



Hi guys....I just rejoined NASWA after a considerable absence (like about a decade and a half) I've definitely got some thoughts to share on the changes that I've run smack into. I've seen Andy Sennitt's comments at EDXC in last month's Journal, and this is right after buying a current WRTVH and "Passport", inside of which I read articles on similar themes...discovered the absence of Luxembourg, and now Bethany....whew. And then there's Harry Helms' comment in this month's Journal. Heavy stuff, all of it.

Now, I'll grant you that I realize that I've only scratched the surface of all the happenings I've missed over recent years, but It Seems To Me that, based on what I've seen so far, Radio Sweden, Andy Sennitt, the "fraternity", and purt near everybody hasn't really looked at a number of basic principles.

First, that comparing shortwave and satelites is a case of apples and oranges, like comparing MW AM and FM, when the death of MW AM was also predicted. Death of shortwave just ain't gonna happen any more for MW AM; Satelite reception is thusfar confined to homeowners and most of us here in the US rent apartments where satelite reception may or may not be available....and where it is available, it's the landlord that decides the limits of what is received...unless a renter has one of those auto receivers that haven't hit the market yet.

Second, the success of market share on the burgeoning channels of satelite receivership is based on commercial viability, and that too often means entertainment, and shortwave radio continues to fill the need for an educational environment as to global cultures and international relations. In this sense, major broadcasters on shortwave will indeed be missed because they will no longer represent their countries and cultures in the global smoorgasbord, the global sociopolitical classroom that shortwave radio still is.

Third, shortwave listeners have ever right in the world to feel insulted by the likes of Radio Sweden for getting on the shortwaves and snub their listeners by broadcasting DX stuff that has nada to do with shortwave. Don't You Believe that the bulk of satelite people are going to be tuning to Sweden's shortwave broadcasts for tips. It it will be shortwave listeners who do that. As long as the shortwave is turned on, even though the person listening may be also involved in satelites, that person is nonetheless a SHORTWAVE listener, and will remain so until he turns his shortwave receiver off.

These are BASICS, guys. It's not a matter of old technology versus new technology. It's a

We're Moving-Finally!

The address shown above should be the last address change you'll need for me for a while. By the time you receive the May Journal we'll be moved into our new Baltimore home. Please begin using the Chestnut Ridge Drive address as soon as possible, as I will be closing out the post office box within the next couple of months.

It will also be a treat not to deal with SWLing in a hotel room. Hotels are not very hospitable to shortwave propagation due to the high concentration of televisions and other RF-emitting equipment, and also due to concrete construction.

BBC World Service

The few reviews I've seen on the new BBC program arrangements have been mixed. One key change in the North American stream is the emphasis on news and news analysis at the expense of music and dramatic features. This shift is not surprising given that most Americans listen to the BBC over a local public radio station. What the BBC uniquely offers public radio broadcasters is news and documentaries; these radio stations don't have to look to the BBC to fill their time with music.

As predicted, at least in eastern Pennsylvania, there are some times of day one can easily listen to three different BBC program feeds. One recent evening at 0300 I could easily hear the European (6195, 9410 kHz) and African (9600 kHz) feeds in addition to the North American release. Unfortunately, column space won't permit including all possible airings of particular programs at all times for all five releases. If you have a particular favorite that you'd like to see the schedule for, please drop me a line.

As before, I do not include program times for North American releases not available on shortwave. Many public radio stations that utilize the satellite feed also record the programs for later broadcast, so the times shown in BBC Worldwide would not apply.

Now, on to the highlights.

News and Feature Programs

Daily, 0200 and 0500: Newsday is one of the new news programs on the BBC. I'd describe the program as "Newshour Lite" as it covers several news stories in detail and provides a general background summary as well. Unlike Newshour, there are no specific segments on sports, British news, financial news, or press review. Other programs cover those topics.

Wednesdays 0230: Heritage returns for a six-part 30-minute series. This program visits archaeological sites around the world. Among the countries visited: Yemen, a country closed to foreigners until the 1960s, is only now being studied for its ancient cities, medieval towns, and mosques existing from the dawn of Islam. First airing Also airing Sundays 1715 and Mondays 0530.

Fridays beginning May 12th, 0730: Letters Home is a new four-part 30-minute series in which BBC correspondents present letters written by distinguished travelers who have passed through the cities in which the BBC correspondents are now based.

Fridays beginning May 19th, 0345: Earth, Air, Fire, And Water is a new nine-part 15-minute series looking at the creation stories of various world religions. Stories from Africa, Egypt, Scandinavia, and elsewhere are explored in a setting of music and atmosphere. First airing Wednesdays 1145; also repeated Fridays 1430.

Monday, May 22nd 1515: We Fire Electrons Not Bullets is a single 45-minute program looking at the development of non-lethal weaponry, from subliminal messages and sleep deprivation to electromagnetic and acoustic pulse weapons. Both the scientific and sociological aspects of these programs will be explored. Also airs Monday 0715.

Thursdays, beginning June 1st, 0345: The Streets Of London is a six-part 15-minute series exploring the history of some of London's unusual and distinctive street names. If you've visited London this program should be particularly interesting. First airing Wednesdays 1515; also repeated Fridays 0715.

Light Entertainment

Mondays, 1130: Let's Do The Show Right Here is an ongoing eight-part panel quiz on musicals. The flops, the hits, the composers, the lyricists, and the stars provide fodder for questions. First airing Sundays 1530.

Mondays, beginning May 29th, 0330: Brain Of Britain returns for another 17-week run. History, sports, science, current affairs, literature, art, music, and geography are all fair game for the panelists. Unfortunately, this 0330 airing is the only North American airing on shortwave; other releases that may be audible include Sundays 2130 (Europe, Africa) and Saturdays 1230 (Europe).

Drama and the Arts

Saturdays, 2230: Play Of The Week offerings include Generations (May 13th), an original play for radio looking at a family's World War II involvement impact a young person's essays on the subject in 1995; Home At Seven (May 20th) is a psychological thriller about a businessman's missing 24 hours and his actions over that day. Dickens' Women (May 27th) appears to be more of an essay than a play, looking at various female characters in Charles Dickens' works. Dickens' daughter wrote at one point "My father did not understand women", which leads to some interesting characterizations.

Music

Tuesdays, beginning May 16th, 1445: Pop The Question returns for a 15-minute eight part series answering listener questions on current and past popular music. What's the biggest foreign language hit worldwide? Which Beatle was an aspiring chess master? Tune in for details. Send your questions to Pop The Question at the usual Bush House address: BBC World Service, Bush House, The Strand, PO Box 76, London WC2B 4PH, United Kingdom. Repeated Wednesdays 0615.

Tuesdays, beginning May 23rd, 0630 (European release): That's Cool looks at the character that has been a core requirement for contemporary music heroes since the jazz cats of the 1940s. The development of style and image as an outgrowth of contemporary music is explored. There are no North American releases directly on shortwave.

Science and Technology

Thursdays, until May 25th, 0345: Do You Know...? is a 15-minute weekly series concluding this month that answers listeners' questions about science. You'll find out why we have eyebrows and when the Japanese started using Hindu-Arabic numerals. The program uses questions from listeners, but you'll have to hurry to get your question in before the program concludes. Also airs Wednesdays 1515 and Fridays 0715.

Around the Bands

Radio Netherlands

Radio Netherlands and BBC Radio Scotland team up to present *Island Life*, a two-part documentary on living on a remote island off the Dutch or Scottish coast. In the **Documentaries** slot Thursdays, May 11th and 18th, 0052 and 0452, and Friday 2352.

UFOs in the Lowlands is Howard Shannon's look at Dutch experiences with UFO sightings and close encounters, airing in the Documentaries slot May 25th and 26th.

Weekend is a new joint venture of Radio Netherlands, the BBC, Radio France International, and Deutsche Welle taking a weekly look at issues and themes important around Europe. Maggie Ayre hosts. Sundays 2352.

Longtime Newsline voice Ginger da Silva can now be heard on the new program A Good Life, which looks at development and foreign aid issues. What's unusual is that richer countries, with development potentially run amok, are also investigated. Mondays 2352.

Deutsche Welle

The end of World War II should find some unique perspective from Germany. Insight, in the 0300 North American release May 10th, will specifically cover the end of the war from a German viewpoint.

You may not think of Germany as a haven for tea drinkers, but there's a region known as East Frisia that specializes in tea blending, brewing, and drinking. East Frisia is profiled in Come To Germany in the 0100 and 0500 releases May 25th.

Politics on Shortwave

Political broadcasts have come under sudden scrutiny in the wake of the Oklahoma City Federal building bombing. Bob Montgomery sent me a note before the Oklahoma City tragedy reminding me of some of the political programming that airs live and accepts phone calls. Radio Free America airs on WWCR daily on 5065 kHz for two hours at 0200 UTC. Tom Valentine, the host, is a consummate muckraker. Hour of the Time follows at 0400 with a one hour program also looking at government corruption. Hey Mister, Can You Hear the Astronauts on that Thing?

No, no home videos or slide shows, not even cold beer. Just a vacation tale of my antenna project second childhood. A May article by Ike Kerschner, N3IK, in Monitoring Times, touted the 8JK wire antenna. Essentially long parallel dipoles fed out of phase, this beast is electrically easy, but mechanically demanding. But I was not unfamiliar with the 8JK. As a teenage ham decades ago, I put one up in our large yard for the 20 meter (14Mhz) band. My Dad didn't mind the antenna, but he did mind the fluorescent bulb I taped to a voltage node that glowed in the dark at night every time the transmitter was keyed. We won't talk about neighbor comments, or surprised people driving past our house at night. My monster was fed with 300 ohm twinlead, and even without an antenna tuner it took at least some of my transmitter's 50 watt output, because one of my first ham contacts was South Africa. Pretty heady stuff for a smartass teenage ham.

Ienjoy playing with wire antennas, so the thought of antenna deja vu at the family cabin in Forest County, Wisconsin, was pleasant. Sure, first I had to finish painting the cabin, but then it would be antenna time. The goal was one antenna that could be used for both shirt wave and ham activities. The 15 meter ham band (21 Mhz) has always been my favorite, but with the low position in the sun spot cycle, that wasn't practical. One doesn't need a good antenna for a dying band. The space available determined that it would be an antenna for 19/20 meters and run east-west. I consulted the ARRL Antenna Book

and considered both the Lazy-H and Sterba Curtain, but the bottom elements would drag on the ground and be near people at this location. Not good.

So...the 8JK it would be. Only 60 some feet long, and 16 feet wide, that shouldn't be too bad. With 4 to 5 db gain, and fed with 450 ohm ladder line and an antenna tuner for multi-band work, it should burn up both the 20 meter ham and 19 meter shortwave bands. What I didn't really remember—or appreciate—were the mechanical problems. This project was a two tripper to the hardware store, except that the hardware store was a 34 mile round trip into the nearest north woods town. And we won't even count the trip where I left my wallet in my other pants pocket back at the cabin, and had no money—or driver's license—inducing v-e-r-y careful driving on the empty handed return trip.

The 8JK is simply like a horizontal letter H. laying on its side parallel to the ground. See Figure 1 for an overview. The two sets of dipoles have a twisted phasing section connecting them which forms the crossbar of the H. By twisted, I don't mean mentally dysfunctional. The pair of ladder line conductors is rotated 180 degrees so that conductor A is now conductor B, and vice versa. The antenna is fed in the middle of the center crossbar. Each leg of the H is one halfwavelength in length, around 32 feet for 14Mhz. But using the standard formula of 467/Frequency in Mhz, one can plug in any band. The problem is the spreaders that keep the legs of the H properly spaced. I surmised that if I used 16 foot quarter wave spreader spacing on 14 Mhz, it would be eighth wave spacing on 7 Mhz. Possibly it would work reasonable well on both frequencies.

I can't remember what I used as spreaders on my 8JK years ago, but influenced by Ed Noll, W3QFJ, of Easy-Up Antenna fame, plastic water pipe seemed worth a try. I found out there is both thin and thick wall plastic pip, and the 3'4 inch diameter pipe will telescope into the 1 inch pipe if thin wall is used. Machine screws with washers, a bunch of eye bolts, and some soldering lugs completed the hardware. The machine screws fasten together the telescoping sections of water pipe, and the eye bolts are anchors for the H legs of wire.

The middle spreader, with its 450 ohm phasing section, needed special attention so that the opposing dipoles are connected. First, I cut the phasing line in half. To prevent screwups, I put red finger nail polish on each end of the phasing section, identifying the same wire. Then I could just see that the red dots were on opposite sides of the spreader when hooked up in place. Of course, I couldn't wait until the polish was dry. so I had red thumbs. The middle of the center spreader is also where the feed line (lead in) to the shack is connected. I used soldering lugs and small machine screws to connect the three wires together on each side of the spreader. It's harder to describe than to do. The final step was to tape the phasing line to the spreader, and also tape a few inches of the feed line plus a hose clamp for stress relief.

The spreaders turned out to be floppier than expected. Trying to distribute the stress a little more evenly, a simple tether was made at each of the four corners where a wire ran to a tree support. Then it was ready to go airborne. One really can't appreciate how bulky this thing is until it starts rising into the sky. Tell your neighbors not to watch. Adjust the tension on each of the four corner supports until it somewhat resembles a rectangle. The 8JK ended up only about 30 feet high for a number of logistical reasons. It may be crude, but it's beautiful—even without the fluorescent bulb.

Routing the ladder line in through the window to the shack, I was ready to try it. These days, the current equipment setup is a Kenwood TS-940S ham transceiver, a Lowe HF-225 short wave receiver, and an MFJ949C antenna tuner. Antennas at this location are a 125' random long wire at about 20 feet, and a 60 meter dipole at 40 feet. Hastily I connected the line to my antenna

tuner and turned on the rig. It was set to the 41 meter band, so I started tuning there. One or two very weak signals on the whole band. Hmmm. Did I mess up the phasing line after all; did I really connect the antenna to the dummy load; is this really the greatest radio blackout in the history of time? Then I noticed the feed line was incorrectly hooked up to the tuner. Feverish fingers, and then-suddenly-there are signals all over the band. LOUD SIGNALS, and LOTS OF THEM.

Radio Moscow is S9+20 in the early afternoon. Radio France International is +30. I switch to 19 meters. Signals aren't very strong; then I remember to tweak the antenna tuner, and there are more strong signals. Radio Damascus is S9+15 and several BBC frequencies are stronger than I've ever heard them. On 25 meters, Radio Marti is S9+50, virgin territory for my tender, innocent S meter. Do they realize they have their antenna pattern reversed, and they're entertaining Fidel Polar Bear, not Fidel Castro? I feel overwhelmed. I band scan slowly, starting with 13 meters continuing down band by band. until finally several hours later I reach the tropical bands. Ghana is \$9+20 like a local broadcast station. I've never heard All India Radio or 60 meters in the late afternoon before. Both frequencies of Namibia on 90 meters are S9 and it isn't even dark. Readers on both coasts are smirking about now, but out here in America's Siberia, it's unusual to have these kind of signal strengths at this time of day-and on many days, at any time of day. Wishing I hadn't taken down the 60 meter dipole to make room for the 8JK, I turn on the Lowe 225 with its 125' random long wire, and start doing A-B comparisons between the two radios. Scores of them over the next few hours, including every band. The 940 is consistently 4-S units higher than the Lowe. What an antenna! By this time I've been hunched over the radios for six straight hours, nature is calling, and I'm hungry, exhausted and exhilarated. For 5db gain, this is too good to be true.

It was. The next morning was a real bummer. It was like the 8JK had quit working, the long wire winning out in almost every comparison. Then I realized that yesterday's conditions had been exceptional, and that this morning I am experiencing short skip which favors the long wire. I also did systematic comparisons between the two receivers on WWV frequencies and found

the 940 was consistently 2-S units higher for the same signal strength, so the 'improvement' wasn't as large as first thought, not to mention differing opinions of what constitutes an S-unit. But later in the afternoon, when the skip lengthened out, the 8JK came back into its own. Then it was consistently 2-S units or more stronger. Not just in strength, but also heft and body of the signals, what nerds call signal-to-noise ratio. Particularly signals with low modulation are made more intelligible by the 8JK. And although I thought full wavelength loops and Beverages were supposed to be the quiet antennas of choice, this antenna is easier on the ears than either the long wire or dipole.

So what's the bottom line, bunky? The 8JK has neither the gain nor the directionality of a yagi, nor does it cost \$300. On distances below 1500 miles, the long wire wins every time. Between 1500 and 3000 miles, it's nip and tuck. Farther out, particularly more than 5000 miles, the 8JK really shines by at least 2 honest S units, and quite often more. Even at a height of only 30 feet, it slurps up low angle signals like a sponge. The directionality and gain are greatest at the design frequency, but there are still very definite characteristics at 7 Mhz. Off the ends of the directional pattern, signals are somewhat weaker since the 'front-to-side' ratio is modest. But in the favored direction, signals are significantly stronger and-most importantly of all-more intelligible, By the time one reaches the tropical bands, the receiving pattern resembles the proverbial bowling ball sitting on a table. It's performance is roughly the same as the long wire, and significantly less than the 60 meter dipole it replaced.

Since the antenna runs east-west, that means it favors South America and Asia. It does a fine job

over the pole to Asiatic Russia, and also the Indian subcontinent. But I feel this is truly a Russian antenna; I've never heard so very many Russian stations, of all different flavors, just waiting to be logged. I call the antenna Vlad, short for Vladimir. Apparently this is as common a name in Russia as John is in America. Don't yell either in a crowd unless you enjoy a good trampling.

This antenna is really a prototype. The spreaders and the hardware only cost \$15, so I really can't complain. But they are bowed like a baby's bottom, particularly the middle spreader. I could use the thick walled tubing without the telescoping for a spacing of 10 feet, but my intuitive feeling is that the wider spacing helps explain the very good performance on 41 meters. Other possibilities are to use larger diameter telescoping tubing with its increased weight, or glue together plastic pipe and hope it would hold up under the routine -20 degree temps here in the dead of winter. Wish I knew of a cheap, light, rigid, non-metal material for spreaders. Any light bulb ideas?

For many, the large size and mechanical problems would outweigh the low price, moderate gain and directivity, and frequency versatility of this antenna. And yes, an antenna tuner is needed even on receive for best results. In many aspects, it has exceeded my expectations, but I haven't yet figured out how to rotate the beast without the help of an earthquake.

Oh...if you don't have red nail polish, Misty Mauve or Porcelain Pink are acceptable, but Fulsome Fuchsia or Peach Flambe are totally tacky.

ECSS for listening to AM stations

The basic aim of the technique is to improve both selectivity and audio response. For the technique to be really effective you need a receiver that has a good specification filter, say 2.2 to 2.7 khz bandwidth at the -60B point, and about twice that width at the -60B point. (These

figures should be given in the Rx specifications in the user's manual-don't worry if you don't understand them!) This type of filter is usually brought into use automatically when you switch to "AM Narrow", or "LSB" or "USB" positions on the so-called "mode" switch.

The filter in use at the "AM" or "AM Wide" position is probably at least 6 khz wide at the -6dB point, not too bad for audio response (except in some receivers" but not very clever if

you have strong adjacent channel QRM, say a station only 5 khz (or less) away from the desired signal.

The other pre-requisite for successful use of ECSS is a small 'tuning increment'--in modern receivers, say 15 hz or sometimes less, or a small number of khz per one rotation of the tuning knob in the older receivers, say 25 khz. If you have a digital readout receiver with a 1 khz as the smallest step then you'll have little joy trying to use ECSS, UNLESS there is an independent fine tuning control.

Now on to the actual use of the technique, ON an A.M. SIGNAL! Suppose you DO have an adjacent channel problem affecting the desired signal when you are using the AM WIDE position on your mode switch. Switch to AM NARROW. This may reduce the interference level but you'll probably immediately notice less treble, i.e. a 'bassy' audio response which is a real nuisance when trying for ID's.

Assuming you are fairly well tuned in to the desired signal, now alter the mode switch to 'LSB' say, when you'll probably immediately hear a 'howl' which is the so-called beat-note. Alter the tuning control carefully until the howl note reduces in frequency down to zero. This is the so-called 'zero-beat' position and you'll immediately note distinctly improved audio on your AM signal, although you are using the same filter (probably) as you had in use on AM NARROW.

Whether the interfering signal has reduced in intensity or even disappeared depends on whether its frequency was above or below the frequency of the wanted signal. If it's still there, simply switch to 'USB' and in general it will then disappear without any need to re-tune for zero-beat. DON'T NOW SWITCH BACK TO 'AM' OR 'AM NARROW'; simply listen on !! On some receivers you may find that you have to retune slightly to re-obtain exactly zero-beat when you switch between USB and LSB or vice versa. There's usually a way of eliminating this slight problem, but you can't do it from outside the case.

The whole technique is simple and very rapid, once you've practiced it a few times. Personally I always DX using ECSS, i.e. my mode switch is always in the USB or LSB positions, simply because I much prefer the treble-enhanced audio reponse, QRM or no QRM. By the way, of course, if the QRM frequency is acutally ON the frequency of the desired signal, then there is no way ECSS can remove it. If it is very close, then use of ECSS can reduce it quite remakably, assuming you've got good SSB circuitry.

There are some bonuses to the use of ECSS by the way in addition to the QRM and audio aspects:

- (1) In several top class receivers, passband tuning and variable bandwidth controls are inoperative unless the mode switch is at 'LSB' or 'USB'. Therefore you can use them when using ECSS-terrific for Dxing!
- (2) Suppose you are checking a frequency to see if an anticipated Dx station is coming through. If you are on 'AM' or 'AM NARROW' then you won't notice anything if only a weak carrier is so far available. On the other hand, if you're scanning around using ECSS then you'll get a weak beat-note (howl) to warn you that a carrier is there, and may improve into a signal as you wait.

If you have a receiver with a BFO pitch control, as well as the pre-requisites already referred to then you can develop ECSS technique even more effectively, but that does mean yet another article!

Finally, if you have managed in the 'AM' mode switch position for years, still give ECSS a try. One of the world's top DX-ers had always done that, regarding ECSS as simply a gimmick. Not long ago, having bought a DRAKE R8, particularly good for ECSS use, he tried ECSS and now thinks highly of the technique!

P.S. Don't confuse the ECSS technique with the very expensive so-called ECSS modules which you can order with certain costly receivers. These modules can cost as much as a complete receiver like the SONY 2010. The TECHNIQUE costs you nothing.

Over the Net And Around The Law?

You can taste forbidden fruit with your computer—and you don't even have to be a hacker.

Official U.S. propaganda that has been carefully withheld from Americans lest it brainwash them is now widely available-possibly in violation of the law-on the Internet.

Almost 100 million people around the world get their news from the Voice of America, the international broadcast service of the U.S. Information Agency—but precious few Americans ever get to hear it. This is by design: The 1948 Smith-Mundt Act specifically forbids the VOA-began as a propaganda service in the weeks after the United States entered World War II-from disseminating its message domestically.

Over the decades, the act has created pretzels of legal logic: Journalists wanting to quote from VOA broadcasts were told by the agency that they had to come to the agency's Washington offices-or have someone overseas listen to the radio, transcribe the shows and send them back stateside. And many Americans thought the restrictions meant that it was illegal to even own transcipts or tapes—though Chris Kern, chief of the VOA's computer services division, explains: "It's a restraint on us—what we can do. It's not a restraint on what American citizens could do."

But in the past year, technology has unlocked the VOA's doors. Anyone with a computer and a modem has been able to sneak a peek at transcripts of VOA stories. And since September, users have even been able to download bits of actual VOA broadcasts and play them on any computer with the proper multimedia hardware and software. The experiment has been strikingly popular, with some 20,000 files being read each day by computer users dialing in.

A recent on-line visit confirmed what many have suspected for years: The rest of the world is getting some pretty dry stuff from us. It's well written, especially as propaganda goes; the pieces employ a straight journalistic style. And it's not all world events. A recent story on former baseball great Gil McDougald, who regained his hearing decades after deafness forced him out of the game, was sweet and inspirational.

When it comes to world affairs, the stories consistently toe the administration line-but then, the same could be said of many news stories appearing in U.S. newspapers. Little wonder that, in those parts of the world starved for information not channeled through the local ministry of truth, VOA is still a lifeline. One agency official says that in Kuala Lumpar, Malaysia, VOA television broadcasts draw a larger audience than Oprah Winfrey. And on-line availability has proved to be a boon in such nations as China, which attempt to block VOA broadcasts. Text and broadcasts are currently available in at least 15 languages. Almost all of the users worldwide come to the VOA computer only for text; downloading sound files can take a lot of time and take up a great deal of precious disk space. The VOA parses its sound reports into 10-minute chunks of broadcast time. But due to the limits of on-line transmissions, even those 10 minute can take an hour or more to move across the phone line from the VOA's computer to yours.

Does the availability of VOA material on-line violate the law? Carl Malamud, head of the Internet Multicasting Service, thinks that it might. Malamud, whose nonprofit organization puts everything from government documents to broadcasts of NPR on-line, says that the VOA move worries him. "VOA to me appears to be doing 'wink, wink," Malamud said, "They're winking at those very fundamental mandates from the U.S. Congress—Ye shall not do news to the American public." Nor is this requirement trivial, as Eastern Europeans who suffered under decades of government-shaped news reports can attest.

Being able to get whole transcripts and broadcasts on demand-and being able to zip copies of those files anywhere in the world via computergives the VOA wider distribution than ever before, Malamud said. "It's important that we understand that cyberspace is part of the real world," Malamud said. "Just because it's on a computer, it doesn't mean that the basic rules don't apply.

Some people have been agitating for broader public access to the VOA for years. Last year former FCC commissioner Newton Minow and Annenberg Fellow Alvin Snyder wrote: "Shouldn't we have the opportunity to know what the United States is saying to people in Bosnia, Russia or South America... Yesterday's fear that such programs will 'brainwash' the American public is senseless. We get a steady stream of government views in speeches, briefings and press releases, and we are capable of reaching our own conclusions."

One VOA official said that the computer broadcast has passed the agency's legal scrutiny. "We have gone through channels and checked at every step along the way." The VOA's on-line introductions to using the wire service states, with the digital equivalent of a straight face, "In accordance with U.S. law, the materials in this directory hierarchy are provided exclusively for recipients outside the United States."

As a practical matter, access to the VOA has been getting easier for decades despite the legal restrictions. Anyone with a shortwave radio can pick out the broadcasts through the static. And the VOA's television network, WorldNetTelevision, is available to anyone with a satellite dish.

"Our view of putting the material on the Internet is, it's merely an extension of our broadcasts," says VOA spokesman Joe O'Connell.

But the move to computer transmissions is a quantum leap. Not only is it essentially impossible for any regime-including that of the United States-to block reception of information put out on the Internet, but now the VOA's information can be put out anywhere, anytime—no one has to wait for a specific broadcast at a specific time.

The pretzel logic, meanwhile, isn't completely vanquished. The agency still can't legally tell you the location of its broadcasts on the shortwave band, satellite or on the Internet.

"Whether we personally agree or disagree with it, it is a statutory requirement and we are officers of the federal government. We don't have discretion," said Kern.

The VOA puts out its text and audio files on what's know as a "gopher," an easy-to-use (by Internet standards) on-line repository. Most people with Internet access can reach it by typing gopher gopher.voa.gov. For highertech types who love the multimedia World Wide Web, the address is gopher://gopher.voa.gov. You can even get VOA information if the closest you ever get to the Internet is electronic mail: Sende-mail to info@voa.gov with the message send help. The computer will automatically respond with instructions telling you how to receive, say, the list of upcoming Mandarin and Cantonese programming on radio and television.

This is not a decisive cut-back and we will continue broadcasting to all areas, but some of the extra programming will be cut back; that we will mainly concentrate on news and current affairs and sports on shortwave, and religious programming—and general feature programming and music will not be available on shortwave any longer." IRAQ Shortwave broadcasts from official Iraqi Radio continue to be erratic. Frequency usage is highly changeable and the reliability of transmitters appears to be poor, Reception of shortwave broadcasts is further impaired by the persistent jamming that generally accompanies transmissions from Baghdad on both shortwave and mediumwave. The main domestic service in Arabic of Republic of Iraq in Baghdad has been heard recently during the daytime on the frequency of 17740 kHz. Recent reception [in Europe] has been surprisingly good at around 0600-0900, although it deteriorates later because of the jamming. Station closes around 1600. Iraqi Radio also noted on 13652 kHz at around 0900-1100 on 11th April, and also on 4615 kHz, which for some time has been its most regularly-heard shortwave frequency. (BBCM)

MEXICO Radio Huayacocotla, 2390 kHz, was closed down on 29 March by inspectors from Mexico's Secretariat for Communications and Transport. In their report, SCT technicians attributed exaggerated faults in the antenna and transmitter (for example, that the antenna was not properly painted, that it had one restraining cable too many, that there was a spare backup transmitter on the premises) and warned that these failures represented a danger to life and limb of the operators. They also reported that there was no evidence of some measuring instruments like an oscilloscope, audio frequency generator, a multimeter, and a wattmeter. On the 27th of March, the Provincial of the Jesuits, Jose Morales, asked for an interview with the Department of the Interior to discuss the closure of the Radio. He has yet to receive an answer. Although R. Huayacocotla applied for an AM frequency back in 1978 (tentatively 1350 kHz, callsign XEHAY), the license still awaits approval from the Department of the Interior. (DEVMEDIA list/18-April/Don Moore) [The reality is more likely that the station was closed by Mexico's one-party government as part of a broader effort to silence indiqenous (i.e. potentially dissident) voices.-AQ]

MOZAMBIQUE According to a broadcast by Radio Mozambique, "A total of 11 of the 20 Radio Mozambique transmitters at the Matola transmitting station have broken down. Only nine transmitters are functioning now with a total output of 222 kW. The broken transmitters represent a total output of 575 kW, more than double the output of operational transmitters. The transmitters have been experiencing constant breakdowns of valves and other components. Radio Mozambique has had financial difficulties in repairing them." (BBCM)

MYANMAR A Japanese DXer reports a verification from the *Defense Forces Broadcasting Station* at Taunggyi, confirming 10 kW into an inverted cone antenna on 6570 kHz. Although listed as 1 kW since 1985, the fact that the station has been widely heard at good strength made it apparent that the transmitter must have been more powerful than a mere 1 kW. (DSWCI Mar/95 via TLC on HCJB/DX Ontario World Radio Report)

NAMIBIA NBC is heard opening at 0600 s/on on 4965 with choral anthem, IS/ID and African radio news. Weekdays the pgme is in English while on the weekends a local African language is used. The channel is subject to RTTY interference. (TLC on HCJB/DX Ontario World Radio Report)

NEPAL To mark the 45th anniversary [of the station], Radio Nepal has added an English news bulletin at 0720 UTC. Similarly, a new English language program, "Destination Nepal", is scheduled to be broadcast three times a week on Sunday, Monday and Friday at (?8.50) in the morning, aimed at promoting tourism development in Nepal. There have also been some changes in the timings of regular programs and some news bulletins. (BBCM) [No further details provided—AQ]



Bangladesh: Dale Park sent along an RNZI and R Norway schedule, and mentioned that he's been hearing R Bangladesh on 7185 at 1230. I've lost track of them since the March 26—very difficult to hear in these low solar cycle conditions—but Dave Kenny sent along an April 18 update...

Bulgaria: New times are being announced for the DX Program for Radio Amateurs and SWLs. The show airs in the last quarter hour of Fridays 1900 and 2300, Sundays 0400, 1130, 2100 and 2300.

Ecuador: There will be another MW HCJB test on May 13 0600-0630 UT. Bilingual announcements, music, and Morse code IDs. This one will use the 690 kHz 25kw transmitter at Pifo, the home of the SW transmitters.

Ukraine: The NAm service of R Ukraine Int'l has been very difficult to hear. I can only occasionally hear 9750 at 00 and 9835 at 03.

USA: Transmitter problems at WINB, Red Lion, PA, took the station off the air for more than two weeks in late March into April, WEWN has now

changed to 7425 for 24-hour service to NAm.

Media Shows: AWR's WaveScan via WRMI and IIRJA are no longer part of Viva Miami, but now have their own time slots. WRMI: Sa 2200, 2345, Su 1130, 1245. HRJA: Sa 2200 and 2345. And the first of the two World of Radio Friday afternoon airings on WWCR was dropped when the time period was sold. And via cyberspace: Al Weiner will be producing a new weekly media show — not Radio Newyork International as first reported — airing UT Mondays 0400 on WWCR on 7435.

Yugoslavia: The NAm service from Belgrade is very difficult to hear, but mid-month I finally found it at 00 UT on 9580.


