a demonstration of how the great artist played.
- • If, some day, you turn a deaf ear to a good-looking and insistent Ford salesman down the Peninsula, you may only be escaping him temporarily, for you will listen to the new tenor on KTAB, and Paul Hammet, auto salesman and Paul Hammet, tenor, are one and the same. Paul is married; has two young potential radio artists in the family; one of them, seven years old, showing a decided genius in the vocal field.
- • Mort Harris, pioneer radio balladist, and more recently in charge of producing Publix stage shows in New York, has returned to San Francisco to stay. Many fans here will remember Mort's silver-toned voice in the early days of radio as well as his personal appearances at the Granada Theater with Paul Ash. He is the composer of a number of popular song hits, among which is "My Guitar and You." Mort returns to local ether channels over KJBS, where he will broadcast each Monday and Friday.

- • Paul Bergman, saxophone player with the studio orchestra at KMTR, has a clever composition to his credit—"Wild Fire," usually played as a saxophone solo. He also is a real "radio fan," owning a short-wave receiver and listening to Russia, Japan, Germany, and others at will. A native of Germany, Paul has been in America only three years; he is the usual handsome continental type.
- • Robert Olsen's great, great, great grandfather was an Englishman, says Bob. Which perhaps accounts for the KFRC tenor's total lack of any Scandanavian accent. Listen closely to his Victor records and see.
- Clarence Tolman, the Idaho cowboy, and Curley Davis, cow tamer from the Colorado Hills, have roped themselves into a team which they call the "Whispering Cowboys." Henceforth they will be a Shell Happytime attraction, appearing on Mondays, 8 to 9 o'clock, on KPO.
- • Don E. He returned to his old vocation for an hour one night recently, when he spoke at a dinner of the Pacific Radio Trades Association, on "New Problems in Radio Set Sales."
- • Glenhall Taylor is back. He left KTAB months ago where he had served in the capacity of program director, and went to KTM, the southern outlet of the Pickwick stations. After he had cleared up static and other Hollywood problems down south, the call came again, and he was air-mailed back to KTAB as production manager and assistant general manager.
- • Merle Matthews, KFRC's production manager, broke into radio about four years ago by winning a continuity contest conducted by a coast broadcasting chain. Previous to that she had been a writer.
- • Amos 'n' Andy are going to open all future meetings of the Elks' Lodge in Hoquiam, Washington. Sixty members of the lodge voted on whether the radio receiving set should be moved into the meet-

- ing hall each Tuesday night at eight o'clock, and the motion that this be done was carried 57 to 3. The members will hear the Amos 'n' Andy episode before the regular opening of the lodge, which will be delayed until Bill Hay signs off.
- • Musical comedy stars had better look out! KFWB has discovered a talented duo in Johnny Murray and Elinor Gail, who warble every Monday night those lilting melodies which one hears only in musical shows with the ease of old timers. Elinor Gail was Hugette in the Broadway production of "The Vagabond King," while Johnny sang his way through "Good News" and Gene Buck's show, "Take the Air."
- • Spectators who watched the benefit football game, staged at Kezar Stadium, San Francisco, Sunday afternoon, January 25, by the Knights of Columbus for the unemployed, left the stadium satisfied that the sobriquet "ball hound" rightfully belongs to Don Thompson, KPO's popular sports' announcer.

Don, who beefs at 212 pounds, tops six feet three, played guard on Larry Betten-court's team and was opposed by "Jumping Joe" Savoldi's eleven. Throughout the game Thompson displayed the form that made him one of the most brilliant linesmen of the nation two and a half years ago. The KPO announcer was a tornado of action and smothered the ball on every move, besides taking his opposition out of the play.





"Mac" of KFRC



T WILL be utterly impossible, within the confines of this article, to give you a very detailed or complete picture of Harry McClintock, but we shall do our best to increase your knowledge and understanding of the man.

"Mac" is beyond a doubt the most widely known and the best liked radio artist in Northern California. It is doubtful if any section of the country has a personality as outstanding in the radio field. For that is what "Mac" is, primarily, a

personality. There may be others who can sing some of his songs better from a technical standpoint, and play a guitar with more finesse and skill, but they lack something that "Mac" possesses in abundance. He's "Mac." Let's briefly review the course of his life.

"Mac's" grandfather was a Blue Nose and a wood-carver. He carved the figure-heads on wooden ships. But he deserted Nova Scotia to go to Ohio and become a farmer, taking his thirteen sons and five daughters with him. It was in the same Ohio county that gave America Grant, Custer and Mc-Kinley that "Mac's" father was raised. When he grew up he moved to Tennessee, where he became foreman in the Knoxville car shops of the Southern railroad, in the wooden coach building department. He was a cabinet maker. He was also a choir leader in church and played cornet in the county band. When little Harry became old enough he also sang in the choir. He was boy soprano in the St. John's Episcopal Church at Knoxville. This didn't make him stuck up, however. On the contrary he grew to have little use for the kids of the neighborhood, because they had a white collar complex. They wanted to be white collar men when they grew up. "Mac" was more romantic. He had ideas of becoming a naval officer, but his eyes barred him from the naval preparatory school and so he accepted the next best and ran away from home with Gentry's Dog and Pony Show at 14. The show closed two months later in Birmingham, Alabama, and the 14-year-old groom beat his way

home, where he remained for two years, or until the Spanish-American War came along to interrupt the monotony of things.

Young Harry was ambitious and frugal for a while. He worked up a paper route among the soldiers at Chickamauga Park, near Chattanooga, Tenn., lived on government rations and wore a government uniform. He saved his money. He had to save it; there was nothing to spend it for. Finally his father let him enlist, though

he was still too young, and he was sent to the Philippines, where he remained for three years. He was discharged just one month before his 21st birthday. And then his adventures began.

He traveled through the Orient and down to Australia-going broke in Sydney. He joined a travelling professional football team, built fences, was a boundary rider and finally shipped out as an ordinary seaman aboard the Cairnworth Castle, bound for San Francisco. He started home, but was deflected from his route by a boatload of mules bound for the British army in South Africa. He was paid off in Portuguese East Africa, where he got a job on the local wooden-axle railroad as a guard, or a brakeman, as he is called in this country. It was his first railroad job. After seven months he paid his fare to Cape Town, worked his way to Sydney, worked there for a while as a teamster, fell in love, and then shoved off for England as a coal passer in an excursion ship in order to see Edward VII crowned as King of England. In the Red Sea and the Gulf of Aden it was so hot they couldn't keep steam upthe stokers couldn't remain close to the fires long enough to keep them burning effectively. The watches had to be split and the youth and strength of McClintock was put to work tending the fires. He saw the coronation, was on the bum for a while, shipped out of Cardiff, Wales, on a square rigger for Buenos Aires, jumped her there, where he had a lot of fun until the money ran out, shipped in a German steamer for the Barbadoes, lived a care-free life in the tropics with a Belfast Irishman for some months, joined the crew of a Halifax brig that had lost four men in a blow, and paid off in Philadelphia.

"Mac" explains that he carried either a guitar or a banjo in those days, together with a repertoire of popular songs. This fact, added to his popularity in forecastle, camp, farm, bunk-house-or saloon. In the latter instance it added to his pocketbook, a fact which quite often kept the wolf from the park bench when he was an indigent sightseer in foreign climes. Just five years ago we wrote the following: "We could quite logically, as well as playfully, devise a remote ancestry for "Mac" in the singing Troubadours and their successors, the Joglars of the old state of Provence in southern France. It is of these medieval singers that we are reminded when we think of "Mac," for his natural calling does not fit snugly into our present-day social system. For many years he journeyed around the world, working at all manner of jobs, playing and singing for his mates when the day's work was over. He sang songs that were simple and obvious, but nevertheless rooted deep in the lives of his listeners; songs of work, love, sorrow, humor and protest. But he was happiest when he could combine his work with his artistic propensities and he often sold his versatility to the tent or the medicine show branches of the show business."

It wasn't long after paying off in Philadelphia that "Mac" went to work for his first medicine show. He switched for a while for the C. L. & W. railroad and then joined the Copper Medicine Co. as an entertainer for one of its traveling shows. With Joe De Voe as a partner, he played the guitar, sang and did comedy turns in black-face, Irish and German dialects.

Space doesn't permit us to follow his adventures with any detail from that time until he joined KFRC in 1925. He went to Alaska, was in San Francisco at the time of the earthquake and fire, in Nevada at the time of the Goldfield and other strikes, worked on railroads, fired a tug on the Great Lakes, joined the Canadian army, helped paint a bridge in Canada, fought forest fires, followed the wheat harvests, worked at a sugar refinery, spent a winter studying and reading such authors as Marx, Huxley, Darwin and Morgan, helped organize the unemployed in Portland, Oregon, in the winter of 1913, was married in Salt Lake, drifted back to San Francisco, and was railroading when

he met Blanding Sloan, the artist, while studying art at the California School of Fine Arts during his spare time. Through Blanding and others he was recommended to KFRC.

"Mac" is still prone to go on a spree with a box of paints and some canvas, to show up at the studio a week or so later with some vivid landscapes or woodland scenes. They aren't strikingly original, either in conception or execution, but they are fresh and bright and cheerful.

One of the secrets of "Mac's" popularity lies in the fact that it is natural for him to always bring some new thought and some genuine feeling with him to the microphone. He is not so interested in trying to give people what he thinks they want as he is in giving them what he is. And he is a real personality. His interest in things is unflagging, his fund of stories and anecdotes bottomless. Groups naturally gravitate around him. He is indifferent to what others are thinking about him because he is busy thinking about something himself. He is at home with all sorts of people, car washers, stock brokers, artists, sailors, Jews, Protestants or Catholics.

Behind "Mac's" rendition of an old-time song of the worknig man there is complete understanding, because he has lived the song. He sings with complete naturalness and unconsciously genuine feeling. His humor, too, is grounded in his living. He is acquainted with America's native humor from first-hand knowledge. He has lived it. It has become a part of him. There is a richness of association in his stories that place them on the plane of real artistry. When he tells you the one about the yokel switchman on a bitter, wind-swept, Montana plateau who was asked by the engineer, leaning out of his cab, if he didn't feel cold without an overcoat, he leaves a story with you that you can chuckle over many a time. The yokel switchman replied, "Oh, that's all right. I got my winter underwear on."




