## ${ }^{8}$ Standard Equipment Is Assured

Standardization $S t a g e$ Here, Says American Radio Association.

That radio equipment is fast becoming standardized will be welcome news to radio users and people who would like to enjoy radio, says a bulletin just issued by the American Radio Association, the national organization representing the listener-in. It is said that a large number of people express a desire to own receiving sets but are fearful that they cannot hook up the batteries and antenna and make other électrical connections properly.
"Standardization means no less than bringing order out of chaos," said Alfred M. Caddell, secretary of the association. "Purchasers of radio equipment not otherwise skinled in the art will now be enabled to hook up the right battery to the right terninal in the set without fear of making a wrong and sometimes unfortunate mistake. For instance, a blue cord will be used to designate the antenna circuit, due to the fact that the anteuna is always associated with the blue sky. Yellow cord will be used for the filament circuit, to suggest the color at which the filament of the tube burns. Bright red has been chosen to indicate the highest positive $B$ battery patential, this being conven unial electrical engineering practice. Black cord designates the ground wire, and so on. Telephone plugs and jacks, vacuum tubes, dry batteries and the like have likewise beein standardized from the standpoints of terminology, physical dimensions, constructional details and features involving operation.
"If progress is to be assured in an art, standardization must go $h:$ nd in hand with its development. 'Tis is very necessary to avoid coniusion on the part of the users of the equipment and also desirable from the standpoint of interchangeability of one manufacturer's product with another. The credit for chith another. The weicomer bringing about these Standards Conces belongs to the Standards Committee of the Associated Manufacturers of Electrical Supplies, who made a thorough survey of the situation and decided

## Wave Lengths May

## Be Changed Again

Present separation of broadcasting wave lengths by ten kilocycles has been found insufficient by the Department of Commerce, and another effort will be made to relieve interference between stations radiocasting on adjacent wave bands
The department believes this relief will have to come fron one or two sources, either the refinement of radiocasting apparatus to permit of much closer tuning by the listener-in, or the separation of wave lengths by fifteen kilocycles, instead of ten. The latter course is more probable.
