



EMBER the "Old Timer," that lovable old character who used to spin such enthralling yarns during those Empire Builder broadcasts a few years back? We've had many queries as to his whereabouts since that program went off the air. So we know that many of you will be pleased to know that he comes back on the air Sunday, October 8, at 1:30 o'clock.

His real name is Harvey Hayes. He is to appear in a series of programs over the NBC which will be sponsored by the Hoover Vacuum Company. He'll do the narrating

on the air show. And how he can narrate!
Appearing with Mr. Hayes will be a chorus of sixty voices directed by Nobel Cain and

a large orchestra.

On September 24 KFRC in San Francisco was nine years old. As you probably heard, it celebrated the occasion very appropriately the next night, September 25, during the Jamboree—birthday cake and everything. Nevertheless it was a grand party at the studio that night.

Radio has changed a lot since KFRC first squawked out to the world nine years ago. Harrison Holliway, its present manager, built the station and for several years afterwards was the announcer, operator, technician, publicity director, salesman, et al. But as we set forth above, radio has changed and now KFRC is one of the major stations of the West, with a large staff of employees and doing business that runs into the hundreds of thousands of dollars a year.

KYA is moving bag and baggage into the Hunter-Dulin Building, headquarters for the NBC in San Francisco by November 1. Its present lease at the Warfield Building expires on that date. The station, which is owned by the NBC, will bring its full staff along with it, probably occupying the twentyfirst floor of the skyscraper, and will utilize the NBC's studios.

Another comedian, who is after some of those laurels set up by Wynn and Cantor, steps into the radio limelight on Sunday, October 8, over the NBC. He's Joe (Wanna buy a duck) Penner, practically new to radio but a wow in vaudeville. He'll do his turn from 4:30 to 5 p. m. on Sundays for Standard Brands. KGO gives it out locally.

We're just reminding you once again that the one and only John McCormack begins a series of weekly appearances on the NBC wire-up beginning Wednesday, October 11.

Walter Damrosch is back on the air with his "Music Appreciation Hours" via the NBC. This makes the sixth consecutive season that he has presented this feature via the network. Dial the program on Fridays from 8 to 9 a. m.

The West coast lost one of its best allaround announcers with the departure a few days ago of the popular KFI mikeman who has been heard hundreds of times over the coast NBC chain. Wilson was drafted to serve as announcer on the East NBC chain, specializing in sports broadcasts.

John Eugene Hasty, who has penned many successful series and dramas for radio stations in the Bay district and produced a number of big broadcasts, including the recent "Standard On Parade," was recently named production director for the MacGregor and Sollie electrical transcription company.

Other additions to the firm include: Cliff R. Engle, who will have charge of stations relations; C. R. Hampton, supervisor of sales promotion, and C. E. Martin, who will represent the firm in Chicago.

Frank Galvin at KTAB tips us off that Moore's Clothing Company has signed with the station for a series of football radio rallies on Friday nights at 8:30 o'clock. Coaches, glee clubs and university bands will be heard on the broadcasts.

KJBS will broadcast a special thirty-minute program on October 12 in coöperation with Blindcraft Week. Talent from the Blindcraft organization, all sightless, will present the program. As guest speaker, Alfred Cleary, city administrator, will tell the meaning of Blindcraft Week and its origination. The time is 2 p. m.

Fred J. Hart, manager of KQW, is vacationing in a resort in Napa County.

There are some real spine-chillers in those electrically transcribed drama productions which are going on the air these nights for Miracle Diamonds Company. They are clever stories and well acted. Three stations in the Bay district are broadcasting them now: KJBS, Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 4:15 to 4:30 p. m.; KQW, Tuesdays and Thursdays from 7:45 to 8, and Saturdays from 8:15 to 8:30 p. m.; KTAB, Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, 8:45 to 9 p. m. Each episode is a complete story in itself.

A new religious type program has been booked on KYA entitled "Fellowship of the Air." It may be dialed Sunday mornings, 9 to 9:15 o'clock. Rev. Julian McPheeters conducts the programs.

Piano Pictures which features Eileen Fealy and Phyllida Ashley has been moved from Friday nights to Monday nights, 10:30 to 11 p. m.









The celebrated singer, whose occasional guest appearances before the microphone in the past have attracted nationwide interest, will be heard over an NBC-KGO network each Wednesday evening at 6:30 p. m.

William Daly, well-known radio musical director, composer and arranger, and former guest conductor of the New York Philharmonic-Symphony Orchestra, will accompany McCormack on the half-

McCormack's repertory for the series will be made up of songs which millions have heard him sing on his worldwide concert tours and on phonograph recordings, and new compositions which the tenor has selected from the works of contemporary writers. Both classical and semi-classical numbers will be included, and an occasional operatic aria, reminiscent of McCormack's career with the Metropolitan Opera Company, will add to the variety of the offerings.

A dramatization of Edgar Allan Poe's horror story, "The Black Cat," was preceded by the announcement: "Young children are advised not to listen to the following program."
- Did you know that the sound effects for Captain Henry's Show Boat are the most elaborate on the air? The various noises are so intricate, and so much an integral part of the show that the sponsors of the program hire two free-lance technicians who have devised scores of special contraptions to produce exactly the sounds called for in the script.
