Daytimers Deserve New AMs

Groups Suggest RARC Plans

Washington DC ... Daytimers should have preference for new channels when Region 2 expands the AM band to 1705 kHz later this decade, said NAB and ABES.

This suggestion was one of several responses to two Notices of Inquiry about plans for the 1986 Regional Administrative Radio Conference (RARC), in which Western Hemispheric countries will decide how to use the new 100 kHz of AM broadcast band.

Ten new AM frequencies will be available to major metropolitan areas, as well as rural areas, according to FCC attorney Jonathan David.

The first RARC, slated for 14 April-2 May 1986 in Geneva, Switzerland, will develop the technical criteria and planning methods for broadcast use of the 1605-1705 kHz spectrum. A second RARC session, scheduled for 1988, will consider the findings of the first conference.

Daytimer preferences

Daytimers "merit special consideration" in their quests for full-time authorization on the new band spaces because they have "technically limited facilities which place them at a significant competitive disadvantage," NAB said.

As the rules stand now, a daytimer would not be allowed to operate on a second co-band frequency in or near its particular community. In such a case, the Commission would have to grant waivers of its AM duopoly rule until the station could divest its original frequency within a specified period of time.

Instead, the FCC "might consider imposing a requirement that the AM daytime-only licensee obtaining the new AM expanded band grant divest one of the AM stations after a suggested period of five years," NAB said.

Also, RARC should reserve parts of the band for noncommercial and minority service operations, NAB and ABES added.

Technical regs

Neither NAB nor ABES want Class I stations in the new band, because sky-wave interference from the high-powered stations would preclude regional full-time operations.

Instead, NAB espoused a "compromise" to allow only Class III stations on the new band section, because Class III power allotments fall between the extremes of high- and low-power stations.

For daytime operation on the new band, NAB recommended a 5 kW minimum power level, which would provide a non-directional daytime service area of between 20 and 25 miles.

NAB also suggested nighttime operation at a 5 kW maximum and 1 kW minimum.

Since the new band's heightened sky-wave propagation would cause even greater nighttime interference, ABES recommended that Class I's (Class "A's" according to the Rio Plan), which propagate great distances at night, should not be allowed at all.

Instead, ABES recommended allowing unlimited hours of operation to an "intermixed system" of Classes B and C (which roughly correspond with Classes III and IV, respectively). Class Bs are regional operations with powers not exceeding 5 kW, while Class C powers do not exceed 1 kW.

"Experience conclusively shows that it is neither wise nor practical to create new daytime-only or other types of limited hours operations," ABES commented.

Concerned about non-broadcast services on the new band, NAB suggested that Travel Information Services (TIS) move from 1605 kHz to 1700 kHz.

"It makes little sense to interrupt the AM broadcast band with TIS operations at 1610 kHz if those operations can be moved to 1700 kHz without significant cost," NAB commented.

Planning for overall regulations, NRBA and ABES suggested that the Commission should treat the new band as an expansion of the existing AM broadcast band.

Protection ratios, class of emission, and bandwidth requirements should be the same as those regulating the existing band, ABES said.

"Uniformity in modulation standards will simplify receiver design, avoid expense and ... expedite the introduction of (535-1705 kHz capable) receivers into service," ABES said.

Advisory committee

The Radio Advisory Committee, a group of industry leaders who advise the FCC of preparations for international conferences, is now primarily concerned with RARC plans.

The Committee's technical and allocations subgroups meet individually and together to hash out specific questions. The allocations subgroup examines which localities and areas of the country should receive new radio stations, and whether public and minority groups should get the channels.

If stations in the new band segment mainly serve small communities, lower

power levels will probably be required, FCC's David said.

However, if new stations are to serve minority groups scattered throughout major metropolitan areas, higher powers would be needed to overcome the radio noise and interference found in built-up areas, David added.

David, leader of the allocations subgroup, said he wants the subgroups to represent as broad a constituency of broadcasters as possible.

"We need the give and take now," he said.

The technical subgroup is examining power levels, emissions classes and protection ratios, in addition to the possibility of sharing the new band with other services, according to technical subgroup chairman and ABES President Wallace Johnson.

The advisory committee will combine the subgroups' findings into a report, to be issued to the FCC this summer, David said.

Final plans

The FCC, which will consider the Committee's report as well as comments solicited from NOIs, expects to adopt final plans in late 1985 or early 1986.

The Commission will send its final recommendations to the US State Department for use at the first RARC session.

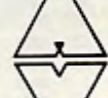
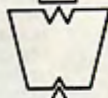
Meanwhile, in February members of the FCC attended the CITEF Conference in Lima, Peru, to iron out many of the less controversial issues regarding band expansion.

Radio-TV deals set by Taft

CINCINNATI — Taft Broadcasting Co. announced Tuesday it has agreed to sell five radio stations to CBS Inc. for \$107.5 million to clear the way for Taft to purchase 12 stations from Gulf Broadcast Co. for \$755 million.

The transactions, to be closed simultaneously this fall, are both subject to Federal Communications Commission approval and completion of other closing conditions.

The properties to be sold to CBS are KTXQ-FM, Dallas-Fort Worth; KLTR-FM, Houston; WLTT-FM, Washington, D.C.; and WSUN-AM and WYNF-FM, Tampa-St. Petersburg, Fla.

Taft announced it is selling the five radio stations to CBS to allow Taft to comply with federal regulations in buying the five television and seven radio stations from Gulf Broadcast. The Gulf properties will be held by Taft's wholly owned subsidiary, Taft Television and Radio Co.

FCC regulations prohibit one company from owning newly acquired television and radio properties in the same market. Taft officials said the company's acquisition of the Gulf stations would have resulted in such cross-ownership in the Dallas, Houston, Washington and Tampa-St. Petersburg markets.

Three of the radio stations to be sold to CBS — KTXQ, WLTT and KLTR — are among the group that Taft plans to buy from Gulf Broadcast.

The others Taft is buying in the Gulf deal are radio stations WKLS-AM and FM, Atlanta; WNDE-AM and WFBQ-FM, Indianapolis; and television stations WTSP, Tampa-St. Petersburg; KTSP, Phoenix, Ariz.; WGHP, Greensboro-Winston Salem, N.C.; KTXA, Dallas-Fort

Worth; and KTXH, Houston.

Taft has said it arranged financing for the Gulf properties purchase through a group of banks led by the Bank of New York.

Disc jockey Don Cox locked himself in station WNZ-FM in Miami, Fla., and played the song "Smuggler's Blues" 51 times to drive home a message about drugs.

The song, by Glenn Frey, outlines the dangers of a drug smuggler's life and the pervasiveness of the drug trade.

Listeners who heard the song over and over from 6 p.m. Wednesday to 10 a.m. Thursday couldn't get enough. They besieged the station with telephone calls for more.

One report said Frey, a former member of the Eagles, heard about it in Hawaii and called to ask what was going on.

"Today is a day of rebellion. How better to do it than with an anti-drug song?" Cox said.

Station management refused to comment. *Post-Tribune Gary, Ill.*

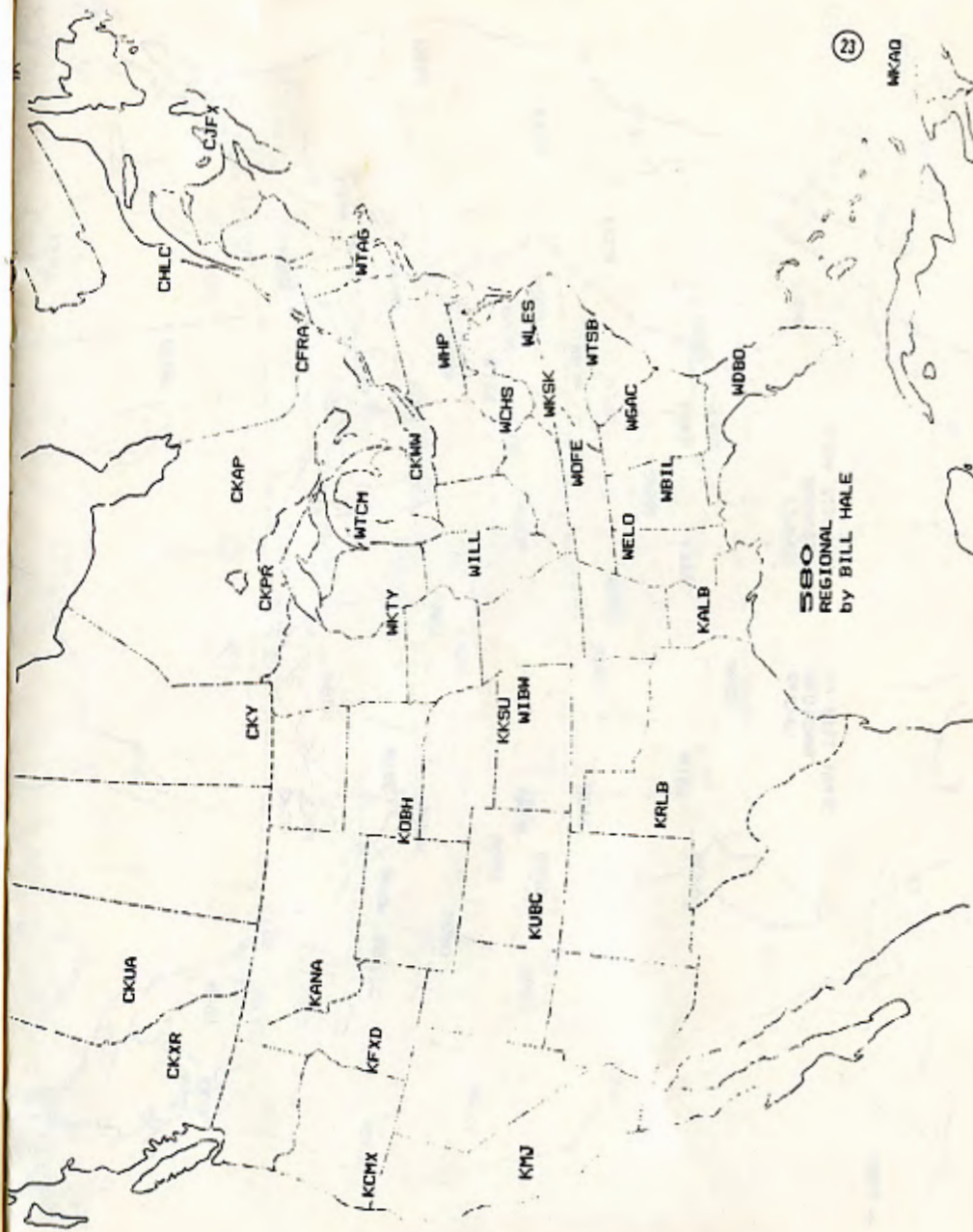

The tune, which featured the station's staff singing to the music of Murry Head's Top 40 hit "One Night in Bangkok," spoofed life in tiny Boonville, Ind., with lyrics like: "One night in Boonville feels like half a month there. 'Not much to do and even less to see.'"
 And: "It's a drag, it's a bore. They never even lock their doors. 'Haven't really seen a party since the Second World War."

 Taylor said the station was "just poking fun," but Boonville Mayor Tom Pryor wasn't amused. Pryor called the song "a slap in the face of Boonville" and asked for an apology from the station. The station didn't apologize, and Taylor said the criticism had nothing to do with his decision to pull the song. "We just felt that it attracted so much attention that listeners have burned out on it by this time," he said.

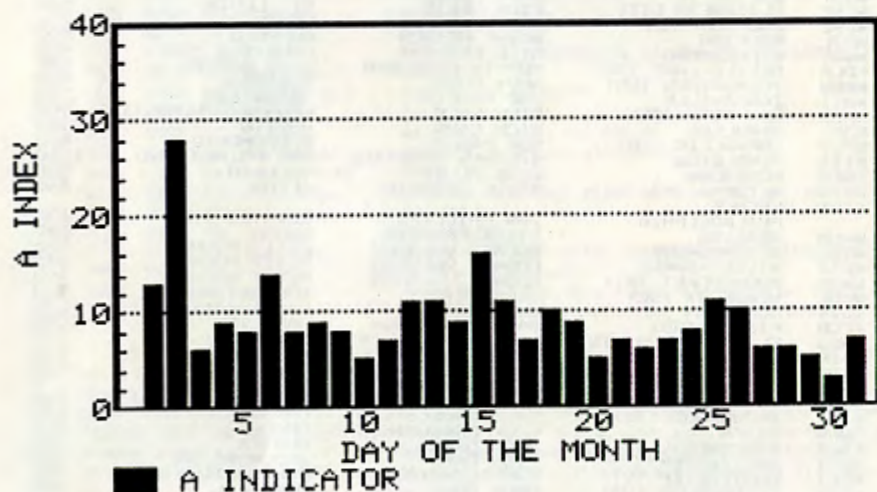

MAY/AFR GRAPH



This graph shows the daily variations in AFR, the Fredericksburg (VA) index of geomagnetic activity in the earth's magnetic field. High values (above 20) indicate that medium wave signals in upper latitude paths will likely be absorbed, thus resulting in "auroral conditions", with signals from the South and from local stations predominating due to this absorption of the more northerly signals. Low values over a period of time indicate a likelihood of more receptions of the higher-latitude paths --- more, and more northerly TA's and TP's. Several days of low values following higher ones are needed for conditions to return to "normal", due to residual absorption. Long periods of extremely low values (6 or less) are necessary to raise the possibility of good high-latitude conditions throughout the entire MW band, although this is not the only requirement. DUSTY DIALS

A Look at the History of Radio and DX

This edition of DUSTY DIALS features a profile of one of BCB DXing's most fascinating personalities, the late Henry F. Lyndall. Hank was born in 1906 in Burlington Vermont. He started DXing in 1923 and started verifying in 1924. Hank was actively DXing thru the late 1960s, with a reputed total of 6,925 BCB verifications from 166 countries. Yes, 6,925 and 166, that's no typo! More about those totals later in this story, which as you will see, sets quite involved.

There are very few surviving DXers who knew Hank personally. Much of what I know about him was learned in discussions with his close friend the late Carleton Lord, an article published 25 years ago in a short lived DX magazine letters written by Hank, an unforgettable night in 1964 spent on Dick Cooper's front porch listening to DX lore from Dick and Ray Edge until 6 a.m., various musings by Hank over the years in NNRC and NRC, and from Bob Curtis, who plays golf with an old golf partner of Hank's.

Personally, when I first joined NNRC in 1957, and NRC in 1959, I found that the listed accomplishments of DXers like Hank made them semi-legendary heroes to a BCB Club neophyte like myself.

Hank lived in the same house in Burlington from birth thru retirement in 1965. He was proprietor of Lyndall's Paint Shop, which was started by his father, Henry T. Lyndall, Sr., and it was a successful auto body repair and painting enterprise. Hank's first marriage was in 1929, and he and bride Clara went to Florida for their honeymoon on a Harley Davidson motorcycle, making a side trip to Newport Rhode Island, where Hank waited three hours for the C.E. to show up so he could get a delinquent reception report verified! After retirement, they sold the old home, bought a home in Shelburne along with a mobile trailer home that they used for winter vacationing in Florida. The Lyndalls had no children, and Clara passed away in the late 1960s. In Florida, Hank married again, but it lasted six months. Hank then moved back to Shelburne, where he passed on around 1978. Hank was one who lived life to the fullest. He was an enthusiastic skier, an avid golfer (playing over 1600 courses in all the contiguous states and Alaska), had a fully restored Ford Model A convertible, was an avid nature photographer, was quite an active athlete in his younger days, and he travelled extensively. Yet, he managed to find the time to amass those totals: ... 6,925 veries in 166 countries. I gather that Hank's business was very lucrative over the years, allowing his extensive travels after retirement. Of interest is the fact that the Lyndall's never owned a TV set until after he retired. On one occasion he said that the BCB was his only iron in the fire, and that it never lacked his undivided attention over the years, but in 1939 he was published as saying he had quit short wave DXing. Accounts by people who knew Hank reveal that he was an exceptionally popular man, both in DX circles and in his home area. His musings in the old NNRC were perhaps the most delightful to read by anyone in any club, on a par with those by NRC's beloved unforgettable Ralph "Uncle Ralphie" Johannis. In the NNRC, which in its heyday was not only the top BCB DX club but also promoted friendship as a personal value no less important than DX skills, (something we ALL should remember), Hank was really liked and respected as a warm human being. People cite his personal honesty and integrity, and not one disparaging word has been unearthed to date. He was also quite witty, in the dry New England tradition, and his musings can bring a smile even when read today. As an adult, Hank was known to join in any baseball etc. game being played in his neighborhood by kids much younger than him.

There is a photo accompanying this article of "Lyndall's Tavern", photo being made by Carleton Lord. The Lyndalls would buy two bottles of each and every liqueur they came across. One bottle would be consumed, and the other would be kept unopened in the collection which is in this photograph. It has always fascinated me how many of us BCB DXers are of the "collector" and "totaler" types. Hank collected fine liqueurs and kept detailed totals of how many golf courses (a tee-totaler?) he played.

Hank did not join NRC until 1955. Before that he was a very prominent member of NNRC. In a letter written by Hank in the 1960s, he mentions that his reason for joining NRC finally was due to the best DXers then being nearly exclusively NRCers, an oblique statement that NNRC was long past its glory days. 1955 was also the year that Carleton Lord joined NRC. Just before World War II, Hank bought a Hammarlund HQ-120-X, which was his only receiver for the rest of his days at the dials. The author is also the proud owner of one of these magnificent sets, and feels it is one of the better Hammarlunds, somewhat equivalent to the HQ-150, and far better in quality and performance than the relatively cheap intervening HQ-129-X model. Along with the HQ-120-X, Hank had a simple 80' inverted L antenna. I drove past his old QTH on North Street in 1973, and found the noise level rather high then. Carleton Lord also found it a noisy QTH in his visits to

Hank. Years ago, while visiting with Ray Edse and Dick Cooper in Kittanning, they told me that Hank's fabulous DX claims were possible due to his close proximity to Lake Champlain. However the house was at least a half mile from the lake and in a densely built up area. Bob Curtis, who lives in a much quieter location a few miles North of Hank's old home, has never found ECB foreigners to be anywhere near at the levels and frequency or reception that Hank's verification totals might suggest. So, exactly what was Hank Tyndall's secret method or there in the Green Mountains of Vermont? At this point in the story, we have to examine several of Hank's statements on his own DXing achievements. A 1939 musings in NNRC stated that he had not heard a DU Zedder or Aussie since 1931 and he bemoaned that he did not have a very good location for foreign DX, these statements being made when his countries verified total was under one third of his final claim of 166. In a letter written in the 1960s, Hank mentioned frequently receiving letters from fledglings young DXers asking what his secret method was. He stated that there was NO secret or gimmick. Another musings once bemoaned that a number of stations were non verifiers due to the number of bad reports that were increasingly being sent by younger DXers. We also have to mention the one full page summary of Hank's verifications, typed and published by Dick Cooper in DX NEWS in the mid 1960s. Some of the totals claimed were: 2 from India, 24 Alaskans, 203 from Europe, 64 from Asia, 261 from South America, 43 from Africa, 114 from Oceania, 228 from Mexico, 34 from Japan, 1 from the Faroe Islands, 55 Brazilians, 26 Hawaiians, and a total of 1,586 veries from ECB foreign stations! At the time these totals were not questioned. A subsequent article in DX NEWS analyzed some of Hank's Asian and Pacific veries, and concluded, somewhat poker faced, that they proved that maybe high sunset years apparently had little effect on high latitude path long haul ECB DX.

Yes, but Hank HAD the veries, and as some old timers falsely still insist, 'a verification is proof of reception'. Well, a couple years later, Hank was suddenly gone from NRC, and for years the true story was a confidential matter.

Before I get into the details surrounding Hank's departure from the NRC, I should remind all of the Chicago 'Black Sox' World Series scandal, and the cry of Chicago star Shoeless Joe Jackson's young idolizing fans: 'Say it ain't so, Joe!', and I should remind all of the mortal weaknesses of us all, and the countless falls from grace by people at the top, whether in pro sports, politics, the arts or any other walk of life. In those days NRC and NNRC had 'rankings', with NRC's being known as 'SUPREMACY RATINGS', implying much more than a hobby achievement. Hank was always at the top. In the late 1960s Hank was caught red handed. He had sent a reception report to a station based on a logging by someone else, as published in DX NEWS. Hank admitted to the deed, and was asked to quietly resign from NRC, which he did.

Later on the pieces began to surface as to his secret method. It must be stated however that evidence indicates that Hank was every bit one of the top two or three legitimate DXers until sometime around 1950 or so, when the band began to deteriorate due to HSPs, ANs, and galliumfric (love that word!) frequency congestion.

It is speculated that Hank feared being toppled as 'Numero Uno' in the Supremacy Ratings. This behavior is common in people 'at the top' in any field. A fear of loss of stature results in a reaction of trying to retain one's position at any cost, in any manner. About the same time, the late Joe Becker decided to call it quits as far as DXing, and in my opinion Joe retired as 'cheap', in 1951, at 64, living another 21 years, to 85. Hank's secret method was simple: send a follow up reception report without any verifiable details, without having ever sent an original report with details; then bombard the station with follow-ups until they send a 'verie' to get you off their back! That and use of prepared cards was enough for Hank to amass 6,925 veries in 166 countries. DXers visiting stations that kept files of DXer reception reports, saw the pattern repeated over and over. The 'smoking gun' use of a published logging was the other method. My purpose in writing this is not to 'expose' Hank Tyndall. I still think

he was, at least until the 1950s, one of the top DXers, and I think that you, the reader see the personal tragedy in this weakness of an otherwise very likable human being. We published his photo in the 50th Anniversary Book, because, as I said then, 'the legend is greater than the man'. Hank never confided his own feelings on the matter, not even to his close friend Carleton Lord. Carleton had his own personal doubts about Hank's later DXing, but as Carleton told me, the man was otherwise a long time friend of remarkable likability, and in the early days, a hell of a good DXer. A few of us had realized that this story had to be told sooner or later. We never met the man, but we share an empathy for the man and his mortal weakness. Plus we also realized that this story must be told as a lesson to all.

Hank's fall was from the top. Over the years there have been numerous cases

of gross fraudulence amongst DXers. Collectively they have been, perhaps, a major reason why stations don't verify legitimate reports. However, sooner or later, they are discovered, and their names are well known. The demise of DXers doing for verifications is due to many reasons: increasing cost, understaffed overworked station personnel, frequent call changes bringing a deluge of reports from the same DXers, little practical value to stations of reports (with exceptions of course), lapses as the ultimate proof of a reception and the near meaninglessness of a paper verification as proof of reception. Page Taylor once speculated that anyone could verify at least 75 countries on ECB by merely opening the WRTVH, never turning on a receiver! That is probably right on. It is a souvenir at best, occasionally it is meaningful when a legitimately tentative report is verified. The saying 'To thine own self be true' is certainly a wise one to follow for ECB DXers. Hank is gone, his 6,925 'replies' from stations long ago trashed. According to one account, Hank himself destroyed them before his death. It all reminds me of the final scenes in one of the all time film classics, Orson Welles' 'Citizen Kane'. In closing, I hope this article has been of benefit in reminding all of human nature, has warned the unscrupulous in our midst, and has been a lesson to all of us. This hobby is nothing else but a hobby, to be honestly enjoyed, and I like to think Hank finally realized that truth.

Classical music plays in the background as 20-year-old Jade Howell slings her air rifle over her shoulder and heads out the door on the prowl for rattlesnakes.

"I don't want to kill 'em," she says. "But what do you do?"

Over the past two days Howell, who works in the hills above Sausalito as an engineer for KDFC radio, has been forced to shoot five diamondhead rattlesnakes — some measuring two feet in length — to keep them out of her studio.

They linger around the doorway — but Howell thinks their interest in the studio has more to do with resident mice than a proclivity for high-brow music.

Her 6 a.m. to noon job is to change pre-recorded taped music at the station. But at least once the usual classical format turned into dead air space when she spied a rattlesnake heading straight toward her.

With a certain amount of fanfare, she swept it out of the room "while it tried to attack the broom and my ankles at the same time."

She says she knows the show must go on.

"But this is getting a little ridiculous."

Although it's a little early in the season, the recent hot weather has probably brought rattlesnakes out in numbers in most brushy areas around Marin County.

They're looking for mates and food, according to Kris Thorne of the Marin Wildlife Center.

Thorne says she has successfully sent them scurrying by squirting water at them or turning up a radio to scare them — a tactic that apparently has not worked in Howell's case.

The Wildlife Center would rather people try to live with wild creatures — not kill them.

Sunrise and sunset calculations are important aids in the process of determining skip propagation viability on a given DX path. On the frequencies below 5 MHz, minimum skip attenuation generally occurs when the entire signal path is in darkness. Some enhancement may occur if one or both ends of the path is in the "grey zone" (within approximately (plus or minus) 15 minutes of sunrise or sunset). Reports of long-haul signals of incredible strength, especially on the tropical shortwave bands, have been linked to a signal path lying entirely along the "grey line": the day/night boundary.

Two BASIC programs dealing with sunrise/sunset calculations are presented here. Each program's report print-out precedes the actual program listing so that DXers not familiar with programming can immediately see the results which, after all, are the reason for the programs' existence. Both programs use a math. subroutine module derived from an earlier (less-automated) program presented by Ron Schatz in NRC's DX News circa 1982/1983. Both programs are written in DEC (v1.1-60) BASIC-PLUS-2; they run on a PDP-11 under the RSX-11M+ operating system; and they send their outputs to editable / printable disk text files. Modifications must be made to the programs to allow output to be sent directly to a printer and to allow running of the programs on other computers. The necessary modifications, in most cases, should be of a minor nature.

Both programs can link to Geodata disk files which contain up to 128 sets of location names / coordinates each. Refer to the "BEAMIAIC" Great-Circle Distance / Bearing article to see how Geodata files are created and modified.

The first program, SUNTABLE.B2S, generates a table of sunrise & sunset times for a user-selected site for 48 dates throughout the year (4 per month). Sites may be selected manually or they may be picked from a Geodata file read by the program. Times are expressed in both GMT and local time (Eastern time was used — the programmer can tweak the program if another local time zone is desired). The following output file, COODSUN.TXT, was generated by the SUNTABLE program:

HOW SWEET HE WAS

A Tribute to the Voice of Pittsburgh Pirates on KDKA
(1916-1985)

"Bobby Clemente hits it a mile...way back...and you can kiss it goodbye!" "...Bobby Clemente is totally annihilating Baltimore pitching!" "...Stuck him out swinging!" "...Haddix pitches a perfect 9 inning, no hit, no run game!" "...(foul) just by a gnat's eyelash..." "...closer than fuzz on a tick's ear" "We need a bloop and a blast..." "there's a bug on a rug!" "We need a Hoover!" "...chicken on the Hill with Will!" "We had'em all the way!...How sweet it is!"

Pittsburgh and many other of his fans were saddened to hear that the man who spoke these colorful phrases and who was known as "The Gunner", Mr. Robert F. Prince, 68, died on Monday, June 10, 1985 at 5:35pm.

Of all the things that have happened to the Pirates in 1985, the selling of the team, the drug investigation, the firing of General Manager Peterson, and the team's losing record, it was a kind and civic-minded gesture that KDKA did to bring back the legendary Pirate broadcaster. In hopes of sparking a larger interest and possibly improve attendance, "The Gunner" came back on the air, Friday night, May 3rd, for a weekend series with the Dodgers. The pictures included show Mr. Prince being welcomed back by the present oice of the Pirates, Lanny Frattare, and acknowledging the greetings from the Three Rivers Stadium crowd. Bob did the middle three innings with Jim Rooker, the other Pirate announcer. Along with Frattare, it was hoped those three could be a superior team. As I listened to Mr. Prince's first game, I was stunned to hear he final was 16-2, pirates, with 9 runs in the fourth inning including Bob mentioning that Pirate first baseman, Jason Thompson, "might as well ding one", and he did! A "dinger" in Mr. Prince's lore was a homerun. Two week later during a short homestand with the Reds in a two hour rain delay, Mr. Prince came down with pneumonia and was hospitalized on May 20th. Then just 6 weeks after cancer surgery on his throat, Bob Prince was gone.

That night on WTAE's and KDKA's talk shows, the tributes flowed from the public as well as from baseball greats Dick Groat, Warren Spahn, and Lou Berdette, and from Mr. Prince's broadcasting partner from 1958-69, Jim Woods. KDKA-TV also had a 40 minute special with tributes from ex-Pirate pitcher Steve Blass, Woods again, Jack Buck of KMOX (as the Cardinals were in town) who mentioned "Bob treated everybody like a star", and Mr. Prince's second partner from 1967-75, Nellie King. There were two moments of silence, one before Monday's night game and the second at 8PM, Sunday night, June 16th, the day of Mr. Prince's memorial service. Sunday nights one minute of silence came after KDKA's "Sport Huddle" talk show and tuning around the band, was also on 4 AM stations (WAO, WAMO, KQW, WPLW) and 4 PM stations (WJUG, WPNT, WYDD, WAMU). Many people said Bob Prince was a friend to all, the rich, the famous, and the common person. Others spoke of how Mr. Prince helped people by lending his money and of his great charity work with the Allegheny Valley School or Exceptional Children. Flamboyant, a quick wit, and colorful personality were traits to describe Bob Prince. Sam Nover of WPXI-TV said, "Bob was the King of the (Pittsburgh broadcasting) industry." Met's announcer and former Pirate Ralph Kiner said, "He was Mr. Pittsburgh. When you thought of Pittsburgh, you thought of Bo Prince." As for myself, I never had the opportunity to meet Mr. Prince, but I grew up listening to any of his games, and in my mind, and in the minds of many, Prince and the Pirates were inseparable.

Following graduation from Oklahoma University and attending Harvard Law School, Bob Prince's sportscasting career started at WJAS in 1941. In 1947, Mr. Prince began as an understudy to Rosey Rosewell, another great Pirate broadcaster, at WJSW, then holding Pirate broadcasting rights. Bob not only spelled Rosewell at the mike, he was also Rosewell's sound effects man. Recreating road games via telegraph tickertape in the WJSW studios in the old Sherwyn Hotel, Rosewell described a Pirate homerun by telling "Aunt Hinnie" to run upstairs to open that window, "because here she (the ball) comes!" However, it was too late and the sound of her window shattering was created when Bob dropped a garbage can lid or a tray of nuts and bolts to the floor. During the off season, Mr. Prince also did Steeler football for 11 years and Penn State football for 9 years. Following Rosewell's death in 1955, Bob became the top man and a year later moved over to KDKA as they took over the Pirate broadcasting rights. An important lesson Mr. Prince learned from Rosewell was that if the Pirates wee down by a big score, "you've got to keep people interested with

funny stories, names, and reminiscences...and to be able to pronounce towns around Pittsburgh correctly - Monaca, Monessen, and Zelienople."

In my younger days in the 1960s when I first started listening to baseball, I can remember Mr. Prince ranting and raving for the Pirates. Around 1966, Bob introduced the "Green Weenie", so fans could put "the whammy" on visiting teams. In one game, it got Don Drysdale so upset, he turned to the umpire and said, "How can you concentrate with that silly idiot up there in the booth getting everybody to wave those weenies at me?" The umpire didn't know, but told Drysdale to pitch. Then Bobby Clement hit a bases-loaded triple. Late in 1970-71, Bob Prince was encouraging women to wear babushkas to Pirate "Babushka Power"! I also remember Bob using the phrase "we need Hoover (get a double play, so we can clean the bases)" many times, but KDKA-owned Westinghouse didn't make Hoovers and we're mad, so Mr. Prince once said, "OK, I'll take a small Bissell instead", and that made them even angrier! The "chicken on the Hill with Will" phrase was used in the 70s whenever Willie Stargell was up a bat or hit a homerun. The "chicken on the Hill" referred to a place in Pittsburgh's Hill District owned by Stargell similar to Kentucky Fried. On time, again in 1971, Mr. Prince mentioned free chicken to anyone if Stargell would hit a homerun at that time at bat...well you guess what happened. The phrase or goof I'll always remember was during a game in Wrigley Field against the Cubs in 1968. A ninth inning, two out, easy flyball was hit t Pirate centerfielder Matty Alou that Mr. Prince non-chalantly described as a "big 'ole 210 pound can of golden banton corn", but Alou drop it! That eventually resulted in the game being tied and the Cubs went on to win in extra innings. If ever Bob used that phrase agin, it was with tongue-in-cheek.

Mr. Prince liked to give ballplayers and people names. Some former Pirates were the Dog (Bob Skinner), the Kitten (Harvey Haddix), the Tiger (Don Hoak), the Duck (Dick Schofield), the Quail (Bill Virdon), and his former partner the Possum (Jim Woods). Bob Prince also liked to say about Clemente, "Arriba Ro-ber-to!" Though it was Woods who bestowed "The Gunner" on Mr. Prince and while Woods wouldn't say why in the paper, he did disclose the truth on the KDKA-TV Tribute. Many years again in spring training, both men went to a bar, where Bob sat next to a woman to converse, but her husband didn't like this and later put a loaded gun to Mr. Prince's head. Fortunately, Bob escaped the incident and when they started a game the next day, Woods introduced his partner as "The Gunner".

Following the 1975 season, the shockwaves which would be felt by many Pirate fans for years to come occurred. Mr. Prince's 28 years of Pirate broadcasting came to an end with a controversial firing by KDKA. Also gone was his partner Nellie King. Mr. Prince "brooded and brooded" over this, by slowly came back. In 1976, Bob Prince became the first play-by-play announcer on ABC TV's Monday Night Baseball while also doing Houston Astros baseball. However, Bob could not get adjusted to this new image, so he came back to Pittsburgh. Later, Mr. Prince formed "The Gunner Network" based from WYDD-FM on Saturday mornings, did commentary on WTAE-TV, and for three yers returned o his first station, WJAS, as sports director. In 1982, slowly coming closer to the Pirates, Prince did cablecasts of their games. Then finally at long last in 1985, Bob Prince was brought back to KDKA, but the man was ill and the voice was not the same. As Nellie King sad the day after Mr. Prince's death, "It was kind of sad hearin him that night (May 3rd)...if you heard Bob Prince whn he was god, you knew this wasn't the same"

Mr Prince will always be remembered as a legend in Pittsburgh. Remembered as a man with "the elegance of expression". Tonight on This Week in Baseball, Mel Allen summed it all up by saying Bob was, "a Prince of a man". Thus ends...my tribute...to Robert F. Prince....How Sweet He Was.
