From the publisher ... We debut a new, but not really new, column this issue, in "DX'er's Notebook", with Dave Braun editing it. Okay, so it's the former "Target DX" column renamed to reflect more accurately the content. Through the medium of the Internet, and more specifically the listserv hosted by www.nrcdxas.org, Dave has been selecting the most useful of the spontaneous on-line discussions concerned with DX tips and topics. We had been concerned that some of these on-line comments, made by noted experts in the field of DX'ing, might vanish without a trace and without being read and enjoyed by the rest of the NRC membership, so Dave agreed to survey the ongoing discussion and edit them for placement in the more permanent paper pages of *DX News*. And since he's done so, more comments and articles have been generated and have ended up in *DXN* for all to take advantage of.

We think "DX'er's Notebook" is an excellent compromise for those members who do not have access to the Web but would like to take part in some of the discussions. Meanwhile, "Musings of the Members", which has been slowly decreasing

in contributions over the years, can still serve as a forum for independent contributions, "mini-articles", DX tips, and certainly ideas and DX experiences for anyone, and indeed has been the place for some "spillover" from ideas discussed online.

So what happens to "Target DX"? I still say that there's a need for a column in which tips for DX'ing "smart" can be shared. And not only that, I firmly believe that our newer members need a forum in which they can ask questions and receive some guidance from more experienced members. We have tried two similar columns in the past, "The Answerman" and "For Beginners", which for various reasons faded out, but perhaps now, with the more instantaneous advantage of asking questions on a listserv and quickly receiving expert answers, we can refocus a question-and-answer forum which could be conducted online and edited and reprinted in "Target DX", with special consideration for new members who may not be used to "expert" DX techniques nor DX "jargon" ... and who might leave the club in frustration after finding that *DXN* has not served their needs. I'm therefore asking for someone to step forward, coordinate efforts with Dave Braun, and edit "Target DX" with these ideals in mind.

Good news is that we're just a few mouseclicks away from announcing a new editor for *DDXD-East*, pending formal acceptance by those concerned.

Finally, if the NRC and *DXN* are not serving your needs, please contact either a Board member or the Publisher with your concerns. We might just turn you into an editor if you have a specific proposal, but we certainly would like to have feedback so we can correct any problems of which we may not be aware.

DX Time Machine

From the pages of *DX News*:

50 years ago ... from the February 11, 1950 *DXN*: Pat Reilly, Jamestown, NY, reported hearing KPOA with a broadcast of a Hawaiian heavyweight championship wrestling match on Feb. 6 at 3:10 am.

25 years ago ... from the February 24, 1975 *DXN*: Marty Wright, Springfield, IL, listed his best catch of the season as KGHL-790, heard 1/6, for his 43rd state.

10 years ago ... from the February 19, 1990 *DXN*: Gene Martin, Denver, CO recalled hearing (from his DX location in Dallas) W3XN, Whippany, NJ, on 700 kcs, followed a few months later by WEXAL, Cincinnati, and on Oct. 4, 1928, WLW, which began regular operation as the first 50,000-watt station west of KDKA, seizing the lion's share of the night-time listening audience across the South and Midwest.

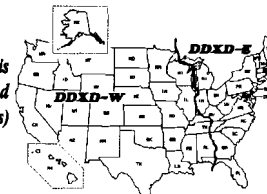

MEDIUM WAVE RAMBLINGS

- **Bob Pote** of Greenwood, Indiana writes: "I noticed in the latest issue of the *DX News* under 'Medium Wave Ramblings' that T-shirts were available from radio station WHAM-1180. If any club members are interested my local station, WIBC-1070, has T-shirts, jackets, coffee cups, keychains, etc for sale, all with their logo. They are on the Internet at <www.WIBC.com> for prices and information. They maintain a pretty neat website for those that are interested." **Randy Stewart** of Springfield, Missouri fills us in on all the latest from his home town: "Local changes in Springfield . . . KGMV-1400, formerly *Memories 1400* with a nostalgia-music format, is now airing ESPN Radio 6 AM - 6 PM. During the overnight hours it simulcasts classic-rock station KXUS US-97 (97.3 FM). Both are owned by **Sunburst Media**. KGMV will go 24 hours ESPN after April 15, when ESPN's current agreement with rival Meyer Communications lapses. Meyer is leasing 12 hours a day (6 PM to 6 AM) on KIDS-1340 and running ESPN Radio during that time; the rest of the time KIDS runs Branson Information Radio (Branson tourist infomercials). Meyer is in negotiations to purchase KIDS (which, as you can tell by the call, used to be an all-kid format — locally produced) — says sale will be complete in about 60 days. Once it's a done deal, he says KIDS is . . . *not going to run infomercials*, but he doesn't say what he will run. (Meyer also owns all-talk KWTO-560 and various FMs). This info from *Springfield News-Leader* February 9, 2000. KGMV had been stereo, but shut off their stereo generator several months ago (in anticipation of this change . . .?)"
- **Gary Jackson** of Sacramento reports he received a couple of QSL cards: one from KKWY Fox Farm, Wyoming. Full info included. One of the nicest QSLs he's ever seen. - 940 WCPC MS Houston - 2/7 1641 - Good, clear GOS format, ID, promo. (JJR-WI)
- 970 WNIV GA Atlanta - 2/7 1643 - 970 & 1400 WNIV into REL program. Alone on frequency. (JJR-WI)
- 980 KMBZ MO Kansas City - 1/29 - Fair around 2200, despite some CBW splatter. IDs as *KMBZ Kansas City. News, talk, and sports 980*. (MS-MB)
- 1000 KXRB SD Sioux Falls - 1/27 1805 - Good, despite local CBW-990, with country music. ID at 1809 as *Country 1000 - KXRB*. (MS-MB)

- 1380 KLPZ AZ Parker - 2/8 2059 - On top of channel, with C&W, legal ID: *The all-new 13-80 country, KLPZ Parker-Lake Havasu-Blythe*. (TRH-CA)
- 1410 WLTV AL Mobile - 2/12 0716 - Fair, with promo looking for sales people at *Victory 1410 WLTV*. (JJR-WI)

- 1520 KVTA CA Port Hueneme - 2/5 2100 - Even with KKSXN an hour after LSS. I heard this station a month ago fielding a listener call about the signal disappearing at sunset. At least this night, they seem to have resolved the problem! (PT-WA)

Welcome to the first "DXers Notebook". Well, the name has changed, but our mission remains the same. We're going to continue looking in on discussions from the NRC's e-mail group (if you're on e-mail, why not join?). We're also going to continue to try to include information to help you hear more DX, and to identify the stations that you do hear. While we have been concentrating on the e-mail group recently, mostly due to your editor not having a lot of extra time to dig up other info, look for other types of information to show up in upcoming columns.

We start this time with a "new source of RFI".

Russ Edmunds <wb2bjh@yahoo.com>: Today I decided to see if the source of an insistent buzzing mostly at the lower end of the band was really computer-generated. It wasn't, but I did trace it to the mini-transmitter attached to my water meter which enables the meter readers to drive by and read from their cars! And this is mandatory, and the electric/gas supplier is talking about going the same way. Pretty soon I'll need a cabin in the woods in order to DX!

Paul Smith, W4KNX <sunray2@gte.net>: Russ, that problem is easily repaired with a pair of diagonal pliers. Let them come to you when they can't read the meter.

Paul Swearingen <PlsBCBDXER@aol.com>: Some distant day in the future, when I have lots of time, I need to research state laws to see what our legislature has done to protect the public, including DX'ers, from this type of pollution. I know that our city soon will have "drive-by" transmitters similar to what you've described, but I never thought that they would cause such a problem. Silly me!

Russ Edmunds: The whole utility industry is going in this direction. But why they have to leave the things on continuously when readings are only bi-monthly escapes me. I intend to negotiate with them to disable it the rest of the time. It kills 530 and 730, and many channels up thru about 900, and causes lesser noises above.

David Braun <dcbraun@delanet.com>: Have you contacted the utility about this yet? It would seem that the manufacturer should have had some specs that they had to meet - interference was one of them we worked on when I was in charge of Dover's water department.

Doug Smith <w9wi@bellsouth.net>: How about a wireless mike tuned to the thing's frequency? Maybe your state's Public Utilities Board can do something? (it may also be in violation of Part 15, but I wouldn't expect a FCC complaint to see action any time in the near future...)

Doug Smith: Be careful what you ask for in terms of state legislation, you may regret it! State legislatures - and even more so, local governments - are good at ignoring the laws of physics, and even the Constitution, in order to do something that sounds good to them. (not that the federal Congress doesn't do this too, but the states are a lot worse) You might end up with a law prohibiting the maintenance of more than one radio tower on the same property, or prohibiting transmitters of more than 100 watts within the state's borders, or prohibiting the operation of those distracting red lights on radio towers at night...

Bart Cronin <bcronin@gte.net>: My biggest RFI problem is a horrible buzz that comes from my CATV after they upgraded the system. It is constant at some level from 1500-2000 +/- kHz basically ruining the XBand (except for KXOL, of course.) They are less than cooperative and with a sale to AT&T I doubt the cooperation will improve. I'm looking at a Dish but with lots of trees in the way apparently won't get a good signal, either.

Patrick Martin <mwdxer@webtv.net>: You might have pretty good luck with a Dish (18 inch), even with the trees. There are a bunch of Poplars blocking the South here, but the signal gets through all the same. It was different with the big dishes. I refuse to have cable, mostly for the RFI QRM too.

John R Tudenham <jotud@juno.com>: QRM the thing and maybe you won't get a water bill. HI.

Paul Swearingen: Far be it from me to ask for more... even though our local legislator is a former student of mine and has a good head on his shoulders! I would only research to find currently existing legislation to use as a club only as a last resort, or to change the priorities of the offenders.

Ragnar Danneskjold <lwdxer@juno.com>: KFI 640 AM in Los Angeles has turned its C-QUAM exciter for the last time according to its CE. I will miss another AM stereo signal at night. It's a shame to see it go because of government and manufacturers stupidity.

Paul Smith, W4KNX: Didn't KFI just join the clear Channel empire?? Randy Michaels has turned

off the stereo of every AM Clear Channel owns. It's his policy.

Ragnar Danneskjold: Paul, What that man has done is awful. Yes, KFI has not yet joined but it is a pretty much foregone conclusion. The money is going to change hands soon and the deal will be done. The CE, Marvin Somethingorother said that it wasn't his choice but that it came from AMFM and he was just following marching orders. Money talks. What else can I say.

John R Tudenham: Right, but how many people care anything about AM stereo, most younger people don't even know AM exists. I don't like it that way but that's the way it is. In most markets FM stations have 80% or more of the audience.

Ragnar Danneskjold: Go to www.amstereo.com. Go to amstereo@listbot.com and sign up and see all the people on the list. There are a lot of people who wonder where am stereo went and would like to see it back. You'd be surprised. I know I want to see it return and would like to see AMFM go to hell for turning off all the exciter.

John R Tudenham: Ragnar again I agree but look at the ratings on AM in most markets only talk AM stations are doing well, I wish this would change. Look what happened to your 550 KOY a good station, they make more money with talk and sports programming on AM. WDAF 610 in Kansas City might be the exception. Our 10KW local KKOW on 860 just changed from music to all talk, the only AM stations here that still play some music are religious stations playing some gospel music 1230 and 1310. They couldn't afford to go Stereo. The 1310 ex KFSB 5KW, was donated to Ozark Bible College here because no one wanted to buy the station and the owner of 4 FM stations did not want it. Your Phoenix area may be doing better because of the large number of Senior Citizens but very few young people listen to AM music anymore. Money talks and that's the name of the game, I don't like it either.

Randy Stewart <jrs555t@mail.smsu.edu>: The situation John talks of in Joplin is similar to what's happening 70 mi. up I-44 here in Springfield MO... our longtime country station on 1260, KTTS, recently shut off their stereo generator, as did "Memories 1400" (whose call I just forgot!!). Now, I'm not a fan of country music, but their stereo audio was superb—cleaner in fact, with less limiting, processor artifacts or distortion, than their *FM* (94.7), and with almost the same frequency response! 1400 frankly isn't that much of a loss, as their audio was horrid—uneven channel levels, hum and noise and unidentifiable garbage in one or both channels, tinny, bass-shy, distorted crap. Sounds better in non-AMax format, actually. However, now we have NO local AMs in stereo, and that's a damn shame. KTOZ-1060 supposedly has a stereo generator, but they've never hooked it up.

Patrick Griffith, N0NNK <AM-DXer@webtv.net>: My '86 Jeep Cherokee had a factory AM stereo/FM stereo radio in it. The sound on AM stereo was superb. It even had an indicator light to tell you when you were tuned to a stereo station. Made DXing and general listening a lot of fun. When I traded it in on a '96 Ford Bronco I was surprised to find out they didn't offer an option with AM stereo. Of course, when I bought the Jeep there were still some AM stations playing music formats. I can't see what purpose AM stereo talk radio would serve. I suppose in a debate you could put pro on one channel and con on the other :-).

John D Bowker <wa2wen@juno.com>: AM Stereo.. FM Stereo..Talk shows benefit a great deal. When two people start talking at once, in stereo you can understand them both! And WQYK(FM) here in Tampa is broadcasting the football games in stereo.. the crowd really comes alive!

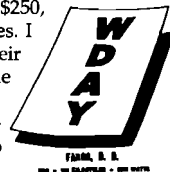
John R Tudenham: "KTOZ-1060 supposedly has a stereo generator, but they've never hooked it up." Randy does KTOZ 1060 still run an all volunteer staff and still not showing a profit? I can see why they can't go stereo. I hear them here in the daytime fairly weak but audio seems somewhat distorted.

Randy Stewart: John, yes, KTOZ is still doing the all-volunteer staff routine (indentured servants, more like—from what I hear he treats his volunteers like dirt, don't know why anyone would WANT to subject themselves to that...). And yes, their sound quality is awful... any low-modulated audio disintegrates into gritty distortion, like their compressor/limiter is totally screwed up.

Ragnar Danneskjold: "I can't see what purpose AM stereo talk radio would serve. I suppose in a debate you could put pro on one channel and con on the other :-)." Lots of times the moderator and someone else is talking simultaneously. It would help to be able to hear them both well.

Patrick Griffith, N0NNK: That makes sense. I sure wish my Bronco had an AM stereo radio in it.

Chet Copeland <CHETCOP@webtv.net>: I was at my local Radio Shack yesterday, and noticed that the RS DX 392 shortwave/AM/FM portable with a (mono) I event timed-cassette recorder is now on clearance at \$130. My store had three; the DC area stores had a total of 45, most of them display models. You should know that if the packaging, etc. is in bad shape or non-existent, you can get a year added to the full warranty (or a \$20 discount)—at least I have. This 'rig' retailed at \$250, and \$199 on sale. I'm sure the Sangean version is still being sold at those prices. I currently have two (along with a 390, 398, etc), so I must like it! I always buy their TSP—4-5 year full warranty, since I'm rough on my units: it's not unheard of for me to get 1-2 free DX392 replacements in that time (if it's not made any more, you stand a good chance of getting an upgrade to a more expensive version to something roughly comparable, say, to the DX398), plus replacement antennas, etc. no



questions asked. Getting the cassette serviced 'free' has also been welcome. Because of this, I avoid mail order radio stores (but then, many look down on R.S. products, esp. shortwaves... They can go on looking down, IMHO!). If I lose my warranty info, RS has it via their 800 TSP # which I've accessed myself but only because store clerks kept getting 'no TSP on file' one time: In that case it turned out to be because the selling clerk entered the wrong zip code, so it was filed there.

Russ Edmunds: Pete Taylor asked me if I had any ideas about how to locate SR/SS times for Canadian stations similar to what is available on the FCC's website for US stations, also noting that our SR/SS maps don't include Canada. While I have an old archival set of IRCA World SR/SS maps from the early 1970's, that's the only source I can locate. I've checked several of the Canadian government sites and found only huge database files which might be downloaded if you have 25+ megabytes to spare along with the time it might take to download them. While I have both at the moment, I thought that before I went in that direction, I'd ask here to see if there's a better source.

Russ Edmunds: I've been thinking lately about how to provide more help for DX'ers in this area, and I've come up with a few thoughts. Perhaps some of these resources are already available, but I may not be aware of them. There could perhaps be created. Perhaps we can discuss this here and come up with some answers.

1. I have looked without success for a current listing of the names of the various state governors on the web. This is sometimes helpful to ID news items or promos.
2. It might be helpful if there were a listing of all of the call-in numbers used by the major national tele-talk programs/networks. I know we could compile such a list.
3. It might also be helpful if we had studio call-in numbers for local talk shows, although this could be an enormous undertaking to compile and keep up-to-date.
4. I've come across a good telephone area code index site which I'd like to share: <www.555-1212.com/adlookup.html>

5. I haven't seen anything in DX News, but there is a listing of stations for the Liberty Works Radio Network available at <www.libertyworksradio.com>. For some reason, this list doesn't include WCPK-1600-VA, which as recently as December when I last paid attention to the station, was running this net. Also, I don't know how current the website is on this.

Russ Edmunds: It's always a good thing when you are able to answer your own questions, hi. As it happens, I stumbled across a list of governors on the web. The URL is: <www.nga.org/Governor/GovMasterList.htm>

Wayne Heinen <Nrclog@aol.com>: My latest info says Liberty Works abandoned WCPK when they acquired WHKT-1650.

So what type of information would like to see? What would help you identify those stations you've heard that won't ID? Let me know - I'll try to get it for you.

Taking the cue from this discussion, let's get some in-depth information on some networks - more than just the station lists. Here's information on "Florida's Radio Network". FRN provides the following programming: News, "Better Lawns & Gardens" (Sat. 0700-0900 ELT), "Florida Roundtable" (Sun. 1000-1000 ELT), "At Home with Gary Sullivan" (Sat. 0900-1100 ELT), and "Outdoors with Vern & Doug" (Sat. 0500-0600 ELT). The network's phone number is 888-407-4FRN.

My congrats to BEN DANGERFIELD on his outstanding catch of India-1566. It is a well-modulated station, apparently beamed to the Gulf, not undermodulated or hummy as some of its shortwave equals, Ben's equal to on 5010 khz clinches it. Equals noted here are Calcutta-1134 (a megawatt which would peak an hour earlier, if on the air, then be an even rarer catch on the East coast) and Delhi-810. Hearing 810 in Hindi call for extreme care in ID'ing, since Fiji is also in the same language at the same time, 6A here. And since Fiji now has an ethnic Indian prime minister, it is conceivable that Radio Fiji could relay AIR, certainly Fiji's English service on 774 and elsewhere, carries many relays from BBC, RA and RNZI. Selfishly, as a DX'er here, I'm sorry to hear that KOHO-1170 is being reactivated. It used to be Japanese, but about 3 years ago, it went silent on 1170 and, as KJPN, replaced the former KAHU on 940, doing away with HI's only country station. Since KFRE-940 was also country then, it was a great demonstration for non DX'ing visitors to flip the antenna switch and show the two different stations on the same frequency, one semi local and the other 3000 miles away, both at local strength. Honolulu's local shaky economy will be hard put to support yet another marginal AM station. On the positive side, there are still several silent traditional HI frequencies, 970 here on the Big Island where a construction permit was granted for Waimea (Kamuella) but never materialized, 1130 (once KLEI Kailua, Oahu), and 1350 (once Kauai). Listening the other morning to BBC-1296, my most distant semi-regular catch, I noticed what a huge range of frequencies England was audible on simultaneously, all the way to 21710 (at 6AM local). But, approaching it the other way round, to the best of my knowledge, English DXers have never heard HI (or New Zealand or the Pacific Islands) on AM. I began DX'ing in England in 1957, and little thought then that I would be living in the Aloha State. The Sheigra, Scotland, DXpedition caught the West coast, mainly KOMO-1000 and KING-1090, but no HI. On the other hand, Finnish DX'ers have sent me tapes of KKON-790 with better reception than in downtown Kailua-Kona. In fact, KKON's local coverage is poor. At my business, I conduct informal surveys of customers AM listening habits and have yet to meet one who heard of KKON, which has now become a satellite of KIPA-620, which has its own Kona synchro relay! What a waste of frequencies!

Non-technical Observations On The Radio Shack Indoor Am Loop (15-1853)

After reading the comments by Russ Johnson and John E. Bowker (DX News Volume 67, #7) on the new AM loop from Radio Shack, I purchased one the following weekend (\$30). It was the only one in stock.

For reception comparison, I am currently using a Drake SW8, purchased in August, 1998. The following January, I ran a 950' longwire, which is generally NE-SW oriented. Results have been more than satisfactory as over 70 new logs have been added with the Drake/longwire (all but one was a domestic.) Problem is that the wire is "fixed" and nulls stations from the west and north-west. For instance, WGN, WHO, CBE, and WAKR are nearly impossible, KDKA and WLS difficult. This is great for nulling properties but sometimes I'd like to hear these stations and others in that direction.

At first I tried the Loop in the day on the Drake, but the gain didn't nearly match the longwire. Next, I tried it with a Radio Shack DX-375 but not much there either. Then I tried it on a GE Superadio III with somewhat better results; the antenna leads could be attached to the receiver.

With night-time DX on the SR III and the Loop, reception was much improved. Without going into a lot of detail, I've been missing a whole lot of DX! Comparing reception is like DXing on two different frequencies. While the Drake would be picking up one signal, the Loop would be getting another on the Superadio. And, in some instances, one could not be heard on the other. In recent months I've added at least a dozen new AM loggings on the SR III/RS Loop which were not heard on the Drake/longwire.

As for positioning the RS Loop next to a receiver (the SR III), I've found good results by placing the loop under the receiver for best reception: nulling and gain. Another benefit is that both the receiver and loop can be maneuvered to get the desired signal. (Recently, I was able to hear 4 different signals on 1060 kHz besides KYW Philadelphia).

For the product, the Radio Shack Loop is a good investment for AM DX'ers. It is well designed and stable (i.e. doesn't tip over easily). The only drawback is that the Loop is much more prone to TVI and QRN than a shielded-to-receiver/longwire. Only improvement I can think of is that Radio Shack could make a larger version (maybe 1/2, 18" diameter) and be active (battery powered, like the Wooster SM-1).

Radio's Role in the Communications Revolution

NEW YORK - On an otherwise unremarkable late October evening in 1938, many Americans relaxed at home, doing what they had become accustomed to since broadcasting had become popular a couple of decades earlier: They listened to radio. It was the Mercury Theatre's live broadcast of a concert from New York's Park Plaza Hotel.

No one expected the urgent news flash.

"Ladies and gentlemen, we interrupt our program of dance music to bring you a special bulletin from the Intercontinental Radio News. At 20 minutes before 8 Central Time, Professor Farrell of the Mount Jennings Observatory, Chicago, Illinois, reports observing several explosions of incandescent gas occurring at regular intervals on the planet Mars."

For the next couple of hours, listeners across the country remained transfixed, some panicked, as details poured out of the radio about the Martian landing in New Jersey.

Owens Pomeroy, a grade-school boy at the time, remembers hearing the announcer talking to Professor Pierson about the rocket in the sky and the spaceship landing.

"My mom got really upset," recalled Pomeroy, who now lives in Baltimore. His father, though, was immediately skeptical. "Now if this is the real thing, it should be on the other stations," he said, and quickly scanned the dial.

"Lo and behold," said Pomeroy, "we heard Charlie McCarthy coming to us over the good old NBC Blue."

For the Pomeroyes and millions of others, it was a relief when Orson Welles' chilling broadcast of "The War of the Worlds" was revealed as fiction - but it also reminded them of the awesome power of radio.

In this age of information overload, it's easy to overlook the grandparent of 20th century mass communications.

The clunky device that in its early days resembled a homemade science project filled with tubes and wires. The primitive tuner that people would fiddle to pick up a scratchy broadcast of "Amos 'n' Andy" or a president's speech. The simple yet powerful precursor to television and the Internet. This was radio, which became the foundation on which the information revolution was built.

Consider the legacies radio has established:

— THE VOICE OF AUTHORITY: Radio's reach and power were such that anything heard over the airwaves was considered to be fact, said Chuck Howell, the curator of the Library of American Broadcasting at the University of Maryland.

"Part of it was that voice of authority — this

was something that did come into your home," said Howell. "It was so glamorous and so high-culture — radio had a real cachet."

Radio's assumed authority was a primary reason why the "War of the Worlds" resulted in a panic in some areas, with thousands of people contacting police - even though newspapers had printed notice of it in their broadcast listings.

Lest one think that Welles' hoax was a unique experience that could not be repeated today, consider the effect the mass media still have on the average person.

One example: About a year ago, securities analyst Ralph Acampora, noted for his bullish attitude toward the stock market, made a pronouncement on the CNBC cable television network that the stock market run was over. The market, which had been struggling all day, promptly plunged as traders and investors across the country, independent of one another but reacting as one, sold stocks.

— THE LOSS OF BOUNDARIES: Radio connected people over vast distances, enhancing a sense of regional or national unity.

Today we take for granted the eroding of boundaries that has been carried much farther by the Internet. It was not always this way.

One radio pioneer, Fay Gillis Wells, described how she and her husband used to travel in the late 1930's doing a show called "The Magic of RCA" to help promote the wonders of short-wave radio. Sixty years ago, it was still astonishing that someone could speak in Los Angeles and be heard in New York almost instantaneously.

"We would always have to synchronize watches ... so when they wanted him to speak at 2:17, he'd start," she said.

Not only did radio shrink the distances between people, it helped to bring them together. In the throes of the Depression in the early 1930's, President Franklin Roosevelt began using regular broadcasts as a forum, and families gathered around the radio to listen. "My dear friends ..." he would start each Fireside Chat before going on to explain the latest details of his New Deal.

— INFORMATION, NOW: In a century of impatience and speed, radio allowed people to get the news immediately, rather than having to wait hours or days for the local daily or weekly newspaper. It became an invaluable propaganda tool, leaping enemy lines during World War II, slipping behind the Iron Curtain during the Cold War.

On Nov. 2, 1920, Pittsburgh station KDKA announced that Warren Harding had won the presidential election in what is considered the first-ever

commercial broadcast.

From presidential elections to ball scores, radio news gathering progressed, relating key news events as they happened. Events such as the Hindenburg disaster in 1937 showcased the medium in all its glory, a precursor to today's live TV news coverage.

NBC (WLS) newsman Herbert Morrison was on the scene that day.

"Here it comes, ladies and gentlemen, and what a sight it is, a thrilling one, a marvelous sight.... Oh, oh, oh.... It's burst into flames. ... It is burning, bursting into flames and is falling.... Oh! ... This is one of the worst ... Oh! It's a terrible sight ... Oh! the humanity ..."

Radio news broadcasting perhaps reached its apex during the coverage of World War II. While World War I was fought through the antiseptic pages of the country's newspapers, the brutality and atrocity of the Nazis' march across Europe was brought to life through radio by the compelling reporting of correspondents such as H.V. Kaltenborn, Edward R. Murrow, and Eric Sevareid.

Dave Michaels, a former CNN anchor, said listening to the wartime broadcasts on WEAJ with his family was always compelling. "There was something about the voice on the radio that was extremely dramatic."

Sometimes the added drama wasn't necessary. He was in Philadelphia when the Japanese surrender was announced over the radio, Michaels said. "The family just went nuts."

— THE POWER TO ENTERTAIN: Much of early broadcasting consisted of radio manufacturers' sometimes desperate efforts to fill air time so people would want to buy a radio to listen. Gradually, however, entertainers cultivated followings, helped tremendously by the introduction of network radio.

Led by the National Broadcasting Company and Columbia Broadcasting System, the networks broadcast the same show everywhere in the nation at once.

People would make time to hear shows such as "Our Gal Sunday" and "The Goldbergs," just as people decades later carved out time to watch "Seinfeld" each week, said Susan Smulyan, an associate professor in the Department of American Civilization at Brown University.

"You could get professional quality entertainment without leaving the house," said Smulyan.

One of the most popular shows of the late 1920's and early '30's, "Amos 'n' Andy," starred Freeman Gosden and Charles Correll, two white men playing two black men in slapstick roles that offend modern sensibilities but were so popular then that more than half the listening public tuned in for the 15 minute show every evening. Restaurants stopped serving for that quarter hour; some movie theaters interrupted the film and

pipled the radio program into the cinema.

It wasn't just comedy and music that were popular. Horror and drama serials drew listeners back to the radio each week to hear the latest adventure of The Shadow or The Lone Ranger.

Exactly who gets credit as radio's inventor is subject to debate, though a device patented in England in 1896 by Guglielmo Marconi became the most commercially successful.

By the end of 1930, 12 million American households, or 40 percent, had radios. A decade later, 35 million households, or 80 percent, had a radio.

It was no longer the only show in town. TV technology existed in the 1930's but had not been able to flourish due to the prohibitive costs and the lack of television facilities through which to transmit the signals.

Now, however, with the end of World War II, the networks - now three, with American Broadcasting Company taking over one of NBC's networks, - faced a choice: Continue investing money in radio, or start spending money on TV - which offered everything radio had plus pictures. It was an easy decision.

Many entertainers liked the new medium, which allowed them much more leeway on how to perform.

No longer were families gathering around the radio for the early evening drama - now it was the TV set.

"Once the TV came into the house, the big Atwater Kent (radio) got relegated to the basement and was never heard from again," said Michaels, who worked as a page at NBC during the transition period.

"We still had network shows, but all the stress was on television."

The Golden Age of Radio was nearing an end. But rather than dying out, radio reinvented itself, evolving to a localized format and filling the airtime with everything from rock 'n' roll to today's ranting talk shows. It's now a \$15 billion industry, according to Radio Business Report.

With nearly 12,500 stations licensed by the Federal Communications Commission in the United States as the century nears a close, radio today is as big as ever, though different now.

Software such as RealAudio allows people to use their computers to listen to radio stations across the world.

At the other end of the spectrum of listening experience, rival sports teams in small towns use the local radio station to make ironic song dedications to the opposing team.

"I like radio's ability to foster community and make people feel connected," said Smulyan, who heard some of those musical raspberries during a visit to Texas. "It can bring different people together - people who have lots in common, and people who have nothing in common."
