Status changes in AM stations, supplied by the FCC and listeners

FLASH! FCC SCRAPS LIST OF EXPANDED BAND ALLOTMENTS! Just as we go to press we have learned that the FCC has rescinded The List. As the result of several petitions filed by unsuccessful applicants the FCC has admitted that there were errors in their engineering database and "improvement factors" used to generate the list of stations moving to the expanded band that was released earlier this year. They have also redefined the U. S.-Canadian border. Previously the border included some water boundaries. The Commission is changing this to define the border by land mass only. In addition the database may have "overprotected" some TIS stations. The result of this whole mess? The FCC will have to completely re-do the computer model with all these changes and generate a brand new list of stations who can apply for a CP to move to new frequencies between 1610 and 1700 kHz. Your old list? Well, you can keep it as a souvenir of FCC ineptness or toss it in the circular file. The new list could be significantly different. There is no word on how this will affect the WJDM-1530 entry you'll find below in Otherness so we have left this information intact. This last-minute news was received after this edition of AMS was completed.

 1260 KKER AZ Casa Grande: silent station is ON THE AIR
 1340 WWNH NH Madbury: this station (and FM affiliate WRUT 107.5) are announcing that their 1400 kHz station, WTJH in Roxbury, NH is about to begin operations. The problem? WTJH's CP and call were deleted and cancelled by the FCC in 1992. Furthermore, MSJ reports that it now appears that WWNH itself may be operating without authorization and that the FCC does not believe it to be operating. This could get pretty interesting.
 1410 WVKK AL Prattville: silent station is ON THE AIR
 1500 KJIM TX Sherman: silent station has entered an LMA with owners of KWSM-FM Sherman and may be ON THE AIR by the time this reaches you
 1510 KMRF MO Marshfield: CP for 1000 D3 is on (brand-new two-tower transmitter site is right on the south side of I-44; construction was still going on as we passed while on vacation)
 1530 WJDM NJ Elizabeth: FCC has issued STA (Special Temporary Authority) for WJDM to begin operations on their expanded band frequency of 1660 kHz. Since all expanded band CPs are being held up while the FCC deals with 16 petitions for reconsideration from unsuccessful applicants disputing the allotment procedures, this STA will probably assure WJDM the honor of being the first commercial operation in the expanded band. Owner John Quinn hopes to have the 1660 facility operating in October. According to WJDM there are already over 16 million radios in the NYC metro with coverage to 1700 kHz and more than 270 million nationwide. The decision on whether to simulcast on 1530 kHz or to convert the 1530 facilities to 1660 kHz has not yet been made.
 1570 WBUX PA Doylestown: silent station (previously reported) has asked FCC for permission to remain silent for six months to facilitate tower replacement.



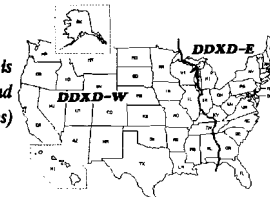

[Two other "expanded-band" items are in SPECIAL, below.] Welcome back to the NRC and this column, **Chris Knight** of Northglenn, Colorado. **Ron Donath** of Las Vegas says he has accumulated a small amount of antenna clamps/hardware, plus small variable capacitors from AM-FM radios, and a few electronic texts from the 40s and 50s. If anyone is interested in acquiring any of these items, let me know and I'll put **Ron** in contact with you. He also needs **Radio West's** phone number. Seems he's tried the number listed in NRC publications and got some poor soul who's getting a lot of errand calls.



Bruce speaks (should have been in the last edition): "Comments: Mark Connelly's exploration of coastal locations north of Boston has resulted in a new site perfect for mini-DXpeditions; the Parker River NWR. Lots of birds, not many bugs on the night of AUG 27 when Tom Beaton and I visited the site. The reservation mainly consists of salt marsh, with a path leading out to Nelson Island, directly east of the end of the access road. Antenna wires were run in parallel along the path. Beverage-length wires could possibly extend north, east, and south, although hip-boots are recommended for stepping off the Nelson Island path. It might be easier to traverse the salt marsh in winter if it freezes. This will definitely be a primary location for future DXpeditions."

The big change here is that WINE-940 up in Brookfield has gone to an automated country format, to be the fourth AM station in the Metro New York area to do so. And, on our annual hiking trip to Coos County, NH, we found a new country FM station, WXLQ - 106.1, "White Mountains Country" on the air in Berlin, sharing WMOU-1240's tower and simulcasting WMOU during AM drive. Otherwise, WMOU is still automated and satellite - fed oldies.

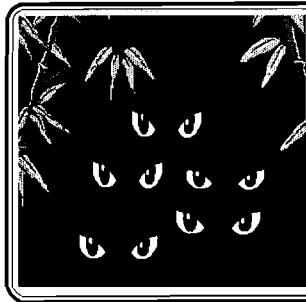

Between 7/24 and 8/4, the wife and I decided to spend 10 days in the Island of Kauai which is the most W island of Hawaii. On this trip, I decided to take along a new Sony ICF-5W7600G with the sync detector. The first 5 days were spent in the Hanalei Bay area which is in the N part of the island. The resort where we stayed was free electrical noise which is common in such places. At this location, I assumed that if any DXing was done, it would come from the W coast, W Canada, far E AK due to some mountains blocking the S, ie: Tahiti, New Zealand and Australia. The other 5 days were spent at the Poipu Beach area, which is on the S side of the island. Here are some of my findings: In Hanalei Bay, the following were received on a regular basis at night: KABL-960, KIQI-1010, KFAX-1100, KNX-1070, KGO-810, KNBR-680, KFI-640, KEX-1190, all heard at various times and at various levels. Lots of hets on the split channels were noted between 11PM and 6AM local time, with 7/30 noting hets on 612, 621, 639, 738, 747, 792, 819, 828, 882, 972, 1008, 1098, 1143, 1242, 1332, 1341, 1467 and 1548. Noted a Far E Russian on LW on 180 and 189. The in Poupi area, (??-pls) Tahiti-738 was noted with French programming at 10PM. Also noted Tauranga-1008 between 4-5AM; sounded like a phone in program in English. On 7/31, noted Melbourne-774 with ABC news at 4AM, very weak. Heard a station on 810 several times but very weak, it wasn't KGO, but seemed to be 2 stations, one in English, the other in Spanish but could never get an ID. The English station sounded either like a New Zealand or Australian type accent. All of the stations mentioned were received on the mentioned Sony portable with its built in antenna. It seems to me if a person with a communications receiver, loop antenna and beverages could indeed get great DX on the island, lots of clear channels on the dial as local stations are few. 73's

My 884th and last was XEDM-1580 Hermosillo, MX 11/52. For various reasons, I've not verified any stations in the last 43 years, but I still frequently punch up a set of test frequencies to see if the Caribbean and /or Venezuela and Columbia are coming in (533, 650, 700, 750). YVKS-750 Caracas is frequently heard on the car radio. My DXing hit a road block in 1952 when I traded my HWQ129X for a Hallicrafters that had a FM band. What a mistake! Its specs look almost as good as the R8 for \$400 less. My wife says I can buy either one if I get rid of my R390, R392, HQ180, HC-SX100 and NC125! Something from each of the world's best hollow-state manufacturers. They all work well, except the R390, which has lost its sensitivity. It's time for a reintro! I believe the last one was in 1985! I'm 50 years old, single and an NRCer since 1961. I got into the radio game in 1957 as a SWL and drifted into BCB DXing in 1960. In 1967, I got my ham ticket. Between 1960 and 74, I DXed from Pointe Claire, PQ, in the W end of Montreal. My main radio was an RCA AR88D, a 14 tube war surplus set. Other sets included a Howard 430, an NC109 and grandmother's old Philco console. In the early 60's, I DXed the BCB obsessively. The best period was the winters of '63-'65 with 40 new TA and many LA's and other goodies. By 65, I diverted more energy into university studies, BCB DXing became and on/off pursuit. I graduated from McGill in 1967 and passed my "CA" exams in 1969. My career has been in professional accounting and business planning. In the early 1970's, I briefly lived in Toronto but returned to Montreal in 1971 to work in industry. I got back into BCB DX for a while and had logged over 1500 when the Pointe Claire era ended in 74. That year, the AR88D broke down for good, my career was taking off and BCB DX ground to a halt. I moved to an apartment in Nuns' Island, close to downtown Montreal. Between 1977 and '85, a Radio Shack 'TRF' performed very well for me despite the limits of apartment DXing. In 1986, I had a rebirth of serious BCB DXing thanks to BILL GRANT and GEORGE HAKIEL, I was the proud owner of both an R390A and HQ180AC. I rounded out my shack with a Superadio II and a Radio West Loop. Outside, I improvised a 125 ft. LW in

the large courtyard behind my apartment. In the winter, it was snowed in and few people went there. I strung the antenna through the trees in November and took it down at Easter. Nobody noticed it during 6 years of great service on both SW and AM. This setup put me back in business for serious TA DXing during the peak years of 86-87 and good domestic DX after that. In 1991, a corporate restructuring moved me to Cornwall, where I have DXed modestly. I may have more time to DX in the coming season. Last winter, another restructuring eliminated my job. I am still looking for another, likely in another town. There is a chance of staying here as self-employed or free-lance. I have improvised a LW for BCB DX this coming winter. Current totals are about 1775 logged with 1695 verified from 71 countries. Its been a long time since I had any official club duties, my last contributions were in 1983 with the French report package and the 50th anniversary book. Long before that, I hosted the 1966 convention in Montreal, the only one ever in Canada. I also arranged a handful of CPC Tests in 1963-65. Between 1963 and 68, I was the BCB editor of the old Canadian DX club (CDXC) now defunct. The social side of the NRC brings out a great camaraderie for our unique hobby. Over the years, I have enjoyed attending several of RAY ARRUDA's 'Lower Deck' gatherings in Acushnet as well as 14 official NRC conventions. For various reasons, the most enjoyable conventions for me were Amarillo-1961 (hi Larry!), Montreal-1966, Boston-1968, Pittsburgh-1990 and Nashua-1994. Good DX and 73!

Every year I hope to be more involved with the club, rather than just being a lurker. Often attending the convention gets me in the right frame of mind; though I didn't attend this year, here's a MUSING for the reintroduction issue anyway. I'm in my 21st year of continuous NRC membership, pretty amazing since I'm still 29 years old and holding! Was also in the JRCA from 73-82 and even served on their BoD many moons ago. It seems that I did about 75% of my DXing and 99% of my station verifying during my high school years in Teaneck, which is probably just as well given the lower response rates I'm hearing about these days, plus I did try to verify all my locals and some of them have changed calls since then (missed out on the ones that went off, like WPOW-1330 and WAWZ-1380). These days when I DX, its more of the FM-DX approach, listen long enough to get an ID and then move on to the next frequency rather than listen for 15 minutes 'to get enough for a report'. Have also DXed from NYC in '77-78, Nelsonville, OH from '78-80, then from greater Monmouth since 1990. Technically, my totals started over as it was a 43 mile move, but I haven't actually entered my AM DX into the stations-heard log yet. What's kept me interested all these years despite never getting that multi-hundred-dollar communications receiver is all the radio-related hobbies. In the 70's, the big collecting item was music surveys, in the 80's it evolved into bumper and window stickers. These days, I'm more involved with aircheck tapes than anything else in the radio related hobbies. That in mind, let me say that I'm interested in recordings of Top 40 stations that you made yourself, especially from 1969-1974, the first 6 years I listened to music on the radio, and before I got suitable recording equipment myself.

Am much less interested in airchecks you got from someone else because most of them have already 'made the rounds'. Another interest that has evolved is trying to keep up with the status of stations either licensed to, or with tower sites in NJ, both AM and FM. I've made 4 trips to the FCC Mass Media reading room in Washington, useful for details behind

Normally when I send in to these columns, I have good news to report with new loggings or some local change on the radio scene in the Toledo area. This time however is different. Perhaps by the time you read this you will have learned of the sad news involving the passing of one of the DX fields most accomplished DXers. On 8/7, very good friend and spirited DXer KEN ROMSTADT of Ottawa Lake, MI (suburban Toledo, Ken was a native Toledoan having grown up in my neighborhood in the Point Place section of Toledo) died of natural causes at the age of 39. He leaves behind wife Cheryl and son Kevin along with a host of memories that we as DXers shared. I knew Ken for some 35 years, even before either of us got into the DX hobby. When I got interested in the hobby in the mid '60's, Ken became interested soon after and took the hobby up seriously after 1970. While I may have been the catalyst for getting him started in DXing, he took the hobby to very accomplished heights. Many of you may have not been familiar with Ken (although some of you met him at the 1971 IRCA, 1974 NRC and 1984 IRCA Toledo conventions) he did have a way of carving out friendships in the hobby while not being widely traveled. It was through Ken that my own DX horizons and some of my best friendships developed in the hobby were forged and expanded. Had it not been for Ken, I might not have heard or known about the DX clubs such as IRCA, NRC and

WTFDA. Some of my earliest introductions to other DX'ers such as DAN MYERS, FRANK MERRILL, GEORGE GREENE among others were through Ken, so many like Dan, Frank and George have proven to be lasting friendships that I owe quite a debt to him that can never be repaid but through these pages you will come to know Kenny a little better than you might have. Ken was not a bragger when it came to DX or in life. He went about his business as best as he could. While we were competitors on the DX field, we were also friends as I mentioned and often exchanged notes on catches, tips, and conditions. 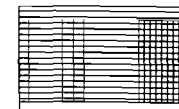
