IN IN A BUROPE, AUGUST, 1939

Each day during the momentous events late in August, the Columbia audience heard complete, frequent reports of the Polish Crisis directly from the European capitals where the news was being made. As the crisis deepened, the network operated on a twenty-four hour schedule with bulletins of the news "as it happened" broadcast from Europe and America periodically throughout the night. A majority of the broadcasts were made by Columbia's staff reporters in the capitals of Europe and in America: H. V. Kaltenborn in London and New York, Edward R. Murrow in London, Thomas Grandin and Eric Sevareid in Paris, William L. Shirer in Berlin, W. R. Wills in Tokyo, Elmer Davis and Bob Trout in New York, and Albert Warner in Washington. Following is a partial list of the news reports, analyses, and addresses heard by the Columbia audience between August 19 and August 31:
