Please bring your place setting and hot or cold dish. Also, we can always use extras like pickles, olives, dips & chips, vegetable sticks, etc.


Make this a family day. Bring the kids and wife and all their friends. There will be a free watermelon for the largest family in attendance.

Originally from February 1976

KAY KYSER

June 18, 1906 - July 23rd, 1985

Born James King Kern Kyser, "Kay's" first band was formed at the University of North Carolina in 1926. Kyser enjoyed leading a band but could not read music, nor did he play any instrument. This was a novelty in those years. Other things that were novel in '26 were the yo-yo, 16mm movie film and the National Broadcasting Company (founded at WEAF).

Seven years later, 1933, brought his first radio broadcast. It originated from the Bal Tabarin Cafe in San Francisco.

Few beginning "big bands" made waves on early radio. Kay Kyser accomplished this in 1938, when he began his Kollege of Musical Knowledge. He brought with him his trademarks of introducing a band number with four bars of the melody and added to it a a cap and gown tradition. He even went so far as to have his band members wear beanies and lettered sweaters, and calling the audience "class".


Many may remember Georgia Carroll who sang with the Kyser band during the war. Georgia became Mrs. Kyser on June 7th, 1944.

Kay Kyser and the band played more than 400 shows for our servicemen during and after the war. During world war II and the years that followed Mr. Bill Foreman became known as the "dean of versatile public speaking", with his "39 throats", and Merwyn A. Bogue became "Ish Kabbibble".

Kyser's band continued on radio until late in 1949 with it's last sponsor being Pillsbury Snowsheen cake flour.

In the early fifties Kyser retired from entertainment and became active in the Christian Science Church. For the last 30 years he has donated huge sums to that church from benefit appearanes.




Meting minutes (continued)

Leads and needs were given and the meeting adjourned at 10:50 a.m. followed by the auction.


