He's a trouper through and through.

At thirteen he made up his mind that playacting was his life's work. At fifteen, when he graduated from high school, he secured his first thespian job—in vaudeville. And at nineteen he was the leading man in his own company—The Ted Maxwell Players.

In the intervening years he has been before the microphone in one capacity or another—as producer, continuity writer and actor.

Miss Bernice Berwin is an actress of the highest degree, having devoted many years of her young life to the art.

She has been associated with radio and the NBC for the past five years and in that period has built up a following as strong as Gibraltar. Thousands never miss a play that Miss Berwin is scheduled to play in.



THE SHELL SHOW

HE Shell Show, Monday night Don Lee-CBS chain event, makes a strong bid for the "wash-day" air audience and judging by its several efforts to date, it isn't going to find it the least bit difficult to

good majority to its tuneful and hilarious broadcasts.

The Shell Shows that have come through our loud speakers thus far have been comparable to the big variety productions in the studios of the New York chains. And to that end, the success of the Monday

night presentations, credit is due E. H. Sanders, advertising manager of the Shell Oil Company. His foresightedness, showmanship and ability to take an old, slowly dying air institution such as the Jamboree, put new clothes on it and a new name and evolve it into a fast-moving, hilarious, melodious sixty minute show, is almost uncanny.

Against the advice of wise ones who proved not so wise, Sanders determined to put on a show with the Jamboree ingredients that would get the whole town talking. And he has.

This is not the only occasion in which the adeptness of the Shell Oil official at creating a radio broadcast with universal appeal has come to the fore.

Sanders signed up Hugh Barrett Dobbs, Cap'n Dobbsie to his legion of radio friends, when others thought that the famous radio character had seen his day and was on the decline. But this builder of air stars and creator of paramount broadcasts, was convinced that Dobbsie could be built up as a dominating personality on the air throughout the West. As the result he signed for five years at an annual salary that overshadowed that received by the President of the United States by several thousand dollars.

The Shell Show will feature masters of ceremonies who are nationally known in the theatrical business. This different m.c. each week idea has been evident since the adoption of the Shell Show. The sponsor is spending large amounts to bring renowned show people to San Francisco on Monday nights to act as master of ceremonies for the productions.

"We have a lot of great things in store for our listeners," Sanders said. "I can't spring them now, as we want to keep the Shell Show audience in suspense and surprise

them when the time comes."

On Monday night, August 7, Benny Rubin, nationally known vaudeville and microphone headliner, was IT. His contagious laugh, his wisecracking, novel manner of introduction, black-outs and penetrating personality, made him one of the best m.c.'s thus far engaged by Shell for its big broadcast production.

Rubin was practically the whole show. He was everywhere. He was master of ceremonies, assisted in skits, was the foil for another comedian and caused much amuse-

ment with his song title gag.

Claude Sweeten and the KFRC orchestra started the broadcast out with a bang with some tuneful ditties. Outstanding among the vocalists was Edwin Imhaus, whose resonant, well-rounded powerful voice must have brought round after round of applause from the unseen legion in radiodom.

Imhaus will be remembered for his many fine concerts on the old Shell Happytime program with Cap'n Dobbsie some months back. He is a real asset to the Shell Show.

The auditor to this broadcast could have no complaint about any lack of comedy. The hour was packed with it. Good hearty laugh material to disintegrate that blue Monday feeling.

Adhesive Pontoon (Arnold Maguire) contributed nobly, bringing as he usually does, outbursts from the studio audience.

Pedro Gonzales (Eugene Hawes) had a good act, in which he called on Benny Rubin to assist him.

Yahbut and Cheerily (Jennison Parker and Bill Wright) were exceptionally good, bringing a lot of amusement with their skit, "In a Persian Garden."

Midge Williams, the colored lass, together with her three pickaninny brothers, came through with some vocalizing that was more than attention-getting and the Shell's Bells, feminine vocal trio, contributed satisfactorily to the sixty minute "mikeburst" of frivolity.

ETHER GLEANINGS

71TH the avowed purpose of aiding each other in the solution of their current problems and working as a whole to combat any obstacles that may confront them, the broadcasters of the San Francisco bay area have formed an organization to be known as the Broadcasters Association.

At the organization meeting recently managers or representatives of each of the eleven broadcasting stations in this territory were present. They came from NBC, KFRC, KYA, KTAB, KROW, KLX, KQW, KJBS, KLX, KGGC and KRE.

Ralph Brunton, manager of KJBS, and a veteran of more than ten years' broadcasting experience, was elected chairman of the group. He in turn appointed a committee of four to adopt a code of ethics for the Association. They are: Fred J. Hart, KQW; Bob Roberts, KTAB; McCallum, KYA; and Strong, KROW.

The code of ethics will be submitted to all stations in this territory before being adopted

by the group.

The news that Jack and Ethel are returning to the air once again in "Roads to Hollywood" under the sponsorship of Broadcast Weekly, has caused no end of favorable comment in radioland. The popular pair, Bernice Berwin and Ted Maxwell, are stepping back into the rôles which won them many thousands of admirers and will be heard in the skits each Tuesday and Friday night at

9:15 o'clock over KYA.

A beer manufacturer, identity not yet divulged by the NBC, is contemplating the sponsorship of two fifteen-minute spots a week over the network beginning in September. Ryan and Noblette have tenatively been chosen as the artists and Mondays and Fridays as the days.

Genial Charlie Hamp, whose pleasing personality doesn't change when he's away from "the firing line" was host to the city's radio scribes at an informal reception at the Hotel

Mark Hopkins the other day.

He told your reporter that he is thrilled every time he comes to San Francisco and never fails to visit as soon as possible the Palace of Fine Arts which stands as a lone memorial to the 1915 Panama-Pacific International Exposition.

The Chicago Exposition of Progress does not touch the beauty that was the 1915 fair

here, he says.

Hamp has leased a house in the Marina district, not far from the picturesque Fine Arts Palace for the duration of his radio contract here.

"Showmanship is most essential for successful radio programs," he declared. "If you don't believe me, just stop and think who the biggest successes in radio today are. There's Ed Wynn, Jack Pearl, Jack Benny, Ben Bernie, Kate Smith, Burns and Allen, Myrt and Marge-all former show people.

"Of course you will find a few exceptions, such as Rudy Vallee and Bing Crosby, who created an individual style, which put them

over."

Hamp said that efforts of some big radio men to change his stereotyped style of the "one man show" to other types of microphone presentation, have failed thus far.

"Why should I change," he asked, "when my little act has been so successful these

many years.?

"Just as soon as I have one failure, then

I'll change, and not until then."

Reports have leaked out that S. and W., food products concern, is contemplating the sponsorship of two weekly programs on each of the networks here-NBC and CBS beginning in early September.

A re-arrangement in the KFRC main studio has caused a sacrificing of about seventy guests seats, but has worked out to advantage for the orchestral presentations. In the new set-up, each group in the orchestra is separated—for instance the wind instruments are in one group, the strings in another, the pianos another and each group has a micro-The experiment has proven quite satisfactory, according to Claude Sweeten, musical director of the station.

The management of KFWI is entitled to a vote of commendation. When the present operators took over the station a few years ago, it was on a basis of paying every creditor in full—a somewhat unusual procedure. Then came the ruling of the Federal Radio Commission compelling broadcast stations to hold closer to their assigned frequencies. This necessitated the purchase of a new transmitter for about \$25,0000. With the depression that followed, this load was too much for a half-time station to carry. The management made a splendid fight, but the odds were too strong against them. Despite the obstacles, the performance and the programs they rendered were of a very high order. It is hoped their refinancing program will succeed and that we will have them back on the air.

The Prentice Institute Jubilee Singers, colored quintet, have been contributors to The Never Can Tell hour on KQW the past few weeks. The group, of which N. L. Powell, is business manager, are representing the Institute, an educational institution at Prentiss, Mississippi and have been on tour in the southern and western states for the past nine months. Funds derived from their appearances on radio, at theatres and clubs are forwarded to the school.

Noticed that puffy chest and broader smile on Ned Tollinger, NBC ace, of late? You guessed it, he's a "poppa" now. Seven-pound boy was delivered by Doc Stork to Ione Tollinger, at a San Francisco hospital a few days ago.
