An Interview with Gerry Dexter

hose entering the shortwave listening hobby today probably know of Gerry Dexter as an author and publisher of shortwave listening related materials. However, Gerry has been a shortwave broadcast (SWBC) DXer for close to forty years! February 13, 1991 will mark Gerry's 40th year as a SWBC DXer. During that time, he has verified over 1,400 shortwave broadcast stations from over 230 radio countries per the NASWA Country List. In addition, Gerry has earned over 30 NASWA awards. He holds Award Certificate #1 for 17 different awards and Awards Certificate #2 for 7 different awards and Award Certificate #3 for 4 different awards. Among Gerry's many awards are the Master DX Centurion, Master Nigerian DXer, Master Subcontinental DXer, ORTF DXer, Emissora Nacional DXer, Maple Leaf DXer, Master Indonesian DXer, Senior Ecuadorian DXer, Senior Venezuelan DXer, Senior Brazilian DXer, Senior Tropical Band DXer and the Senior Peruvian DXer.

Gerry is more than just a "name" in the hobby. He has regularly attended the Winter SWL Festival in Kulpsville, periodically attended ANARC Conventions over the years, regularly attends shortwave gatherings held in Chicago and Milwaukee, and was one of the attendees of the first convention organized by Monitoring Times. Those that know

Gerry understand his love for the social aspects of the hobby.

Gerry has been a member of literally countless DX clubs over the vears serving in a variety of capacities. He was the second Executive Secretary of the now defunct ANARC. Currently, he is a member of the Committee to Preserve Radio Verifications (CPRV). Also, Gerry was a member of the first two Administrative Committees for the North American DX Championships. He ioined NASWA in the early 1960's and has been active in club affairs ever since. Today Gerry is a member of the club's Country List Committee and Executive Council.

After a career in broadcasting, Gerry formed Tiare Publications in 1986. Since its inception, Tiare has been known for its wide variety of excellent titles concerning the shortwave spectrum. Recent additions include "Coast Guard Radio" and "The Warship Directory" both by James T. Pogue. Gerry has written for some well-known publications such as "The World Radio Television Handbook" and is a staff writer for Popular Communications Magazine, Soldier of Fortune and Passport to World Band Radio.

Forum: Forty years as shortwave broadcast DXer is a long time. How did you get started in DXing?

Dexter: Radio has fascinated me for as long as I can remember. When I got my own first radio I was enthralled to discover I could pick up WWL in New Orleans, KDKA, etc. Sometime later one of my friends was given a shortwave radio and the first time we fooled around with it I was hooked.

Forum: Who were some of the key figures or names from the early days that helped shape you as a DXer?

Dexter: Oh, Ken Board, who wrote the shortwave column in Radio Television News and Hank Bennett who did the shortwave column in the Newark News Radio Club bulletin. Don Jensen and I established a friendship very early on and we exchanged

a great amount of tips and information. A lot of it was just learning on your own. Aside from the clubs and the WRTH there was almost nothing else available in the way of books or magazines.

Forum: What were some of your early DX accomplishments or achievements? What made them so special to you?

Dexter: It's hard to remember any from the very first years — maybe there weren't any. Later I can recall sitting up 'til after 4am to hear the Fiji Broadcasting Commission, more or less stumbling across the Gilbert and Ellice Islands Broadcasting Service on 4912.5. And, of course, the unexpected arrival of newstations which put new countries on the air — Galapagos, AFAN, FEBA. Oh — and the night Turks and Caicos was on with hurricane warnings!

Forum: Today the British Forces Broadcasting Service is broadcasting special programs on shortwave to the Gulf region. What shortwave stations and international incidents do you recall from prior years that hold a special significance to you as a SWBC DXer?

Dexter: I suppose shortwave activity surrounding the Soviet invasion of Hungary in 1956 and Czechoslovakia in 1968. Radio Swan and all of the clandestine radio activity around the Bay of Pigs invasion and later. Much more recently the Falklands War

(BFBS was active on shortwave at that time, too). And, in the early 60's, there were all those African countries becoming independent which brought about station changes or totally new stations coming on the air.

Forum: Every DXer has some "war story" concerning the chase for those elusive QSL's from rare stations. Please share with Forum readers some of your favorite tales.

Dexter: The 15 year effort to get Burma still stands out. The last couple of years I worked through someone at the US embassy and was astounded to learn that it took the approval of the equivalent of our Secretary of State just to issue one QSL! The effort to get China to QSL sites and provincial outlets was a very interesting effort, too, though I think the timing — which matched the end of Mao and increased openings to the West had more to do with it than anything.

Forum: It's been said that ANARC stopped functioning as a hobby-related organization long before its recent demise. Looking back on your experience as a former ANARC Executive Secretary, how did that organization change from its early days until its termination at September's ANARC Convention?

Dexter: Actually, I think ANARC improved steadily over its first decade or two, albeit with some ups and downs in there. There was a period of several years when I just didn't pay much attention to ANARC and I guess there were too many others with the same failing. I think ANARC's efforts with the ECPA, the Woodpecker Project and WARC were very good. But, for whatever reason, ANARC just didn't draw enough enthusiastic and capable people to keep it going and growing.

Forum: I'm sure Forum readers would be interested in hearing about the equipment in your shack. What equipment are you currently using?

Dexter: I have an NRD-525 and an NRD-515. Also a Drake R4B, although it declines to operate at the moment.

Forum: Many shortwave listeners get mistyeyed over old tube radios. What memorable pieces of equipment did you own from the tube set era? What was your first receiver?

Dexter: Tube radios had personality and warmth. They were friends. Today's receivers — however many wonderful things they can do — are "cold." Calculators with knobs.

I started with a Hallicrafters S-38B, then an S40-B. Next came a Hammarlund HQ-129X (I wish I still had that!), an HQ160, HQ180, Drake R4B and Racal RA17.

Forum: What part of the world is your favorite DX target? How has this area changed over the years?

Dexter: Latin America has been my favorite DX area for a long time. Unfortunately most Latin countries, especially in Central America, have far fewer stations now than they did 30 years ago. So there are a lot fewer new targets for someone who has been at it awhile and subsequent drop in interest, or at least in activity.

Forum: You are well known for your extensive collection of Peruvian QSL's, some 120+ veries to date. When did you get started DXing and QSLing Peru? What motivated you to "attack" Peru?

Dexter: I didn't look at Peru any differently than any other Latin country, as far as DXing was concerned, until about 10 years ago when the government there loosened things up and there began to be a steady stream of new Peruvians coming on the air. There were times when there must have been 60 or more stations which were active or semi-active at a time. Peru was where the action was so that's where I pointed the radio.

Forum: How has the economic downturn of the late 1980's affected QSLing activities from Latin America?

Dexter: Who can say for sure? I assume everything is more difficult for these stations, especially in Peru with the runaway inflation, the guerrilla problems and such. I read somewhere that a malaise, a "what's the use" outlook is prevalent and you certainly can't blame them. QSL's must be very far down on the list of any radio operator's concerns. Quite a number haven't even managed to stay on the air. All I know is that

I haven't had a QSL out of Peru in at least a year.

Forum: Without a doubt, most DXers consider you the foremost expert in QSLing shortwave broadcast stations. Eventually this lead you to writing your famous book — Secrets of Successful QSL'ing. What inspired you to write the book? Was it a difficult undertaking? Is there an update planned in the near future?

Dexter: The book wasn't difficult to write. I guess it was just sitting up there waiting to come out. I'd only seen reception reporting and QSLs covered in the occasional book chapter or club article — there wasn't a single source that covered all the bases. No, I don't expect it will be updated any time soon.

Forum: Have you dabbled in other aspects of the DXing hobby such as medium wave or utility DXing?

Dexter: Oh, yes. I have had forays into utilities, amateur DX listening BCB, FM, TV but never for very long and I always came back to SWBC. I haven't gotten outside of SWBC for quite awhile now.

Forum: In 1986 you formed Tiare Publications (P.O. Box 493, Lake Geneva, WI 53147) and began publishing hobby-related books. What lead up to your decision to launch Tiare?

Dexter: Well, I wrote Secrets of Successful QSLing "on spec", thinking it would be a natural. But none of the hobby publishers were interested so I decided to publish it on my own. It was very well received and so it wasn't hard to make the decision to bring out further books.

Forum: Your publication Shortwave Goes to School — A Teacher's Guide to Using Shortwave Radio in the Classroom by Myles Mustoe created a lot of interest in shortwave radio when it was released in 1989. How did the idea for the book develop and what was the reaction from outside the hobby community to the book?

Dexter: If I recall correctly, I saw a mention of someone who was using shortwave as a learning tool in the classroom and it seemed like there might be a book in that. I was fortunate to find Myles as he was one of the

people who were into that technique. I'm pleased with the reaction to the book — it's had some very favorable publicity outside the hobby and we've filled orders from schools in all parts of the country, plus several foreign countries.

Forum: Over the years, you have collected numerous NASWA awards. What are some of your favorite NASWA awards?

Dexter: I guess the Master DX Centurian and Senior Peruvian. When are you going to come out with one for clandestines?

Forum: You have a very special interest in clandestine radio broadcasts. In the early 1980's you wrote the very popular Clandestine Confidential and currently edit and publish the Clandestine Confidential Newsletter. How did your interest in clandestine broadcasts develop? What were some of the early clandestine stations that peaked your interest the most?

Dexter: I've always liked mysteries, spy stories, intrigue, foreign affairs — and clandestines have all of that. Even so, I don't think I really got into them until we had that string of anti-Castro stations which came on in the 70's (Alpha 66, Libertad Cubana, LV de Juventud and several others).

Forum: If you were starting from scratch, what area of the world would you pursue as your first DX target? Why?

Dexter: I'm not sure how much hardcore DXing I'd really do. If I were in such a position, though I'd probably focus on Africa — it's got more of a foreign flavor than Europe.

Forum: Occasionally, DXers have to ignore political influences to achieve their DX goals. Were there any stations you encountered while DXing that made you think twice about sending off a reception report?

Dexter: That's an easy question. No.

Forum: A handful of international broadcasters complain about receiving reception reports from listeners. Most appear to be quite receptive to QSL requests. In general, how has the attitude of international broadcasters changed over the years? Dexter: I think a few of the international broadcasters — those who've discontinued QSLs — see QSLing as a bigger deal than it has to be. I'd wager that most of us would be happy with a no-data card if the only other choice was no QSL policy. Issuing a no-data card can't be any more time-consuming or expensive than mailing out program schedules and/or the station replying to you to say that they don't QSL! But, whatever the reasons, a few stations have gone to a no QSL policy, a few have made us jump through hoops to obtain them which, again, is fine, given the fact that the other choice might be a no-OSL policy. It was very gratifying to see the Christian Science Network drop their initial no-data card policy in favor of individual cards for each of their stations. I hope all who send reception reports are thanking them.

Forum: If you could change three things about any aspect of the shortwave DXing hobby today what would they be?

Dexter: Fewer half-million watt transmitters. Fewer frequencies for each station (equaling more room for smaller voices). And active listener/DXer groups in every state!

Forum: Is it true that you once verified the infamous hoax Radio Nibi Nibi?

Dexter: You're mistaking that one for Radio Nada Nada.

Forum: Gerry, thanks for taking the time to share your insights into the hobby with the DXer's Forum readers.

Dexter: It was my pleasure. Thank you!

UPDATE: RADIO FOR THE PRINT HANDICAPPED - DOWN UNDER

We are indeed fortunate to have a special update from David Clark, Chairman of the Ontario DX Association, on the Print Handicapped stations. These stations broadcast in the grey zone of 1620-1630 kHz, considered shortwave by some and medium wave by others. They have been heard across North America, under excellent conditions, and represent a prize long-haul catch. Thanks for giving us the "low-down", Dave! --Ed.

The inaugural broadcast of ZLXA, New Zealand's Radio for the Print Handicapped on shortwave - 3935 khz (parallel 2XA on 1602 medium wave) took place on August 25, 1990. ZLXA is using a 1 kW transmitter with a V-beam directional north-south to provide coverage to the entire country.

Their announced schedule is as follows: Sunday at 0600-0900 and Monday/Wednesday/Thursday at 0630-1000 UTC, although I believe all times would now be one hour earlier, since New Zealand moved to summer daylight time on October 7th. To date, loggings in North America have been rare, although my DXing partner, Cedric Marshall and I are quite sure we have heard them on several occasions so far here in Newmarket, Ontario.

Meanwhile, in Australia, there have been a number of recent developments relating to their radio services for the print handicapped which, unfortunately, do not auger well for DXers in North America (with the possible exception of the West Coast) wanting to log these stations. To put the current transitional state of affairs into focus, a little background information seems appropriate.

In Australia, Radio for the Print Handicapped (RPH) stations have been established in a number of the major cities under the Wireless and Telegraphy Act and heretofore have been confined to operating on 1620 and 1629 kHz on a shared frequency basis, using a power of 500 watts. Stations in Brisbane, Canberra and Hobart have shared 1620, while their counterparts in Sydney and Melbourne have shared the 1629 channel.

The stations are operated entirely by volunteers and their primary source of funding is public subscriptions and contributions. It is estimated that there are some two million people in Australia benefiting from the services provided by the RPH stations - persons who are blind or visually impaired, physically impaired by other debilitating illnesses, intellectually impaired, and people from non-English speaking backgrounds who are able to understand but not read printed material. Thus, the primary source of program material is newpapers and magazine articles which are read over the air. The objective is to help relieve these people of their feelings of isolation from normal communication through the immediacy of radio.

Recently, the Australian Department of Transport and Communications has determined that steps should be taken to overcome the problems of low power and shared usage of these out-of-band frequencies which are not always covered by standard broadcast receivers. Steps have now begun to allow the RPH stations to occupy channels within the standard broadcast band (or the FM band) with increased

power to improve their audience reach.

Speaking of "audience reach", it is quite amazing that the signals of these 500 watt stations have actually made it across the Pacific to North America with some degree of regularity, especially for DXers living near the West Coast. On Christmas morning back in December, 1988, Cedric and I were thrilled to discover the RPH stations could actually make it all the way to our combined shack in my barn here in Newmarket (and I have heard of a few loggings by other DXers in ECNA too). Of course, the key to hearing these stations here in the East is the fact that they have been sitting on clear channels outside the BCB and so far, the FCC in the United States has not moved ahead to grant operating licences to domestic stations in the expanded band above 1600 kHz.

We have since made a number of RPH loggings, although it has often been difficult to be sure which stations we were hearing on the respective channels. Indeed, on several occasions, we could hear both outlets mixing on 1629 (it turns out that Sydney was typically dominant) and all three stations on 1620 (Canberra tending to be dominant). Last March, Cedric logged and subsequently verified both Sydney and Canberra!

Although audio tends to break through with more regularity on 1629, Cedric's tape of "1620 here in Canberra" on March 16th is truly outstanding. I remember the morning well: it was the day I was preparing to leave for the Grayland DXpedition which Guy Atkins wrote about for "Listener's Corner" in the May 1990 issue of The Journal. I emerged from the house and wandered into the barn about 15 minutes

after the station's fadeout. Rats!

It is not surprising that the RPH signals from the South Pacific should be heard best during the equinoctial periods - this is consistent with DXers' experience on the Tropical Bands. As noted, last March proved to be productive and at date of writing, several good October openings have been experienced as I shall reference below.

Getting back to the present situation, the move of RPH radio away from 1620 & 1629 has begun. It is likely that by sometime early in 1991, all stations will have vacated the present channels, and thus will become most difficult or impossible (at least in the case of those which move to FM) for us to hear ever again.

Given that implied urgency from a North American DXing perspective, I have pieced together the present status as best I could from a variety of sources. Here's the rundown (as of October 15, 1990) with the caution that the situation may well have changed by the time this information reaches you:

* 1620 kHz *

1PPP-CANBERRA: There was an indication in Australian DX News in May/90 that a move to FM was planned. This move was not expected until 1991, according to an information sheet provided by the Australian High Commission in Ottawa. However, on the September 13th edition of Media Network, Arthur Cushen confirmed that the move had already taken place (I presume in August). Kiss Canberra

goodbye!

4RPH-BRISBANE: WRTH/90 and Australian DX News in May/90 stated that a move to 1296 kHz was planned. Arthur Cushen confirms this. The move will likely take place before the end of 1990, especially as this is now a clear channel, the listed Australian and New Zealand stations having already moved to other frequency assignments. Recently, on October 8th, Cedric pulled good audio from 1620 at 1100+; then on October 14th, we heard both stations mixing at about equal levels. Soon after 1100 (and about one-half hour before local sunrise here), one of the RPH's briefly rose on top quite clearly with some form of radio drama but we did not get a specific ID. With Canberra gone, one would think based on relative location that Brisbane would dominate, but Hobart, being on the southern island of Tasmania, would surely be the preferred catch. You may yet find one or the other if not both signals present.

7RPH-HOBART: Australian DX News in May/90 stated a move to FM was planned. More recent information as outlined by Arthur Cushen is that 1341 kHz is the target channel. Subject to the accuracy of the Australian High Commission data sheet at hand, the indication is that this move won't happen until 1991 - but look what

happened to Canberra. Now's the time!

* 1629 kHz *

2RPH-SYDNEY: According to a letter which Cedric received with his verie, the station manager said that a move to 1539 kHz with 1 kW would take place in mid-August. This is seen as a temporary move until early 1992 when another channel assignment with 5 kW is anticipated.

The move has not taken place as originally planned but one must still suspect it will happen soon. Also on the September 13th edition of Media Network, Arthur Cushen noted that Sydney "remains on 1629". Again on October 8th, Cedric got a good tape of Sydney at 1100+; and then on October 14th I monitored them from 1055 to 1120

with solid audio (best as I've ever heard them!). Go for it.

3RPH-MELBOURNE: This station officially moved as planned on August 19th to 1179 kHz where it is now using 5 kW (3KZ in Melbourne vacated this frequency and moved to FM). During the initial period after the 3RPH move, broadcasts were simulcast over 1629 but this came to an end about September 20th, I believe. West Coasters might be able to nail this down on the new channel, where the only serious competition appears to be a 50 kW outlet in Osaka, Japan.

Perhaps as they do move, all the remaining RPH stations will follow the example of Melbourne and simulcast on their original channels for some days or weeks after their official frequency changes take place, although I wouldn't count on it. As they say in the stock market, "timing is everything" and there isn't much time left. Good

luck!

Latin Destinations

lola amigos! Welcome to another edition of Latin Destinations. Most rural radio stations in Latin America devote part of their broadcast day to "advisos", "comunicados" or "servicios sociales" (the name varies from region to region), which are simply short community and personal announcements that the stations are (ususally) paid to air. This month, I'm going to follow that example and start out with two "advisos". First, on October 2, my wife Theresa gave birth to our first "harmonic", Rebecca Joy Briesmoore. As I write this, just a few days later. I haven't yet found out how good of a night-time DX alarm clock she is, but from what I hear, she is probably the most effective kind!

Our second "adviso" concerns the contest questions in the August column. The first question asked for the name of the only 90MB Bolivian station reported in the NASWA column for the prior six months. Don Weber of Westlake, Ohio won the drawing on this one, with the correct answer of Radio San Miguel, 3310. The second question was a real tough one, and I wasn't surprised when no one submitted the correct answer. The first SWBC station in Latin America was TI4NRH, Heredia, Costa Rica. TI4NRH has been off the air for nearly fifty years, but while in Costa Rica a few months back I was able to look up the descendants of the man who founded it, still living in the same house. It's an interesting story, but will have to wait to a later date. For the curious, the first SWBC station in the world was KDKA Pittsburgh. The next three (I'm unsure of exact order) were WGY. Schnectady; the BBC; and Philips in Holland.

Focus On Venezuela

With the winter DX season now underway, I thought this month we would make this a true beginners' column and focus on one of the easiest LAm targets, Venezuela. Experienced LAm DX aficionados should still read on, however, as there is a bit of

info below that may help your station counts.

Venezuela has always been a favorite LAm DX target of mine because when I started LAm DXing in 1972, the sixty meter band was chock-full of Venezuelans - almost one every ten kilohertz. There were also several stations on 90 and 49 meters, but I cut my LAm DX teeth going after the YVs on 60 meters. In fact, my first tropical band LAm station logged and station QSLed was now-inactive Radio Barquisimeto on 4990 kHz. Unfortunately, Venezuelan activity on SW gradually declined through the 70s and into the mid-80s. In some other LAm countries, similar declines have been partially abated by new stations coming on the air, particularly from more remote regions. This hasn't been the case in Venezuela; only one new station powered up during the 80s (although there have been rumors of at least two more for several years).

Currently there are about a half-dozen "regular" stations, and another eight or ten stations that are heard with varying degrees of irregularity. However, Venezuelans are not that difficult to hear (assuming they are on the air). First, Venezuela is the closest South American country to North America. Secondly, Venezuelan stations tend to be larger, commercially more successful, and more powerful than their Andean counterparts to the South. Lastly, technical standards in Venezuela seem to be much higher than in most of the rest of Latin America.

Most Venezuelan SW stations are on the air from 1000-0400 UTC (6am to midnight, local time). They are much more likely to sign-on early than stay on late; several have 0900 sign-ons. That schedule gives North American DXers two chances at Venezuelan DX, the first from around your local sunset until 0400 signoff, and the second from 1000 until Venezuelan sunrise (which usually precedes sunrise in most of North America). On a good mid-winter day on the East Coast, it is occasionally possible to hear the

60MB Venezuelans as early as 2000, if there isn't too much interference from the Africans

The Stations

All of the "best bets" for Venezuela are in the 60 meterband. My two favorites, Ecos del Torbes on 4980 and Radio Tachira on 4830, are both in the city of San Cristobal on the Colombian border. Ecos del Torbes is so well heard that several years ago Radio Earth investigated buying transmitter time from them. The anti-Castro clandestine network La Voz del CID, took that a step further and actually did buy an hour a day for a while.

The most important station in Venezuela is Radio Rumbos, which operates two 100 Kw AM stations on 570 and 670 kHz, each from a different transmitter site. Rumbos is also the anchor station of Venezuela's largest radio network, and their newscasts, with a doorbell-like chime between each item, can occasionally be heard on other Venezuelan stations. Radio Rumbos also operates two 10 Kw SW transmitters on 4970 and 9660 kHz. The latter one is usually best heard in the mornings when the European QRM is gone. Few DXers, however, know that the two SW frequencies, like the MW ones, come from different transmitter sites, and thus may be counted as two seperate stations. 4970, and 570 MW, come from the site in Villa de Cura, Aragua state, about 50 miles 9660, and 670 MW, outside Caracas. broadcast from the main site in the Distrito Federal. These transmitter sites are listed in the WRTH (although not PWBR) and have been confirmed by Venezuelan DXers who visited Radio Rumbos.

Radio Elsewhere in Venezuela, Continental on 4940 has usually been active and easy to hear since it began SW broadcasts about two years ago, although as I write this it has been off the air for a few weeks. Radio Valera on 4840 is much weaker, but can be heard with a little trying. Radio Los Andes, also called Radio Mil Cuarenta (1040) after its AM frequency, can sometimes be heard on 6011 variable, especially in the morning, but QRM can be a problem. Venezuela's all-Spanish international service can sometimes be heard on 9540 kHz, as long as the more powerful intenational broadcasters make room for it. Of course, we shouldn't forget the Venezuelan version of WWV, YVTO on 5000 kHz. In the East, YVTO can be heard in the early evening before WWV fades in on 5 MHz. Otherwise you may have to do a little careful listening to get this underneath WWV. Finally, there are a lot of inactive Venezuelan's that occasionally turn on their SW transmitters for a few days, a few weeks, or even a few months. Some that have done that recently are Radio Libertador, 3245; La Voz del Tigre (Radio 980), 3255; Radio Mara, 3275; and Radio Maracaibo. 4860.

Venezuelan stations on the whole don't seem to be much better than the rest of Latin America when it comes to OSLing, but the more easily heard stations are generally good verifiers. Ecos del Torbes, Radio Rumbos, Radio Continental, YVTO, and Radio Valera all have their own OSL cards. Radio Tachira and Radio Los Andes are good letter verifiers. As usual, write a good, polite Spanish report, and include a few local souvenirs. Return postage doesn't appear to be quite as important with Venezuelans, as the stations are better off financially than many stations elsewhere in Latin America. Still, you could enclose some mint stamps or a dollar bill for extra insurance. As usual with small LAm stations, don't bother with difficult-to-exchange IRCs, though!

One Man's Garbage Is Another Man's Treasure

Last month in "International Band Loggings", fellow editior Wallace Treibel had an interesting table of solar activity figures. He noted that K-indices of 1 or 0 are "best listening" and of 4 and 5 as "worst listening". That is usually true, especially for the higher frequency bands, but don't automatically write-off high K-indices. High K-indices also bring enhanced Latin-American tropical band and medium wave reception. So, the next time a geo-magnetic storm and high K-indices interfere with your reception of Radio Sweden or Radio Budapest, tune down to 60 meters, and give Latin America a try!

GOOD NEWS!

You may remember that last month I was complaining bitterly about major publishing houses only keeping "our kinda books" in print for about a year. I was particularly upset by the loss of DXing with the Experts, Ed Noll's Easy Up Antennas and of course, the close out of Helms' super Shortwave Listening Handbook by the publishing giant Prentice Hall. Well, the Library just received an interesting letter from Harry Helms. Harry thanked me for my comments in the October column and then went on:

"You know in those macho action movies how the hero, supposedly left for dead by the bad guys, suddenly shows up at the end to dispatch the villains? Same principle at work here. This year I asked for, and received back, the rights to The Shortwave Listening Handbook from Prentice Hall, Work is now finished (except for last minute changes to accommodate the RBI and situations) on the revised edition, renamed Shortwave Listening Guidebook. Enclosed are some page proofs for your review; the entire book has been produced on Macintosh systems using Microsoft Word, Quark Xpress page layout software, and a four-color scanner for halftones. The final page count will be 320 pages in a 6x9° format, and it will be in softcover. Expected arrival from the printer will be in January, and it will be available from leading SWL dealers and the other usual suspects. It will be a "DX/SWL Press" book from High Text, a new publishing venture in which I'm a partner." I'll send more details as the date approaches.

Well, all of that was really good news, and the page proofs that Harry included looked super. I sure look forward to the January, 1991 publication date.

MORE GOOD NEWS!

Since Harry is a pro in both the writing and publication of "our kinda books," the latter half of his letter was even more interesting:

"On another topic, the reason why publishers are in so much distress has nothing to do with book inventories or tax laws; it's marketing-related. General interest (trade) book publishing is dominated by the major chain stores such as Dalton, Waldenbooks, Crown, etc. If they pass on a book, it's dead in the water. Established publishers have yet to figure out how to exploit niche and secondary markets instead of relying upon the chains. For example, I had to send sample copies of my Prentice Hall book to CRB, Universal. etc., myself since P H wouldn't do it despite several requests on my part. The advent of microcomputer-based publishing systems means that one needn't go to an established publisher to get a professional looking book: if you have to do most of the marketing effort yourself, why not just go ahead and publish it vourself? I think we're going to see a proliferation of these smaller "personal presses" in the years ahead. The result will be more books on more topics available, and that'll be good for all of us."

Well, thanks Harry. My own experience as part of the fine tuning's Proceedings effort tends to bear out your viewpoint. stopped to think about all the fine books from Tiare...from the Language Labs to the Coast Guard book, and the books from CRB Research, and some of the superb single book publishing efforts. My all time favorite of the single book efforts is Ray Communications Receivers--the Golden Years. and my current bedtime companion (well, my other companion!) is How to Fix Nice Old Radios by Ed Romney, also self-published. The list of currently or recently available books of interest to radio enthusiasts is surely at an all time high. The micropublishing/niche publishing phenomenon is absolutely the best thing I've seen happen to the radio hobby in many a moon (and then there is Havana Moon and Moonbeam Press doing some superb work, Moon Publications out in California whose work will knock the eyes out of any Asia radio freq and Moon over Miami and... enuf, enuf!!

BACK DOWN TO EARTH

The 'second hobby' of many of us is maps, cartography and geography. Several NASWAns have checked in recently with more great suggestions related to maps and atlases. Ed Janusz has noticed a Revised Edition of The Map Catalogue, primarily a reference, listing map sources in dozens of categories from "jigsaw puzzles" to "congressional district boundaries." It's a gold mine for the researcher, but with many illustrations and a number of useful essays such as tips on choosing an atlas and an alltoo-brief- survey of the alternatives to the Mercator projection, The Map Catalog should be enjoyed by any armchair traveler or geography freak. It costs \$27.50.

If you're planning a vacation, it's always worthwhile to get a detailed map ahead of time, and this book will point you toward tourist-oriented maps and detailed street maps. (For the latter, Ed says that Champion does a good job across the USA). The "water maps" and "sky maps" sections will be valuable to utility DXers, and while the majority of the sources listed here are American and Canadian, SWBC DXers who need detailed maps of places like Peru will be guided to good publications and a host of retail outlets. This is one of Ed's favorite books.

Karl Forth of Chicago has also spotted an atlas of interest to our Latin specialists. The Atlas Moderno Universal is a handy paper-bound atlas entirely in Spanish. It features detailed maps of all Latin American countries, making it especially useful to DXers. There are also some interesting "differences." (The Falklands are labeled Islas Malvinas and shown as part of Argentina). The atlas also has good maps of European countries and the rest of the world, and is small and thin enough to make a good radio shack reference. Karl says that he's seen this atlas at Rand McNally book stores.

A QUEST, A QUEST!

Our recent discussions of the two software packages which will draw azimuthal-equidistant world maps has generated a flurry of requests for sources of currently available wall-sized azi-equi maps centered on various major cities in North America. Joe Smolka of Albany, NY has a azi-eqi centered on NYC, published by NOAA 15 years ago. Joe said that the

beautiful old map needs replacement. He has wandered the halls of The Bureaucracy with no luck. Pete Tutak of Whidbey Island, WA wrote almost simultaneously about azi-equi's published by the (U.S.) Defense Mapping Agency. Pete got his at a commercial map store in Seattle. I thought that we had scored a journalistic touchdown until I contacted DMA.... they no longer publish ANY azi-equi maps. Does anyone know a current source for wall sized azi-equi maps??? HELP!!!

TO THE STACKS

Tom Daly of Pomona, NY wrote recently to highlight one of my own personal books called Ring of Fire by Lawrence and Lorne Blair. This is the story of two brothers who moved from England to Bali and spent 10 years wandering Indonesia. Their adventures included sailing with pirates, living among cannibals in Irian Jaya, investigating the spiritual world of Bali, visiting the Toraja people who believe their ancestors came from ancient starships, searching for the lost "dream-wandering" Dyaks in Borneo and finding and filming the Greater Bird of Paradise.

The book contains numerous color and b/w photos and is written in a very interesting, and entertaining manner. The Blairs frequently highlight the spiritual aspects of Indonesian life and this provides a different view of the people and their customs. Karl and I both highly recommend this book to all who are interested in adventure/travel stories in general and to Indonesian aficionados in particular. This story was televised by PBS in a 4-parts of their series called "Adventure."

A second suggestion from Tom (and from Kevin Atkins) is called Equator by Thurston Clarke and is the story of Mr. Clarke's 3-yr journey around the world by traveling on or near the Equator. In 1984 he started out in Brazil and went east through Gabon, Zaire, Kenya, Somalia, Indonesia, Abemana, Christmas Island, Ecuador and finished his trip back in Brazil. Along the way he met a lot of interesting local people, talking to teachers, truck drivers, doctors, government workers and even met the king of a South Pacific island and asked a lot of penetrating questions about these people's lives. The result is a book that presents a very realistic view of everyday life in a variety of third world countries.

Pack in September Dr. DX began his last Listener's Classroom with the statement, "Strange things happen sometimes." Well, whether he knew it or not then, a strange thing was about to happen to me.

On Bastille Day 1972 my wife and I were living in Morocco in a little town not far from Tangier. I'd been in the Navy about nine years and knew a little about electronic communications. On that hot sultry day we wandered over to the new store that had opened out at the transmitter site. (Yes, fearless UTE DX'er, our call was "CNL" but couldn't reply to reception reports!) There I saw a Zenith TransOceanic D7000Y and have been in the hobby ever since. Although I don't use it anymore, I still have that one receiver out of the many that I've gone through over the years.

A few months later the Arabs and the Israeli's went at it again tooth and nail, fang and claw. Our local AFRS station prudently would not air the news concerning the flare-up and I had found out enough by then, thanks to NASWA, especially Dan Ferguson, to tune in VOA, the BBC, and others to keep score. The Moroccan contingent was slaughtered to the last man and we feared for our safety. But, we went through the first of many tense periods, and the TransOceanic kept us up-to-date. During the latter part of my Moroccan tour I'd started my own DX NewsLetter which the base newspaper dutifully published twice each month.

After returning to the States I got a call from Dan F. and Ed Shaw who convinced me that I should try my hand at editing "Short Wave Center," as it was called then. Al Niblack was editing FLASHSHEET and NASWA dues were only \$10.00 per year. I

began my first column in January 1975 and handed it over to Jerry Lineback in September as I was off to Sardinia. Incidentally, Charlie Loudenboomer was the rage and Larry Magne was the "Clandestine Bulletin" editor. Bob Zabot, whom I met at the recent ANARC/ARO Convention in Virginia Beach, was the QSL editor.

By the time ANARC allowed as how I could handle the job of Chairman of the Frequency Recommendation Committee my wife was reading up on how to sue for alienation of affections. (Now that I have a computer, she is reviewing her notes.) When I became Utilities Editor with DSWCI her eyes flashed so fast I thought it was morse code via flashing light and was going to use it as a log entry....

"Politics, religion, and sex have often been regarded as 'forbidden' topics," I naively began. "...(I)f the subjects have anything to do with short wave, send it in...and if it is printable, I'll print it." Well, that still stands. "Print, write, type, draw I do not care how you get the information to (me), but get it here!" Especially from the new NASWA members with your questions and comments.

I can take mail through the fearless USPS, CompuServe, GEnie, even through NASWA HQ, just get it to me. If I can decipher your writing, you get published in this column! As a middle school teacher I've seen plenty of writing styles!

And that's the strange thing that has happened to me: I'm back in the pages of FRENDX -- oops! I mean The Journal and I'm glad to be home again...and, coincidentally, nine years after retiring from the Navy. Some things just go full circle. 73's!

JUST THE FAX, PLEASE

This month's column is an anniversary of sorts for me. It was about this time one year ago that I wrote a column from the relative discomfort of my motel room. The Loma Prieta Earthquake had destroyed my home. Your letters, calls, and personal well wishes were overwhelming, and the memory of those kind acts will stay with me always... as will memories of the loss, destruction, and suffering I saw around me. Please do me a favor and take a moment to remember those who didn't get through the quake as well as I did.

In September we took a look at an enjoyable and less often seen side of shortwave listening - RTTY. This month we are going to move into what I believe may be the most unusual and interesting aspect of shortwave listening: FAX reception.

In these modern times the name "FAX" has become almost common place. You can send FAX messages from the local drug store to someone who is presumable as anxious to receive it as you are to send it. You may not realize it, but you are using technology that has evolved over 70 years, not counting the other advances its progress depended on.

What Does "FAX" Mean?

FAX is actually an acronym for "facsimile," which of course means a copy of something. Back in the 1920's news of important events could be sent across the country in a matter of hours, either by telegraph or by radio. But pictures of events lagged the news by days. Photos taken at the scene were rushed by trains (which often contained darkrooms for the purpose) to the opposite coast. In some rare cases the photos were developed and flown all the way by airplane. Either way, thought, it could take up to eighty hours (roughly 31/3 days) for the photos to get there. After the San Francisco Earthquake of 1906, it

took over five days for photos of the disaster to reach New York. For a public anxious to see what was being reported, this was intolerable. As with almost all advances in technology, American ingenuity rose to the occasion. A device was invented that would allow a photo to be scanned and converted into electrical impulses. An identical unit could receive the electrical pulses and convert them back into a facsimile, or copy, of the original. With a relatively decent phone system already in place, it was a marriage made in heaven. What the Teletype® did for printed matter, the FAX machine did for pictures. Still, the new machines were very complicated and expensive, and coordinating the sharing of photos between newspapers was difficult.

AP Wirephoto® And FAX Come Of Age

In an attempt to improve the situation, the Associated Press Wirephoto Service was created. Originally a syndicate of about 12 newspapers, the service was able to supply papers across the country with photos of events as they occured. The original network consisted of about 40 FAX units. One of the first photos sent on the network was a munitions explosion that occured only one hour after the system was put into operation!

As with Teletype, FAX machines were soon connected to radio networks, making international news photos a reality. It is hard to imagine what it must have been like before this time, having to wait weeks for photos of events in Europe.

How Did It Work?

Until the advent of the microcomputer, all FAX machines worked on a revolving drum principle. Each machine had a stainless steel cylinder, with two springs that functioned as "rubber bands" to hold the photo wrapped

around the cylinder. A high-intensity light source was focused on the drum, with the reflection picked-up by a phototube (a nonsolid state photocell). As the drum revolved. the light source and phototube travelled on a carriage across the width of the photo. Each little "pixel" of light and dark in the photocreated a corresponding electrical signal. It was all either black or white, with no shading inbetween. Since press photos were all printed in black and white anyway, this presented no problem. At the other end, an identical machine would be set to "receive," and in place of the photo, a special thermal paper was placed on the drum. The drum would revolve in synchronization with the sending unit, and as the carriage on the receiving unit moved across the paper, the incoming electrical signals were converted into electrical discharges. Each discharge would turn the FAX paper black. A photo could take up to five minutes (depending on size) to send. There were obvious drawbacks to this system. There was a rather severe limitation on the size of photo that could be sent (around 6"x6" was common), and of course color photos wouldn't travel at all well

Room For Improvement

The development of the microprocessor chip revolutionized many areas of electronics, and none benefitted better than FAX technology. The modern made it possible to send very complicated data quickly at very high speeds. The microprocessor also made it possible to synchronize the sending and receiving of photos at the new, higher speeds. The modern FAX can send entire sheets of documents and photos, as well as material that isn't even printed before it's sent. This means that satellites can send photos of the Earth, taken by an electronic "camera," and send these to ground stations in a matter of minutes. Very highly detailed photos can be sent. Ground stations, too, can send weather charts across the globe. Here is where the fun comes in. We, too, can receive these photos and charts with comparitively simple and reasonably priced systems!

What Can You See On Shortwave?

What can you copy from the shortwave bands? An absolute wealth of information is sent on regular schedules all over the world. Press photos have already been mentioned. In addition to these there are WEFAX weather charts, sent by the National Weather Service, and GOES satellite photos - infrared and visible light photos of the Earth taken by geostationary satellites. Reception of all this is free for the taking.

Real World Examples

We will examine two commercially available FAX decoding units, which will give you a good starting point to do some comparison shopping. I should note that I do not have any interest in either manufacturer, and receive no compensation for discussing their products.

PC HF Facsimiletm


Easily the most inexpensive FAX system available is the PC HF Facsimiletm system. supplied by Software Systems Consulting, 1303 S. Ola Vista, San Clemente, California 92672. Don't let the suggested price of \$99 plus tax and shipping fool you. This system is surprisingly good! The unit consists of a demodulator, which plugs into the serial port of your IBM® compatible computer, and software to be loaded into the computer. The kit also includes a cassette tape of instructions and sample FAX signals to make recognizing the real thing easier. The secret of this unit is the demodulator. It is totally contained in a DB-25 plug/cover assembly, and receives its power from the computer. Coming from the connector is a two-conductor cable that terminates in a miniature phone plug, ready to plug into the earphone jack of your receiver. It is recommended that you purchase a "Y" fitting, so that you can listen to the received signal as you tune the system.

Novel Features


The most novel aspect of this system is that it provides a tuning oscilloscope right on your computer monitor! As you may recall from previous columns about RTTY, a tuning scope is almost a necessity, and the same is true for FAX. To receive a FAX transmission, you simply tune a signal (active frequencies are provided with the system), use the on-screen menu to set parameters, and sit back and watch while your monitor fills with a picture. The picture can be saved on disk. Another useful function is the "autostart" feature. Once you have found a favorite frequency, you can count on transmissions at regularly schedule

times. With autostart, you set all the parameters ahead of time, and the system will automatically copy each picture that is sent until the command is cancelled. No more staying-up until the wee hours of the morning to set things up.


Software Systems Consulting also offers a PC-SWLtm system (also \$99.00), that allows the reception of RTTY and CW signals with many of the same features as the HF-FAX. PC-SWL also has an on-screen tuning scope, and in addition has a spectrum display, that allows you to analyze the RTTY signal being received. A supplied software algorithm can be called-up a the touch of a button, and automatically calculates the speed, shift, and type of most received signals, and configures the system for these settings. 

The second system we will examine is a new offering from Universal Radio, 1280 Alda Dr., Reynoldsburg, Ohio 43068. Universal Radio has long been known for the professionalgrade M-900 and M-7000 stand-alone FAX/RTTY/CW units. The M-1000 is an "internal board" system, meaning that you actually install the supplied circuit card into your computer's expansion slot. At \$399.95 the unit does just about anything you could want, including CW, RTTY (Baudot, Sitor, ARQ, and ASCII), Packet, and FAX. It is easily the most complete system for the price available today. The supplied software includes onscreen menus, status indicators, and help menus. Through the use of ROM upgrades, future coding schemes can be added as available by simply plugging a new chip into the board.

= A Review of Fine Tuning's PROCEEDINGS 1990 = By Richard A, D'Angelo

After watching the Fine Tuning gang issue two block buster hobby related resource books in 1988 and 1989, I decided to infiltrate the organization for an inside look at the Fine Tuning Special Publications editorial process. Writing for PROCEEDINGS is not a casual affair. The Fine Tuning editorial process requires authors to be mentally and physically tough because the review process is very demanding. I contacted John Bryant concerning a potential feature about shortwave radio broadcasting in Guatemala. By the time we finished discussing the project, the article was expanded to include all of Central America! Be careful when dealing with Mr. Bryant!!

The rigorous editorial review process is quite impressive. All manuscripts go to Dave Clark for distribution to the Editorial Review Board members assigned to your feature. In my case experts such as Gerry Dexter, Don Jensen, Don Moore, Mitch Sams along with Messrs. Bryant and Clark reviewed my article on technical merits. The big red pencil of Fritz Mellberg rounds out the team. Fritz reviews every article submitted to PROCEEDINGS for spelling, grammar and other editorial niceties. He is fondly known as "the chopper". This team provides quite a bit of professional level input. This process pays huge dividends when the final product is ready for publication.

All PROCEEDINGS authors are subjected to the same level of detailed review. Different Editorial Review teams are put together depending upon the subject matter. Some of the top names in the hobby are among the participants in reviewing PROCEEDINGS articles. Other members of the 1990 Editorial Review Board are Guy Atkins, Nick Hall-Patch, Bruce Portzer, Chuck Rippel and Harold Sellers. Bryant once described the editorial review process as a humbling experience. I couldn't agree with him more.

Without a doubt, Fine Tuning's PROCEEDINGS series is the technical reference work for the shortwave hobbyist. The 1991 edition is already on the drawing board - these guys don't waste much time. PROCEEDINGS 1990 is one item that should be sitting on every hobbyists bookshelf. What follows is an individual look at each of PROCEEDINGS five main sections.

PROPAGATION (60 pages)

Once again, PROCEEDINGS continues to present serious, in-depth propagation issues that hobby bulletins can't begin to touch. "Notes On Tropical Band Propagation" is more like a book within a book. It is split into three sections (perhaps chapters would be more appropriate description). In this monster of an article, propagation experts John Bryant and David Clark discuss some new theories which challenge the multi-hop theory of HF propagation. In addition, the authors suggest that seasonality patterns experienced by Tropical Band DXers may be associated with ionospheric conditions taking place at the transmitter, not the receiver. Finally, excerpts from propagation research conducted by Yuri Blanarovich are presented and discussed which again attacks the traditional multi-hop model of sky wave propagation. This article opens up new vistas concerning propagation theory.

ANTENNAS (14 pages)

This year only two articles appear in this section. While the quantity is low, the quality is superb. Guy Atkins discusses the terminated, tilted, folded dipole (T2FD) antenna which is a little known antenna that is an excellent performer. The other feature by Joe Farley and Mitch Sams addresses shortwave direction finding using a small indoor loop antenna developed by Farley. The antenna is impressive. This section shouldn't be ignored.

RECEIVERS (39 pages)

Another year and another banner crop of receiver related articles. Some things never change! Five articles provide PROCEEDINGS readers with an interesting variety of information. Only one traditional receiver review, the Kenwood R-5000 by Don Moore and Kent Willis, appears this year. Gene Pearson discusses ECSS reception while Craig Siegenthaler talks about synchronous detection. Gordon Darling presents a compendium of modifications for the popular Sony ICF 2010/2001D portable receiver.

Perhaps the most unique article this year is the feature about collecting and restoring antique communications receivers by Chuck Dachis. Some very nostalgic gems appear in this article which tube radio fans will appreciate.

PERIPHERAL EQUIPMENT (13 pages)

This year's toys and gadgets section features an improved keypad control for the NRD 525 by Guy Atkins; a high quality, low cost cassette deck suitable for DXpeditions by Chuck Mitchell; and a review of the Datong FL-3 Multimode Filter by Rowland Archer. The Datong filter offers the serious DXer a fast, practical method of notching out heterodynes. Rowland takes the reader from set up to operation.

FEATURES (74 pages)

If the technical aspects of the hobby do not interest you, this section of PROCEEDINGS will make your purchase worthwhile all by itself. This section is my favorite because I'm only mildly interested in technical aspects of the hobby and my article about DXing Central America appears here. PROCEEDINGS offers a forum for publishing long articles that would take months to serialize in a DX bulletin.

This years line up of feature articles is quite impressive. Moore and Bryant take us on a tour of "The Library As A DX Reference Tool" where they reveal the wealth of useful and interesting hobby related information that can be found in public and university libraries. Bruce Portzer relates his impressions of "International Medium Wave DXing From Western North America" which includes a country by country breakdown of what can be heard from the west coast. For those that like to pack a shortwave radio when travelling, Rowland Archer's "DXing On The Road - A Compendium of Advise, Tips and Techniques" is essential reading. This article expands upon a Archer's "DXers Forum" feature that appeared in the NASWA Journal. Possibly the biggest adventure in the entire book is "An Introduction To DXpeditions - A Compendium" by Nick Hall-Patch. Generously illustrated with photos of prominent DXers on DXpeditions, this article should inspire hobby couch potatoes to DX in the great outdoors. Closing out PROCEEDINGS 1990 are two articles about shortwave radio in exotic locations. The first is my article called "A DXers Tour Of Central America" which is a country by country review of the six Central American Sahara And Sahel" by Harold Cones in which Northern Africa and shortwave broadcasting from that region is discussed.

This year's line up of "Features" is very impressive and should satisfy the pallet of the serious shortwave listener.

Ouality Customer Service Too

Generally, the two most important aspects of any purchasing decision is the product itself and the support the purchaser receives after the sale. In quality customer service the Fine Tuning gang excels once again. This year's first print run had a sequencing page problem in one article. The required solution was reprinting and distributing a new page to the early purchasers. The Fine Tuning crew was on top of the situation. At Fine Tuning's expense, corrected pages were in the hands of most readers before they knew a problem existed. Not bad, eh?!

Is PROCEEDINGS Worth The Price?

I've ended each PROCEEDINGS review with the same question. This year's answer is no different than prior years - Definitely, yes!

As sales of PROCEEDINGS grow, so does the demand for prior editions. To meet this new demand, the Fine Tuning Special Publications crew decided to print a limited run of 1988 and 1989 editions of PROCEEDINGS. If you are new to the hobby, or missed the first two editions, now is the time to act. The 1988 premier edition comprised approximately 200 pages of material. The 1989 edition used a photo reduced format that was the equivalent to nearly 300 typewritten pages. Both are destined to become collector items. Pricing is identical to the 1990 edition.

Without question, the PROCEEDINGS series is the finest hobby reference work that DXers can develop for DXers.

Notes

I was surprised to note the quality of the signal level on Radio Korea at 1215 UT on 9750. If the signal holds up, the time is a nice alternative to the 1030 UT Sackville relay. RBI did disappear October 2, and now I note that some unannounced ex-RBI frequencies are being added to at least some of the Deutsche Welle releases. Radio Beijing changes are effective November 12.

The problem with publishing the full schedules prior to the first Sunday in November is that I know that not all the W-90 frequency changes are included. Some stations just don't publish their schedules ahead of time and these have to be picked up off the air. Radio New Zealand International has shifted to its summer schedule, but I don't have the data yet. WYFR will be making some major changes November 12, but it was not finalized at press time.

It now appears that Radio Sweden's Sweden Calling DXers will be heard bimonthly. The printed bulletin will cease publication, but the electronic edition will continue.

Thanks to VOA staff, two versions of the complete VOA W-90 broadcast schedule are available for download from the *Pinelands RBBS* as ASCII text files. One lists times, frequencies and target areas; the second includes azimuth and transmitter sites.

JRC NRD-535

Japan Radio Company's new NRD-535 will probably arrive in the US the first quarter of 1991. At first glance looks and features are akin to the NRD-525, but there is much more. 

SAUDI ARABIA - BSKSA starts transmissions on two more frequencies already used by Iraqi Radio - The Broadcasting Service of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia (BSKSA) General Service from Riyad was observed on 11990 kHz from tune-in at approximately 11025 gmt on 11th October. The same service was observed in paralel on 6055 kHz from 1645 gmt. Both these frequencies were formerly used by Radio Kuwait until Iraq's invasion of Kuwait, and - since then - have carried Radio Baghdad General Service or Voice of the Masses programmes.

The BSKSA General Service was unheard on 11th October on 15490 kHz, a frequency it has been using since albout 27th September. It had moved to that frequency from 15495 kHz a few days after Radio Baghdad made the same frequency change on 23rd September, presumably in an attempt to escape interference from BSKSA. (WBI 19/10)

SPAIN - REE is announcing and using NF's as follows, via Beijing relay 11-12 in SP on 11910 ex 11915. The 12-13 broadcast remains on 9620. 11910 is also used at 1300. The station is announcing the 1100 service as for Australia but sked shows it directed to the Philippines. The REE sked, effective 30/9, also shows th following special broadcasts to the Gulf: 07-2145 on 11920; 10-2145 on 17890; 1930-2245 on 17870; 1930-2330 on 15110. All in SP. ST. HELENA - Special Radio St. Helena broadcast observed on shortwave. - At 2000 gmt on 6th October, a relay of the BBC World Service news in English was observed on 11092.5 kHz, in the lower side band (LBS) mode. Following

several public service announcements for the island of St. news were Helena, and at 2012 qmt the following station identification announcement was broadcast: "This is the international service of Radio St. Helena in the South Atlantic Ocean transmitting in the mediuwave and shortwave band, and you're listening to the 'Anything Goes' radio programme.."

The programme consisted of pop music with live phone calls from shortwave listeners in Europe and North America who were hearing the broadcast. At approximately 2027 gmt the announcer said "...as you people probably be aware tonight is a special broadcast in that we are also being heard on shortwave this evening. Its a special broadcast for the Store Tuna Dxer's Club in Sweden..." The shortwave broadcast ended at 2100 gmt. (WBI 12/10)

11092, 2005-2100, Cable & Wireless Ltd, Per tip in "Fine Tuning" \$574, checked for special test (for Nordic DX Championships) on 6/10 from 2005-2040 UTC. Carrier with bits of audio noted; fair level by 2030. Test reportedly via "SSB", but unable to tune via LSB or USB. If AM, poorly modulated carrier with possible female announcer. Music seemingly instrumental. Selection at 2055 sounded like polka or "South Pacific Island Music"! During talk by announcer, only "clear" word sounded like "shortwave." Audio ceased at 2100 and carrier off at 2105. Reportedly, also on 9338 kHz, but not even a carrier was noted. (Mike Hardester, NC) & Eric Swedberg, Portland, OR also heard them.

<u>CLANDESTINE(S)</u> - Some anti-Iranian radios using Iraqi radio facilities no longer heard.

A number of anti-Iranian clandestine radios which broadcast via the facilities of Iraqi radio (Radio Baghdad) are no longer heard. A survey

failed to find any trace of the Free Voice of Iran, Voice of the Mohahedin-e Khalq (Voice of the Crusader)f or the Voice of the Ahwaz Revolution. The latter station's frequency, 1431 kHz, has been carrying Iraqi radio's Voice of the Masses since early August.

Free Voice of Iran was last observed on 8th October. However Radio Iran (First Programme) was still being heard at 04-05 on 9545 and 7180 kHz on 15th October. On the same channels, Voice of the Movement of the Mojahedin of Iranian Baluchistan was being heard daily at a new time of 07-08 gmt. At other timesa these channels carry Radio Baghdad's Persian service.

The following anti-Iranian radios, which broadcast from clandestine facilities possibly in the Kurdish areas of Iran and Iraq or from outside

the Iran/Iraq area, continue to be heard.

(1) Voice of Iranian Kordestan of the Iranian Kordestan Democratic Party on 4065 kHz from 1625-18 gmt.

(2) Voice of the Worker of the Iranian Revolutionary Workers'

organisation - Rah-e Khargar on 4160 kHz from 1430-1530 and 17-1830 gmt.
(3) Voice of the Iranian Revolution on 6415, 4475 and 3888 kHz from

1430-1530 gmt. The freqs vary.

(4) Voice of the Communist Party of Iran on 6410 and 3888 kHz from 17-19 gmt, and on 6417 kHz from 0315-0445 gmt. Announcements in EG give the freqs as 6430, 4480, 4005 and 3610 kHz. A Friday broadcast starts at 0430 gmt.

(5) Radio Iran Toilers on 10870, 6230 and 4775 from 1530-1830 gmt. This

radio emanates from transmitters in Afghanistan.

(6) Iran's Flag of Freedom (Kaviyani Banner) Radio on 15100 from 14-1445 and 1630-1820, and on 9045 from 0330-0520 gmt. This radio is believed to emanate from transmitters in Egypt.

(7) Voice of the Feda'i on 4160 from 16-17. (via WBI 19/10)

Our Kashmir - Indian authorities hunting for JKLF secessionist radio. AFP news agency, Hong Kong, in EG 1223 gmt 17 Oct 90. Excerpt from Srinagar. - Indian authorities are hunting for a clandestine radio station operated by Moslem secessionists broadcasting anti-Indian propaganda in the troubled state of Kashmir.

Listeners in the state capital of Srinagar said the radio, calling itself "Hamara Kashmir" (Our Kashmir), broadcast commentaries on the insurgency and accused Indian security forces of treating civilians

brutally.

An announcement by the radio said it will operate "on different frequencies" every Friday with broadcasts in the morning and evening, listeners said.

Official sources said a hunt had been launched to trace the radio station, which observers believe is operated by the banned Jammu and Kashmir Liberation Front (JKLF), the leading secessionist organization... (WBI 19/10)

Mark Burns is a newcomer this month. I'm glad you sent in what you've been hearing. Mark's been a member since January and is getting back into the hobby after a long absence. He works at WCTK-FM in New Bedford, MA, a 50 kW country station. He uses a Panasonic RF-B65 with a longwire or Antennas West World Probe and Grove Mini-Tuner. He's considering trading up to a Yaesu, Kenwood or Icom and asks for suggestions. Well, they're all popular models so before making that purchase, you might want to read some receiver reviews and find out the specs on each receiver so you get the one with the most features you are looking for. Mark also mentions having traveled to Oaxaca, Mexico, a few years back and that's where he became interested in the Latin American radio stations.

Thanks, again, Bill Kurrasch of Ontario, NY. Bill says his loggings this month are a result of the segment on English broadcasts in the tropical bands which appeared here a couple months ago. Glad to hear it was helpful.

Kevin Atkins says September was good for Indonesian stations, particularly those from Java. Remember, Kevin's our new DXers' Forum chairman so I'm sure he'd be happy to hear from anyone who's interested in writing an article on some specific aspect of the DXing hobby. Kevin really can pull in that Indonesian DX and I have to look closely at the loggings to figure out whether these loggings are coming from Atkins on the East Coast or Atkins on the West Coast!

Speaking of which, Guy Atkins also checked in directly with some nice loggings--good catch on RRI Semarang. Once again, Guy's loggings were from a DXpedition at Lion Rock Plateau, WA.

Also, Kris Field and Vern Hyson continued to do a good job getting me as many loggings as possible in time for the deadline. Remember, our new distributing editor is Vern Hyson, whose address appears on the contributors' page. His deadline is the lOth of the month, but if you are running late, you may also send your loggings directly to me by the second to last Saturday of the month.

This isn't a tropical bands station but certainly not an international broadcaster either: Listeners to World of Radio or SWL Digest or members of Fine Tuning may have heard about the special broadcast conducted by Radio St. Helena on 11092.5 kHz on October 6 from 1953-2100 UTC. The broadcast was arranged by Stora Tuna DX Klubb in Sweden. I understand this was the first legitimate SWBC from this country. We appreciate the help of Stora Tuna and Radio St. Helena!

Also, the country of New Caledonia has left the shortwave bands. DXers could hear this one on 7170 in the past during the early morning hours playing pop music with announcements in French. There have been several countries which have left SW lately. Thanks to Geoff Cosier via NU for this info.

Radio Berlin shut down October 3, coinciding with German reunification. Loggings for the former West or East Germany will continue to be shown as such since they will still count as separate countries under NASWA rules. In closing, please continue your great support and Happy Trugyg.
