



Professional broadcasters, students, scholars general public take advantage of the museum's collections which are in t he cassette form and number approximately 10,000 radio and 7,000 television programs. The subjects of recent exhibits held in the museum theater have included retrospectives of the television of "Sid Caesar: shows Master of Comedy", "Toscanini: The Television Concerts", and the broadcasts of the BBC external Services. The Museum also presents seminars and lectures which included two seminars on comedy given by Steve Allen. The Museum of Broadcasting is located at 1 East 53rd Street New York, New York 10022, and is open Tuesday through Saturday, 12 noon to 5 p.m..


