

# ARE YOU SATISFIED?

ROADCAST WEEKLY sounds a warning and makes a plea. Radio is still in its infancy. Its stupendous possibilities and potential power for good or evil transcend the human imagination. Already it has revolutionized communication throughout the civilized world and effected sweeping changes in the attitudes and activities of its inhabitants. As you sit at home tonight comfortably ensconced in your favorite easy chair, summoning entertainment and inspiration from the ends of the earth at will, give a thought to the future of radio. Whether this infant prodigy grows toward greater service and broader benefactions or metamorphoses into a mere moneymaking machine of capitalistic monopoly depends entirely on your own alert interest, outspoken expression, and active support of those agencies sincerely dedicated to radio progress.

Do present programs meet your entire approval? Are broadcasting stations guilty of sins or ommissions which conflict with public interest or your own personal enjoyment? How can radio increase its humanitarian value, alleviate present economic hardships, and speed the return of prosperity? Can you conceive ways of utilizing broadcast facilities to improve representative government? Speak up, and keep on speaking. A stream can rise no higher than its source. The inspiration and direction that emanate from the audience itself will ever continue to be the exact measure of radio progress and achievement.

Silence signifies disinterestedness or approval, invites stagnation, and automatically encourages commercial interests to appropriate broadcasting to their own ends in possible disregard of public welfare and individual rights. Big business stares covetously at control of the air as the richest prize of modern times. The present exercise of this control by the listeners themselves is neither more permanent nor effective than their fulfillment of the duty and obligation

such control entails. Though the inherent right of a democratic people, at the slightest show of indifference it quickly becomes a mere political shibboleth, the actual power passing into the hands of organized capital eagerly outstretched to receive it. And once such control is lost to the public, its return is difficult if not impossible of attainment, as has been vividly and repeatedly demonstrated by other similar losses.

The conscientious exercise of that control can stimulate further radio development and progress exceeding even the most sanguine expectations of its most ardent supporters. Who shall say that in addition to its colossal contributions to entertainment, education, religion, and home happiness radio will not also ultimately achieve the political salvation of the nation?

Eternal vigilance is the price of safety. If the people of today are to continue to reap these benefits in ever-increasing measure and number, and prevent so great a patrimony being jeopardized for future generations, then lethargy and indifference must cease and every radio listener here and now resolve to let his voice be heard and his interest known.

Your congressmen are sworn to obey your mandates. Instruct them. The Federal Radio Commission at Washington is the people's radio tribunal to which all broadcasting stations must apply semi-annually for license and answer for their conduct. Communicate The stations your will to your officials. themselves need, seek, and welcome your comments and criticisms. They are powerless to conform unless you see to it they are informed. Broadcast Weekly is dedicated solely to your service, its editorial page a medium for giving effective expression and widespread circulation to your opinions and suggestions. What are they? Guide us. Speak fully and frankly, that this page and your entire magazine may be edited with maximum benefit to you and to radio.

HE daddy of the Don Lee string—KFRC in San Francisco—is going through a sort of rejuvenation period right now. They're pepping up the Blue Monday Jamboree, shooting the Feminine Fancies with new enthusiasm, adding some new productions to the station line-up and parading many new voices before the microphones.

That the station is going right after the potential radio business is evidenced by the fact that the sales force has been doubled

in the last few weeks.

And all that means, we would say, that KFRC is going right after that place in the sun that it occupied not so many months ago. That's interesting. Because the more competition among the stations the better programs we get. Hop to it, old timer.

We believe that more than casual mention should be given those opera presentations being broadcast over the continent direct from the stage of the Metropolitan Opera House in New York. And a few affectionate slaps on the back should be handed the NBC for making it possible for us to eavesdrop on 'em.

The broadcasts of the annual Wagner matinee cycle started on February 2. We're sorry we didn't know about it soon enough to tip you off before. They are being released in the West over the NBC-KPO chain on February 17, 22 and March 3, at 11 a. m. On February 17 "Gotterdammerung" will be broadcast; on the 22nd, "Tannhauser," and on March 3, "Tristan and Isolde."

Jean Ellington, who you hear over the Don Lee network on the Blue Monday Jamboree, was formerly with Vic Meyers' orchestra on KOMO and at KGW.

Are those jig-saw puzzles getting the NBC gang by the collar? Well, just any day you can drift through the studio lobbics and bi-places and find artists, musicians and announcers racking their gray matter trying to solve them—during their spare time, of course, Mr. NBC. Among the most ardent fans of the new pastime are Edna Fischer, Billy Page, Victor Linfoot and Jerry Kilgore. Jerry, by the way is considered the champ around the NBC Camp.

Frederick Bittke, who was one of the most popular of the KFRC singers some months back, had quite a tribute paid him the other day when the Don Lee station received a petition from Seattle containing 150 signatures, asking that the vocalist be returned to that station's mikes. Bittke, however, is now engaged at KFAC-KFVD in Los Angeles.

KROW has closed its San Francisco studios, but plans some time in the near future to reopen at a spot in Van Ness Avenue in this city.

Betty Kelly, who rose to radio fame on the NBC, is now being heard on KFRC. She made her debut on that broadcaster on the Jamboree on January 30.

Dogdom will have its day, or rather night, in etherdom when, on February 13, the NBC presents the first of a series of bow-wow programs over the NBC wire-up called "Spratts Dog Show of the Air." Scotty Mortland, who has been philosophizing on the air for many moons, will weave puppy stories. In addition there will be a contest for dog lovers. Stewart Edward White, the noted author of dog stories, will be the judge. The broadcast time is 8 to 8:30 p. m.

Hap and Jack, rapid fire song writers, who earned quite a "rep" on KYA some time back, are now grinding 'em out over the KJBS airways daily except Saturday and Sunday, at 3:45 o'clock for a beauty preparation concern.

We don't know exactly what inspired it, but it was moving day for four NBC folk on January 30—that is, home moving, not job. Paul Carson, Donald Cope. Don Thompson and Lloyd Yoder left their old abodes for new at that date.

The Martha Meade Society, sponsored by the Sperry Flour Company, moves to the NBC-KGO network on Thursday, March 2, for a series of twice weekly broadcasts, featuring Martha Meade. The days, Tuesdays and Thursdays. The hour, 9:30 to 9:45 a. m.

# MICROPHON GOSSIP

- • One of the most unusual programs on the air originates in the studios of KEX, Portland. It is the "Circus Court of the Air," and is presented in the interest of the Shrine Hospital for Crippled Children. The studio is fitted out as a real courtroom and is presided over by Circuit Judge, W. A. Ekwall. Special Prosecutor Barney Goldstein is the beetle-browed griller, and two attorneys for the defense are on hand, Robert Mautz and Herman Kenin. Kenin is familiar to musicgoers, having had one of the finest recording bands several years ago; he retired from the musical field to pursue the study and practice of law, and it is in the rôle of attorney that he makes his appearance on the program. Jimmy Richardson, well-known sports authority is heard as the hardboiled and wise-cracking bailiff. Each week a prominent citizen is hailed before the court, is tried for a misdemeanor, and is fined accordingly. All proceeds go to the Shrine Hospital for Crippled Children.
- Almost everyone with an office takes pride in some desk ornament of one kind or another-ash tray, photo or cigarette container. Henry Grossman, Columbia's Chief Division Engineer, decorates his office with an enormous burned out water-cooled power tube, at least a yard long, from Columbia's transmitting station at Wayne, N. J. Each of these intricate glass creations cost \$480—there are 26 of them in the Wavne transmitter, and each of them lasts just about 1,000 hours. Then a new one's needed.
- • Just before leaving for Boston with his band, Don House at the other, to a back-

conductor, packed up a dozen announcing staff will be headpairs of roller sales in a special valise. It seems that Mistah Redman and his brethren are "that way" about rollerskating and always spend an hour after their evening shows rolling around a stretch of smooth asphalt. Recently Buzz, now a full grown Persian, was entered in the California Cat Show — the only feline permitted to enter without a pedigree-and although his family tree was missing, he possessed so many "points" that he won second place in his class.
- • The greatest array of broadcast talent and equip-ment ever assembled for a single event will be brought into play by Columbia Broadcasting System, when it covers the inauguration of Franklin Delano Roosevelt as President of the United States in Washington, D. C., on March 4. Herbert B. Glover, CBS News Director, has drawn up plans for the reporting of the activities of President-elect Roosevelt at every point of importance, from the Capital. at one end of famous Pennsyl-

- ed by Ted Husing, he will be assisted by a staff of veteran commentators, including Frederic William Wile, Edw. C. Hill, and H. V. Kaltenborn, plus a number of men from the regular announcing staff. The broadcast will begin at 6 a. m. and last until I p. m., Pacific Standard Time. Description of the Inaugural Ball will be heard from 7 to 8 p.m.
- • Rudy Vallee, at the microphone for one of his Fleischmann hours is serious in mien, intent on his job. He conducts his orchestra with movements of the hands, swaving of the body; he uses no baton. When he sings, Rudy steps from the conductor's stand and goes close to the microphone, his voice inaudible a few feet away in the studio. He closes his eyes if he is singing a tune he is familiar with. He does this as an aid to his memory and to help him concentrate on the words and music. He adopts an easy, informal garb, with collar loosened to give his vocal chords free play. When introducing guests, or engaging in dialogue with them, Rudy appears less serious, smiles and gestures freely. As a veteran of the air waves, he gives invaluable advice on microphone technique to the guests he brings from the stage and movies.
- • Ivar Kallin, violinist member of the staff orchestra, unexplainedly dropped his case on his way down the hallway toward KNX's main studio. Down on his knees he went, flung open the case, to find that his precious fiddle was split back and front. To any true musician this is a major tragedy-so it was to Ivar. But Kallin took the Redman, Columbia's dusky ground of martial music. The fiddle to one who mends such

things, and was told that the instrument after being repaired might be improved musically and certainly would be enhanced as to material value.

- • There is one very definite spot in KFI's studio B, where Silvio Lavatelli is not allowed to sit. Technicians soon discovered that when Silvio parked himself in a certain location and played his beloved 'cello, its tones fairly blew the transmitter off the air.
- • Ben Alley, the bridegroom, received 104 wedding presents from radio fans. . . . A few years ago, Lennie Havwas attending boys' camps, and now he's conducting one of the most important programs in radio. . . . The Roslyn, L. I. Baron Mun-chausen Jack Pearl Club members answer their phones with "Vas you dere?" . . . Anson Weeks possesses New York's most energetic band because he adds six new tunes every week to his band's repertoire. . . . Leo Reisman is collecting the love songs of all the ages for future orchestration. . . . Jesse Crawford likes to play "Barrelhouse" organ, which is rhythm of the super torrid type. . . . Mildred Bailev is to be spotted soon on an important commercial originating outside of New York. Cliff Hall, straight man for Jack Pearl on the Magic Carpet Thursday nights, is camera shy and refuses to be photographed.
- • Although he has had long experience in radio dramatics, Bob White, who portrays Dr. Petrie in "Fu Manchu Mystery Stories," cannot drop the gestures he acquired on the legitimate stage. They were published in 1836 and the binding bears these words: "Presented to Mr. John Marry by the Congregation of the Methodist New Connexion. Under-Lyne, as a Testimonial of Respect for his Service as Leader of the Choir," December 24, 1853. Black believes there are not more than two other copies of the first edition.
- • Charley (Capt. Henry) Winninger and Lanny Ross, were among the radio celebrities at a party for Amos 'n' Andy, staged at the Hotel St. Regis in New York, recently by Clarabelle Walsh. well-known New York the-atrical patron. Mrs. Amos and Mrs. Andy were there, too, and Mrs. Walsh herself made sure Madame Queen wasn't absent by impersonating the famous heauty shop proprietress.
- • George A. Presby, better known as "Archie," has been named assistant program manager of KGW, Portland, Oregon.
- • The authors of the serial, "The Seal of the Don," Eugene Carman and Richard Gerson, are both native sons, Gerson having been born in San Francisco and Carman in

DX fans are often puzzled by the time difference throughout the world, and have difficulty in computing the time at distant points with respect to the local time. Particularly is this true in the short-wave field, where foreign DX reception is not only possible, but a regular occurrence. For instance, when the Pacific network gives us the London rebroadcasts, no doubt many listeners are puzzled to know the hour in London corresponding to Pacific time. The accompanying World Time Chart answers all questions concerning world time.

The local time, under the "Pacific" heading, corresponds to the time indicated on the same

horizontal line in any other part of the world. It is seen that 2 a. m. here is 10 a. m. in London, 9:30 p. m. in New Zealand, 8 p. m. in Sydney, 7 p. m. in Japan, etc. If you should hear Manila on short waves at 6 a. m., you will know that it is 10 p. m. there. In order to determine whether it is the same day, or the preceding or following day, follow this rule: Crossing from dark to light area at midnight, indicates the following day. Crossing from light to dark area indicates preceding day. As an example, 4 a. m. here is 9 p. m. in Tokio of the preceding day.


