Another "New Deal" Demanded

ITH the approach of football season is revived that perennial argument on the radio broadcasting of college games. This year it seems the West is again to be particularly favored. If somewhat reluctantly and with considerable condescension, the scintillating academic minds who decide this momentous question for our western institutions of learning, have apparently given their consent to the broadcasting of the season's games. It is regretted that so generous a gesture could not have been extended without a codicil which quite effectively stifles the gratitude and approbation the radio audience should have preferred to feel.

It is stated that the fee demanded of the radio stations for the privilege of broadcasting these games is so exorbitant that there is little likelihood of being able to obtain a sponsor. Failing to obtain a sponsor the stations themselves will have to bear the entire cost of football broadcasts this fall. The fact that these colleges do not really fear broadcasting will keep any number of people from attending the games in person, is indicated in their willingness to let such broadcasting be done at the expense of the radio stations. The prohibitive fee demanded if the broadcasts are sponsored is therefore obviously far in excess of any loss anticipated through reduced gate receipts, and as a consequence bears all the earmarks of deliberate extortion.

BROADCAST WEEKLY holds no brief for the broadcasting companies. They are not without their faults and shortcomings. In the past, we have not hesitated to criticize them frankly and freely, and, in the interest of radio and its audience of over seventeen million American homes, we shall do so again. But radio must go on. It is one of the greatest and most constructive influences of modern times. Its benefactions are voluntary and far-reachings. It demands no gate receipts. Though it is one of the outstanding educational agencies of the day, unlike the colleges and universities whose attitude toward it is now so mercenary, it is to no extent subsidized by public taxes or private endowments. Its entire expense is borne by the broadcasting companies, without public levy of any sort. Therefore, in the interests of radio and all it means to the American people, these companies must be protected in their full rights to earn the money upon which radio depends for maintenance and progress.

The major radio chains have declared their willingness and intention to broadcast western football games this fall by whatever arrangement is possible. The radio audience now demands that this arrangement be such as to permit these companies at least to defray the cost of such broadcasts, and give impetus to business and employment by making it possible for some worthy sponsor to finance the arrangement.

Football games produce hundreds of thousands of dollars in revenue annually for western colleges and universities. It is, therefore, unfair and unreasonable for them to ask or expect a third and disinterested party who profits in no way from the games, to stand the expense of carrying them to such of their constituents and supporters who are unable to attend. And it is even more arbitrary of them to attempt to swell their games' profit by demanding of the potential sponsor an exorbitant fee for the privilege of rendering the service the schools themselves should perform for the taxpayers who support them.

It is high time that the people set for institutions which *they support*, some of the fundamental standards of service and fair play enforced upon institutions which *support themselves*. Radio demands a "new deal" from the colleges and universities.



T'S always fair weather when good fellows get together—on the ether or elsewhere. Here's the group that sings and plays so melodiously on the Stars of the West program, broadcast over an NBC-KGO network every Monday night at 8:30 o'clock P.S.T., under sponsorship of the Acme Brewing Company.

At the microphone are Paul Gates, the announcer on this program; Irving Kennedy, tenor, and Mary Wood, soprano, two of the best known and best loved stars of NBC's San Francisco studios. Mary is a former Denver girl whom Mary Garden discovered, and her clear, golden tones soaring higher than those of most sopranos, are realiniscent of her Rocky Mountain home. Star was a noted musical comedy and vaudeville star before she joined the NBC staff. She has sung on many transcontinental programs from Denver, where she was a member of the Silver State Light Opera Company. Kennedy's rich, lyric tenor is recognized everywhere that NBC networks reach. He was born in Brooklyn, New York, in a house where his family has lived for more than half a century, was educated for the law, and became a singer on advice of his cousin, Olga Cook, light opera prima donna. He came west with Irving Berlin's Music Box Revue, and has remained on the coast ever since.

At the left, in the foreground, stands Meredith Willson, conductor of the Stars of the West orchestra. Willson's unusual arrangements, which transform popular songs into symphonies, make his music unique. 

HERE is a cycle of vaudeville or variety type radio programs hitting the air right now that to this dialer's belief has never been equalled in the history of radio.

Is the variety, revue, musical comedy type of ether presentation the answer to the listening public's cries for a perfect radio program? Maybe so—for a while.

In the past few weeks program builders have ground out continuities for a number of new, quick-tempo pot pourrie presentations. And they are selling 'em, too! To the biggest buyers of radio broadcasting time the oil companies.

KFRC polished up the Jamboree—the first hour of it, and found a buyer in the Shell Oil Company. General Petroleum is staging a half hour variety show over CBS every week night. Standard Oil has its "Standard on Parade" on Sunday nights on the NBC, which is cut out of the same pattern as the Jamboree, the old Spotlight Revue and others of that type. KTAB has its Borden Capers on Thursday night: KYA its Maurice Gunsky variety show; KPO its Carefree Carnival; the CBS the Merrymakers and Happy Go Lucky Hour, and NBC AI Pearce and his Gang. KOW its You Never Can Tell program on Tuesday nights; not to forget three or four coast to coast NBC affairs that arc off the air for the summer and KLX its High Jinks, ad infinitum.





NE day in a small town 011 the New Jersey coast, half the team of Rvan and Noblette was born.

And a few years later, in San Francisco, the other half gurgled up at her nurse: "Where's my brother Zero?" But the nurse didn't understand, and neither did anybody else until, in a drafty backstage corridor one day, a Mister Tim Rvan was presented to a Miss Noblette. She said: "Hello, Mr. Rvan," and he said: "Hello, Miss Noblette," and then . . . let Mr. Rvan tell it.

"She started talking about her Brother Zero-and she hasn't stopped yet. I wanted to get in the show business the worst way-she says I did. Hobbies? She enjoys her work; likes to eat, loves to sleep. Is crazy about clothes and just adores money."

Anyway, that meeting seems to have been the moment to which the fates had been leading up, and the insouciant team which recently transferred its activities from the vaudeville stage to the NBC microphone was on its way. As Ryan and Noblette, Irene and Tim have teamed together over the major vaudeville circuits. headlining most of the bills on which they have appeared. In San Francisco they were favorites at the Old Orpheum, the Golden Gate and the Fox,

San Francisco was the birthplace of Miss Noblette, Her father, J. M. Noblette, was an immigration officer at Angel Island, and Irene attended the Fairmount school and dreamed of going on the stage. She realized her dream when she played her first rôle at the Majestic Theater, San Francisco, from where she

went into big time in the East, playing in musical comedy, drama, and then vaudeville, where she met Ryan.

At the age of seventeen, when his father, an oil man, told Tim he never could be an actor, he ran away and joined a tent show, where his strong voice got him a job-"one of the concessions," he admits bitterly. But he did get a chance to sing soon after that and he varied acting, from 10 to 10:30,

singing, publicity work, and writing plays and vaudeville sketches.


