





You'll be interested to know that some time next spring, if present plans materialize, WNAX will be broadcasting from the tallest tower in the Western Hemisphere. We will erect a 927-foot tower, if the steel is available and, thus, have the distinction of the tallest antenna in the Western Hemisphere and the second tallest in the World. Our engineers advise us that with the new antenna, we will probably increase our coverage by about 40 percent.
