The folks in Honolulu and Manila were given the opportunity of listening in on the annual "Big Game" between California and Stanford, traditional gridiron rivals, last Saturday. The Associated Oil Company, which spent a small fortune to bring all the major contests to the sets of Western dialers. augmented their extensive sports program to the extent of short-waving the pork-hide classic to the other side of the world. While Pacific Coast listeners tuned in the game, beginning at 2 p. m., the audience of Station KGMB, in Honolulu, heard it at 11:15 a. m. and those who dialed it from Station KZRM at Manila did so at 5:45 a. m. Sunday morning.

Thirteen Don Lee-CBS stations in the West broadcast the Big Game, with KFRC the key station.

Incidentally, KFRC proved a mecca for football fans Saturday. The station was broadcasting the sport for approximately six hours, which included the transmission of two eastern games in the morning. Uncle Sam's postoffice department at San Francisco has already started its "Do your Christmas mailing early" campaign over the air. KYA is broadcasting a special studio program which features a talk by the San Francisco postmaster.

A busy man this Scotty Mortland. In addition to his NBC program, he is now heard over KJBS thrice weekly—Mondays, Tuesdays and Saturdays—in an informal chat about everything. You can dial him Mondays and Fridays at 9:15 a. m. and Saturdays from 1:30 to 1:45 p. m. "Talkathons" is the name of his program.

One of the newer Don Lee chain events that is causing quite a bit of notice is Black Rhapsody, which is released 8:30 o'clock Sunday nights, originating at KHJ for the net. Earl Dancer's negro chorus of eighty-seven voices is the feature of the production, which is interspersed with dramatic interpolations from the typewriter of Jack Van Nostrand, continuity chief for the Don Lee net. He is the son of Superior Judge John J. Van Nostrand of San Francisco.

Golden voiced Irving Kennedy has returned to the Silhouettes program on the Sunday night NBC schedule.

They are featuring Lucille Kirtley now on that Sunday night "Wings of Song" bill on KPO at 10:30 o'clock.

Al Cormack, KFRC chief technician, was busier than a centipede on roller skates a few days ago gathering special radio equipment for the Byrd Antarctic expedition. Admiral Byrd cabled Cormack from Wellington, New Zealand, to get the additional apparatus for him and the San Francisco man had to scramble about at high speed to get it in time to ship it on a boat leaving the same day for the antipodes.

G. W. Payne, commercial manager of the entire NBC network, is a San Francisco vistor, looking the situation over and getting acquainted with this link of the chain. He visits Los Angeles next.

The Standard Symphony Series is going visiting. For the next few weeks we will hear the orchestras of various Pacific Coast cities on the Thursday night broadcast. On Thanksgiving night the Seattle Symphony under direction of Basil Camerou will be heard; December 7-Los Angeles Philharmonic under baton of Otto Klenperer; December 14-San Francisco Symphony with Issay Dobrowen waiving the stick. Last Thursday the Portland Symphony, under direction of Willem van Hoogstraten, was heard.

The NBC newcomer changed her front name of Dolly to Nanette, because it sounded better on the air.



REAL music on a harmonica? Musicians scoff at the idea until they hear Johnny O'Brien of NBC. This tall boy, whose eyes have a woodland glint in them, performs almost impossible chromatic feats upon his modern equivalent of Pan's pipes. Johnny will attempt almost anything that an orchestra can play, and his programs have lifted harmonica playing out of the category of something anybody can do into a rare craftsmanship, all the finer because it is altogether self-taught.

One of Johnny's greatest admirers is James Hartley, known as "Harmonica Jim" on the vaudeville stage for many years, and now a harmonica authority who goes about the country teaching youngsters how to play his favorite instrument, in the interests of one of the largest harmonica-building companies in the nation.

"Your Johnny O'Brien is one of the greatest musicians in America." Hartley wrote a western radio editor not long ago. "He can do everything any other harmonica player can do, as well or better than most of the headliners. He would be a star on any radio chain anywhere and in any theatre."

It was Johnny's ability to play difficult classics of music on an ordinary harmonica which first attracted Hartley's attention, but small boys, who form a large and enthusiastic wing in his army of fans, are attracted by the irresistible swing of his melodies, the freedom with which he executes them and the color with which his personality invests almost any microphone or stage production. He is a member of Charlie Marshall's Mavericks, and a star on the Carefree Carnival, transcontinental broadcast heard Saturday nights, and he and Manuel Tapia, guitar player, comprise a unique duo in which their dissimilar instruments produce strangely harmonious effects.

Johnny was born in San Francisco twentynine years ago. He began playing the harmonica when he was as small as his youngest fan of today, but it did not occur to him until a few years ago that his dexterity with scales and chords might prove anything but an interesting hobby. Graduated from high school, Johnny was attending a business school when he happened to drop in at the old Orpheum theater one night. On the vaudeville program was a harmonica team which entertained the audience with their music and a bit of patter. Johnny decided that while they played well, he could play better, and with the youthful honesty that is part of his temperament, he made his way backstage and asked the team how he should go about becoming a vaudeville headliner.

His naive frankness carried him over the first hurdle of a tryout; his ability did the rest. That was in 1917, and not long afterward the NBC harmonica master found himself at the Warfield Theater, strangely at home in his new surroundings. Johnny has never suffered from stage fright; he knows his own ability, loves to play the harmonica, and regards an audience of several thousand with the same friendly unconcern that he did the troops of small boys who used to follow him into his father's grocery store on Bernal Heights, San Francisco, to hear him tootle on his first mouth organ. He brought that mouth organ with him as a mascot when he joined the NBC staff in 1929.

Notes and musical arrangements mean nothing to him. Throughout his theatrical career, which included Orpheum and Pantages tours, and an engagement in a production starring Olsen and Johnsen, Johnny played, as he still does, by car. He buys his harmonicas by the gross, always carries his favorite type (one with a three-inch playing radius called the Marine Band) in his coat pocket, and uses up as many as a dozen in one program, if his numbers include "Poet and Peasant" or some of his other favorites. Boxing and swimming are his favorite physical diversions; he won the amateur hoxing championship of the West Coast in 1921.

ERT LAHR, born in Yorkville section of New York, where once again the breweries and beer gardens are flowing merrily. By the time he was sixteen, he was looking for jobs in vaudeville, and for many years thereafter the grind was hard, what with minor road shows, small time varieties burlesque. In 1916 a show called "Boys and Girls of Avenue B" needed a comic, as a fellow named Jack Pearl had quit. Bert got the job, using the same German dialect, and it wasn't till after the war-which he spent scrubbing floor at a naval training station that he dropped the "Dutch" lingo. More trouping followed, until his opportunity in 1927, with "Hold Everything," and a year later "Flying High," These hits made him a big Broad-way success. In radio he has been on the Magic Carpet program, on Chase and Sanborn with Rubinoff and now Royal Gelatin with George Olsen.

Later, when she married, radio offered a means for keeping her professional interests alive and her home intact. Has a small son who receives much of her time.
