Aberdeen, Wash. will dedicate their December 2nd frequency check to our club from 6:40 to 7:00 A.M. WBR 1310 kcs. Buffalo, N. Y. will dedicate their test of December 4th to us from 2:00 to 2:20 A.M. KGFV 1310 kcs. Kearney, Neb. have promised to take part in the 1310 kcs. Frolic being planned by Floyd on Saturday morning, December 21 from 6:30 to 7:00 A.M. This makes either the fourth or fifth station on that frequency to accept Floyd's invitation to take part in the Frolic, so we think you will all have a most enjoyable morning on Dec. 21st listening to the stations on 1310 kcs. KIUJ Santa Fe, New Mexico, also 1310 kcs. will present a program which will be dedicated to the members of our club on Sunday morning, December 22 from 3:00 to 4:00 A.M., All the times mentioned in connection with these dedications are naturally E.S.T.

We are in receipt of a card from Mr. Wilbur T. Golson, Chief Engineer, station WJBO Baton Rouge, La. in which he advises us that they are running DX programs the second and fourth Sunday mornings of each month from 2:00 to 4:00 A.M., E.S.T. We had been notified by one of the other clubs that these broadcasts were on the air every Sunday, however Mr. Golson's card proves that such is not the case. He has promised to dedicate one or more of these broadcasts to the members of our club.

Oh yes! We almost overlooked a very important fact that Floyd Smith sent to us. He says that KGFV Kearney, Neb. have advised him that their station runs a frequency check on the 2nd and 4th Wednesday mornings of each month from 6:00 to 6:15 A.M., E.S.T. They request our members to listen in and send in their reports on these test programs.

It is quite evident that this column is not really what it ought to be. Surprising to say the least, is the fact that the DX season has commenced and there seems to be less material for the editor to throw into his weekly copy than before. What do you think is the matter? Not so long ago every one was spilling over with short wave chatter. As for QSL cards, WFLA ran 'dry' at one time with so many requests.

The suggestion of having official listening posts for this department was put before the President of the Club. It seems to be a rather good idea, for it would be one means of creating more interest in the short waves and there are a number of DX fans who will be willing to become official 'L. P. O.' for the present season. Are you interested in applying?

The twenty meter band seems to be dead now after sunset. During the daytime however we can hear most of the middle and western districts. All the other bands have changed their DX properties considerably. The 150 meter fone band was particularly peculiar last Saturday evening around 6PM. The local stations were not very strong, nor were stations in the upper first and eighth districts. Canada was nil. But the fourth district was popping all over the band. W4DKI Winston-Salem, N. C. was pounding through on his channel, adjacent to WFLA. W8MKR Cincinnati was working Birmingham, Alabama. Detroit, Michigan was clear on three different channels.

Saturday morning WFLA was active as usual. We snared W4DGV and W8DN before giving out the DX tips. Was surprised to work a station using only three watts input...W1JHW. During the transmissions, however, WFLA incessantly arced over in the large antenna tuning condenser which is placed directly above the operating table. Could not trace the trouble for the circuits were evidently in resonance. Tried dropping the carrier to 75 watts, which was quite in vain.

Can see where the EOB fellows are going to get it in the neck!! The 'boss' has got an new GE radio. Here is his starting list: CT1AA, DJB, CJC, DJE, DJN, EAQ, GSB, GSC, GSF, GSG, 2RO. He finds PRF5 the best of the South American stations. Has us 'stumped' on this one: "Who is the station I hear almost every day on 11.27 meg. that has some sort of a bird song between announcements?" Mr. Weaver does not think that it is like the 2RO nightingale, but feels that it may be Radio Coloniale.

Speaking of France suggests this clipping from the New York Sun be mentioned here. We learn that the new short wave station at Ville-just, which will replace Pontoise, will be on the air, using two one hundred KW transmitters, early next year. They will use six directional radiators.

Forgot to say that you SW fans will be of real assistance if you write to the editor of this column concerning the questions relative to the LPO. The QRA again is 82 St. John Place, New Canaan, Conn. Some of you fellows have been really co-operative in the past and your correspondence will be greatly appreciated again. 73 Ed.

DO YOU KNOW...that WFBO 1370 kcs. Decatur, Ala., has changed the time of its weekly Saturday morning DX programs to 5 to 6 A.M., EST, because of QRM from XEFZ on the same frequency...that WMFG, 1210 kcs., Hibbing, Minn., DXes for the FCC the Fourth of each month, from 1:30 to 1:50 A.M., EST...that we sent back the Zenith (poor tone, too broad) and instead are blessed with a new Philco 116K...that the best time to get KRNT, 1320 kcs., Des Moines, Iowa is just before they S.O. at 1 A.M., EST...that stations of the Canadian Radio Commission, located in the provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and Vancouver, are to have a Saturday night dance band program, starting October 19th, and continuing weekly. The time to be 11:30 P.M. to 1 A.M., Sunday...that the airplane beacon atop WNEW's 424-foot tower was found smashed, and at the bottom of the tower a spanner wrench (used by aviators) was laying. Draw your own conclusions!...that WIBA, 1280 kcs., Madison, Wisconsin increases power to 5000 watts day, 1000 nights...that WRJN, 1370 kcs., Racine, Wis. increases day power to 250 watts...that WTMJ, 620 kcs. Milwaukee, Wis., was refused renewal of license...that WSGN, 1310 kcs. Birmingham, Ala., has been bought by Scripps-Howard newspapers. As was the case with WFBE there probably will be a change of call...that CMCQ, Havana, was wrecked by vandals again and the station resumed broadcasting after a weeks lay-off...that WHN, 1010 kcs., New York, will be on the air until 4:30 A.M., EST, for the next fifty weeks, on a commercial!...that WCHS, 580 kcs., Charleston, W.Va., has changed ownership, so also watch for a possible change of call...that sweeping changes in the broadcasting spectrum are expected within the next ninety days. Under the new plan by the FCC, reallocation of channels, elimination of "cleared" channels, increasing the actual broadcast band to 1600 kcs., adding 100 new stations and increasing the power of MANY stations, are all included. (Aside to DXers: When are you going to get some sleep?)...that WSAY are the call letters assigned to Brown's Radio Service & Laboratory at Rochester, N. Y....that there will be a new station in Gastonia, N. C. on 1420 kcs. with the usual 100 watts, owned by J. B. Roberts....that the Head of the Lakes Broadcasting Co., has been granted a CP for a new station on 1370 kcs., with the usual 100 watts power, at Virginia, Minn....that WMFG, 1210 kcs., Hibbing Minn., tests the 4th of every month, and that their regular FCC test period is the first Friday from 5:50 to 6:10 A.M. EST...that KPCE, 710 kcs., Seattle, Wash., will change call to KIRO...that the new Brooklyn Daily Eagle station, supplanting WARD, WVFW and WLTH, on 1400 kcs., will use 500 watts...that WHAZ, 1300 kcs., Troy, N. Y., will have a DX program on January 19, 1936, from 3 to 4 A.M., EST...that KMO 1330 kcs., Tacoma, Wash., will DX November 23, December 21 and January 18, 1936, from 4 to 5 A.M., EST.

Mrs. A. C. Johnson, our Henry, S. D. member has kindly consented to serve as our L.P.O. observer for South Dakota. Hence she becomes NATIONAL POST #7. She also sends us word about the FCC check of WMFG which is reported in the above DX Chatter.

Carl Forestieri, NATIONAL POST #6, who we erroronously reported as living in Brooklyn, when his home is in New York City, advises us that the best time to hear KROC 1310 kcs., Milwaukee, Wis. is just around their sign off time at 1:30 A.M., E.S.T.

Russell Heller, a very good friend of the club sends us word that WKJC 1200 kcs., now located at Lancaster, Pa. will in the very near future move to Easton, Pa., and that the new owners will be known as the Associated Broadcasters, Inc. Examiner George H. Hill recommended that the control of the corporation and 70 per cent of its capital stock be transferred to the Mason-Dixon Radio Group. WKJC's moving to Easton will serve an area now without local service.

DID YOU KNOW...that a new station in British Malaya, using the call ZGR, has been heard on the 49 meter band...that ZsLB, Cape Town, South Africa, 7.10 meg., is temporarily off the air due to transmitter trouble...that CEC, 10.67 meg., Santiago de Chili, broadcasts daily from 7 to 8 P.M., EST, excepting Thursday and Sunday, when the time is 8:30 to 9 P.M.,... that a new SW station is now being constructed at Villejust, near Paris, France. It will have two transmitters, each using 100000 watts...that a new station (call reported as TICG) has been heard on 6.41 meg., located in Costa Rica...that there is no use sending Mexican stations money for verification purposes (BC or SWB DXing), inasmuch as the Mexican government custom officials confiscate all money, the stations not receiving same...that YVQ, 6.67 meg., Maracay, Venezuela, is being heard very well on their Sunday night program from 9 to 10...that "Radio Center", 25 meters, Moscow, USSR., broadcast English programs, Sunday, Monday, Wednesday and Fridays at 8 P.M., EST.
