Leads and needs were given, the meeting was adjourned and the swap meet began at 10:13 am.


Jim Mason, Secretary Our members in Arizona, announces:

ORSON WELLES 1915 -1985

Orson Welles was born on May 6th, 1915 in Kenosha, Wisconsin. The wonder boy of radio began his performing career playing the piano at age 10. At age 12 Welles played three different roles in high school play, thus setting a precedent.

In 1934 after a European tour Welles found himself in New York. At a New York production of Romeo and Juliet, Welles met John Houseman. Houseman cast Welles in the leading roles of several of his productions and began an association lasting a lifetime.

In 1936 they produced a WPA, all black melodramatic adaptation of MacBeth and other WPA "Negro" productions that carried them into 1937.

The first production in the Mercury Theater (formerly New York's Old Comedy Theater) was a modern version of Julius Caesar which depicted the fascist government of Italy at the time. It opened forty-eight years ago this month and became an immediate financial success.

As early as 1935 Welles was being heard on radio. He appeared often on the "March of Time" and in 1937 became the voice of Lamont Cranston in "The Shadow". These were other people's scripts and other peoples productions. While involved in these roles, and continuing his stage career at the Mercury Theater, Welles began to write, produce, direct, narrate, and star in the "Mercury Theater of the Air". The original radio agreement scheduled nine 60-minute dramatizations of classics from literature. Welles, "the genius of radio" was only 22 years old.

"Mercury Theater of the Air" has The the test of time. Classic withstood presentations of "Dracula", "The 39 Steps", A Tale Of Two Cities", "The Counte of Monte Cristo", Jane Eyer", "Oliver Twist", "Sherlock Holmes", "Hell on Ice", "Abraham Lincoln" many more are listened to and todav bv students of radio drama and is only too easy to pick out history. It the voices of radio greats like Joeseph Cotton, Agnes Moorehead, Alice Frost, Kenny Delmar, Ray Collins, and Martin Gabel, not to mention Welles himself.

Probably the most memorable radio broadcast, whether you were alive to hear it or have just heard about it, came on the night before Halloween in 1938. It was the radio adaptation of H.G. Wells' 1898 novel, "War of the Worlds". Entire books have written to document this 60 minute been broadcast and it's effect on the nation. Quite recently, hindsight being superior to foresight, many scholars have wisely looked at the events of the day and have reported that fluke coincidences placed Orson Welles position of fame that he would in a otherwise never have held, were it not for that Sunday night 47 years ago.


