## BOSTON BOUND!

Everyone knows, or should know by now, the 7th annual convention of the Association of North American Radio Clubs (ANARC) will be held July 14-16, in Wakefield, Mass., near Boston. Having attended five of the previous six ANARC gatherings, I can tell you flatly: YOU SHOULD'N'T MISS THIS ONE! I can also predict that on that weekend, there will be some guys sitting at home wishing that they were there, but aren't!

Why? There are several reasons that will be given...but few are really valid.

(1) "I wouldn't fit in. I wouldn't know anyone there. I'm a newcomer to DXing and I'd feel out of place among all those experienced DXers.." Nonsense! I've yet to find anyone, regardless of age, who came away from a convention feeling he'd been a lost soul. When listeners start talking DX it doesn't make a bit of difference if you've been in the hobby six months or 50 years, if you're 15 or 75! DXers, when they get together, are a friendly and gregarious lot. You may not know anyone when you arrive, but within a few hours you'll be swapping DX yarns, asking questions, getting answers, propounding your theories on DXing, with all the rest!

(2) "Maybe I won't have any fun...dull meetings bore me." ANARC meetings are so informal and informative that they're nothing but fun. Do you like to meet people, the names behind the reports you see in the bulletins? Do you like to swap tales about our grand hobby? Stay up, literally all night, DXing and talking about DX? Meet people like Eddie Startz, long-time host of Radio Nederland's "Happy Station" program? See displays of SW gear? Sit in on fascinating panel discussions of some of the current issues of the day in DXing? Win prizes? Then I guarantee -- you'll have fun !!

(3) "I waited too long to decide if I was going." Ah, the old devil, procrastination! There are now only a few weeks left. Act now. Decide, decide. Right now, and I mean right NOW, tell yourself, "Yes, I'm going!" AND right now, drop a note to Steve P. d'Adolf, 16 Westgate Drive, Apt. 201, Woburn, Mass. 01801, and say, "I'll be there!" Not tomorrow -- NOW!!!

(4) "I'd like to go, but I can't afford it..." This is probably the most common explanation, particularly among students and younger DXers. This is understandable, but, attending a convention may not be as expensive as you think. There is a minimum expense of \$12 for the convention registration fee. Beyond that, cost in attending the convention is pretty much up to you.

Assuming that the cost of air, train, or even bus fare is prohibitive, driving can be relatively cheap if you have, or have access to a car. Six guys driving from up to 500 miles away from Boston should be able to round-trip it for under \$20.00 each. If you're a hitchhiker, and have the time, you can cut travel expense to nothing.

A single room at the Colonial Hilton Inn, where the convention will be held, is \$18 plus tax per night, or \$36 for the two night of the convention. If you can't swing two nights, arrive Saturday morning and sleep over only that night. Or, as many do, share a room with another DXer -- convention hosts will help line up something for you, pair you off with someone else, if you wish. That way the room cost will be only \$11.50 a night. If this is too much for your wallet, I'm willing to bet you'll find some other DXers who'd let you flop your sleeping bag on the floor of their room for nothing. After all, based on past experience, you'll probably only be sleeping an average of a couple hours a night, so who needs a private room?

Food costs? Well, your registration pays for the Saturday evening banquet and Sun morn breakfast. That means you'll have to purchase Friday's supper and Sat.'s breakfast and lunch. Toast and coffee, hamburgers and coke don't cost much. How you eat and what it costs will depend on your tastes and appetite.

No, cost need not bar one from attending the convention. And, if you do make the convention this year, I, willing to bet that before you leave, you'll be planning for next year's. Make the commitment to yourself NOW, though: send the registration fee to Steve..TODAY!!! And, see you in Boston! ---Don Jenson

## THE LOUDENBOOMER REPORT

## A NOTE OF THANKS

With the first MAIL CALL in the June issue of FRENDX I was pleasantly surprised at the number of letters in response which came in the first week. I will try to print as many excerpts from member's letters as possible each month. However, the number of bulletin pages and cooperation with other editors of FRENDX may necessitate some occasional reduction to one page. Another point that I wish to be clear from the very beginning is that this section will not become a battleground to defend and rebut varying points of view among the members. And so, to this month's queries and answers.

Dear Uncle Ed: I wonder if there are any laws which prevent (or frown upon) the desire we have to seek QSLs from the Communist countries - particularly North Vietnam?

Answer: My own experience with this question was satisfactorily answered by my (Then) Senator Thruston Morton of Kentucky. In his letter to me - after being advised by the Postmaster General - Senator Morton wrote: "...Several of the U.S. Government Agencies, including the Post Office has full knowledge and acquaintance with your hobby. There is no danger in writing to any of these countries. In the case of your desire in acquiring a QSL from Hanoi, I advise you to write directly to the station. Even though the U.S. has no diplomatic or any other recognizable agreements, your letters are being delivered through unofficial channels via Hong Kong and Peking"....

Dear Ed: I would like to improve my DXing technique. I know many DXers use headsets which enable them to listen to radio signals undisturbed by extraneous noises around them in their homes. Which kind of headphones would you recommend?

Answer: There are many types and kinds of headsets in use today among DXers, and I can only give one opinion. In DXing, I am interested in hearing mostly voices and music for identification purposes. A set of headphones that will give a frequency response to most narrowly cover this range adequately will serve best. I DO NOT recommend Stereo or other Hi-Fi earphones with wide frequency response. These will reproduce low bass tones as well as high treble crackle - thereby interfering with your objective. Stick to the advertised communications-type sets in Allied, Lafayette.

Dear Ed: I remember reading that you could supply members with names and addresses of other members in their areas. Is this service still available? Wouldn't it be simpler just publish a list of all NASWA names and addresses?

Answer: Yes, this service is still offered on a limited basis. No geographical charts are kept of the membership, and each query necessitates a thumb-through of the membership card file. That is time-consuming, and prompt answers for these requests cannot be answered for that reason. As to membership lists, this was once tried, but it seems that certain member(s) began using their lists for commercial mailing list purposes and we no longer lend ourselves to this practice.

## Radio Tanzania

(...translation from Kiswahili original by Mr. Albert Scheven.)

**"WE BUILD THE NATION BY RADIO":** Saba-Saba is one of Tanzania's great holidays not only because it commemorates the founding of TANU (the party which voiced the will of the people of Tanzania and lead to the realization of Uhuru, or Independence), but also, above all, it is the yearly renewal of our will to build the nation. It is the occasion to see where one has succeeded and to see where one has failed. Radio Tanzania, under the Department of Communications and Tourism, has not been on the sidelines of national development. Let us tell you how radio is important to Tanzania.

First of all, radio reaches all people and can therefore remove barriers which may divide men and tribes, and foster relations among the inhabitants, thus creating a spirit of togetherness. Without this unity, our problems only increase. Secondly, the radio provides education and amusement, both of which help to raise our standard of living in Tanzania. Amusement programs help people living in inland villages to rest. We should not forget that man doesn't live only by work, but also by his leisure. If a man enjoys his free time, he will be better able to work in his fields or workshop..

Broadcasting also helps adults and students in the service of Tanzania to acquire knowledge and thus overcome our big enemy, IGNORANCE. It provides the listener with facts about both his country and also the world in which he lives. Now we come to the third aim of broadcasting in Tanzania: that is, to provide the listener with facts, and news, and to lead the nation. We all understand that the country cannot raise itself up nor can we build our nation to one of progress and prosperity without the efforts of all our citizens. All together they can raise the standard of living and the expectations of the land. Radio broadcasts make it clear to Tanzanians how to best realize their own progress.



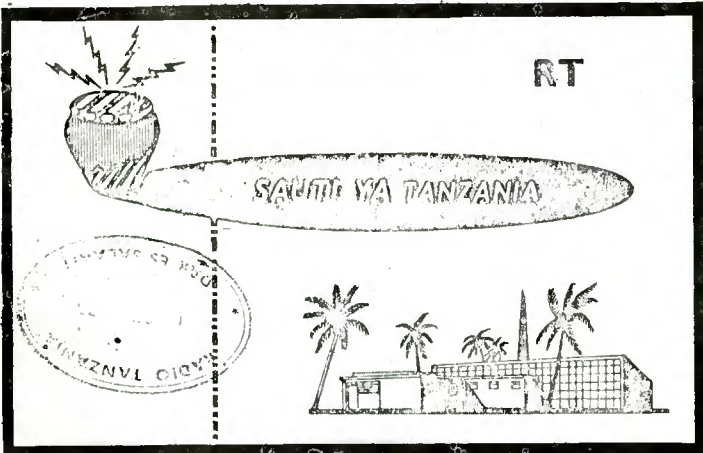
(ABOVE: the RT broadcast control)

RADIO TANZANIA - DAR ES SALAAM

A Short History of Radio Tanzania

Radio Tanzania, Dar es Salaam, as we know it today, started as Sauti ya Dar es Salaam in the year 1951. At that time it was a very small station, it's studios were quite modest, facilities quite limited, and there wasn't as much transmitting equipment as today. It was located in Kichwele Street (now Uhuru St.) opposite the Uhuru Primary School, and near the East African Breweries Co., Ltd. There were few listeners. After Building powerful transmitters of 20 kilowatts on Pugo Road in



1956 and after increasing the number of employees and broadcasting hours, the station was named the Tanganyika Broadcasting Corporation. The actual studios were then occupied and everything was then "kem-kem". Since we had more power, we reached more listeners: not only in Dar, but also now in Mtwara, Moshi, Arusha, Mara, Singida, Dodoma, Mbeya and many other

sectors of the country could now listen in. But there were still some sectors of Tanzania which had no clear reception as of July 1, 1965 (e.g. Kigoma, Kasulu, Mwanza, and Bukoba.) On the first of July, 1965, the constitution of the Tanganyika Broadcasting Corp. was approved in the House. Although all else remained the same, the government now took control of broadcasting. Taking the name "Radio Tanzania - Dar es Salaam", it was incorporated into the Department of Communications and Tourism.

Radio Tanzania: The Kiswahili Section

This section is an important and steady means of giving the people news, knowledge and recreation. Here the speeches of our leaders and the achievements of our people are broadcast. The nation's policy of "Ujamaa" (brotherhood) and "kujitegemea" (self-help) are daily explained in detail. We don't give formal education, as is the case with the School Section of the Radio, but even so, we have many hours of world affairs...however, if we were to broadcast politics and news all day long without resting the brains of our listeners, we would soon find ourselves broadcasting to empty rooms and those who are thrifty in buying batteries would turn off the radio and the cockroaches would find a free homestead. That is why we have a fair number of hours dedicated to gladdening our listeners: Mambo Show, Makorama, and Maoki Yenu are only a few of such programs. The total number of airhours per wk for this section is 95.

Radio Tanzania: The English Section

This section is younger than the Kiswahili section, but when it was born, it was stuck within the same branch. In the course of time it received its own quarters. Besides the transmission of the usual national cultural, political and entertainment programs, this section also transmits matters foreign to us but profitable to the advancement of our nation. Broadcasts come from the United Nations and different countries of Europe and Asia, and it would be too difficult to translate it into Kiswahili. News is on three times a day and we have many hours of enjoyable music. Part of these English broadcasts - especially the music and entertainment features - comes from overseas. We are on for 39 hours a wk with local English programming, too.

Radio Tanzania: Branch of Conversation and Foreign News

This branch can be compared to a factory because all talks in Kiswahili and English are made here before they are broadcast by other branches. It's our task also to record outside of our studios important meetings, visits, football games, boxing matches etc. The other section of the branch provides news of countries abroad who are helping or hindering total African independence.

Radio Tanzania: School Section

The important value of the Radio as a means of knowledge comes from the fact that it is capable of bringing often and quickly significant news and facts. Thus, in the effort of teaching, the school radio helps the teacher to use means that he would otherwise be unable to obtain or hear. It also makes accessible the know-how and teaching of the teachers who are highly qualified in certain matters. Experts of this kind are few, and cannot visit every school. In this way the radio shares equally their expertise among all schools who can listen in. Broadcasts are for Primary and Secondary schools, and there is also a program dealing with "Teacher Training College". Helping our teachers is very important, and so we devote special transmissions to this purpose.

Radio Tanzania: The Foreign, or Business, Sector

We broadcast only 10 hours a day. It is our aim to be heard across the borders of Tanzania and it looks as if we have been successful. This branch started in 1965. There are two aims of the External (Business) Section: a) to notify the business world about the available produce of our people, and b) to secure funds for our station, Radio Tanzania. There are two divisions in the compilation of these transmissions, one which collects the business news, and one which edits the news and sets up the programming to make it attractive for listeners. For many years Tanzania bought imports. We are trying to change this mentality - now everybody knows what we make in Tanzania. Our policy, our culture, and our honor are all considered before we broadcast any message.

Radio Tanzania: "The Newsroom" Program

Upcountry people do not get newspapers daily. They depend on the radio for news. We try to broadcast news that is fully true. While we have our own newswriters, we also buy much news from Reuters (London) and we also monitor broadcasts of world radio to supplement this. Using English and Kiswahili, this program tries to present all the news which is important for a young, nation-building people: how to live together, work together, helping one another. We're on the air 18 hours a day...

DX.....Radio Singapore



The Broadcasting Division of the Ministry of Culture operates the radio and TV services in Singapore. Radio Singapore transmits services in 4 languages: Malay, Chinese, Tamil, and English on separate channels in the MW, SW, and FM bands. The total number of hours over the air averages 525 per week. Each language svc also carries commercial advertisements and sponsored pgms. However, no ads are allowed in nxcasts, talks, serious mx pgms, documentaries and features. The language services present programmes designed to promote mutual appreciation among various racial groups. It is estimated that over 70% of the population of Singapore tune a RTVS bc daily. Radio & TV Singapore is often well heard in N.Am. winters, w/EE xmsns on 11940 and 5051 kHz...Selamat Lagi!

CAN YOU

DX TILL IT HERTZ???? .....Mission:Impossible !!

So you think such goodies as Tristan Radio and the Falkland Island BCing Service are rare and difficult DX? Those two stations are just the more famous ones: like an iceberg, there's more beneath the surface -- much more. Stations that are seldom noticed in the listings but rival or exceed the likes of Tristan and FIBS in terms of mere challenge and rarity!

Turkey is the location of a number of low-power, short-scheduled, and scarcely-heard xmtrs. One such is Bursa Educational Radio, in Bursa, operating on 6925 kHz.

Up in the North Atlantic there are a couple of recently discovered (hi) outlets (cf. the new book by Alistair MacLean), one on Björöya (Bear Is.) on 1757 kHz, and the other on Jan Mayen, using 1722 kHz.... Both operate with just 200 watts of power and are only on the air during bad weather condx, w/relays of the Tromsø, Norway, weather report.

Lesotho isn't as difficult to log as it used to be. But you can still make a job of it if you go after Radio Station 7PA22, using 100 watts on 3824 kHz from 0630 to 0730 on Fridays and Sundays.

A real powerhouse compared to most of these is Radio Universite in Madagascar. They use a whole hKW's on 3370 kHz. Best time to tune would appear to be during their 0315-0430 GMT segment.

Another African, this one in Mozambique, even has two rough outlets, 3240 and 7235 kHz. It's Emisora do Aero Clube da Beira, in Beira, using 300 watts.

In S. America you might take a shot at Radio Nickerie, N.V., in Surinam. There is some doubt as to whether this one even exists or has ever been on the air! If you want to try, check 3240 kHz from 0930 s/on. Maybe one day their 75 watts of power'll make it to your QTH!!

There are many more after you've logged these. You might try the Israeli Armed Fces Station on 6335, or Australia's Melbourne Royal Instit. of Technology, being technical lessons to 0515 GMT s/off on 5370. And how about R.Terapetra on the island of Crete? They just make the SWBC band with their fcy of 1614 kHz.... and that's variable, by the way.

One thing's for sure, and it's this: there can never be an "Alexander the Great" in the hobby of SWBC DXing. There are always new worlds left to conquer!!! --30--

### RADIO IRIS, ESMERALDAS - 3381 kHz

"The Older Station in the Province w/the More Modern Equipment"

This well-known and well-heard Ecuadorian station, HDYL, was founded in 1950 with equipment running a meager 200 watts. Although the WRTH notes 5 kW's power for Radio Iris Esmeraldas at present, in actuality they are only managing to pump out 2 kilowatts -- this according to Mr. Daniel Alvarez Tenorio, the studio's manager. The city of Esmeraldas has approximately 80,000 inhabitants, and its very beautiful beaches on the South Pacific shore attract a multitude of tourists every year, in fact, so many that a special seaside airport has been constructed to accommodate the flow of vacationers. Also, within the city of Esmeraldas, according to the manager, has been erected the first petroleum refinery in the state: it is capable of processing 60,000 barrels of oil @ day. ...via NASWAer Steve Dildine, Va.

Relax, DXers. The "death-bells" have quit tolling, at least for a while. Our own Al Reynolds, Tenn., sends the following excerpt from "The Future of International BCing", ANNALS OF AMER. ACAD. And in a July 1970 rpt to the White House, USA experts came

"Such a satellite could provide a single voice channel to an area the size of Brazil for between \$40-\$50 million @ year. ...the VOA is presently reaching the entire W.Hemisphere for \$1.5 million using terrestrial HF trx's for as many as three different pgms simultaneously...The VOA has used PTP satellite stations on an experimental basis to feed FE rly stations. They were more reliable than SW, but more expensive...."



SHORTWAVESHORTS.....Random Notes and Juicy Tidbits From the World of SWBC DXing.....Death of a Rumor: RN & SSB

The old rumor-mill cranked out another little gem, and many of us swallowed---hook, line, and sinker. Perhaps you'd heard: with all the talk of SSB being in vogue, is almost seemed plausible that Radio Nederland might be a trailblazer in this direction. RN on SSB...Our own NASWAer Mark Welsh, OH wrote RN, and his answer over the DX-Jukebox: "...Well, it is just that, a rumor. Present-day AM broadcasting xmtrs are not equipped for transmitting single-sideband, and for another thing, the standard for the suppression of the carrier has not been accepted or even proposed by the CCIR. So the broadcasting stations are only following developments with a watchful eye, and you may expect no SSB transmissions from us for the next few years at least..."

Well, acc'ding to FDXCI, the show has been reinstated due to DXers letters, and will return to the airwaves in a 5-minute segment broadcast twice every Saturday, at 1800 GMT on 9555, 11755, and 15185 kHz for Europe, and at 2300 for N. America on 15185 kHz. A FDXCI member, Martti J. Pessi has been "sailing the seven seas" for some time now as a radio operator, and his collection of IS and ID tapes from all over the world will be a feature.

WHAT'S GOIN ON HERE????

WVW on 9730 kHz? Surprized? Well imagine the reaction of NASWAer Corky Webb, TX when he logged this strange fgy (for a "standard fgy station"). The explanation emerged when he wrote for a veri on the freak transmission -- and you may well recognize it: "...Assuming your rx is properly aligned and its tuning dial is calibrated correctly, the most likely cause for reception of WVW at 9730 would be cross-modulation. C-m may occur whenever incoming signals become wholly or partially rectified in the radio frequency stages of the rx. It's most noticeable when strong signals, such as WVW and a local station, are picked up simultaneously at the receiving antenna. By driving the input stages into non-linear operation, the strong signals beat together to produce extraneous fgy's equal to the sum and difference of the two original fgy's. Thus, under favorable propagation condx the 2500 kHz signal from WVW could beat with the carrier from an amateur station operating on 7230 kHz to produce a third fgy equal to their sum: should the rx be tuned to 9730 kHz under such circumstances, either or both of the original bc's might be heard..."

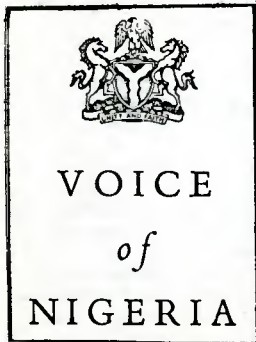
From "Wired-Wireless" to External Svcs...

BROADCASTING IN NIGERIA

Broadcasting in Nigeria made its inauspicious debut in 1932, the same year in which the BBC inaugurated TV experimentation and opened the Broadcasting House. On Dec. 19, 1939 the BBC commenced the Empire Service from Daventry to provide "political, cultural, and economic links between the UK and English-speaking peoples of the world". The significance of this is that the Empire Service required advisory monitoring stations all across the globe to best determine propagational quality, choice of frequency,

and general reception condx for Empire Svc broadcasts. Soon afterward, the BBC also offered to subsidize the construction of regional outlets for rebroadcasting of E.S. In view of the general world depression at the time which was running rampant, this offer was opportune for many less-developed nations---a means to provide a substructure for rudimentary broadcasting services was thus afforded, and quick to seize the chance were Ceylon, India, Australia, New Zealand, and many others, including, of course, Nigeria...

The task of devising a system to disseminate the BBC programs within Nigeria to the most densely-populated areas (Lagos, Ibadan, Kano) was given to the Nigeria Posts and Telegraph Dept. The scheme hit upon by this agency was referred to as the RDS, or Rediffusion System. It was in essence much akin to a one-way telephone network. The project soon earned the misnomer of "wired-wireless", as it consisted of a system of transmission lines running from the rediffusion station to the listeners' homes. By 1936, after a year of experimentation, the rediffusion system was fully operative, with the main RDS outpost at Lagos. Also by 1936, it was noted that a sizable number of Nigerians (and a growing proportion of the population) owned genuine, legitimate SW rcvrs. By the year 1939, the RDS expanded to include sites at Ibadan, closely followed by the inauguration of another at Kano. 1939 is of importance in the history of Nigerian radio for two main reasons: a) Locally-produced programs of limited-length which catered to the tastes of the local audience were



allowed to be broadcast over the RDS from Lagos, alongside the Empire Service; also, b) In 1939, operating with the callsign of "Radio Nigeria" and 300 watts of power, the first true wireless station started transmissions from a small shack on Ikoyi Island, near Lagos.

Following WWII, the RDS soon snowballed, incorporating sites at Lagos, Ibadan, Abeokuta, Ijebu-Ode, Port Harcourt, Enugu, Kano, and Zaria. In 1947, Calabar, Kaduna, and Jos went on the air, and a few years later, Warri, Katsina, Sokoto, Onitsha, Maiduguri, and Ilorin followed.

However, by 1948, the gross inequities between the highly-developed, war-bred European broadcasting services and Nigeria's relatively infantile stature in the area of radio broadcasting became increasingly apparent, with the RDS showing itself as being more and more inadequate. The Nigerians called on the BBC for advice.

The Secretary of State for the Colonies urged the immediate improvement of broadcasting in W.Africa, and accordingly commissioned a team of 2 BBC engineers. Their report, subsidized by the Colonial Development and Welfare Act of 1948, was to change the future of broadcasting in W.Africa. Based upon an 8000 mile tour of the territory, the "Turner-Byron Report" recommended that "...future coverage in W.Africa should be by BOTH wireless(wired) and by actual transmission, the former being economically limited to densely populated areas, and the latter being suited for the thinly-populated areas...". Also proposed was that Lagos, Ibadan, Kaduna, Kano, Enugu be made studio centers for regional transmissions specific to the needs of people in their locales, to be run in conjunction with a national program from Lagos. "The Turner-Byron Report was responsible for the development of broadcasting in W.Africa, and with certain amendments, it laid the foundations for the engineering plan that Nigeria has followed to this very day..."

Under the direction of Mr. T.W. Chalmers, an expatriate senior BBC Network-Mgr, the integration and transformation of the RDS into a true broadcasting system was undertaken in 1951. From the onset, financial and political considerations badgered his success. Rather than strictly adhering to the ambitious Turner-Byron Report,



Chalmers pursued a more conservative course: in accordance with government recommendations, studios were provided for Lagos, Kaduna, and Enugu --- and the Nigerian Broadcasting Service commenced operation in 1951. The NBS had planned to have all technical installations completed by 1954 (a three-year plan), but a series of unforeseen problems arose, most of them being associated with the transportation or operation of the new equipment within the tropical rainforest. An interesting anecdote in this vein concerns the NBS's first transmitters:

"...the famous Normandy Beachhead mobile transmitter was available for purchase; this was the xmtr which, in the dark days of 1944, transmitted the nightly war-rpt of the Allied invasion of Europe. It was an RCA 7.5 kW shortwave transmitter with a rectifier unit, mounted in two extremely large mobile vans, which also housed a mobile diesel generator. 7 years had elapsed since the transmitter had been assembled but apparently it was in a reasonable state of repair...There were difficulties from the start with this historic transmitter, though. On arrival,

By 1954, the NBS occupied portions of its new Broadcasting House in Lagos. Insufficient funds hindered similar edifices in Kaduna and Enugu, and there the old RDS stations were modified and used: the RDS site at Kaduna was on the air in May '53 with 300 watts. Thus, by the end of 1953, the first phase of Chalmers's plan was completed; and by 1955, all three cities were to have permanent installations.

Also in 1954, a proposal was made that the NBS be made free of gov't control, and be given status as a separate public corporation, in the mold of the BBC. After much legal discussion, the issue finally carried on March 31, 1957. The newly-formed Nigerian Broadcasting Corporation signed on for the first time--the NBC lived! The newly-formed NBC immediately embarked upon a 3-year plan to improve and intensify their service, mainly emphasizing consolidation of the Service into the Corporation framework, raising the standards of programming, and expansion of facilities, accompanied by Nigerianization of personnel.

Controversy arose in 1959 when regional dissent was aimed at the NBC. The prevalent opinion was that the NBC represented a centralized, federal stance which in the main emphasized national programming, to the detriment of regional programming. Too much, the people felt, of the power was in Lagos. Also it was noted that a large amount of BBC programming was relayed to cover international news---and not enough broadcast time was devoted to purely Nigerian programs. Stemming out of this melee, the Western Region Government set up its own radio and TV Svc at Ibadan, with the East Region soon following suit. The situation of the nationally-run NBC and the 4 different regions was likened to a "wife with four husbands...she cannot satisfy them all." Thus, in 1956, the Federal Gov't of Nigeria regained control of all broadcasting in Nigeria, and attempted to provide programming over the NBC which would be able to satisfy all the regions--something the independent corporation had failed to do.

In May 1960, the WNBS-Ibadan set a precedent in Nigeria by going commercial. Fearing now the possibility of being outbid by the WNBS in the ever-present struggle to recruit personnel and equipment because of the WNBS's new source of income, the NBC also went commercial on Nov.1, 1960. In Aug.1961, the Northern Regional Svc commenced transmission, and in Jan.1962, the Western Regional Service came on the air. The NBC now had equal footing with the regional governmental stations in the competition for local audiences.

On Jan.1, 1962, the NBC erected a temporary 10 kW shortwave outlet, operating 2 hours a day in French and English, directed to its neighboring W.African countries. The External Service was born. The Prime Minister, Alhaji the Rt.Hon.Sir Abubaka Tafawa Balewa made the first broadcast: "...On the behalf of the Government and the people of the Federation of Nigeria, I send you greetings wherever you may be listening to this new service of the Voice of Nigeria, broadcasting from Lagos.."



**PHENOMENON OF THE DARKNESS PATTERN - EXPLAINED, Part IV by Ed Shaw**

Summer season is really upon us now and the accompanying charts will be a greater value to you than ever before. The

summer margins between sunset and darkness often mean the difference between a new catch and a near miss....

Remember The Cardinal Rules:

1. Low frequencies propagate best only between two points in darkness...
2. Figure 4 minutes of time added for each degree West of Greenwich(0°), or 4 minutes subtracted for each degree East of Greenwich...
3. The accompanying charts tell sunrise and sunset times for nearly any latitude in the world - in local time. Exact times may be guesstimated for latitudes and dates not illustrated (simple interpolation)...
4. And, for this summer season, let me add that low frequency DX will have fallen to its lowest ebb, and one shouldn't expect to accomplish great achievements. But good luck, and nice going if you do! Good DX has been found in all seasons.

Reception of Radio Warsaw at a QTH in Winslow, Arizona, is only possible for a mere 1½ hours after Winslow's sunset since Warsaw will be having sunrise at approximately that time. There is a path of darkness between the two points from 0208 to 0325 GMT. At 0325 GMT, although the night is in full swing in Winslow, reception will become unlikely since at that very time Warsaw will be experiencing the first rays of the morning sun, and the darkness path will no longer be complete.

Our global community of DXers, viewed collectively, has from time to time brewed up some ingenious stratagems for dealing with hesitant verifiers -- true gems of public relations work mixed with the insight of a Shortwave Holmes. Some have even become standard operating pro-

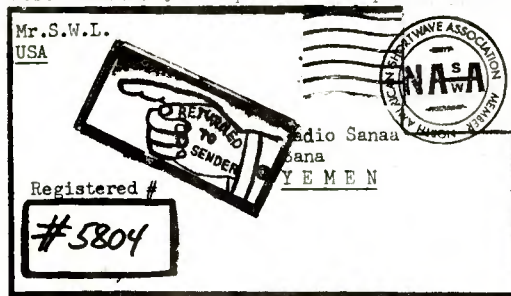
tocal: take, for instance, foreign language reporting forms. We might tend to view 'em as commonplace now, but think of the many QSLs which must have been denied DXers in the past who hadn't the command of, say, Portuguese or Indonesian. And now, the use of the appropriate language in the majority of reports sent out to potential non-verifiers has certainly trimmed a few off an otherwise bulging "black list".

There are some old standby's which seem to succeed with amazing regularity when dealing with a recalcitrant SW/ECR: sending commemorative stamps, colorful postcards, snapshots of the (TA-DA) DXer, small magazines, etc. Even if there be no stamp or p/p/cd collectors at the station, such lil' gifties both make a good impression thru a show of friendship, and also, it must be admitted, subjects the station to subtle psychological coercion to reply.

If it is not a communications gap lying behind a non-verie policy (which lang. rpt. forms can alleviate), and it is not merely apathy, then two possibilities remain: ignorance of the hobby, or enmity.

If the answer lie in the former, then the course of action is clear. Al Sizer's experience with Radio Bangladesh is a case in point: after Al had explained to Mr. Habibullah just what it was that we crazy DXers were after, Dacca quickly became one of the most regular verifiers in Asia.

If, however, the distinct absence of QSLs springs from ill-will (be the underlying motives political, bureaucratic, or personal), then it is this which the DXer must attempt to assuage -- and it seems that the DXer with QSL-fever is invariably a man with a scheme. And although there is no substitute for sending a good report, and, sometimes more importantly, being in the right-place-at-the-right-time, the most dramatic QSL coups have been pulled off in this area as the direct result of

of some dedicated DXer's diligence, ingenuity, and homework. The unusual tactics springing here are always of the genre which arouse in other DXers the reaction of "...now why didn't I think of that...?" Some of the more recent ones, for example:

---the use of a 3rd party intermediary (a mother station; network front office; commercial firms like TIE; embassies per the Jerry Berg BBS coup, etc...)

----the use of a more palatable mailing address. For example, many Russian regional stations will verify direct to European DXers, but not to NA. This may change. However, supposing you'd heard one and wished it varied (but suspect your NA QTH would, for political reasons or whatever, would result in a big red Zero), you might see if your European DX-club would be willing to act as your QSL Bureau. You merely send your report, legitimate in every way, in care of your club in, say, Finland. Although I have not utilized this approach, I am told that it will work, and whether or not you consider it ethical or not is your personal decision. It IS DONE, however. I, myself, am still undecided..

---the all time prize ploy, in my opinion, was involved in the "Gerry Dexter vs. Radio Sahara Caper". The approach? Simply send a few gratis USA pop/folk discs: records to a radio station---what a natural!! And considering the great demand for recent American pops around the world, and considering the time-lag often involved for a station to secure such tunes, the sending of current mx while it's still current seems to be hard to beat...

---you might even go to the station itself, as GAC has done of late down south of the border (course, this might turn out to be even more expensive than taped registered rpts, hi!).....In short, the non-verifiers CAN be verified. If some men can climb Everest just to freeze their beards, and others can jump Niagara in barrels... But a short note, tho: there's no truth behind the rumor that Chris Lobell engineered what has been called "...the biggest plot to get a veri out of Zanzibar in years". Infor-mants tell me that he has not left the States in the last 90 days. --30--

RADIO PAKISTAN EXPANSION

ISLAMABAD -- A three-year crash program from the development of broadcasting has been proposed at a conference of senior engineers. Its purpose is to provide the entire country with radio coverage by 1975.

Costing over Rs. 11.3 crores, till 1975, the programme includes extension of MW coverage all over Pakistan, provision of broadcast channel II at all major stations and introduction of a third channel on FM transmitters which is meant for sophisticated listeners.

The conference inaugurated by the Information Minister on Thursday discussed the 5-year programme incorporating both ongoing and new projects.

EXTERNAL: Besides the extension of external services, which would shift entirely to Islamabad from Karachi, the conference also discussed how the engineers could assist in designing material from developing radio and electronic equipment to conserve foreign exchange.

The various projects likely to be completed by 1975 are: two additional 250 kW shortwave transmitters, two 100 kW shortwave transmitters, one 1000 Kw MW transmitter all at High Powered Transmitter Station Islamabad, beside construction of Broadcasting Houses at Islamabad, Peshawar, and Multan and installation of one 150 kW MW transmitter at Quetta....

100% COVER: It is expected that by 1975, the total MW coverage will extend to 90% of the population, and internal shortwave coverage would be 100%...The conference of senior radio engineers was held after about 6 years. Now the radio engineers will be meeting more frequently -- once or twice a year to review the progress of the program.

HIC-NORWAY:

The Hard Way!!! -- Tromsø

Along with a QSL from NRK, the following information was received by your editor: "...regarding our Tromsø SW xmt, we take pleasure in informing you that it operates on 7240 kHz with a power of 10kW. The transmitter carries the Norwegian Home Service Program, and is beamed westwards. It is mainly intended for Norwegian fishermen off the coasts of Greenland and Iceland. We regret we have no pix of the station at the present time..." NASWAer Don Jenson speculates that "...this may be the northernmost DX in the world!" Who knows?? But you don't have to be a Norwegian fisherman to try, hi.

CLANDESTINE-PIRATE:

World Music Radio...

WMR is a clandestine station operating from the Netherlands. The station started broadcasts on MW 186 meters about 10 years ago. The frequency was changed to 7050 kHz, and later to 6025, and again, to 6040 kHz...World Music Radio was operating under the name of Radio Euroweekend. In April of 1969, Radio Euroweekend closed down and WMR started some 4 months later. In December of 1971, WMR started to use 6067 kHz...Their program schedule is as follows: (GMT)



0900: "To the World, With Mx" (non-stop)  
1000: "The John O'Mill Show"  
1100: "The Favorite 10 of WMR"  
1130: "To the World of Mx"  
1200: "45 Toeren op 49 meter" with Andre  
1230: "Studio 2" with Theo

This schedule is broadcast now every Sunday on 6225 kHz from 0900-1300 GMT. A DX-pgm called "The DX-World of WMR" is broadcast on the 1st Sunday of the month. Incidentally, the station has, in the past, verified....And according to the QSL, WMR operates with a power of 0.015 kW.

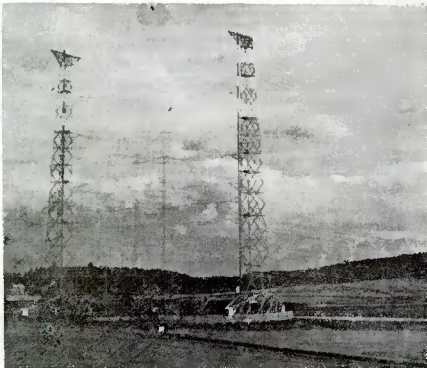

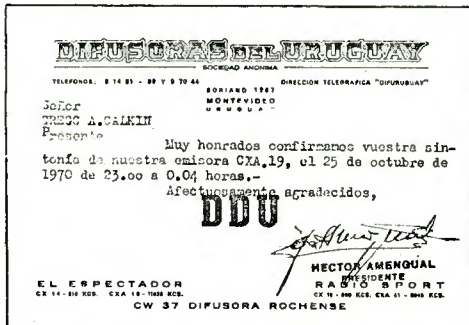

"On May 28 I had a complete reception blackout on all frequencies from 1335 until 1410 GMT... After 1410, reception was back to normal. Did anyone else have this same experience?(Albert A. Miller) Yes, what you observed was a Sudden Ionospheric Disturbance. This was observed widely according to reports received here from both North America and overseas.

ARGENTINA RAE is scheduled to Europe at 1900-0000 with one hour programs in Spanish, German, Italian, French and English, in that order, on 11710 kHz. Also list to Af/ME. To ECNA at 0100-0400, and to WCNA at 0400-0700 on 9690 kHz. All Spanish except for English at 0300-0400 and 0600-0700. Also listed to FE. To LA at 0000-0100(Port), 0100-0300(Sp) and 0400-0600(Sp) on 9690. To the Far East/North Pacific at 0300-0400(Eng), 0900-1000(Japanese), on 9690 kHz. (Thanks to Larry Marshall)

AUSTRALIA An item in the June issue of AUSTRALIAN DX NEWS is interesting. ARDXC member Frank Aue reports that transmissions are expected from the Adelaide University station, VL5UV, on 28 June. Frequency will be 1630 kHz. Note that this qualifies as a shortwave broadcast station under NASWA station counting rules. Schedule was not indicated.

CANADA Well-known shortwave personality Earle Fisher of the Radio Canada International mailbag program retired at the beginning of June, 1972. His last show was heard on Sunday, May 28. His show will now be handled by two voices: Lynn Henderson and Charles Gursky. (Richard Wood)

FALKLAND ISLANDS Writing in the June issue of DX NEWS, published by the South African DX Club, gives the sked of FIBS; 2230-0130 weekdays, 2130-0130 Saturday, in the summer months. During the winter months (April to September) the station operates 2230-0200 weekdays and 2030-0200 Saturday. No Sunday schedule is given. The frequency is given as 3958 kHz, though it is said to drift a bit.

PORT GUINEA According to an item in SADX's DX News, the station at Bissau will in the future be owned by the army. New address is: O Commando Chefe, Programa sad Forcas Armadas, Bissau.

IRAN A transmitter at Shiraz operates 0615-0930 and 1230-1730 on 4500 kHz, according to notes from the BBC Monitoring Service. BBC MS also shows the external service, Radio Iran, to operate on 9005 at 1725-2130 in (½ hour each beginning 1730) Russian, Turkish, Arabic, German, French, English, Persian(full hour). The Persian tx at 2030 is also aired on 15085 kHz.(BBC Monitoring Service)

ISRAEL IBA operates 7189 kHz at 0358-0700 and 0900-2215, all in Arabic except for some news-casts at various times in English and French.(English 0500-0515 except Sunday, French 0515-0530.) (BBC Monitoring Service) ITU lists power as 20 kw.(DF) Further info from the BBC MS shows the schedule of the "Forces' Program". It is shown as: 0900-1210, 1300-2205, on 8777, 6332, 2442 kHz. 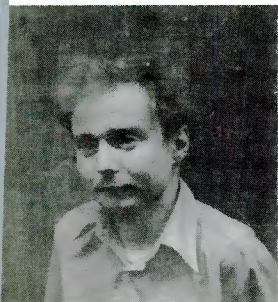

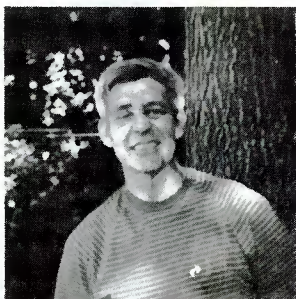
