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





Many people stood idly by when radio was born, because they could not believe that it would ever amount to anything. Now people are ignoring it's death.

It's not the death of the inanimate objects that can be kept alive with furniture polish or on magnetic tape. Not the volumes that have been reduced to writing. Not even the chassis which has a few solid state components hidden underneath. The living breathing, actors, producers, directors, engineers, and station owners are dying.

No one in future generations will be able to say that they visited with Frank Nelson; or heard Parker Fennelly do his New England dialect. Few will know the names Pat McGeehen, Milt Joesefberg, Virginia Gregg or Lurene Tuttle. Many household names of the 30s and 40s are all but forgotten. More than forgotten, the number still living is being reduced each month. If you were a radio actor in the 40s, chances are you will not see January 1989.

What can we do? In a way we can keep them "alive" in memories. In a year, maybe two, the only actors left will be those who got their *start* in the fifties. In five years there will few of those left. In ten years all that will remain will be those beautiful wooden cabinets, spotless (and not so spotless) chassis, and the occasional electrical transcription. As we preserve these wooden relics, these classic consoles, these timeless table radios let's keep alive the memories of those who made it possible.

Pat McGeehan, most often remembered for parts in The Whistler, Suspense, Red Ryder and the Screen Guild Theater, was born in 1907 and died January 3rd 1988.

Parker Fenelly, the New Englander, Titus Moody, in Allen's Alley, the narrator in Snow Village Sketches, and recognizable by his accent in episodes of The Adventures of the Thin Man, died January 22nd at age 96.

Milt Josefberg, one on a team with Sam Perrin, John Tackaberry, and George Balzer, was a writer for the Jack Benny show, Through the forties, into the fifties and right into Television. Milt Josefberg passed away last November.

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Thanks to them, we remember Radio!

EDITORIAL

As our display draws to a close, I thought it would be apropriate to address some of the "feed-back"

On the matter of which brands should have been included in our display. Your editor always prefers a display situation where all brands are welcome and one or two brands are featured. Now let us take a closer look at our current display.

CROSLEY, a volume manufacturer of quality affordable radios. The crosley pup is always seen with his headphones, listening to his Crosley. He is the original radio dog and was never seen sitting in front of a phonograph. Crosley's WLW was the original giant station with 500,000 Watts.

PHILCO made the most copied antique radio of them all, Model 90.

ATWATER KENT, no display is complete wihout an AK breadboard. Atwater Kent was one of the largest radio companies.

GREBE one of the original radio companies, began manufacturing before 1920. Grebe built WAHG (now known as WCBS). Grebe always built high quality sets and no display would be complete without an MU-1.

PORTLAND Radios and Transmitter; they certainly belonged in our display.

ZENITH, the first and last of the surviving radio manufacturers who made their own radios. Zenith always made high quality radios. Only Zenith built a Stratosphere. I've been told that the Stratosphere outperforms them all.

These brands were carefully chosen and I believe correctly chosen. Next display I hope we will include Scott, Brunswick, Majestic, Sparton etc.



The Golden Age of Radio

As announced at the February meeting, The World Forestry Center has asked to extend the current radio exhibit. In their words, "[the display] has attracted much more public interest than we expected. It was first thought that [the display] would appeal to a very limited audience, but we were wrong."

Daily the Forestry Center receives telephone calls requesting information about the Golden age of Radio. An underlying intention of many members was to obtain exposure which may result in a permanent museum for radios. With KVIX, possibly KBPS, and remotely possibly KKSN interested, we may make it yet. It needs to be a common cause of all of us if it is going to come to pass. Keep this in mind as you talk to others about the display or invite people to see it.

The Golden Age of Radio, Memories in Wood, is a credit to our society and future display can only better our position. Keep looking for display locations and report prospective leads to the president or vice president.
