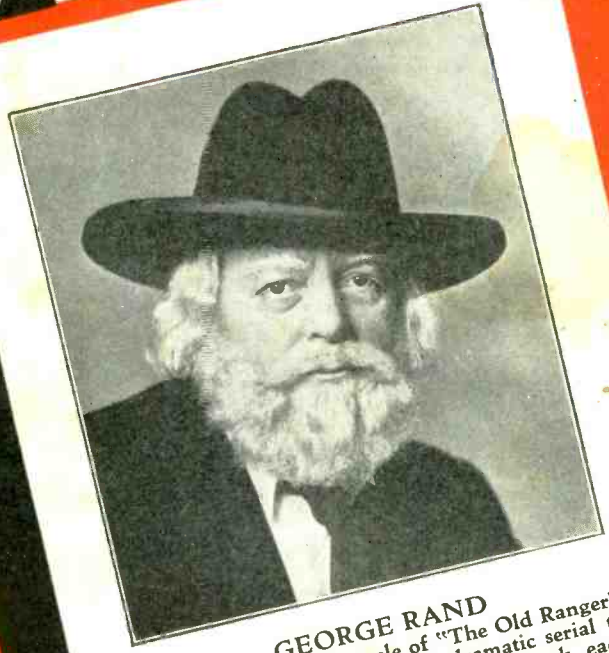

ETHER GLEANINGS

WE humbly admit that there have been many things in the distribution of radio broadcast programs that have stumped us. But why in the name of romping rheostats does most of the best comedy fall on Friday night, one program right after the other?

There are no less than five rib-tickers on the NBC lanes alone and about three on the CBS, not to overlook a number of the independents.

For instance, on the National there is Phil Baker at 5:30; Jack Benny at 6; Amos 'n' Andy at 7; Musical Grocery Store at 7:30; Gilmore Circus at 8:15; and on the Columbia you can dial Hodge Podge Lodge at 4:15; Columbia Revue at 6, and various others.

Enough to give the steady dialer that evening convulsions or a severe attack of comic indigestion.

Why so many sponsors have picked out Friday night to spread their chortle material over the ether domain is more than we can savvy. Isn't Monday or Tuesday or any other night just as good? And why not spread some of 'em out, so they won't bunch up like at present? Program managers should take it upon themselves to make some suggestions to the sponsors in cases of this kind.

Of course there is some comedy most every night in the week on one or the other network and on the independents. But there are several nights through the week that could stand more.

As far as this radio eavesdropper is concerned there is nothing quite as refreshing as good, *wholesome* comedy on the air. We like to laugh and like lots of comedy, but we're not crazy about taking it all in one dose.

How about it, Mr. NBC and Mr. CBS?

* * *

General Foods, Inc., one of the larger victual companies, is hitting it off on the Don Lee-CBS network five times a week from 1:45 to 2 p. m. with a script program called Belle and Martha, featuring a pair who made notches for themselves in Eastern radio. The program originates in Los Angeles.

* * *

The Century of Progress Exposition, which opens in Chicago on June 1, is being brought in advance to the dialing audience of the nation by the NBC. Burton Holmes, renowned globe girdler and lecturer, appears before the network mikes five days a week, excluding Sunday and Tuesday, from 3:15

to 3:30 o'clock, describing the various buildings, exhibits and novelties that will be housed within the world's fair grounds. KGO is releasing it in San Francisco.

Tarzana Minerals, who signed up with KFRG to start on May 2, cancelled their contract before they started, because they couldn't get the type of program they wanted.

* * *

KYA has cancelled its nightly news broadcast conducted by Darrell Donnell.

* * *

Ted Fio-Rito leaves the Hotel St. Francis and CBS programs here May 25.

* * *

The last of the Lucky Strike programs, the Baron Munchausen affair, will be broadcast on June 29. Lucky will be off the air entirely then, as far as is known now.

* * *

Those weekly Standard Symphonies on the NBC eventually blossomed into a symphony of love for two of the principals on the program, who were welded May 7. They are Modesta Mortensen, violinist, with the symphony, and John Ribbe, NBC producer, who has had charge of the broadcasts for the past three years. It was the broadcasts that first brought the couple together three years ago.

Another recent NBC marriage was that of Bernardine Flynn, character actress at the Chicago studios, who is heard out here on the coast in various programs, including the role of "Aunt Hessie" in the Northwestern Chronicle. She was married April 29 to Dr. C. C. Doherty of Chicago. The bride also plays the role of Sade in "Vic and Sade."

Followers of that "First Nighter" program can be assured of hearing it for another fifty-two weeks at least. Its sponsor has just renewed for that period of time. Incidentally, the program has been moved to 6:30 to 7 o'clock on Fridays.

Jane Froman, the contralto, succeeds the Two Doctors—Pratt and Sherman, on the Real Silk Hosiery program on Sundays—NBC. Vincent Lopez and his musical aggregation remain.

* * *

KQW auditors are welcoming the return to the station of Mabel Adams, contralto, who has been off the air for the past two months, due to illness. Miss Adams has been singing over KQW, the San Jose station, for five years and enjoys a wide following.

Among other programs she is appearing on Mondays from 1:30 to 2:30; Tuesdays from 8 to 10 and Thursdays from 8 to 9 p. m.

Pierre Douillet, swanky pianist, who has concertized in all parts of Europe and America and studied under the top notch masters in Moscow, is KTAB-ing twice weekly now—Wednesdays and Saturdays from 3:30 to 3:45 o'clock.

* * *

Eugene Hawes—Pedro to you—has been giving quite a display of his histrionic talents around the KFRC studios lately. His latest is an act monickered "Slim Hawes and his One Man Show," in which he plays about half a dozen characters. It was Jamboree-ed a couple of times.

* * *

Sally Selma is an addition to that matinee program especially built for feminine listeners on the Don Lee network.

* * *

Mildred Bailey, pianist; Harriet French, violinist, and Vernal Deane, 'cellist, compose that Lyric Trio, recently added to the KTAB staff. You can dial 'em daily from 12 to 12:25 o'clock and other times.

* * *

Program maestro Bill Wright at KFRC tells us about a new group called Torrid Terriers, who cut musical capers there. The personnel: Chester Smith, guitar player; Tommy Thunen, trumpeter; Leo Kailon, violinist, and George Whitney, saxophonist.

Good news to its former followers. The Pacific Coast Borax Company returns its very popular feature, "Death Valley Days," to the air via the NBC on May 18. It has not been heard in the West for many months. The good news comes in a double dose, as far as the local NBC artist staff is concerned. For these productions are to be given from the San Francisco studios.

The previous presentations had all been produced in the New York studios. George Rand and Barbara Jo Allen will be the principals.

Erno Rapee, who conducts the Radio City Symphony Orchestra, is making it possible for American composers to have their own compositions played over a coast to coast NBC hookup on Sunday mornings. He is inviting composers to submit their works to him and all those accepted will be played on his Sabbath program.

We take it that Lord Bilgewater got quite an education recently when he was master of ceremonies at a lingerie show for women only at one of the high class downtown de-

partment stores. The pretty-pretties were displayed on living models, too. Some fellas have all the luck.

For the first time since the days when it owned KFRC, the City of Paris, San Francisco department store, has gone in for regular broadcasting again. This time it is using the facilities of KJBS. A remote control has been placed in the store and the broadcasts are given direct from there every weekday morning from 9:30 to 9:45 o'clock.

Two NBC personalities, who hitherto had been playing in groups, are being featured on solo spots now. They are Carl Kalash, violinist, who has a period of his own from 3:45 to 4 p. m. Wednesdays on KGO, and Winston Petty, 'cellist on the same station Saturdays from 12 to 12:15 p. m.

SILHOUETTES

On February 19, 1902, in Lynn, Massachusetts, Edwin Ellsworth Peabody was born.

On February 19, 1917, in Lynn, Massachusetts, a sturdy blond lad of fifteen walked into a navy recruiting station—and Edwin Ellsworth was gone forever. Eddie Peabody took his place, to live in the hearts of theater and radio audiences everywhere. Eddie and his banjo and his sea-going haircut have become an institution of the entertainment world, in which a bright dot of color is as welcome to those who inhabit it as it is to those who spend their lives in offices or factories. Thus it happens that when Eddie's diminutive figure is bouncing about a stage in its characteristic electric fashion, the wings are crowded with fellow professionals, and similarly, when he appears for his Wednesday night Safeway broadcasts, over an NBC-KGO network, radio stars usually gather around the studio door to watch.

Eddie isn't bashful about an audience. He has been used to having one since childhood, for he was only nine years old when he started his musical career, with a violin his father gave him. He plays thirty-one musical instruments today, but his most precious one still is that little old violin, still bearing the name of its owner on the side, where he carved it with a jackknife.

When he ran away from home to enlist in the navy at the age of fifteen, the violin accompanied him, and it stayed with him in training camps, on board the "battle wagons," through submarine duty and shipwrecks, which he and his violin managed to survive together.

Eddie was nineteen when he was honorably discharged from the navy. He had picked up acquaintance with a dozen or so other musical instruments besides the fiddle in those four years he spent being a gob and entertaining his fellow seamen, and he found himself in demand for dance bands, picture houses and vaudeville. Successive tours during the last nine years have carried him all

over the world, to win plaudits from audiences in Dublin, Nice, Monte Carlo, London, Paris and other entertainment centers. His repertoire of instruments now includes thirty-one, all of which he plays with equal facility and carries about with him wherever he goes.

Eddie's first radio experience came back in 1924 when he was a guest artist at station WTAM, Cleveland.

The blond young star with the elfish smile and the trick pants hasn't much time for anything except work, but when he does steal a few days to himself he spends them on his orange ranch at Riverside, California. Golf is his favorite outdoor occupation—outside of ranching—and driving comes next. The greatest thrill he has ever known, he says, was when he rode around the Indianapolis Speedway at 127 miles an hour recently.

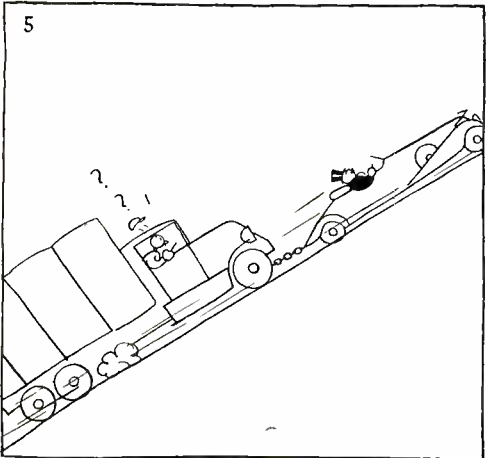
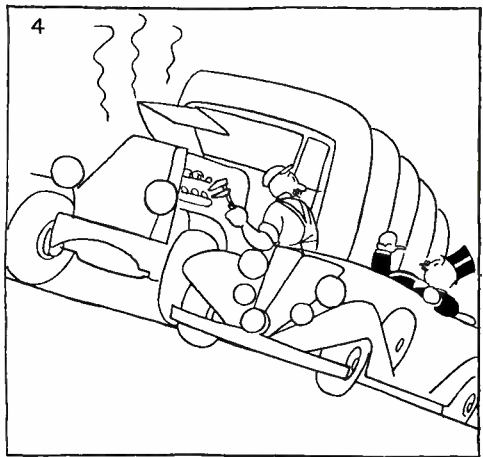
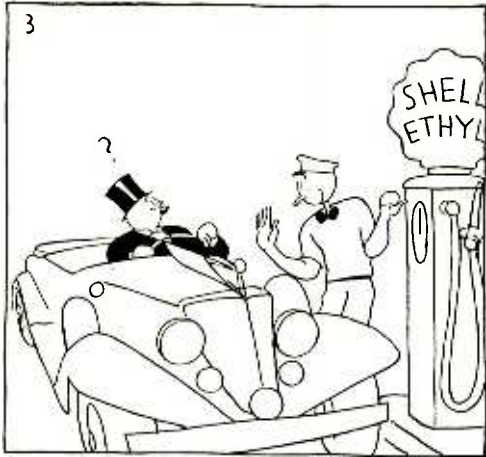
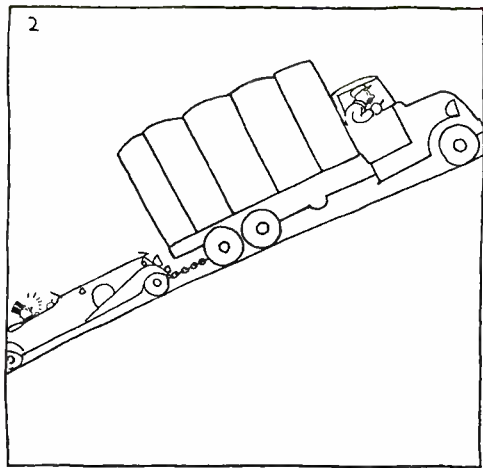
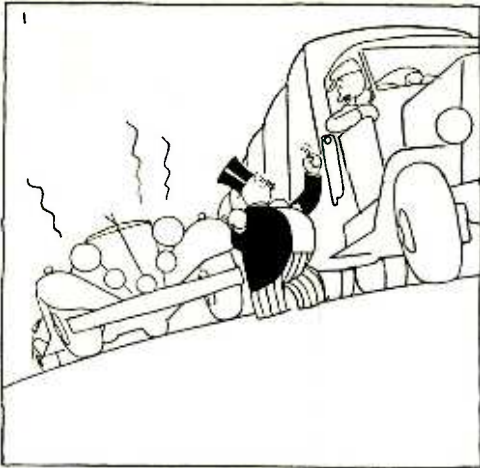

MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • Bernardine Flynn, NBC character actress, known to radio listeners as "Sade" in Vic and Sade and "Aunt Hessian" in the Northwestern Chronicle, became the bride Saturday, April 29 of Dr. C. C. Doherty of Chicago. The ceremony took place in the rectory of Holy Name Cathedral, and the couple have driven south for several days honeymoon.

Bernardine owes her honeymoon, and incidentally her first vacation in three years, to the continuity writer who has "written her out" of the script for a few days. During her absence Vic and Rush will carry on alone.

Miss Flynn is a daughter of George C. Flynn of Madison, Wis. She was born in Madison and was graduated from the University of Wisconsin. After playing in several Broadway productions she turned to radio, joining the dramatic staff at the NBC Chicago studios three years ago.

Dr. Doherty is on the staff at Passavant hospital in Chicago and a member of the faculty at Northwestern University medical school.

• • • Ruth Etting is vacationing at present underneath the Havana moon, en route to join the colony of Columbia celebrities in California. After singing fourteen months from coast to coast, Ruth decided to have a look at both of them via the Panama Canal where, as Gracie Allen would say, Isthmus be nice.

• • • What with the circus coming out of its winter quarters, it's also getting to be traveling time for some of Columbia's noted bands. Guy Lombardo's Royal Canadians are in the midst of a 30,000-mile tour which took them to Pittsburgh, to be followed by

a prom at the University of Virginia, and thence to Atlanta. It will end in Chicago where, on May 19, the Lombardos will open the summer season in the Windy City for the first time in three years. They are deserting Long Island's Pavilion Royal for "The Dells," in Chicago. They'll also serve as the World's Fair example of a Century of Progress in dance music.

• • • Columbia's vocal stars and bands are not alone in the demand for personal appearances of radio celebrities. The commentators also are putting in appearances. Edwin C. Hill, CBS's most stage-shy speaker, has capitulated to the theater and soon will embark on his first series of platform addresses. At the same time Frederic William Wile, political analyst, is preparing his second address before the annual Congress of the D. A. R. in Washington. Wile will discuss the international situation. Simultaneously, H. V. Kaltenborn takes time off from his Columbia talks to meet lecture engagements.

• • • Jerry Cady, the KFI-KECA continuity demon, has won the stations' bowling championship, according to Jerry Cady. Other players were Glenn Dolberg and Leslie Kelly, accountant. It is interesting to note that Dolberg says the championship rightfully belongs to one Dolberg, and Kelly maintains both Dolberg and Cady wrong.

• • • Consuelo Gonzales, popular little Mexican singer from KFRC, Columbia's San Francisco outlet, who always acts out her songs before the "mike" as if she were in the presence of a huge audience, is threatening to steal Claud Sweeten's job. Visitors to the

studio at rehearsal time often see the dusky little miss, who is just barely 19, sharing the director's platform and vivaciously leading the orchestra during her own songs, while Claud fiddles away obediently beside her, keeping one eye turned down at his tiny boss *pro tem*.

• • • Add movie actors on the KHJ staff (Columbia's Los Angeles outlet): Frank Jenks of the humorous features, now working in the Bing Crosby picture "College Humor," comes as a dance-band leader; Sam Coslow, the Voice of Romance, who does his stuff on the Fox lot, is making his debut as a singing actor in a forthcoming musical.

• • • The radio version of the "Count of Monte Cristo" (serial) is now being released over KNX, Hollywood, every night except Saturday and Sunday from 7:45 to 8 p. m. It is an electrical transcription. The cast includes Walter White, the stage actor and motion picture director, in the leading rôle, that of Edmond Dantes. Betty Webb, the Betty Lou Regent of "Chandu, the Magician," plays opposite. The other principal characters are to be done by Joseph de Stephanie, Joseph Franz, Cy Kendall, Victor Rodman, and True Boardman. This series will be released over three stations only: a station in Chicago, a second in New York, and the third by KNX on the Pacific Coast.

• • • KMTR announces the presentation of Rosalie Barker Frye, mezzo-soprano, in a series of recitals to be broadcast daily except Saturday.

Miss Frye is well known throughout the West as a radio star, having filled impor-

tant staff positions on several coast stations. She is also a member of the Los Angeles Opera Company, and has appeared as soloist repeatedly with the Hollywood Bowl and Los Angeles Philharmonic orchestras.

• • • Under the paternal and jovial chaperonage of Ben Frank, Phil Harris and his Coconut Grove Orchestra journeyed to Palm Springs over the week-end. Ostensibly the boys were to play a dance at the resort's leading hostelry. Down in their hearts they knew the truth—they were going to get out in the open for a game of baseball with the lads of another orchestra, playing at the Dunes. Phil Harris' outfit was ingloriously defeated, beaten, walloped, and otherwise humiliated by a score of 25 to 15. But, to give credit where it is due—Phil, ensconced on first base, turned in the only unassisted double play of the game, and Art Jarrett pitched good ball. It was the fielding that showed a lack of harmony. Tom Hanlon, official announcer for the Harrisonians, was behind the bat.

Ben Frank officiated as umpire, wearing a bathing suit with a .45 strapped around his middle. From that little touch, we trust that at least an amusing time was had by all.

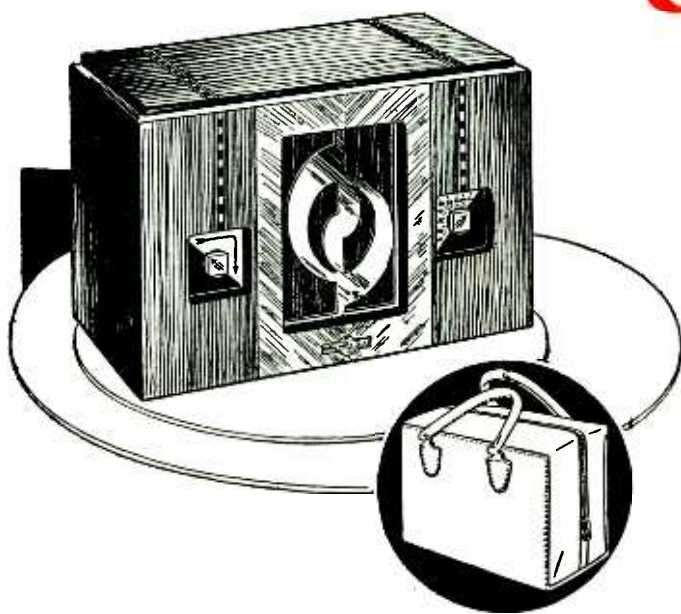

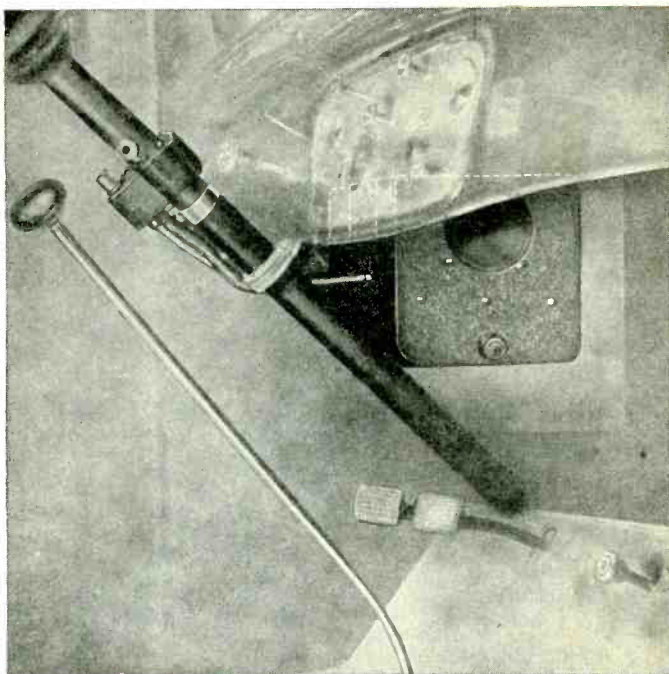
