provided constructive comment about the CALL LETTER and what should be in it.


The most popular idea involved having more technical data included. I was pleased when not only did members suggest this, but they suggested what to include (your editor is not a technician, not even close!).

The following two pages are reproductions of charts donated by Bob Campbell which display some of the lesser known facts about "plug-in" balasts. I hope these are items which can be of use.


Next month look for a chart which explains the combinations of honeycomb coils used in receiving various frequencies.




