



The Club Choice for March will be sets with names beginning with the letters W, X, Y, Z. The meeting adjourned at 10:50 a.m.








#### CABINET RESTORATION TIPS

Often the old lacquer finishes on receivers is stripped off and a tedious re-finishing task is attacked, when a simple restoration process could provide fraction authentic results with а of finish Α may be clouded cracked, but is restorable if it is intact. light has onlv surface scratches Materials needed liberal qouges). are quantities of lacquer thinner, and several 400 grit wet/dry sheets of sandpaper, Pay'n'Pak, Ernst, Fred Meyer, available at or other large hardware stores.

Using a soft clean cloth soaked in lacquer a section of finish rub the repeatedly until begins it to become slightly tacky to the touch. Then sand that section of the finish with the sandpaper. this process 3 or 4 times, and then move on to the next section. until sanded. Finally, cabinet has been rub the finish down with 0000 grade and little lemon oil or furniture а polish.

The results will be dramatic in most cases, in cabinets that are already improved condition can even be using remove most small Ιt will surface scratches and imperfections, and give hand-rubbed finish and cabinet a color is always authentic!
