WTIC/KRLD Non-test ... We've received word via officials at WTIC and KRLD, both 1080, that they intend to cooperate in being off the air for testing and maintainance, on March 3/4, and perhaps for a short time simultaneously.

"WTIC and KRLD routinely communicate through tent late delivery times or missing or damaged quarterly corporate Engineering teleconference

were going to be doing scheduled maintenance the way, at least in the U.S. during the same month, and decided it would be a nice gesture to the DX'ing community to coordinate this maintenance, since it would be quite impossible for this to happen naturally.

25 years ago ... from the March 1, 1976 DXN: Ray Moore, Walpole, MA reported: "Finally caught the muchsought "R. Caaguazu" [Paraguay, 645], ID on tape at 0800 on 2/6. Sig 100% readable for considerable stretches this AM."

10 years ago ... from the February 25, 1991 DXN: Nebraskans Neil Zank and Mike Hawk reported meeting each other, in separate Musings, at a GTG hosted by Ernie Wesolowski; Mike also reported acquiring for \$125 a Hammarlund HQ-180A which seemed to work well except for the band selector, which occasionally needed a little jiggling.

building to new peaks. I have never heard all the above at once before and at such signal strength. The other LW stations in Western Europe are at higher levels too. We seem to be moving very slowly past the worst of propagation absorption. But the MW band is pretty quiet in general, even toward South America here. Oddly the 160 meter ham band just above the MW band (1.8 MHz) has almost daily contact openings to most of Europe (using a vertical antenna)."

DXP-3 DXpedition Phasing Unit Mark Connelly, WA110N

INTRODUCTION

The DXP-3 is the most compact of several phasing units designed for DXpedition use. Chassis size is $5.25 \times 2.92 \times 2.125$ in. $(13.34 \times 7.42 \times 5.4$ cm). For previous models, see DXP-1 [reference 1] and DXP-2 [reference 2]. As noted in other articles, the object of phasing units is to combine the contributions of two antennas at a 180 degree phase relation in order to null out a dominant signal (or noise) and let otherwise-inaudible weaker co-channel and adjacent channel signals come through.

DXP-3 is optimized for medium wave (500 to 2000 kHz) operation, though it may also perform reasonably well on the longwave and tropical band shortwave frequency ranges.

Phase shifting is wideband in nature: tuning is not required. In high-signal urban areas, one could benefit from passive L-C preselection on each of the two input lines ahead of the unit. In most cases, this isn't necessary.

With broadband phasing, a null set up in a given direction is often effective plus or minus 100 kHz or more from the set-up frequency.

The DXP-3 allows independent observation of each input line as well as providing two combined signal (null) positions. This enables the user to balance amplitudes accurately, at least if the receiver has an S-meter, before adjusting the phase for a null. For good null depth, each of the two input lines must have a similar strength of the signal to be nulled.

OPERATING THE DXP-3

Practicing on stable daytime medium wave groundwave signals is the best way to become familiar with the unit's operation. When starting out, choose a frequency having some evidence of a second station under the dominant one.

Initial set-up:

Connect a passive (unpowered) antenna to J1, or connect an active antenna (such as an MFJ-1024 whip) to J3.

Connect the second antenna to J2 (if passive) or J4 (if active).

Connect a DC power source of +12 volts (min.) to +18 volts (max.) to [6.

Connect the receiver, via coaxial cable, to [5.

Set R1 and R2 fully clockwise.

Amplitude Balancing:

Set R3 to center.

With S1 on 1, observe the level of the dominant signal (or noise) to be nulled. Also do this with S1 on

If the signal level had been greater in the S1 = 1 position, adjust R1 so that the signal level measured with S1 on 1 is equal to that obtained with S1 on 2.

Conversely, if the signal level had been greater in the S1 = 2 position, adjust R2 so that the signal level measured with S1 on 2 is equal to that obtained with S1 on 1.

Nulling

Set S1 to Null-a and adjust R3 for the best reduction of the dominant signal to be removed. Also do this R3 adjustment with S1 set to Null-b. Leave S1 on the null position which gave the deeper, better-defined null

Finish up the null by small interactive adjustments of R3, R1, and R2.

Occasionally it may help to set R1 and R2 "fully clockwise minus 1 hour" (e.g. pointers at "4 o'clock" if fully clockwise is "5 o'clock") and then go back to the "Amplitude Balancing" section and proceed forward from there.

DXP-3A

This is an altered version of the DXP-3. It does not have active antenna inputs and the passive inputs use isolated-ground connectors (Mouser part number 523-31-10-RFX or equivalent) for implementation of low-noise grounding schemes. File "dxp3a.zip" [reference 3] contains the schematics of this design variation.



Figure 1 : Input Section







Drawing BUF-F F1: Schematic





Coupling an external loop antenna to the DX-390 Receiver



I am a new NRC member and enjoy your publication. I am retired from the FAA as an electronics technician some time ago, but I am involved in the maintenance of non-federal Non-Directional Beacons (NDBs) in the 200-400 kHt Band. These facilities are usually owned by a city or local airport authority.

I regularly monitor the NDB's, but I found that the built-in loopstick antenna in receivers like the Radio Shack DX-390 are not sufficient to pick up a low power (25W) NDB at distances greater than about 40 miles. Since the DX-390 has no external antenna input for the LW/MW bands, I decided to couple an external loop antenna to the built-in loopstick.

I wound approximately 20 turns of #22 wire at the far end of the loopstick and connected it to a RCA phono plug which is mounted just below the volume control. (The windings can be held in place by dripping some hot candle wax on it.) The tuneable loop antenna is connected by a coaxial cable to the plug on the receiver. The length of the coax cable is not critical.

The rectangular loop was built using 3/4" PVC with a diameter of four feet with 20 turns spaced 1 cm. For the LW band it is tuned by a discarded two-section AM tuning capacitor (approx 20-475 pF) and paralleled with a fixed 270 pF capacitor. For other bands it is best to experiment with different loop turns and capacitors. Resonance is clearly indicated by an appreciable increase in signal strength or noise, if there is no station on the particular frequency.



(PVC 3/50)

I am sure this modification can be done on other receivers with loopstick antennas; however, I would not use more than 20 turns on the far end in order not to detune the loopstick too much.

I was surprised about the overall performance, and I was able to pick up NDB's as far away as North Carolina (CLB, 216 kHz) and Louisiana (GNI 236 kHz) during daylight hours. My location is in Odessa on the SW coast of Florida. Low powered NDBs were received up to 200 miles away.

The 1160 simulcast of WXRT 93.1 came to an end 1/31 as Salem Communications took over 1160 and now simulcasts WYLL 106.7, located in suburban Des Plaines with its Christian teaching programs. 1160 is now DXable again while they're on their night pattern. Thankfully I've got a few WXRT AM ID's collected, though they didn't seem to make a big deal of being on AM. Wonder how many reception reports they received? I've been listening to WYPA-820 regularly now with its Catholic programming, which is scheduled to go awaysoon, also taping ID's and sign offs. Thats all we need, another ethnic station in Chicago, which will happen when Newsweb takes over. WAUR-930, located in W suburban Sandwich, is airing both U of IL and Notre Dame basketball, but its night signal is very directional; my DX buddy Marc Marino, 35 miles E in Calumet City, can't hear the games at night. I'm still using a 20-year-old GE Superadio II and CCrane portable. I just added a Sony CD/radio/cas sette/recorder CFD515 stereo that I picked up at a moving sale for \$10. It works great. I ran into a problem with the CCrane recently; I accidently pulled the FM antenna out of the case! I did put the metal bottom piece on the antenna but it's not the same; how do I restore it again? As I write this, it's 2:25 PM 2/5 and with WWCA-1270 long gone (they used to air some Spanish last year for a while), I'm getting mostly WKBF with satellite MOR and WXYT with sports talk, both in/out. They had to change their pattern; they've never been this strong before. It must run over WFRN with its Christian programming. The 2/3 Billboard magazine listed 10 cities' Arbitrons. Highlights: #1 New York, top AM was 7th place WABC-770 with a 3.7, Los Angeles was KFI-640 in 10th place, Chicago's WGN-720 showed as #2, San Francisco/Oakland shows KGO-810 as #1, KCBS-740 as #2, KOIT -1260/96.5 as #3, and 4th was KSFO-560. Paul Harvey recently mentioned that KGO has been the #1 station for 22 years! In Philadelphia, KYW-1060 was #2, Dallas/Fort Worth shows WBAP-820 in 4th, Detroit's WJR-760 was #3 (the non sports station), WBZ-1030 leads the pack in Boston, in Washington, WTOP-1500 finished 4th, and Houston, primarly an FM area, KTRH-740 showed up in 7th place. Yes, I've heard CHWO-740 a few times, nice MoR, but never an ID. CU again soon! (I believe the Canadian rule for legal ID's is once in 24 hours, I've heard the CHWO calls on 740 a few times, especially when they were simulcasting on 1250-DWS)

(10 years and a few months; ya havin' fun yet? -pls.). But the column can only survive if YOU send in your reports; hard copy or electronic, they both work. 73

Even the Technical side of the 'behind the scenes' part of radio can be of interest, as well as staying clothed! Here are some entries into our "Behind The Mike" series of reports submitted by the membership ... And the Beat Goes On!

Perry Crabill, Winchester, VA: Although I never worked as an engineer for a BCB station, during a significant part of my 41 years and 7 months with C&P Telephone in Washington, DC, I was involved with wireline program channels between studio and transmitter sites. In 1948 and 1949 I worked at the Radio and TV Operating Center in the Downtown Toll office at 725-13th Street. NW, and was involved with the the first televised Presidential Inauguration in 1949. In 1953 I was promoted into C&P's Engineering Department, working on Transmission Special Services. My responsibilities eventually grew to include the wireline program channels I had worked on as a craftsman. The Engineering Depart-

ment was the company's ultimate technical resource for resolving problems when the Plant Department needed help. At that time C&P provided a 15 kHz audio channel via aerial telephone cable facilities between the studios of AM station WPIK in Alexandria, Virginia, and its transmitter site off US Route 1 near Groveton, Virginia. WPIK operated on 730 kHz, and was cited by the FCC for causing Morse code interference to Alexandria area reception of WBMD in Baltimore, Maryland, on 750 kHz. Some lady was a regular listener to a country music program from WBMD and complained of Morse code signals marring the music. The FCC quickly determined that the code signals were from the 1 megawatt US Navy station at Annapolis, Maryland. operating on 21.4 kHz for communication with submerged nuclear submarines. WPIK's wireline studio-to-transmitter loop was picking up this strong signal from no more than 40 miles away, and it was getting into their audio console, modulating their 730 kHz carrier, and creating Morse code sidebands at 751.4 and 708.6 kHz. When our Plant Department referred the problem to me I told them that it was up to the radio station to restrict their system's audio response above 15 kHz. However, the station pleaded that they didn't have the expertise to deal with the problem; also, they faulted the Telephone Company because they claimed that we were delivering the out-of-band signal to them. I agreed to look into it, and designed and built a high-Q series resonant LC circuit tuned to 21.4 kHz and checked it with an oscillator and frequency counter. I turned the circuit over to the Audio Foreman at our Radio Shop, who happened to be my younger brother Ward, and told him to install it across the cable pair at the transmitter site and re-equalize the program channel. This took care of the problem for quite some time; however, one day I received a call saying that WPIK's Morse code problem had surfaced again. I asked if the trap circuit I had built had been disconnected, and learned that the station had burned down. The trap was lost in the fire, and the station was back on the air with a new transmitter. I gave them another LC tuned circuit identical to the first, and that was the last I heard of this problem. In thinking this over, I wonder if any other AM station with program loops in aerial cable spans near the Navy LF stations in Maine or Washington state had similar problems.

George Santulli, Lovettsville VA: My early days in broadcasting did include some time behind the microphone. In the early 1980's I worked part time on weekends for Santa Barbara radio KKIO-990. The station ran basically a C&W format, but on the weekends it was a mix and the DJ, "Jim" who preceded me was a rather staight arrow guy who played big band music,he didn't care much for C&W. He was a pretty conservative no nonsense guy. One Saturday shift, my brother-in-law Phil came out to visit from Georgia. He was planning on spending most of the day at the local art museum, but a severe winter rainstorm in southern California prompted an early closing of the art museum and Phil came to the station to spend the rest of the day with me. On the way to the station, Phil got drenched by the heavy wind driven rain, and he arrived at the station looking like a survivor of the Titanic, soaking, dripping wet. Since we were alone in the station I told him to hang up his wet clothes and sit with me in the studio until it was time for us to leave, around 6 pm or so. No one would come in since it was the weekend. Phil, now stripped to his underwear only, sits down on the floor in the radio studio and occupies his time by going through the many phonograph albums that lined the studio walls. I played music and broadcast the many road closures that the rainstorm had created, Phil thumbed through albums. Since it was Saturday there was no one else around except us two,or so we thought. Since the studio was noisy with the music, we never heard "Jim" slip back into the studio to pick up something he left behind. Jim was the "big band" guy who was on before me. He opens the door to the studio and there greeting him is me in my chair and Phil on the floor in his BVD's looking up at Jim with startled eyes. No one knew what to say. Jim looks at me, he looks at Phil, mutters something and leaves. He never did comment on that day ever, but there was a "coolness" between us that never did melt during my time at the station. Soon after that my radio days were over and I went into TV.
