FOR VALUE RECEIVED

HREE of the most important words in the English language are "for value received." A giver is entitled to receive and in like measure. It is the universal law of fair play.

Remember that next time you are tempted to criticize a program because of its addenda of advertising. The program sponsor is the pocketbook of American radio. During 1932 sponsors will spend over one hundred million dollars for time on the air, exclusive of program talent costs. By these expenditures broadcasting stations are supported and listeners are entertained, and the sponsor is therefore entitled to value received from BOTH.

Of the broadcasting station or company he has a right to expect the same privileges or treatment accorded him by other standard advertising media: the opportunity to describe his merchandise and quote this prices. Any station or broadcasting company which offers or permits less is betraying radio to its competitors, alienating its single source of support, and abetting the attacks of the public press which presents a united front in seeking to discredit radio's commercial value. Advertising in magazines and in newspapers is not entirely uncensored or unrestricted, nor should it be when radio is the medium. Abuses should be neither encouraged nor tolerated. But the sponsor can and must be given sufficient latitude to utilize effectively and to best advantage the time, talent, and facilities he pays for—and get value received.

Of the radio audience the sponsor may reasonably expect understanding and appreciation; a ready willingness to reciprocate enjoyable programs with commendation and patronage; a friendly tolerance of advertising interpolations and whole-hearted response to deserving appeals. It is neither fair nor friendly to consider advertising a fault in radio, when in even more vigorous form and greater quantity it is accepted without remonstrance in newspapers and magazines in spite of the fact that they, unlike radio, not only levy a charge against the advertiser, but against the "audience" as well.

What business needs today in its struggle toward the recovery which is vital to all of us, is fewer kicks, criticisms, and regulations, and more friendly forbearance, sympathetic encouragement, and human understanding. Perfection is not attained by misanthropic fault-finding, the arbitrary use of power, or the pampering of selfishness. Let's show the sponsor some real appreciation, expressed not merely in words but in patronage. Let's criticize him less and buy from him more. It is our duty to see that he DOES get value received—if he is to continue to foot the radio bill and finance radio progress.

It got a bad break t'other day when the San Francisco bay district dailies smeared all over the front pages the news that a network musician had been murdered in a love quarrel. Is KFRC's recently instituted artists service, which has been successful in booking outside engagements for most of the air performers, keeping the mikesters happy after all? That was the idea when it was organized. With KHJ becoming the producing center for the Don Lee chain it left most of the artists at KFRC hanging on to a mighty thin thread, with only occasional programs. They were taken off salary basis and paid only for spot programs. But now we hear that some of the artists are kicking because they have to work as many as eight and ten performances on these barnstorming weekends, must pay their own expenses and get little compensation. "Count me out," some have already told the artist bureau.

Imagine our amazement when we collided head-on with Jack Keough right in the heart of town the other day. The ex-demon baseball and grid reporter for local broadcasters had just hopped back to San Francisco after nearly eight months in the East.

The sponsors of that "Orphan Annie program have just renewed their contract for another year. "Hot diggity," saith the NBC commercial gang. We second the motion.

Don Gilman, skipper of the western portion of the NBC, passed on the news that Mr. Aylesworth has just appointed Richard C. Patterson, Jr., executive vice-president of the big chain, in charge of all operations. He was formerly Commissioner of Correction of New York and was responsible for the complete reorganization of the prison system there. Wonder if he'll try any reorganizing on the network?

Oh, Maxie, what a commotion you caused! Someone started a rumor that Max Dolin, star of Cap'n Dobbsie's Shell Happytime, Columbia-Don Lee event, dropped dead. They'd been "kicking around" the studios here for a year, working unsponsored programs. Not satisfied with the efforts of the sales force in their behalf, they stepped out and sold their own program. They say that every big star in the radio firmament is taking a crack at those auditions that Chevrolet is holding. The auto firm plans an air ballyhoo that will make radio history and me, oh my, how CBS and NBC are fighting to cop the account. Morton Downey, Stoopnagle and Budd, Fanny Brice, Pola Negri, Frank Black, Crumit and Sanderson are a few of the "celebs" reaching for the juicy contract.

George Taylor, ex-KYA and KJBS, is now KROW-ing in the capacity as master of ceremonies for a variety show wafted out as a daily matinee feature.

Allan Willson, NBC vocalizer, has hied off for bonny Scotland, his native land, for an indefinite period.

If Uncle Sam were christening a \$10,000,000 cruiser it wouldn't have been any more conspicuous than the christening the other night of Hazel Warner's beautiful yacht in San Francisco's pleasure boat harbor. It's a nifty, trim and fast, and measures 36 feet from bow to stern.

It was a gala affair, with fifty invited guests aboard and twice that many uninvited and curious ones ashore watching the ceremonies. They took place at the conclusion of the KFRC Blue Monday Jamboree.

The craft was christened the "Hazel Warner" by Al Pearce, who unhesitatingly

Morse's very human serial drama, to all who wrote to the network. And at this writing, more than 5,000 requests have poured in. The chain is wondering if it's going to be able to pay the photograph bill.

The firm that made famous the saying, "Children cry for it," has gone radio. It's NBCing twice weekly, with a quarter-hour drama tagged "Doctor Dick."

It is devoted to broadcasts of arithmetic and audience reading alternately, with the students participating. About 6000 youngsters in the bay district schools listen in.

It was all arranged to have her "written out" of the drama for the time she'd be in the hospital, but not wanting to miss an episode, Miss Wilson had 'em out on a Thursday and showed up for the next week's episode. . . . Refa Miller, ex-NBC, is now KFRC-ing on the Happy-Go-Lucky Hour. . . . Dick LeGrande of KYA, his son "Dickie" and the latter's pet pootch just returned from a motorcycle trip to Portland, the boy and bow-wow riding the side-car. . . . Wonder who'll be the new Spotlight m. c.? . . . Al Pearce has an electric razor and scoots it over his face just before Happy-Go-Lucky time every day. . . . Cameron Prud-homme copped the lead in Victor Hugo's "Man Who Laughs," serio-dramatized for NBC by Wilbur Hall. . . . Mona Lowe and Edna Fischer are teamed. . . . Earle Hodgins' "Medicine Show" is back on the NBC boards, getting a Saturday night release. . . . For the first time in the sixteen years they've been in the show biz, Ted Maxwell and Mrs. Ted (Bobbe Deane to you) are teamed together. Here is a tip. First, select the guilty person. Second, tell how and why he committed the crime. Third, tell how he was discovered. Fourth, tie together the unexplained clues which the author has given you.

The shock of her parents' death was terrible. . . . True she has not been in good physical health since, but that the sanitarium where she has been kept is an asylum— UNTHINKABLE.

BEN: Besides, what difference does it make? . . There are locks on all the doors. . . . Darned good locks. . .

MAX: (chuckles): Ah, so that's what you were up to, prowling about upstairs before din-

ner, Ben?

BEN (belligerent): Well?

MAX (airily): Oh nothing . . . nothing . . . Just mentioned it. . . . You know there's one thing in Uncle Roger's will I thought rather sporting. . . . MARIAN (embarrassed): Why . . . why, no, they never did. . . . You see I . . . well, I suppose I'm different from most girls. . . . I . . . I haven't been quite well-

JOSEPH: Nonsense; you're the picture of health. . . . Who ever told you you weren't well?

MARIAN (admits): Well, I've felt very well, but Uncle Roger insisted that I wasn't strong and that I remain at the sanitarium. . . .

JOSEPH: Yes, I've heard about that.... I always had you pictured in my mind as a weak, puny, anemic little child on the verge of the grave, and here I find a grave, charming young woman...

MARIAN (sighs): There are so many things

a girl should know. . . .

(OSEPH (agrees): Isn't it so? . . .

MARIAN (suddenly): For instance I don't know anything about what's going on here tonight. . . . Why do we have to spend the night in this house that hasn't been lived in since Uncle Roger died a year ago? . . . Why do I have to sleep in Aunt Gertrude's old room?

JOSEPH: Because, my child, the will says so. . . . And you won't get your fifth of a mil-

lion unless you do.

MARIAN: And no one can leave the house. . . . And no one but the five of us and Mr. Case are to be allowed in the house until ten o'clock tomorrow morning. . . . Does that mean something, too?

JOSEPH: It means that the six of us are absolutely isolated from the world for the next

twelve hours.

MARIAN: But why?

JOSEPH: My dear, a will is like a royal command. . . . One doesn't question. . . . One simply does and dies. . . .

MARIAN: Dies?

(ORGAN THEME . . . "VALSE TRIESTE")

(Ten seconds, then down and out)

(Sound of clock ticking for several seconds) (Clock strikes three)

(Sound of heavy breathing of sleeper)

(Startled grunt . . . agonized death cry of man)

(ORGAN THEME ... "VALSE TRIESTE") (Ten seconds, then down and out)

CASE (coming to mike): That's strange. . . Everyone else is down. . . .

JOSEPH: I've done my best to rouse him. . . . Pounded on the door. . . Called. . . .

CASE: Try it again, Joseph. .

MARIAN (coming to mike): What is it? . . Is something wrong, Mr. Case?







MICROPHONE GOSSIP

- During the past year a great many news stories from the networks in the East have mentioned the parabola pickup, or the parabolic microphone. Although the use of this type of microphone pickup originated in the motion picture studios of Hollywood no West Coast station has used these microphones in broadcast work. They have been used in the East for broadcasting the opera direct from the stage. Now KFWB will use a parabola pickup for the first time. And instead of opera, it will be a football game on which first use is made of the new device. Leslie Hewitt, KFWB's vouthful but capable Chief Engineer, working with Vitaphone experts, has evolved a parabolic microphone especially adapted for radio work. It measures four feet in diameter and requires the whole attention of one man to operate.
- • Mme. Frances Alda, whose long and brilliant association with the Metropolitan Opera Company has made her one of the great personalities in the musical world, will devote a large share of her activities from now on to training young singers for radio broadcasting. Mme. Alda has opened studios at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel in New York City, where she will teach a variety of local aspirants. In addition to coaching singers for the radio, she will also teach prospective concert and operatic artists and beginners. Once each week she will broadcast by arrangement with the National Broadcasting Company.
- • Theodora Warfield, the Ideal Hostess of the Ideal Grocers' program which is released over KGB, and Helen Stone, of KGB's "Around the Town" program, are great friends. In fact, they maintain a bachelor apartment together which is the scene of many convivial gatherings. They have in common extensive careers in stage, screen and radio work, sunny personalities and carefree dispositions. They are well known in San Diego, where they may be seen driving helter-skelter around the town at almost any hour in a snappy roadster, which, to be truthful, is usually hidden from view under several layers of dust and grime.

- • Billy Small (KYA) is another Northwesterner, born in Tacoma, Washington. When he was but 13, he secured his first theatrical job. Billy says he put on "nact"—all comedy—playing Pantages circuit, and he opened in Winipeg. His biggest disappointment was his narrow escape from a commission as army bandmaster—he had flat feet. Like many another star, Billy "drifted" into radio. As musical director at KYA he has been most successful. He is short but not fat, a natural mimic and a violinist of ability.
- You'll find Art Kirkham one of the busiest chaps at KOIN in Portland. He is chief announcer and sports commentator and he directs the commercial angle whenever the "Isle of Golden Dreams" takes the air over the Columbia-Don Le system. Art is an Oregon State graduate, an ex-service man with an overseas record, and the proud father of three small Kirkhams. When Kirkham says "greetings, friends," into a superb dynamic microphone, the fans sit up and take interest, because Art always makes a broadcast one to be remembered.
- Noreen Gammill has come back to KFI-KECA. Radio listeners will remember her as the popular character actress whose Album of Familiar Faces constituted a colorful review of practically all human types. Noreen's keen analysis of human character is the result of years of patient observation everywhere that people gather—in the streets, the home, theaters, games, backyard conferences, and so forth. To this keen observation she brings the finished technique of a fine actress.
- Patricia Ann Manners, who plays the rôle of "Gwen" in "Myrt and Marge," has been driven to radio singing by her eight pedigreed canaries which, with rare antiques, are her hobby. . . . "They sing all day long in my apartment, and I was afraid my voice would be the last straw on a suffering bunch of neighbors," she explained. "I went over to WBBM and they gave me a studio." . . . In addition to her dramatic work Miss Man-

ners now vocalizes from the Columbia Chicago key station each Monday at 8:15 p. m., And it is no new rôle. Before her radio début she was a Shubert operetta star.

- Peggy Mason, well-known Southern California fashionist and director of countless style reviews, has joined the KFOX staff and is heard in a daily program presenting style and fashion notes, instruction in color blending and harmony; accessory and ensemble arrangement as well as conducting a free membership Fashion Club whose members are entitled to the benefits of the Peggy Mason interests outside of radio. This is one of a number of new program features arranged by KFOX to better serve their listeners.
- • The theme song with which Gene Quaw's orchestra has become identified, is the original work of Gene, who wrote it for this purpose, and has refused several offers from various leading publishers for the title rights. Its title, "Tell Me With a Melody, Say It With a Song," has become as familiar to many radio listeners as most current hits. Gene and the members of his orchestra are a versatile group. They go from the Lounge and a program of classical and standard selections directly to The Don Room and a sprightly dance hour. This organization broadcasts regularly over KGB and the Don Lee network.
- Frank Crumit and Julia Sanderson (CBS) were engaged as co-stars of the musical comedy "Tangerine." At each performance Frank wooed her with his singing of "Sweet Lady"—the beginning of a successful stage, radio and marital partnership.
- • Bennie Walker, NBC star and editor of the Woman's Magazine of the Air, receives almost as many letters from men, asking for cooking recipes, as from women. Apparently there are just as many bachelors

- as there are bachelor girls who live in their own apartments and prepare their own meals, and they welcome the chance to write to another male and tell him their kitchen troubles, without fear of being laughed at.
- • Donald Novis, NBC tenor, once lived in a mining village in northern Ontario where, with his father, a singing Welshman, he performed for the woodchoppers and miners in the long winter evenings.
- As KTAB's X Bar B Boys audience increases, so do their shirts. First the boys just had colored ones. Now they have added not only color but style in the latest creations of crepe and satin.
- Ramona, Paul Whiteman's singing pianist can play the piano with her hands turned upside down on the keyboard. She has the nimblest hands Whiteman has seen in his years of directing large orchestras.
- • Brad Browne and Al Llewellyn (CBS) first met when both were boarders at a Newark corned beef and cabbage institution seven years ago. When each discovered the other sang, they decided to take a fling at radio.
- The Playboys, popular harmony team at KGB, the Don Lee Station in San Diego, have added a third member to the act. The charming contralto voice which blends so effectively in the novel arrangements featured by this trio, belongs to an equally charming young lady whose name is Betty Kipp. Frank Guthrie, lead tenor, tall and handsome collegian, was discovered to be the possessor of an unusually effective voice when he sang the leading role in the musical comedy which is presented annually by his school. The other third of the act is Joe Knefler, pianist and arranger and announcer, who jumps from bass to soprano on the slightest provocation, or none at all.



In the summer of 1930 he played for the first time at the Glen Island Casino in Westchester County, New York, where he is now appearing for the third consecutive season. It was an ill-chosen time, for a huge strike had disrupted Chicago life, and he was repeatedly told "Don't do anything until I call you." In desperation he got work on the lake boats, keeping after the bookers whenever he came ashore.

His break finally came when he was 19. "If you're half as funny as your name" an agent told him, "you'll be o. k." He was signed for a vaudeville
