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all of them will build or assemble their own audio and power transformers and filter choke coils. The parts which are generally purchased from outside companies are fixed and variable condensers, fixed and variable resistors, and cabinets.

These are some of the conclusions determined from a survey made recently by RADIO BROADCAST among prominent set manufacturers. Requests for the necessary data were sent to a list of 26 of the largest manufacturers, and, at the time of this writing, replies have been received from 14. The manufacturers who have replied are listed in this article. The list includes many of the largest and probably they will account for the sale of at least 75 per cent. of all the sets to be sold during the coming season.

In gathering the data for this survey it was decided to concentrate on 17 different classifications of parts, it having been found that prac-

The remainder, or 38 per cent. of the parts, will be purchased from outside companies. All the manufacturers will build their own r. f. tuning coils and practically

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ratus that is ordinarily employed in radio receiver construction would fall into one of these groups. The various classifications of parts are given in Table 1. The survey indicated wide variations in the practices of different companies. For example, one manufacturer makes 89 per cent. of all his parts and another prominent company makes only 6 per cent. of the parts, purchasing 94 per cent.



It should be understood that the references in the preceding paragraphs to parts "made by the manufacturer" means simply that the manufacturer does not buy the completed device, although he probably does buy the various components used in the particular part. For example, a manufacturer may not buy a complete audio transformer, but will purchase the coils and laminations and then assemble the transformer, from these parts, in his own plant. Table 1 gives a com-

plete tabulation of the 14 replies received, indicating by an "x" in each case which parts are purchased and which are manufactured. In some cases it will be noted that an "x" appears under both headings, purchased and manufactured. The parts in which this double classification appears most frequently are fixed resistors and cabinets. This probably means that many companies make the various small fixed resis-

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

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

Power Pack Servicing

Due to the relatively few component parts, the detection of defective apparatus in a power pack is not a hard problem. The possible causes of trouble may be roughly classified as defective power transformer, rectifier tube, chokes, resistors and condensers. The simplest form of voltmeter-battery test will disclose whether there is a burn-out or short circuit in any of the above-mentioned components, and their replacement is likewise a simple matter, with, perhaps, the exception of the filter condensers. Here the greatest care is required.

A broken-down filter condenser is easily discovered. Generally this condition is indicated by the plates of the rectifier becoming excessively hot. The condenser block should be unsoldered and disconnected from the circuit and a battery voltage applied. The condenser terminals should then, two by two, be short circuited immediately after the charge is applied, and a small spark should result. If the spark does not materialize the condenser is defective and requires replacement. Great care should be taken in testing power packs, as high voltages are developed across the terminals, and unless these charges are dissipated before testing, a bad shock may be received. According to Harry W. Houck, chief engineer of the Dubilier Condenser Corporation, the testing and replacement of condenser blocks is the most delicate operation in the servicing of a power pack, and should not be undertaken unless the smallest of soldering irons and the steadiest of hands are possessed, "Faulty soldering will destroy or at least weaken a paper condenser quicker than any other factor aside from excessive voltage or electrical strain," declares Mr. Houck.

For the soldering of condenser sections, small soldering irons should be used and these must be kept clean and bright. Resin should be used to clean the parts and just enough heat applied to do the job in a minimum of time; for. if the soldering iron is applied for too long a time, the heat causes the impregnating compound of the condenser to melt. The solder may even work its way down into the tightly wrapped paper and tinfoil, causing a short circuit or weak spot. Acid soldering flux or paste should never be

used, for while 't is easier to apply and solder, the slightest trace of acid may result in chemical action, deterioration, weak spots and even an open connection chewed away by the acid. No acid soldering flux is permitted in the Dubilier plant, and none should be employed outside.

Despite the greatest care taken in the manufacture and assembly of condenser sections, there is always the danger of improper soldering by the serviceman or individual making repairs. To avoid this trouble condensers should be so constructed that the terminals are quite removed from the actual condenser section. so 'as to prevent conduction of the heat from the soldering iron to the delicate condenser itself. In this respect the latest condenser blocks with flexible leads or pigtails represent not only greater convenince in wiring, but also eliminate to a large extent the danger of ruining the condenser in soldering.



HIS MASTER'S VOICE HAD A MIGHTY BIG BOAT by Billy Bragg <u>HIS MASTER'S VOICE WAS EVDRIDGE</u> R. JOHNSON is a biography by E. R. Fenimore Johnson, and it traces the history of The Victor Talking Machine Company. The company was formed by Eldridge Reeves Johnson and his number one son, Fenimore, tells the

story. The older Johnson, a brilliant young machinist, and in 1891, invented a book binding machine, that was his first invention and he formed The New Jersey Wire Stitching Company to market the machine. Born in 1863, Johnson was a well respected machinist at age 28, and he soon received a call from Berliner. The time was the early 1890s, and Edison was selling cylinder phonographs, which were powered by electric motors. Berliner was selling a hand-cranked disc machine. To compete with edison, Berliner wanted to drive his disc machine with a spring motor. Because of a heavy reproducer, and the different sized grooves on a disc, no one was able to build a good spring motor. E. R. Johnson solved this problem by building the first spring motor with a governor (like the kind on a steam engine). He greatly improved the reproducer, and in 1896, he sold 200 of the motors to The Eerliner Gramophone Company.

This started the ball rolling, and in 1900 Eldridge went into the talking machine business on his own. We formed The Consolidated Talking Machine Company, but due to legal problems he changed the name to Eldridge Johnson Manufacturing Machinist. His legal problems continued. One time he loaded his matrices on a wagon to hide them in



the wilds of New Jersey. After winning a long court battle, the name was changed the last time. Because victor means "winner", E. R. Johnson's company became known as THE VICTOR TALKING MACHINE COMPANY.

"I'm Gonna Telegraph My Baby," by John O. Terrell was released in 1900. This label became the first record by The Victor Talking Machine Company. It was E. R. Johnson's idea to put paper labels on records, and ne improved on the wax disc, thus reducing background noise. In 1940, he patented the idea of an inside horn phonograph, and called it the VICTROLA. In 1920, he came out with the slant-top victrola. The too was slanted because Johnson never wanted to see a flower vase on one of HTS phonographs. In its prime the V.T.M. Company had 1,663,552 sq. ft. of factory floor space, 163 acres of lumber stacked 20 to 50 ft. high, and 10,000 employees. The payroll came to \$300,000.00 per week, and in one year, they used 36,850,000 feet of lumber and burned 55,000 tons of coal. During WWI, when hard metal was rationed, Johnson began using tungsten for his phonograph needles. This idea proved superior to the old metal ones, and production soon rose to 25,000 needles per day.

On January 6, 1927, E. R. Johnson sold the Victor Talking Machine Company for \$22,229,960 dollars. The company later became part of RCA. One year, he gave away ALL of the income from his fortune to what he thought were worthy individuals. This soon got out of hand, people begged for money. He soon became a prisoner in his own home. There was nothing left to do, except pursue his hobby of collecting fine art and yachting.

Upon retirement, E. R. Johnson went yachting. His yacht was THE CAROLINE and with a crew of 30 men, the yearly expenses were \$52,000.00. In 1929, with an art collection valued at \$1,173,532.39, he decided to buy a better yacht. THE CAROLINE II was launched in 1931 at a cost of \$1,567,410.90. It had a crew of 42 and to keep it in a stand-by condition, it cost \$90,000.00 per year. This yacht carried 365 tons of fuel oil, 1163 gallons of lubricating oil, and 347 tons of fresh water. It had a cruising range of 10,000 nautical miles at 12 knots. The yecht, weighing 105,790 pounds remained stable by means of a GYROSCOPE. The wheel was 8 ft. in diameter, and its weight was 45,000 pounds. The main dining room was 29 feet long by 26 feet wide. There were bigger yachts in the world, but none were as luxurious. E. R. Johnson spent. many happy days on his yacht, but with the approach of WWII, it was no longer safe to sail the high seas. In 1939 THE CAROLINE II was sold for \$200,000.00 to a Mr. Leeds. In 1941 it was sold to the U. S. Navy and comissioned "U.S.S. Hilo."

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BOOK PEVIEW

Fifteen leading personalities from the "golden age of radio" are profiled in Those Radio Commentators!, just published by the Iowa State University Press. Calling himself the "last survivor of the ers," Lowell Thomas introduces this recapturing of the style, sparkle, brass, and adventuresome spirit that marked himself and his colleagues.

The "golden age of radio" began around 1929 with Amos 'n' Andy and ended around 1948 with the advent of "Uncle Miltie" on TV. Thousands of Americans looked forward each day to hearing the news and the opinions of their favorite commentator who helped explain what was happening in the troubled times of the Depression and World War II. The commentators reflected the varied tastes of their audience. For example, Fulton Jewis, Jr., Boake Carter, and Father Couglhin were zealous partisans of their causes. Elmer Davis, H. V. Kaltenborn, and Raymond Gram Swing were respected journalists. Walter Winchell and Gabriel Heatter provided racy gossip. The closing chapter notes other able commentators who had loyal followings.

Two records of the commentators' voices are included. Total playing time for the recordings is 16 minutes. Pictures of each commentator pin a face to the compelling voices from the past.

Author Irving E. Fang is professor, journalism and mass communications, University of Minnesota. He poses the question of the influence of the radio commentators on the course of history. His fascinating anecdotes of their adventuresome lives give rise to some intriguing speculations.

The commentators profiled include H. V. Kaltenborn, Floyd Gibbons, Lowell Thomas, Father Coughlin, Boake Carter, Upton Close, Dorothy Thompson, Raymond Gram Swing, Elmer Davis, Fulton Lewis, Jr., Drew Pearson, Walter Winchell, Baukhage, Gabriel Heatter, and Edward R. Murrow.

"FIBBER MCGEE" GUEST OF HONOR AT ANNUAL SPERDVAC BANQUET

Jim Jordan, who achieved fame as a hard-headed bungler with an incredibly messy closet on the Fibber McGee And Molly program, will be the guest of honor and featured speaker at the annual banquet sponsored by the Society to Preserve and Encourage Radio Drama, Variety And Comedy (SPERDVAC).

The Fibber McGee And Molly show ran for seventeen years and starred Jim Jordan as Fibber and Marian Jordan as Molly McGee. Fibber, the fast-talking braggart who spent much of his time moving from one difficulty to another was always tempered by his level-headed wife, Molly.

Their radio address, 79 *M*istful Vista, became an integral part of American life from 1935 to 1952 as the Fibber McGee And Molly program consistently enjoyed one of radio's largest listening audiences.

Other characters on the show became famous in their own right; Hal Peary, who took his "Great Gildersleeve" role to its own show in 1941; Bill Thompson, whose numerous characterizations included Wallace Whimple, the brow-beaten and hen-pecked milquetoast of a husband; Gale Gordon, the town's mayor who was constantly befuddled by Fibber; and Harlow Wilcox, one of the first announcers in radio to become an integral part of the show with his own comedic interpretations.

But the charm of the Fibber McGee And Molly show centered about its two principals. Marian Jordan, who performed many characters on the show, was the perfect foil for husband Jim Jordan, the man who rarely, if ever, seemed to do anything right. Together, they became the embodiment of the American way of life--and comedy--for nearly twenty years.

The SPERDVAC banquet will be held Saturday, May 12, at 7pm, at the Variety Arts Theater, 940 South Figueroa, Los Angeles. The Variety Arts Theater is an area landmark refurbished in the decor of the 1940s and features weekly live performances of old radio shows.

Banquet reservations with full payment must be received by April 13, 1979. Banquet ticket and admission to museum is only \$10.00.


