GREAT symphony orchestra, a dance band and a "hot as a fire cracker" banjoist pop into our mind as the central figures in this week's scoopings from

the ether realm.

The first named is the Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra-one of the outstanding in the country, which starts a series of broadcasts March 6 over the CBS coast to coast hook-up. Pacific Coast listeners can dial it on the CBS outlets here from 6:30 to 7 o'clock Tuesday nights. Incidentally the Grunow Company, makers of refrigerators, are footing the broadcast bill-and it won't be any small one, either.

The second mentioned group is Jay Whidden's very popular dance orchestra, which has been making 'em sit up and take notice in Southern California. It is Whidden's group, too, that is rumored to replace Horace Heidt's band on the Monday Shell Show on the Don Lee chain. Whidden replaces Herbie Kay at the Hotel Mark Hopkins and will be heard over the NBC at 10:30 p. m. nightly. Kay takes his tunesters elsewhere, probably to Denver. Whatta life, whatta

The torrid banjoist is Eddie Peabody. Eddie is in New York City now and is going to give four broadcasts over the coast to coast NBC wire-up-two in February and two in March. His first one is February 11 and second one February 25. He'll be held on the like dates in March. Oh yes, the time

8:15 p. m. Pacific Coast time. NBC is stand-

ing the expenses—no sponsor.

Like "rastlin"?" Then give a listen to the colorful descriptions on KTAB every Friday night. That station is broadcasting the matches from Dreamland Auditorium in San Francisco from 9:30 to 10:30 Tuesday nights and from the Oakland auditorium Friday nights at the same hour.

If you are a "Carefree Carnival" fan, you'll have to tune in on the NBC stations Saturday night at 9:30 o'clock now. The time was changed recently

Art Fadden, one of radio's better popular pianists, starts a new series of broadcasts over KJBS. His "This and That" potpourrie hits the ether Tuesdays and Thursdays from 4 to 4:15 o'clock.

The dope is that the NBC has been negotiating with Helen Wills Moody for a series of tennis and sports talks, but so far an agreement hasn't been reached—our spies inform us.

Harriet French is in a new rôle at KTAB. She's telling fairy tales to the kiddies every Wednesday night at 8 o'clock.

Kenneth Spencer is NBC-ing again. The colored basso had been a. w. o. l. from the microphone for the past few months while engaged in a stage production of "Show Boat." The production played San Francisco before the holidays.

Bob Bence, who is Mr. Bounce on Jennison Parker's "screwey" "Hodge Podge Lodge" program on KFRC, is showing a post card he received from a listener back in Concord, New Hampshire. And what's more, he claims its authentic.

KTAB has a new nightly event entitled "Hawaiian Shadows." It's on the air from 8:30 to 8:45 o'clock except Sunday.

Another new one emanating from that station is "Noon Song," which features Don Church, baritone. It comes on from 12 to 12:30 p. m. from Tuesday to Friday inclusive and consists of popular ballads.

Coleman Cox, known as the sage of the West, philosopher and psychologist, is being heard over KQW every morning except Sunday at 8:45 o'clock. His stuff has a particularly wide appeal and is drawing many letters from his listeners all over the state.

Piano Pictures, that popular NBC event which features Eileen Fealy and Phyllida Ashley, is now being heard on KPO Friday nights at 10:30 o'clock.

KYA now has programs representing five different denominations on the air on Sundays. It has just recently added a program by the Boothly Spillman Tabernacle, Seventh Day Adventist, which is heard from 5:30 to 6 o'clock. The program brings before the microphone a choir of seventy voices.

The Christian Science belief is represented on the air at 8:15 a. m.; Glide Memorial from 9 to 9:15 a. m.; Old St. Mary's Paulist Fathers' Church from 11 to 12 noon; Rabbi Elliott Burstein from 6 to 6:15 p. m. And from 5 to 5:30 p. m. the KYA Vespers are broadcast, which includes hymns and sacred music with G. Donald Gray as the interpreter.

Eeginning Saturday, February 17. KYA will bring a series of educational programs sponsored by the San Francisco Board of Education to the air. The chats will concern the San Francisco school system.

Thomas C. Ashwell is the author of those "Threads of Tradition" productions which hit the air via KYA every Sunday night. And a mighty nice job he's doing, too.





HE NBC sound effects man gets a rest when Crosscuts from the Log o'

L the Day goes on the air.

Virtually every sound which helped to create the illusion of deep woods in the South for listeners to this program is authentic, from the twitter of the birds to the hum of a crosscuts saw and the ring of an anvil. Visitors who, after listening to Crosscuts in their homes, are familiar with all the different effects, come to the studio expecting to see some marvelous mechanical instrument capable of producing the sound of the saw biting its way through wood; instead they see a real log, and a real saw, operated by the negroes who play the parts of a lumber crew and sing as they saw.

Laurence L. Cross, slim, blond Southerner, who is the Crosscuts pilot, was born in Gastonburg, Alabama, of a family whose roots go deep into the soil of the land below the Mason-Dixie line. His grandfather "befo' de wa'" owned 30,000 acres of plantation and 700 slaves, and as a boy Cross played in just such a woods as he has created out of thin air for the Crosscuts audience. He made his radio debut in a program called "Plantation Echoes" and won such a large following, with his friendly, untheatrical voice and Alabama accent that Don E. Gilman, Vice-President in charge of NBC's Western Division, suggested he have a program of his own named after a newspaper syndicate column he was writing called Crosscuts from the Log o' the Day.

At first the log and the crosscut saw were the main properties. Cross had found a quartet of negroes whose voices had the real Southern atmosphere, and he and the Southern Harmony Four were the entire cast. But he wanted real birds' voices in his woods, and it took six months of dickering with the California State Fish and Game Department and with the Biological Survey of Washington, D. C., to obtain real Mississippi mocking birds. They are the deans of the present choir of fifteen birds, which include German canaries, Persian nightingales, a Grosbeak from Mazatlan, European finches and military starlings, as well as another mocking bird of California ancestry. Mostly it is only the mocking birds which are heard through the microphone; the other birds act as trainers, whose song the mockers imitate. The canaries and other birds won't sing to order; the mocking birds do. Willis Wilson Barber, basso of the Southern Harmony Four, takes care of the birds, rising at 4 o'clock every morning and crossing the bay to give the birds their bath and feed them. Zeke talks to the birds and plays a music box for them every morning when their breakfast is over, for the mocking birds sing only to compete with other music.

Barber was born in Lincoln, Nebraska, and grew up in Denver. His ambition as a boy was to be an electrician, but his voice made him in demand for quartet work. Eugene Anderson, tenor of the Southern Harmony Four, was born in Dallas, Texas, and studied dentistry two years at the University of California before, like Barber, he gave in

to fate and became a singer.

Saunders King, the other tenor in the quartet, comes from Louisiana, and has been such varied things as a professional boxer and preacher. Alvin Nurse, the baritone, is the only member of the group who started out to become a singer. He has been studying since he was fifteen, and sang for four years with the New Orleans University Quartet and three with the Acropagus Quartet at the University of California.

The anvil which Anderson, who is the blacksmith of Crosscuts, strikes, is a historic relic of early California which Cross found in Placerville. The log in use is generally black acacia, as this has been found to give the sharpest ring, and if the crosscut saw should break in the middle of a program the performance would go right on, for Cross has seven of them—six sent in from Alaska, Georgia, Alabam and other far-flung spots by NBC listeners.

TARY STEELE, NBC contralto, is the original shoeless girl of radio won't sing before the mike when wearing high heels, and often, when she's in a hurry and her sandals aren't to be found she simply kicks off her shoes and sings in stockinged feet. Mary's a Kentucky girl, and the wife of Bob Brown, NBC announcer . . . met while both at WLW. Before that Mary rode into radio on a bicycle .. was at WSAI one day when one member of the Bicycle Sextet failed to appear . . . Mary took the rôle, and was an immediate hit, so she gave up previous ideas of singing opera. Born in Hopkinsville, Ky., she atattended Sayre College at Lexington, then went to musical college in Cincinnati and so into radio. She is only 5 feet 4, weighs 101, and has brown hair.

DX fans are often puzzled by the time difference throughout the world, and have difficulty in computing the time at distant points with respect to the local time. Particularly is this true in the short-wave field, where foreign DX reception is not only possible, but a regular occurrence. For instance, when the Pacific network gives us the London rebroadcasts, no doubt many listeners are puzzled to know the hour in London corresponding to Pacific time. The accompanying World Time Chart answers all questions concerning world time. The local time, under the "Pacific" heading,

corresponds to the time indicated on the same

horizontal line in any other part of the world. It is seen that 2 a. m. here is 10 a. m. in London, 9:30 p. m. in New Zealand, 8 p. m. in Sydney, 7 p. m. in Japan, etc. If you should hear Manila on short waves at 6 a. m., you will know that it is 10 p. m. there. In order to determine whether it is the same day, or the preceding or following day, follow this rule: Crossing from dark to light area at midnight, indicates the following day. Crossing from light to dark area indicates preceding day. As an example, 4 a. m. here is 9 p. m. in Tokio of the preceding day.

MICROPHON GOSSIP

• • It was more than her enthusiasm for the climate and the mountains and the sea that made Helen Pickens of the Pickens Sisters declare she "just loved" and "hated to leave" California when the trio was in

San Francisco recently.

. The pretty, dark-haired "middle sister" of the charming Southern trio, was married to Salvatore M. Curioni at Christ Church, New York, January 23. Curioni arrived from Hollywood at 8 o'clock and the ceremony took place at 11, with her elder sister, Jane, and her younger sister, Patti, in attendance.

Helen met Curioni in Hollywood several months ago when she and her sisters were making a motion picture there, and the ro-mance progressed swiftly via long distance calls and telegrams when the trio returned to New York. Curioni is an engineer, interested in aviation, and was an ace of the Italian flying corps during the war. The Curionis will live in New York, and the Pickens will continue as a threesome on NBC networks.

- • Rush Hughes, new master of ceremonies on the Shell Show, made his radio debut on short notice when, as an employee of the Mark Hopkins Hotel, San Francisco, he was pressed into service to announce the orchestra numbers on Anson Weeks' program when the regular announcer failed to appear. Later he developed a pictorial style of re-creating football games and other sports events as if he were actually witnessing the contest. In addition to his Monday show he does a pictorial program five days a week, in which he appears as "air photographer," dramatizing news of interest to women.
- • Joe Penner, by all signs and portents, is the most rapidly rising luminary in the broadcasting firmament. Surveys of program popularity, fan mail, requests for tickets to his broadcasts, and record-breaking theater appearances all point to the duck salesman as one who is going over in radio in a big way.

Joe came to the air in 1933, first as a Vallee guest and later heading his own Sunday evening NBC program, the Bakers Broadcast. It was a year singularly poor in outstanding new talent on the kilocycles, and, except for Joe, little of importance in this respect came

on the networks during the period. Success hasn't changed Joe Penner. He is the same unaffected chap-very much like the personality he projects over the air waves. He constantly fights shyness, never is sure of himself and is always ready to take advice. He has had enough hard bumps in the course of a varied career to feel that over-confidence is something to be

avoided at any cost.

Even Joe's lisp isn't an affectation. He talks somewhat that way in real life. He lives simply, in hotels here and there, has no servants, and just one automobile. The only outdoors relaxation he is able to get is driving in the car. His wife, Elinor Mae Vogt, is his partner and most candid critic. He finds her the perfect counter-balance for the yes men who might be always telling him he is good.

- • Dorothy Lamour, beautiful southern girl who is singing with Herbie Kay's Orchestra at the Hotel Mark Hopkins in San Francisco, was born in Alabama and spent the first few years of her life there, then moved to New Orleans. She attended Tulane University there and just a year ago won a beauty contest and was chosen as "Miss New Orleans," which started her on her singing career, in Chicago and elsewhere. She says she is not married, engaged or in love. When she returned to New Orleans on her way to San Francisco a newspaper characterized her as the "biggest nine-day sensation since the President visited here.'
- • Effective with the broadcast Wednesday, February 14th, Lennie Hayton, youngest of the noted maestros in radio, becomes conductor on the oldest radio program on the air, the Ipana Troubadours. Negotiations for his services were carried on while he was in Hollywood.
- • When Clyde Lucas was directing his campus orchestra at the University of Kansas where he was a student, his drummer sudtenly became ill. He advertised for another on the school bulletin board and shortly afterwards the ad was answered by a handsome chap named "Buddy." Luke and Buddy became fast friends and spent numerous vacations together. Several years later they parted, Luke to play trombone in a Chicago orchestra and Buddy to enter a training school for actors in Hollywood. Lucas again formed his own orchestra and worked his way to Hollywood where he was given the job of scoring music for the talkies. There after three years' separation the friends again met to work in the same picture; Charles

(Buddy) Rogers to take the lead and Clyde to score the music. Last year they were again together when both led their orchestras in Chicago and were heard over NBC networks. Charles "Buddy" Rogers has since moved his orchestra to New York, but Clyde remains in Chicago and is still heard over NBC networks.

• • • Too many sponsors permit their personal likes and dislikes to color the programs they offer the listener. Too many of them are prone to toss this performer off a program because he doesn't care for his work personally, regardless of how high the public may regard the performer. And by the same token he is likely to inject into his program a personality or type of music utterly lacking in widespread public appeal simply because it appeals to him as an individual. And then, when the number of listeners who follow the program begins to wane, he blames radio and says it is no good anyhow as an advertising medium.

This same sponsor would never think of butting in when his ad men had written a page ad for a newspaper or a magazine. But in radio, he "wants to hear what he wants to hear" and he generally does. The program doesn't mean a thing in the way of results or audiences, and so he gets the believers in his organization to feel that radio is a flop. What he doesn't realize is that more and more radio is coming to be an advertising medium and an entertainment one to be handled solely by experts. The day will come when the president of a big concern will have the intelligence to say, "Personally I don't care for our program but the public likes it. so leave it alone.

- • Johnny Marvin, the lonesome singer of the air, is contemplating a vacation from both radio and vaudeville work to go into the Missouri Ozarks in search of old English folk songs said to be still in existence among residents of the more sequestered parts of the hill country. His trip into the hills would be under the guidance of Vance Criss, author and authority on customs of the Ozarks.
- • Jennison Parker, who has long held the championship as KFRC's most distinguished "loser," added to his laurels the other night during the Blue Monday Jamboree. The Continuity Writer-Comedian-Singer lost his music just as he stepped before the mike. Some of the audience may have heard his agonized whisper, "Where's My Music?", that left the master of ceremonies, musical director and announcer stunned and helpless. The worst of it was that Parker was to sing a very old version of "That Tattooed Man" and only a single copy of the music had been

found. Earl Towner, standing by with a portfolio of music, as much to his own surprise as anyone's, saved the day. He opened his portfolio at random and beheld a second copy of "The Tattooed Man," same edition, which he did not know he had. Parker was just ten seconds late in beginning his song.

- • Annette Hanshaw, the petite and titian-tressed blues singer of the Maxwell House Show Boat, first sang in public at the age of three when her fond father boosted her onto a chair and waved his finger. But nary a note did Annette emit until she had a lollypop in hand. Today the Prince of Wales has a standing order for all the records that Gay Ellis, Dot Dare and Patsy Young make, but he does not know that all three are pseudonyms for Annette in her recording work, so he also has a standing order for all that Annette makes.
- • "Mike Fright" hits the best of 'em, and those that have had it say it's worse than any other kind—far worse than stage fright. Helen Hughes who has sung before thousands from a stage without, as they say, "batting an eyelash," broke down and cried after her first audition at KFRC recently. Here's the other side of the picture. Jean Ellington, KFRC contralto, whose experience has been virtually limited to radio, appeared before the Associated Dealers' Luncheon at the Palace Hotel the other day. "Was I scared," she reported. "There were all those hundreds of people looking at me—and NO MICROPHONE!"
- • With only his fellow Clef Dwellers as witnesses, Wayne Frederick, second tenor of the NBC trio, became a Benedict January 20.

Miss Isabel Gale of Chicago is the bride. She arrived in San Francisco Friday morning, and the Clef Dwellers met her in a body at the Ferry Building, then taxied to a judge's chambers, and the knot was tied. Not until the next day did the blushing bridegroom admit at the studio that he had been obliged to leave his bride of only an hour behind him to answer the call of duty and appear on the Big Ten program with the other Clef Dwellers—his brother, Earl Frederick, Victor La Bat, and Gene Close, their coach and accompanist.

The couple met in Chicago last year, when the Fredericks and La Bat were featured with Ted Lewis and his band.

• • • Benny Fields, whose "song stories" on the Shell Show have proved exceptionally popular during recent weeks, is sometimes called "the original crooner." He is a real trouper, having played in most cities and towns of the United States during vaude-

ville and musical comedy engagements with Blossom Seeley, his wife.

- Jane Froman, radio's loveliest lark, planned to take a vacation from singnig about May 1, and had advised sponsors she was not interested in new programs until September 15. But now the Ziegfeld Follies, in which she has a star's run of the play contract, is a hit and may run for six or eight months, so it doesn't look like she'll get a vacation after
- It is rumored that several movie concerns are dickering with Yahut and Cheerily for a series of two-reelers or shorts. The fact that this popular pair of KFRC comics have topped the fun makers in the program on which they appear makes the rumor appear credible.
- • Page Joe Penner! The No. 1 song in George White's movie version of the "Scandals," with Rudy Vallee, is "You Nasty Man," which ends with the line "Don't Never Do That." Alice Faye sings the ditty.

- • Phil Harris is something of a technician, as well as orchestra leader, announcer and singer. He sits in with engineers who work the controls on his programs and checks up on their part of the job. He feels that the wrong man at the mixing panel can ruin a program as readily as bad material
- Nanette La Salle, NBC ballad singer, is the proud possessor of a tiny Pekinese dog named Poh-Pay, which means darling in Chinese. Poh-Pay is so small that she fits comfortably into a man's shoe, and sleeps in one of the Number Elevens of Nanette's
- Frank Black, NBC general musical director, will probably go down in radio history as the man who turned down the biggest offer that was ever made. A Pennsylvania society, holding a huge ball, offered him \$10,000 to direct his orchestra for dancing one night and Black refused. He spurned \$10,000 solely because he refuses to lead a dance band in public.
