










OPERATION AND CONSTRUCTION

When the Owl's body is pushed down the oil is forced past the piston. The spring then exerts an upward force on the body which action is retarded by the slow leakage of oil through the piston valve All working parts are immersed in oil, eliminating any possibility of wear by friction or rust.

The Owl body and base are made of metal. The oil cylinder, is a highly polished brass tube. The steel shaft is precision ground to insure perfect operation. In the new stuffing box the special oil-proof packing prevents any possibility of leakage. SOMETIME DURING THE EARLY 50^S THE BLACK MIKE RADIOS WERE USED TO HELP PROMOTE KGON. ABOUT 1955 KGON MOVED TO 1520 AND INCREASED POWER TO 10,000 WATTS. THE WHITE MIKE RADIOS WERE THEN USED TO PROMOTE KGON.

IN THE EARLY 60^S KGON MOVED FROM THEIR LOCATION AMONG THE AUTO DEALERS IN GLADSTONE TO THEIR NEW LOCATION ON JOHNSON ROAD. KGON THEN INCREASED POWER TO 50,000 WATTS. Winter Display To Put **NWVRS**On the Map

The displays staff from the World Forestry Center has contact member Dick Karman to coordinate an historic view of radio display to appear in the changing exhibits hall of the Forestry Center this winter. The proposal includes thousands of feet of

display space, collaboration with the American Advertising Museum, audio production of vintage material, and possibly archival footage of vintage movies and documentaries where radio was featured.

"Details have to be approved by the NWVRS Membership

All of these plans have to be firmed up and approved by the

NWVRS membership. They are also contingent upon an agreement being made between the Forestry Center and a corporate sponsor. By the time that this reaches our membership, a sponsor will have been contacted, and the results will be forthcoming.

Part of the burden that society members need to shoulder is the responsibility to get the finest pieces possible to display, the commitment to display those pieces for a minimum of 90 days and pitch in on some of the promotional work. The Northwest Vintage Radio Society has some of the nicest show pieces in the Northwest, and our members have always been generous with the display of their material. The only remaining obligation is getting to work on promotion. A special opportunity may exist to meet the last need.

In the eyes of many, the most appropriate audience for the display of vintage radios is a generation who have never seen them. School children (and their parents) could be exposed to a



part of the immediate past that they have not seen. They can see and hear a part of the history that their parents can only vaguely remember.

In over 50 branch libraries in the tri-county area our society could place one or two pieces of radio and telegraphy equipment in display cases with a brief explanation, a credit to our society and instructions to "see more at the Forestry Center." The printed brochures available at the library locations could correspond to NWVRS events such as meetings, auctions, and swap meets.

Another opportunity to address yet another market comes with the downtown store windows. These possibilities have been discussed in the past and a winter timetable would be perfect. The society can set up some September-November dates for dis-

play of consoles in prominent stores and buildings in downtown to promote the society and to capitalize on the nostalgia craze. These dates will correspond to pre-publicity for the Forestry Center.

"Best public exposure since 1983"

The Libraries will participate if the proposal is written from a educational viewpoint. Businesses and building sites in downtown will probably agree if a quality display is provided at no expense to them. Chain stores such as Nordstroms and Meier and Frank may take it one step further and place similar displays in their mall locations. Between these efforts on our parts and broadcast and direct market adverting by the corporate sponsor, the excitement and interest that can be generated will be even greater than what was experienced in the Georgia-Pacific Museum display of several years ago.

Search your souls and your collections and make a commitment to make this the greatest year for public exposure that our Society has ever had. Your time and your radios are the only things that these ideas lack. Use your imagination and contact Dick Karman with your commitment to help.






