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

ATWATER KENT THREE CIRCUIT BOARD by Walt Sanders

A popular radio circuit of the early 1920's was the three circuit tuner, composed of a variocoupler for antenna inductance and variometers to tune the grid and plate circuits (see Figure 1). Perhaps the commercial three circuit sets best known to collectors are the Grebe CR-3 and CR-8 receivers.

Atwater Kent manufactured and sold separately all the parts needed to assemble a three circuit set. Undoubtedly, many experimenters wired their own from such parts. but Atwater Kent never sold any factory wired sets using this circuit. Why not is open to conjecture. Perhaps AK feared infringement on patent rights. Or, maybe, as Ralph Williams has suggested, the early AK factory sets were suitable for boradcast conditions up to mid 1923, and the tuned radio circuit was developed in time for the later proliferation of stations.




Fig. 3,077.—Bunnell autoplex or semi-automatic transmitter. This apparatus is for automatically making dots, so as to enable operators to transmit Morse characters without the excessive strain necessary for such transmission with ordinary key. It is a simple instrument, and has a highly polished base, upon which is placed the duting mechanism and the binding posts for main and local batteries. Its speed can be adjusted from 10 to 90 or more words per minute. Explicit directions for use accompany each instrument.

The three circuit open set shown in Figures 2, 3, and 4 is one I assembled from original AK parts. I added an AK top control variable condenser in series with the antenna to give the board a more attractive balance and to aid in tuning. The parts are mounted on a 10" X 312" board taken from an AK 10 (Set No. 4600) that I disassembled. If an AK 10 that is hopeless for restoration can not be located, a base board can be made in a home wood working shop or made by a professional wood worker. The three tube TA unit is mounted in

the same position as it was for the Model 10. The spaghetti and grommets were removed from Model 10 and Model 20 AK sets. The hookup wire is not original, but is the same as that used by Atwater Kent on open sets.

The original mahogony stain on the board matches the phenolic of the mounted parts so well I decided not to refinish it. All I did was plug up the holes and, after minor touch up, mount the new parts. The layout of underboard wiring, shown in Figure 4, is simple and clean, without overlaps of the wiring, so there was no need to cover the wires with spaghetti. See Figure 5 for a schematic of the wiring I used.

The set tunes quite well. The variocoupler (antenna inductance). grid variometer (left hand variometer), and variable condenser determine the wavelength received, and the plate variometer controls the regeneration. In tuning a three circuit set, the proper regeneration varies with the wave length tuned in, so that the operator must adjust the grid and plate variometers simultanecusly.

All the parts for this set could have been bought from AK in 1923 for about \$85.00. If you are lucky enough to locate the parts today, expect to pay over \$250.00 for them.

One of his publicity fans phoned



Rear View of set






ATWATER KENT MODEL 10 1923


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




\$72,000 FOR FIFTEEN MINUTES

In March, 1930, Will signed a contract for fourteen radio talks of fifteen-minute duration and was paid \$72,000. Some protested that the sum of about \$350 a minute was far too much and that Rogers couldn't possibly be worth that much.

The editors of World's Work printed a defense of Will's receiving this vast salary, and pointed out that Rogers' stories were all spontaneous and without prolog. The editors wrote:

"All this is to the good. But there is something more than this about Will Rogers. His chief interest is not in the affairs of foreign potentates, but in the manners and customs of the great American public. Here it seems to be his mission, under the guise of genial raillery, to tell us the hard, blunt truths about ourselves—truths about our politics, our civic standards, and our social habits. They are the sort of truths we do not always like to hear, but we will take them with a contagious chuckle and a piece of chewing gum.



NORMAN CORWIN TO SPEAK

Famed radio playwright Norman Corwin was the featured speaker at the Saturday, February 10 meeting of the Society to Preserve and Encourange Radio Drama, Variety and Comedy (SPERDVAC).

The meeting was scheduled for 12 noon in room 214 of the Speech-Drama building on the campus of California State University, North-ridge, 18111 Nordhoff Street. The public was invited and there was no admission charge.

Corwin began his career as a journalist in Boston, joining the CBS radio network in 1938. Among his initial triumphs were a series

entitled Words Without Music, which included Corwin's classic "Plot To Overthrow Christmas" and his famed assault on the growing menace of Fascism, "They Fly Through The Air With The Greatest Of Ease."

Other acclaimed radio plays by Corwin followed, including a humorous verse play, "The Undecided Molecule," with Vincent Price, Robert Benchley and Groucho Marx. In 1941 an emotional and patriotic paean to the Bill of Rights, "We Hold These Truths," was broadcast on all of the radio networks.

"Truths", preserved as real h2 in the SPERDVAC Archives Library, featured a galaxy of stars, including Orson Welles, Jimmy Stewart, Edward G. Robinson and Rudy Vallee, as well as a message from President Franklin D.
