RADIO'S three greatest comics — Ed Wynn, Jack Pearl and Eddie Cantor — will soon be back on their respective jobs convulsing the broadcast audience. Strangely enough all three are now engaged in being funny before the Hollywood movie cameras.

Jack Pearl is due back on the coast to coast NBC hook-up for Lucky Strike on Saturday, October 7, playing the rôle that swept the country — Baron Munchausen. Cantor is expected to return to the Chase and Sanborn broadcasts late in October, but in the meantime his shoes before the NBC mikes are being filled by Jimmy Durante of the films. Incidentally Ruth Etting has been drafted into the coffee broadcasts and Rubinoff came from New York to Hollywood to participate in them.

It is expected that Ed Wynn will be back on the air within the next few weeks.

And, speaking of comedians, we note that another who gained his reputation at his ability to tickle the ribs of the public is about to step onto the radio stage. He is Joe Penner, identified in vaudeville and musical comedy for a long time.

He will be featured with Ozzie Nelson's orchestra in a series of programs entitled, "The Baker's Broadcast" and paid for by the Fleischman's Yeast people. The first one is Sunday, October 8, 4:30 to 5 p. m., on KGO.

The Portland Oregonian, daily newspaper is in a class by itself when it comes to radio. It is claimed to be the only newspaper in the country that owns two radio stations, following its recent purchase of KEX in that city. It has been operating KGW since the inception of radio broadcasting.

Max Dolin, widely known in radio and theater, has been named musical conductor of Warner's Theater in Hollywood. Up until recently he had been conducting the Columbia Theatre orchestra in San Francisco and was making intermittent broadcast appearances.

Congratulations Papa Reinberg on the recent addition to the Reinberg household. Yep, it's a baby boy, eight and a half pounds at birth and the first child. Mamma and the tot are doing swell. Herman Reinberg, KFRC cellist, is running the bow over the strings with added enthusiasm now.

Although he has been one of the outstanding features of Eastern radio lanes for the past few years, Western dial spinners will get to hear Singing' Sam, the Barbasol Man, for the first time this month. He will be heard, beginning September 12, every Tuesday and Thursday nights from 7:30 to 7:45 o'clock over the CBS, chain, KFRC locally.

Paul Carson, the organist, who has taken to the air literally hundreds of times, did so in fact recently when he flew to Bridgeport, Ill., to visit with his mother. George Nyklicek, formerly of KPO, is manipulating the stops and keys on the NBC console during Carson's absence.

The Maxwell House Coffee Company has renewed its Showboat program on the NBC wire-up.

KYA inaugurates a choral program September 17 from 6 to 6:30 o'clock with the Trinity Center Choir as the contributors.

Robert L. Redd, formerly program director of KGW, Portland, has assumed his new duties at the NBC workshop in San Francisco as a producer.

Musical Impressions, recently inaugurated program on KQW is serving to introduce a number of new artists to the radio dialing public. The program is broadcast nightly except Sunday from 6 to 6:15 o'clock. Bernard Litten, violinist and Gilbert Picou, pianist are the contributing artists on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. On Tuesday Shirley Karen, dramatic soprano and member of the San Francisco Opera Association, is heard, accompanied by Chester Arnold and on Thursdays Marjorie Hipsley, soprano and member of the same opera group. Margaret Hipsley is her accompanist, Various guest artists appear on the Saturday night program.

Understand Lanny Ross, the Showboat star, has been signed by Paramount to make a movie.

Max Baer, idol of so many, surely must have hurt himself with many of his followers when he cussed before a microphone in a recent late hour broadcast which we happened to eavesdrop on. The broadcast originated at the Cocoanut Grove in Los Angeles, the occasion being the welcoming to Hollywood of Texas Guinan, the Broadway

night club queen. All the greats of cinema land were there and were introduced by Tex, who had been made mistress of ceremonies. She proved quite an amusing one. Max Baer was spotted and invited up to the mike. The cuss word that he uttered during his brief speech, although not objectionable under most circumstances, was quite so on the air. 

MICROPHON? GOSSIP

- • This is the tenth year l of broadcasting for Virginia Miller, KYA staff pianist, whose youth testifies that she must have begun at a very tender age. Anyway, Virginia presented her first radio program over station KPO in 1923. At present she is taking advantage of a summer scholarship at Mills College and is studying under Egon Petri, famous pianist from Berlin.
- • Edwin Imhaus, whose robust tenor has been heard for several months on the Feminine Fancies Hour, is winning new laurels on the Shell Show of the Blue Monday Jamboree. The radio audience in large and increasing numbers have demanded his appearance week after week.
- • Of all the jazz venders broadcasting over the Columbia waves, Fred Berrens, diminutive studio maestro, deserves a great burst of applause for his merry arrangements and his unique syncopations. He had his first violin lesson when he was five or six, and caught on so quickly that his parents resigned themselves to owning a prodigy. When he was seven, he had the third largest part-that of a son-in a famous Jewish play, "Kreutzer Sonata." He played a violin solo in the last act, and for these activities Fred received a hundred dollars a week, or at least his parents did. The production ran for four years and, fortunately, it stopped, for Fred was growing out of the part. He studied under Max Bendix and Franz Kneisel. Then Fred tried a bit of vaudeville with his brother. It was suggested that a girl in the act would be more of a drawing card, so Fred dressed as a girl and was such a suc-

cess that Keith booked them for forty-eight weeks at six hundred per. Then came the war, and Fred joined the Navy. In 1928 Al Smith made Fred the musical director of the Democratic National Committee. Two years ago Fred gave an audition for an opening on the Columbia staff and has been on the job since that

- • William H. ("Bill") Wright, KFRC's Production Manager, recently took delivery of a new Oldsmobile. indicating things are not so slow in the radio business. Speed cops down the Peninsula highways have had occasion to take notice.
- • Unusual and authentic recognition of the week of a western radio announcer resulted in the selection of Don Wilson, of KFI, Los Angeles, to record a seven-minute NRA appeal for release in theaters and radio stations throughout the United States. Wilson made the transcription at the request of Los Angeles NRA headquarters which chose him through his work on the air, and the recording was rushed East to General Hugh Johnson, Recovery Administrator, for official OK. The talk is to be put on sound-track, and the theater releases will carry screen credit for Wilson.
- Conrad Thibault, young baritone of Captain Henry's Show Boat, was the victim of one of the cruelest tragedies in Radio. He and his young wife were married while they were both in their 'teens. Year after year they worked, struggled, and saved together so that Conrad could continue his musical studies. Success came slowly.

But that day he received a telegram. His wife was very ill following a sudden operation. She died without ever knowing that their years of striving were not in vain, and that he was started on one of the brightest careers along Radio Row.

• • • A record in radio broadcasting is that of Herbert Stanton and Shirlev Peterson, piano duo, who, under the professional names of Lost and Found, have presented a request program over KLX since the latter part of 1928. Their record is 1556 performances, of which 1359 were an hour each.

The program recently terminated when Mr. Stanton joined the announcers staff of station KTAB.

- • Taylor Holmes, the fire chief's uncle, plays three games of solitare every night before retiring-and he has done so for 20 years. If he wins, it looks like a good day ahead: if he loses, he plays a fourth game, and if he loses that he swears he'll never play again.
- Misfortune never strikes singly, it is said-even in the case of a radio team separated by thousands of miles. Within a few hours after word was received from Los Angeles of an accident that sent Marge Damerel of "Myrt and Marge to the hosiptal with a broken arm, headquarters of the Wrigley Company in Chicago received a bad news cable from Myrtle Vail. The message came from far up in the Andes in Mendoza, Argentine and read: "Snowbound in Finally Conrad got his big Andes, Expensive delay up-

setting our schedule but can't move." P. K. Wrigley, sponsor of the radio series, immediately cabled a liberal addition to the traveling fund with instructions that no expense was to be spared in facilitating their return to Chicago for the program's new fall and winter series scheduled to start late in September. "Myrt," wtih director Bobby Brown and Mrs. Brown, embarked on the South American tour to obtain color for the new season's broadcasts which will have the below-the-Equator country as its locale.

- • It may shortly be the movies for Elvia Allman, if screen tests taken at a prominent local studio this week prove satisfactory. The lanky comedienne and recent NBC sustaining artist, answered a call to the sanctum of a producer last week who claimed to be interested in her Auntie McCassar characterization. The screen test resulted. It has long been known that two major studios have been seeking Miss Allman's services, but her retiscence to leave her regular medium, the radio, has held up negotia-tions until now. The girl has been resting quietly in her Hollywoodland home since her arrival several weeks ago from NBC headquarters in New York, Offers from a nationally-known sponsor, for an early return to the air, are also being considered by Miss Allman.
- • Saturday night has become International Night on KQW, what with the broadcasting of programs in French, Portuguese, Spanish and Italian.
- • Don't tell him who told you, but Raymond Paige, KHJ, has a trunk full of manuscripts at home, compositions of his own, and in all the years he has been encouraging local talent by playing their music, he has not

his own on the public. How about a little campaign (from outside, y'understand) to get him to drag some of the opuses forth?

- • Ed Fitzgerald, who conducts the Feminine Fancies Hour over KFRC and the Columbia Don Lee network five days a week from 3 to 4 p. m., has become known as 'The Man with a Million Neighbors," because of the far flung sources of the fan letters that pour in upon him. Recently "Neighbor Ed," as he likes to be called, read a letter over the air asking for genuine Paisley shawl. Among the many replies received was one from Papeete, principal port of Tahiti, far down below the equator in the South Pacific, Another long distance letter came from a listener in Schenectady, N. Y., who wanted a copy of Ed's talk on "Love and Mar-riage." "Neighbor Ed" first came before the public in 1909 as an actor with Bert Lytell in New York. He continued on the stage until 1915, when he joined the Imperial Royal Flying Corps. By 1921, he was in the theater again, but this time in the front of the house, managing theaters for Pantages, Duffy, Fox West Coast, and Warner in San Francisco, Portland, Seattle and San Diego. Since taking over the direction of the Feminine Fancies Hour he has introduced many interesting innovations into that long favorite program and has brought to the microphone a constant succession of prominent persons from the ranks of artists, officials and professional men.
- • The most successful act in the history of entertainment started the fifth year of its record-breaking run on August 19. That act of course is Amos 'n' Andy, who on that date completed their fourth year over a National Broadcasting Company network under the sponsorship once palmed off anything of of the Pepsodent Company.

They were the first five night a week dramatic show on the air; the first six night a week; the first coast-to-coast sensation; the first, and only radio artists to almost disrupt the habits of a nation when their time of broadcast was shifted; the first to create a host of characters that have paraded from the loud speakers of a nation over such a long period of time. The two of them have written every word of dialogue that has gone into the scripts over that period of time and have enacted every character heard in the broadcasts-a record itself unsurpassed in the history of radio. The number of words would fill a number of books. running into more than 2,-000,000 words and the number of characters portrayed seem as an impossible task for any dozen people - let alone just two.

- • Fred J. Hart, president of the Pacific Agricultural Foundation, Ltd., which owns KQW, has established some sort of endurance record for consecutive broadcasts. He has been conducting the Rural California Evening Radio News and Forum at 7 p. m., nightly except Sunday for more than seven years. It is one of the most widely followed programs on the station.
- • Marking the first time a big network program has been transferred from New York to the Pacific Coast, the Chase and Sanborn Hour, in a new set-up starring Jimmie Durante and Ruth Etting, with Rubinoff and his orchestra was broadcast from Los Angeles over the NBC network Sunday, September 10. Durante and Miss Etting were both in Hollywood and Rubinoff left New York by plane immediately after the September 3rd broadcast. The new line-up will continue for a series, with Eddie Cantor's deferred return to the air now scheduled for late in October.

- Mildred Bailey, who made her bow recently as a featured Columbia artist, is singers in her characteristic interpretations of the blues. Yet she is the coolest and most undemonstrative of them all as she stands at the mike, with never a snap of the fingers or a wave of the arms.

ATHAN ABAS, NBC orchestra conductor, doesn't regard diamonds with the same interest as do most members of the human race. When he was a a little boy in Amsterdam, Holland, the NBC artist looked upon costly, fiery gems much as a farmer's boy looks upon the celery and tomatoes on the family farm, The elder Abas was a diamond merchant, importing and exporting the stones for which his city is famous, but from earliest childhood, the violin meant more to his son than the most valuable jewels in the Abas establishment. At the age of fifteen, when other Dutch lads were solemnly learning the fundamentals of their father's business or trade, young Nathan was a member of the Amsterdam Concertgebouw, noted organization consisting of more than a hundred musicians. The fifteen-yearold fiddler was a pupil of Willem Mengelberg, its conductor, and frequently appeared as solo violinist with it. He remained with the Concertgebouw until he was seventeen, and during these two years played under many of the world's most famous musicians who appeared as guest conductors of the orchestra.

String quartet work, with which Abas has been identified for many years, always attracted him, and he was only seventeen when he organized his first string quartet, and with it toured Holland and the continent.

Then the World War broke out. The young Hollander, eager for study with the men who could give him what he wanted in music, found Europe almost depleted of its great musical figures. Those who weren't in military service were in the United States, which was still neutral, and Abas, as a native of an equally neutral nation, decided to follow them.

He arrived in New York shortly after his twentieth birthday, with one hundred dollars in his pocket and just one acquaintance a fellow countryman, not a musician. Singlehanded, he tackled the problem of making a place for himself in the musical world of New York, and single-handed, he won. He and his violin found work in picture houses and dance halls of New York before other doors opened to the tap of the Abas bow. There were lean times in which the young Hollander suffered most of the traditional young musician's experiences, but eventually he gained recognition.

Franz Kneisel, founder and leader for many years of the famed Kneisel String Quartet, was one of the names which had drawn Abas across the sea, and in New York he met Kneisel and became his pupil. Abas himself was engaged to teach at the New York Institute of Music, and his studies, teaching and concert engagements kept him occupied in the East until 1927, when a long illness sent him to California for recuperation.

In San Francisco he organized the Abas String Quartet, which established a record for uninterrupted performance over the air, having been heard continuously over NBC station KPO, until recently, when Abas decided to give up quartet work for conducting. He directs NBC orchestras in a variety of programs, and enjoys the range radio offers the musician capable of meeting its varied demands. Unlike many musicians who have devoted their lives to standard music, Abas has an intense interest in popular American airs, and long experience with popular music.

Tennis and horseback riding are Abas' favorite sports and he is catholic in his choice of games as he is versatile in music, playing a good game of chess, bridge, poker, billiards and pinochle. He still doesn't like diamonds any better than he did as a small boy; thinks the sapphire is the "only really beautiful gem," but admits he doesn't know a piece of blue glass from the real thing.

PERMIT me to congratulate you on the publication of your "newsy" and helpful little paper, which gives news of radio programs and many of its artists. In years to come, when radio is even more influential than it is now, you will be able to say that your paper was one of the pioneers of radio.

We listen to all types of entertainment, some more pleasing than others, naturally, but what pleases me more than anything else is good instrumental music. COMING from a non-fan letter writer, this may add weight to your efforts in trying to balance radio towards the side of giving clean, wholesome and edifying programs.

You are right in feeling there must be a large number of listeners who do not respond to good entertainment with an applause of fan mail.

I have belonged to the large class, but a pricking conscience is pulling me out enough to write this letter of appreciation to you.

After talking with many in my circle of acquaintance, I think I should voice a reason or two for our silences.

We more or less say, "Yes, we do realize that our support should be given, but to write a fan letter seems so silly." Then, too, "If I were a performer, somehow I think I would cringe from such an inpouring of general simpleness."

And so, aside from the inherent laziness which renders all of us liable to forego letter writing (it had taken me over an hour to do even this much) we let it go, believing

that people who are doing artistic and soulsatisfying work do not cherish the idea of becoming public idols.

All this to excuse, psychologically, that class who actually appreciate high-type programs, but do not tell you so.

But it butters no parsnips from the advertisers' point of view. Maybe.

Yet, I contend that these very people who do not write fan letters are far more apt to go out and buy good products than do writers of applause letters.

For it must be that a class which knows enough to pick good artistic material from the air also knows enough to choose highclass material from the market place.




