Speaking of DX Schedules, Floyd Smith one of our faithful CPCers of last season, who is also serving on the same Committee this season, sends us the complete schedule of WTRC 1310 kcs. Elkhart, Ind. for this coming DX season. He says that our good friend Les Zellmer was responsible for having given us such quick action in regards to their plans for this coming season. It can be seen at a glance from the above schedule that each of the leading clubs are to get two frequency check dedications and one two hour broadcast. We are speaking of those leading clubs that have had close contact with WTRC.

Joe Becker, our very capable Vice-President again sends us some very good news to the effect that WNBC 1380 kcs. New Britain, Conn. will dedicate their September frequency check which takes place on Saturday morning, September 7 from 4:00 to 4:20 A.M., E.S.T. to the members of our club. We do hope that all of our members will take advantage of this opportunity to listen in and send the station your report out of appreciation for this dedication.

"INTER-CLUB CO-OPERATION PLAN FOR BROADCAST BAND DX CLUBS FOR 1935-36"

- #1. "The CPC Chairman of each club will send a weekly report to the "Clearing House" listing all DXes definitely arranged, the notification to show call letters, frequency, location, date and Eastern Standard Time. ( frequency check dedications excepted. )"
- #2. "The CPC Chairman of each club will receive a weekly report from the Clearing House, listing all DX programs reported to her and the club which arranged the program. It will be the duty of each CPC Chairman to advise his committee members not to arrange any DXes that will clash with those all ready arranged."
- #3. "Each club agrees that under no circumstances will they make unfair use of the information supplied them by the Clearing House reports. This includes the agreement that no club will write to a station scheduled for a DX program for another club and ask to have a portion of that DX program dedicated to their club."
- #4. "Each club agrees that for all foreign DXes they will do their utmost to give the foreign DX broadcast a clear frequency for the period of DX, and if possible to also keep the adjacent frequencies clear. Cuban and Mexican programs will not be considered foreign."
- #5. "Each club agrees that it will not publish anything in its publications that will in any way be offensive to another club in the plan."
- #6. "Each club agrees that it will not use the publications of any other DX Club in the plan, to secure the names and addresses of members of other DX Club and then write to them soliciting their membership."
- #7. "If the clearing house shall receive notice of two programs on the same frequency for the same period, the notice which shall have the earlier post mark shall receive priority...except foreign stations, which will be given priority in all cases. The clearing house shall immediately notify the sender of the conflicting program of the necessity of cancelling the conflicting broadcast."
- #8. "Each club agrees that it will not publish or publicize the DX programs arranged by another club without the permission or request of that Club. ( Requests or permission to use DX programs must be made by the President of each club in the plan. ) When permission is granted, clubs listing DX programs arranged by another club will give credit to the club that arranged for the DX. If any program is to be shared with another club, it shall be so listed and credited."

The clubs participating in this plan shall be the Newark News Radio Club, International DXers Alliance, National Radio Club, Globe Circlers DX Club, Universal Radio DX Club and the Canadian DX Relay, or such of them as shall agree on this plan. We are very happy to advise our members that our club has entered whole-heartedly into this agreement and we certainly feel that this agreement will do more than anything else to bring about the feeling of friendliness among the clubs participating in the Plan. We note that on page one we printed a list of DX schedules for WTRC, this information reached us and was printed before we received the "Agreement", we trust that none of the clubs mentioned will object to our having listed it. We are willing to publish



more members in another way. If contestants cannot get more members to break the tie they can contact the members they have enlisted and try to get them to join for more than one season. In other words, one member for two years is exactly as good as two members for one year. Due to the nature of the prizes we feel that the tie must be broken before prizes can be awarded. Advance memberships must be prepaid, and contestant may be given credit for advance payment of his own membership. Thus, if contestant pays his next season membership, it may be counted as a member to his credit.

6. In case all this effort to break the tie, a deadline will be extended for two weeks past the ending of the fiscal season stated in rule 3.

7. After complying with rule #2, any member or officer is automatically in the contest, therefore all the intention you need to express your participation in the contest is to get five paid-up members.

8. Subscriptions will be sent to Robert Weaver, 603 W. Market Street, York, Penna. He will forward results to your judge.

9. Contest judge will be Keith L. Freas, 115 Wabash Ave., Kenmore, N.Y. He will gladly supply any clarification to any of the foregoing rules upon request.

We decided to make this week's Bulletin an 8 page affair, in order that we could give you this up to the minute list of frequency checks, inasmuch as we realized that if we waited until next week, these changes would not reach you until most of the frequency checks were over for this month.

We are in receipt of a letter from WJAG 1060 kcs. Norfolk, Neb. in which they have advised us that they intend to stage their annual DX program on Wednesday morning, September 25 from 1:00 to 8:00 A.M., E.S. They also have stated in their letter that this program will simultaneously broadcast over their short wave station using the call WLEZ which incidentally uses but 5 watts of power and operates on 2150 kcs. They have advised us that a portion of this program will be dedicated to the members of our club. They are very anxious to have reports, so, let's not disappoint them.

The ever changing properties of the Kenelly-Heaviside layer have been particularly noticeable lately. DX on the various bands seems to be improving considerably. The Empire stations at Daventry, after holding such a remarkable record throughout the summer for clarity, have shown signs of 'skip-distance effect' with periods of considerable inconsistency. The 40, 80 and 160 meter amateur bands have shown a decided up trend in distance reception. The fourth, eighth and ninth districts have been surprisingly strong. Night Hawks of the air waves have been reporting better reception from "Way Down Under." A DXer near New York, in a comment upon short waves, states that VK3ME seems to be better than normally. VK3LR and JVN have thrown their mighty carriers along the Atlantic Coast. Perhaps some of us may dare to take this as a forecast of the 1935-36 season??

But in as much as this is the inaugural issue of this department let's become more acquainted with the program; and scan the proposed activity. First, this section was designed for the short wave fans of our club. We will conduct it to the best of our ability to be of the utmost advantage to you. In form, it will present itself much like the broadcast section, with DX information, station data, latest changes and other comments of interest.

Correspondence from our members is especially solicited. In this way, it is possible to find where the main interest lies among our fans. Periodic reports will help to provide material of interest to everyone. And last but not least, we can see how active the members are.
