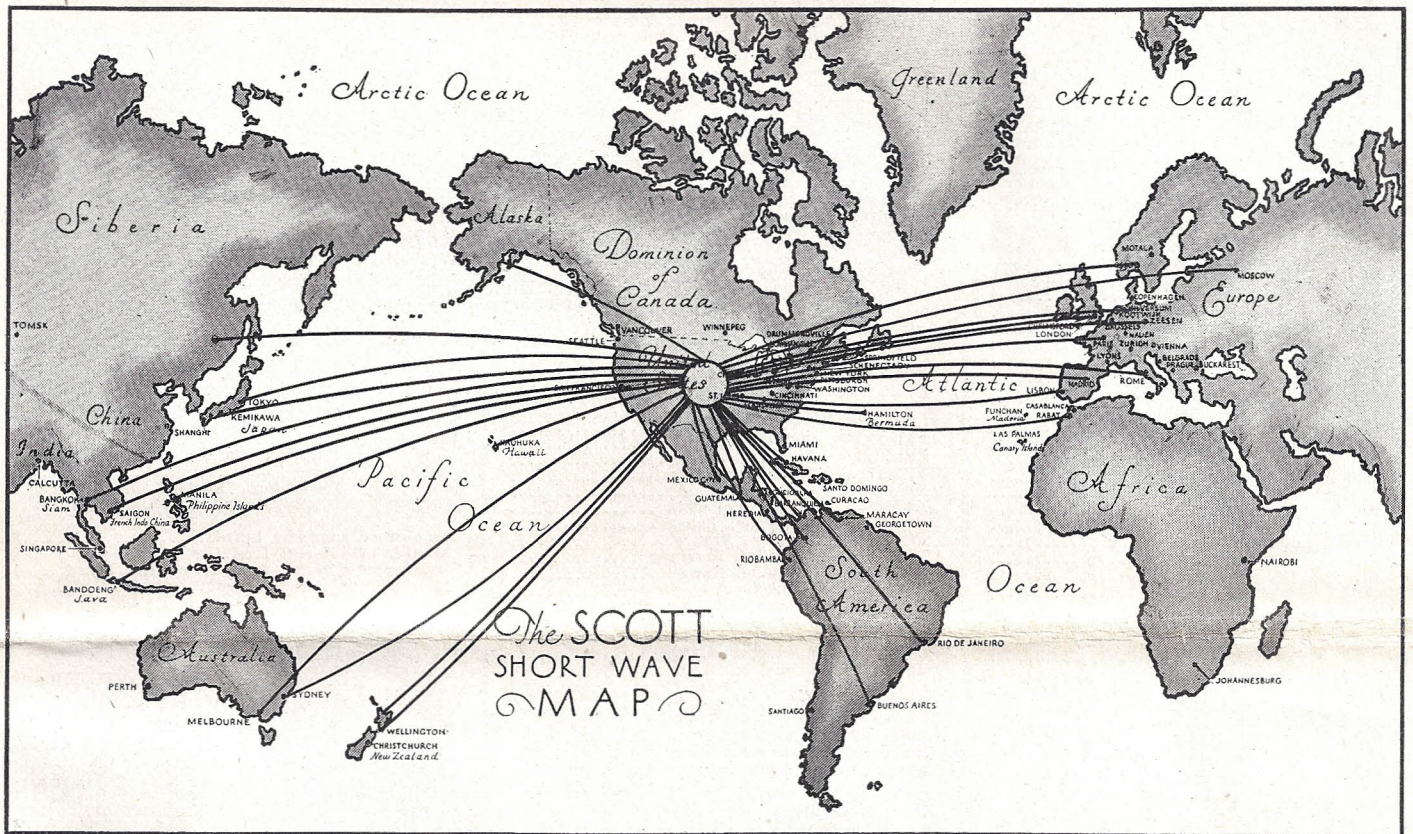

If further proof were wanted of the ability of the SCOTT ALLWAVE RECEIVER to bring in foreign broadcasting stations from all over the world regularly and consistently, it will be found in the results reported by SCOTT ALLWAVE Owners all over the country during the month of February.

In the map above are shown the various parts of the world that have been heard during the month. It will be seen that broadcasting stations in practically every part of the civilized world were heard,

Reception from these stations were reported by Contestants in the SCOTT INTERNATIONAL DX CONTEST and detailed logs were submitted giving the date, call letters of the station heard, wave length, program listened to and the exact minute the various items were heard.

A typical report is shown below from Mr. Bruce Hart of Augusta, Georgia, and gives an idea of the detail in these logs, and will show you how clearly these foreign stations are being received.

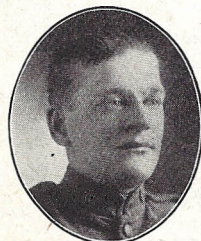
MR. BRUCE HART

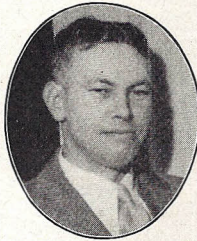

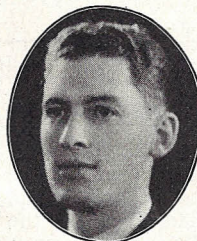

How One SCOTT Owner Proved SCOTT Claims for Foreign Reception

The great majority of people who now own SCOTT RECEIVERS have previously owned other sets. They are the class that are looking for the best they can secure in radio. Many of these owners have spent thousands of dollars in their search for the perfect radio receiver.

Mr. Murray S. Kice, Jr., is just such a SCOTT Owner. The letter written below was one sent to Mr. A. J. Green, President of the "International Short Wave Club." This letter proved so interesting to Mr. Green that he sent it to us, and we in turn asked Mr. Kice's permission to publish it. This permission Mr. Kice has very kindly given.

Here is Mr. Kice's letter:

Dear Sir:

There is only one way, in my opinion, that one can believe what the SCOTT ALLWAVE set will do, and that is to sit down in front of one in ones own home for a few hours.

Previous to my owning my set, I had wasted a lot of time and money year after year and suffered disappointment and disgust in finding the supposed marvelous sets or hook-ups did not do what was claimed for them. I have learned to discount all of this advertising and not expect anything of these sets and my radio history goes back to the coherers of 1911 or thereabouts.

I have been following Mr. Scott's claim for the past eight years. Last Summer I wrote him and wound up with an agreement that I would keep an ALLWAVE set if it would do what he claimed in his literature. As a matter of fact, I concluded before I ordered it, that I would send it back.

I will say this. Mr. Scott could not afford to claim what this set really will do and how it does it for the simple reason that no one would believe ihm. It does more than he claims.

For example I have never yet failed to raise VK2ME or VK3ME when they are supposed to be on the air. The first time I got them I thought a local ham was fooling by playing records and faking his announcing. If J1AA had a reliable public schedule, I believe they would be just as easy to find. Of course, the trouble with them is finding them on the air and finding what wave they are on. LSN and Rugby England stations come in like locals.

My other interest in this set is aside from short waves. Personally, I can't listen to two-thirds of the chain broadcasting because of the offensive ballyhoo advertising, thus I prefer to pick out the small independent stations with good studio programs and my SCOTT puts them right in my room figuratively speaking in the third dimension.

I am writing for verification of what I am sure is CX26 in Uruguay on 1049 kilocycles which I listened to for forty-five minutes. Immediately when they signed off at 11:00 p. m. Eastern Standard Time, in came KNX. These days anyone can get KFI on a midget set with its 50,000 watts, but to get KNX at 8:00 p.m. Eastern Standard Time as I have done with two powerful stations on each side of it, makes me think a lot of my SCOTT, especially when the program sounds like it was coming from Chicago.

Frankly, if Mr. Scott told me he had gotten Mars on his set, I would be inclined to believe him, for his set has sold me on his ability and the honesty of his advertising.

NOTE: We have purposely omitted Mr. Kice's address because we do not wish to have him put to the inconvenience and expense of answering correspondence on our behalf. I believe Mr. Kice has stated very clearly what he thinks of SCOTT RECEIVERS.

PROGRAM FROM FOREIGN STATION —10,000 MILES DISTANT—RECEIVED IN PA.—CLEAR AS LOCAL STATION

The log given below is one sent in by Mr. Roye Bilheimer of Pennsylvania. It was transmitted from station VK2ME at Sydney, Australia, on February 28, 1932. If any possible doubt is entertained about the clarity with which distant foreign stations are being received on SCOTT ALLWAVE RECEIVERS, the log submitted by Mr. Bilheimer should put all doubts at rest.

It was on this particular program that station VK2ME played back two of the recordings that were made of earlier transmissions of this station by Mr. Scott in Chicago. This log will prove that foreign stations are actually received as well as those coming from local stations.

Dear Sir:

I have just had the pleasure of tuning in your station, and on the log below I am giving you some of the selections I listened to. Will you be kind enough to check this with your station log and send me a verification of my reception?

5:11 a.m. E.S.T.—Musical selection, piano and violin, "His Master's Voice" recording. (Poor volume, with fading right now.)

5:13 a.m. E.S.T.—"VK2ME, Sydney, Australia." You announce the next selection.

5:13½ a.m. E.S.T.—Organ selection, "His Master's Voice" recording.

5:18 a.m. E.S.T.—"VK2ME, Sydney, Australia. The time is 18 minutes past 8, Sunday evening. Our next record will be a vocal one, 'Lucia di Lammermoor' sung by Lily Pons, cello accompaniment, 'His Master's Voice' recording." (This is coming in with good volume, although the weather here is very bad, with a very heavy fog, and a heavy downpour of rain.)

5:21½ a.m. E.S.T.—"VK2ME, Sydney, Australia." 5:22 a.m. E.S.T.—"The time is 22 minutes past 8, Sunday evening. Our next record will be an orchestral selection, 'Indiana Sweetheart'."

5:22½ a.m. E.S.T.—Orchestral selection, "Indiana Sweetheart," with vocal chorus. (Coming in with good volume, but just a bit of fading.)

5:25 a.m. E.S.T.—"VK2ME, Sydney, Australia. The Band of Debussy, conducted by Captain Jerry Abers, will play a march, 'Blaze Away.' This is 'His Master's Voice' recording." (Very good volume.)

5:28 a.m. E.S.T.—"VK2ME, Sydney, Australia. Just a short announcement, before the chimes at 8:30. I would like to make this announcement: The Amalgamated Wireless, Australasia, Ltd., through their station VK2ME have now given about 8 months of the best recordings obtainable. We would like to get your likes and dislikes, and any repetitions you would like, of the records that have been given by VK2ME. Please stand by for chimes at 8:30."

5:30 a.m. E.S.T.—Chimes are now heard, and you say, "It is now 8:30 P. M."

5:30½ a.m. E.S.T.—You are now announcing the next selection to be played, and you say it is to be played by (I could not get name) "His Master's Voice" recording.

5:33 a.m. E.S.T.—"VK2ME, Sydney, Australia." You now say, "The members of the orchestra will play the quartet from 'Don Juan,' 'Song of the Nightingale,' Opus No. 4. 'His Master's Voice' recording." (There is now a little fading, but the volume is good.)

5:37½ a.m. E.S.T.—"VK2ME, Sydney, Australia."

5:38 a.m. E.S.T.—"The time is 22 minutes to 9:00, Sunday evening." You now announce the next selection as, "Duet in Italian" sung by Vittorio— "The name of this selection was an Italian name, meaning, 'Where You Are,' sung by baritone and tenor voices. 'His Master's Voice' recording.

5:43 a.m. E.S.T.—"VK2ME, Sydney, Australia. A Wur-litzer organ solo by Sandy McPherson, is played from the balcony of the new Cinema in London. 'His Master's Voice' recording." (Noise level is rising now.) Organ solo mentioned above is now being played.

5:46½ a.m. E.S.T.—"VK2ME, Sydney, Australia."

5:47 a.m. E.S.T.—"The time is 13 minutes to 9:00, Sunday evening." Now you say, "It was a beautiful day here, and the temperature at the present time is 64 degrees. The barometer has risen to 30.5." (The weather here in my city is not very nice, as it has been raining and now it is snowing, and there is a very heavy fog over everything.) Now you say, "Vittorio and his Band play 'Rigoletto Quartet.' 'His Master's Voice' recording." (You are getting noisy now, but volume is still good.) Musical selection mentioned above is being played.

5:52 a.m. E.S.T.—"VK2ME, Sydney, Australia."

5:52½ a.m. E.S.T.—"The time is 7½ minutes to 9:00, Sunday evening." You now announce the next selection, but the noise has risen and I am unable to get it, however, you say, "His Master's Voice" recording."

5:53 a.m. E.S.T.—Tenor solo, and this was either, "Now Fades the Light of Day" or "Love Songs at Eventide."

5:55 a.m. E.S.T.—"VK2ME, Sydney, Australia." Now you say, "George" and his orchestra, playing, "Cupid's Party." "His Master's Voice" recording."

5:56 a.m. E.S.T.—Orchestral selection, "Cupid's Party" with vocal chorus.

5:57½ a.m. E.S.T.—"VK2ME, Sydney, Australia."

5:58 a.m. E.S.T.—"Time is 2 minutes to 9:00, Sunday night. VK2ME operates on 31.3 meters, 9,590 kilocycles." Now there is a man speaking in French, which I am unable to understand.

5:59½ a.m. E.S.T.—Now you say, "Stand by for chimes at 9 o'clock, please."

6:00 a.m. E.S.T.—Chimes are heard striking the hour of 9:00 p.m., and you say, "Just 9:00 o'clock, Sunday evening." You go on to say, "VK2ME, 47 York Street, Sydney, Australia, would be pleased to receive reports from those overseas relating to the reception of these programs. Our next record is rather an interesting broadcast. I am going to play for you, a record recorded in Chicago. This record was picked up by Mr. Scott of Chicago, an ardent listener of VK2ME. It was then recorded on his home recording set, on aluminum discs, and then sent to VK2ME, and we will now play this record over for you, which will give you some idea of the reception in the United States, especially in Chicago. This is a musical selection by the Band of His Majesty's — Guards. Stand by for a second, please."

6:02½ a.m. E.S.T.—You are now playing the musical selection which you have just spoken of, as having been received from Mr. Scott.

6:05 a.m. E.S.T.—VK2ME, Sydney, Australia. The record you have been listening to was one made in Chicago by Mr. Scott, an ardent listener to VK2ME. The original recording was transmitted some time ago and Mr. Scott received that recording, and cut in the record on his home recording set, and forwarded this to VK2ME. That was the record which has just arrived in Sydney and we have just played it for you, to see how you will receive it. I shall now play for you the laugh of the "Kookaburra," that was also picked up in Chicago by the same gentleman.

6:06½ a.m. E.S.T.—Laugh of the "Kookaburra." Now you say, "That was the laugh of the 'Kookaburra,' reproduced in Chicago again after receiving the original recording from VK2ME. We should be glad to receive reports from other listeners as to how they receive these recordings." A talk of the day is entitled "Australia Commences the Travel Idea," prepared by Charles Holmes, Director of the Australian National Travelers' Association. Now you continue with the talk:

"Set in the sunshine of southern seas, Australia is the world's littlest continent. Australia is a continent that is different from other lands in its appearance, its geographic formation, and its strange animals, as well as its age-old peoples. Then, too, the remainder of the native race that originally inhabited Australia are a stone-age people, but now I wish you could see them in the Government Reservations, and in the far-back places of the continent, where many still lead their primitive lives.

"It is even on the go now to make Australia your next long-distance holiday, for the high rate of exchange increases the value of your money on arrival 25 per cent. British visitors to Australia tell us that travel to Australia is becoming increasingly popular. The visitors to Australia claim that it is cheaper to make a trip to Australia than to live at home. In Australia the British visitors do not suffer by the loss in sterling —. And then they, the visitors, enjoy the big advantage in exchange.

"Just three days ago in the noon of a brilliant day, a great white liner, the 'Mariposa,' the United States' greatest and most luxurious ship, steamed her way through the blue waters of Sydney harbor. Australia was glad to extend the hand of friendship to her friends from the other side of the Pacific. In behalf of the people of Australia, they decorated the ship with flowers, the saloons blazed with lights, and the lady passengers received fragrant posies.

"All the visitors to Australia love the plants of this southern continent. Said one distinguished visitor: 'Your sunshine and your plants are wonderful. Any plantation of your country is complete, without mentioning all your wonderful cities and surf beaches.'

"In three crowded days the visitors saw — and gave —"

6:12 a.m. E.S.T.—They were entertained by Australian aborigines who are located in a settlement there. They were amused to see them throw their boomerangs, that strange wooden weapon which, when thrown by a person, returns to the thrower, and the visitors had an amusing time practicing among themselves. Rudolph Priml gazed at a group of black fellows who were playing a tune with the leaf of the eucalyptus tree, "Rose Marie," from the famous play he had written.

6:14 a.m. E.S.T.—You are now speaking of native bears, and say: "Here the visitors saw the quaint and lovable little bears. 'Living toys,' one visitor called them. One gentleman wanted to buy them outright, so enthused was he by these little native animals. Some of the ladies brought honey and candy, and were greatly disappointed when their gifts were refused by the bears. They prefer to get their own sweets from the eucalyptus tree.

"Australia welcomes the visitor. We want the world to know us better, and we, ourselves, seek a greater knowledge of people of other lands. In these days, travel is more than a great pleasure maker—it is a great peace maker, and that is what the world today is most in need of. This concludes my short talk, entitled 'Australia Commences the Travel Idea,' prepared by Charles Holmes, Director of the Australian National Travelers' Association."

This is coming through with fine volume and clarity, although the weather here is very bad. It is very foggy and rainy.

6:25½ a.m. E.S.T.—VK2ME, Sydney, Australia.

6:25 a.m. E.S.T.—The time is 26 minutes past 9:00 Sunday evening. You now announce the next selection, a waltz, by Bruno, "His Master's Voice" recording.

6:30½ a.m. E.S.T.—VK2ME, Sydney, Australia. The band of His Majesty's — Guards, directed by R. G. Evans, playing "Intermezzo," by Reeves.

6:33 a.m. E.S.T.—Band playing "Intermezzo."

6:34 a.m. E.S.T.—VK2ME, Sydney, Australia. Lily Pons sings in Italian, "The Incense Rises"—love scene, Act 3, "Lucia di Lammermoor." Flute obligato played by George

6:35 a.m. E.S.T.—Lily Pons, soprano, sings solo mentioned above.

Your station is still coming in strong, but circumstances do not permit me to continue logging you.

It might be interesting for you to know that this program came in with tremendous volume, using only an inside aerial. The tone quality all through the foregoing reception was excellent. 6:05 a.m. E.S.T.—Sydney, Australia. The record you have been listening to is one made in Chicago by Mr. Scott. I shall now play for you the "Laugh of the Kookaburra" that was also picked up in Chicago by this same gentleman.

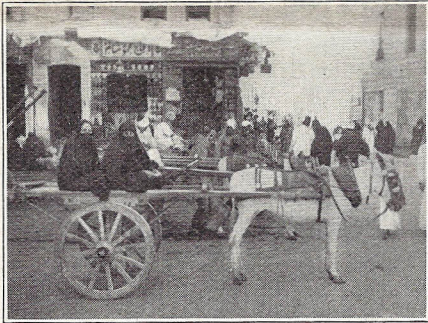

After two days at sea we reach Haifi and disembark to visit a land we have heard about since childhood—Palestine.

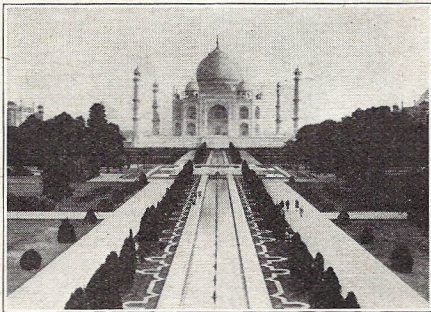


A CAIRO TAXICAB

We could spend a month in Cairo wandering through the native bazaars with their fascinating articles wrought in gold,



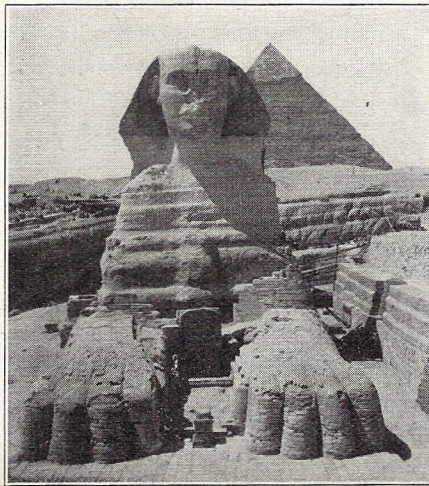
TAJ MAHAL IN INDIA

THE SPHINX, EGYPT

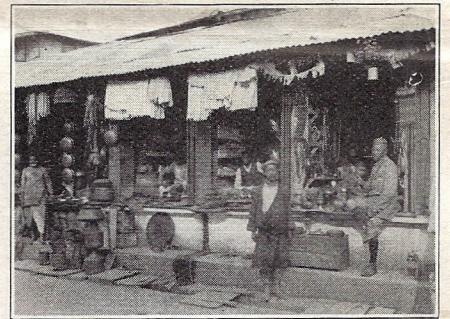

The News and Entertainment from England, France, Italy and South America, Heard in One Day On Scott AllWave

Just as I started to write this Editorial today's logs in the DX Contest (81 of them) were brought up and put on my desk.

I stopped for a moment to glance through them, as they are always interesting and inspiring. In thumbing through these logs I noticed one from Mr. E. B. Roberts of Danvers, Massachusetts and in glancing down the page the word "Lindbergh" caught my eye. Here I found a report of a program transmitted from FYA, France, giving the latest news in English about the awful atrocity, the Lindbergh kidnapping.

I turned to the next log and found that it was a report the same day of the news being broadcast from G5SW at Chelmsford, England, and here also they were giving the latest bulletins regarding the kidnapping.

To complete my amazement, the next log, one from I2RO, Rome, Italy, also March 7th, was broadcasting news of the kidnapping.

Here was news of the day from three different countries, and as the logs will show, interesting ones. These logs give a very good idea of what you are missing if you own a radio that is not capable of tuning in stations other than those in U. S. A.

After listening for a while to I2RO, Mr. Roberts went back to FYA, Pontoise, France, and for over an hour listened to music from that station.

Apparently at this point, Mr. Roberts thought he had listened in enough for a while, so switched off his set. He came back to it again later, for from 8:25 p.m. until 9:10 p.m. he listened to music and entertainment from HKF at Bogota, Colombia in South America.

Mr. Roberts' logs are so typical of the programs from foreign stations that are being tuned in every day on the SCOTT ALL WAVE RECEIVER, and the kind of news and entertainment being broadcast from foreign stations, that I believe a glance through them will tell more about what the SCOTT ALL WAVE RECEIVER will do than a dozen columns of Editorials.
