### Clarence Hartzel

Best remembered for the part of *Uncle Fletcher* in the show Vic and Sade, Hartzel also played Ben Withers on Lum and Abner, Cottonseed on The Road to Danger, and Mr. Watt on Those Websters. Mr. Hartzel died March 5th.

### Helen Wood

If you listened to Radio in the thirties and forties you probably heard Helen Wood and didn't know it. She played many parts on Lux Radio Theater. Helen recently dies at the age of seventy.

### Wendle Noble

Mr. Noble was heard on radio with character actors like Lou Merrill, and June Foray. His credits include Smilin' Ed's Buster Brown Gang, and he was Steve Allen's announcer on Smile Time. He died February 10th. His wife resides in Sequim, Washington.

### Milton Arthur Caniff

Milton Caniff originated the characters of the radio show Terry and the Pirates in his comic strip of the same name. Many may recognize him as the author of Steve Canyon which can still be seen in newspapers today. Terry and The Pirates came to radio November 1st, 1937 written by Albert Barker and closely followed the strips penned by Caniff. Mr. Caniff died April 3rd, 1988 at the age of 81.

### Radio Waves and sheds a tear

A great man in radio died last month. Though we knew him as Fibber McGee, his name was Jim Jordan. Born a Peoria, Illinois farm boy in 1896, James married his childhood sweetheart, Marian Driscoll (Molly), in 1918.

Remembered for their place in the history of radio, the Jordans began in vaudeville making \$35 a week. Fibber seldom let anyone forget that he "and Fred Nitney had a vaudeville act in Peoria". After the birth of their daughter Kathryn, Jim and Marian took the act on the road. When Jim Jr. was born Marian's job as mother slowed the *show biz* progress. In 1924, as the singing team the O'Henry Twins, the Jordans fist appeared on radio.

To quote author and Old Time Radio aficionado, John Dunning, "By 1927, they had begun to carve out a niche for themselves in radio. Never again, as long as radio was alive and well, would they find themselves without work."

Singing as the O'Henry Twins, comedy as The Air Scouts, acting as a Ma and Pa grocery team in Smackouts, were all behind them when Johnson's Wax picked them up. During high peaks like April 1941, Fibber McGee and Molly topped the popularity rating above even Jack Benny. There were low times, too. During the war years Bill Thompson joined the Navy, Gale Gordon went into the Coast Guard, and Hal Peary, believed to be one of the first spin-off shows, left Wistful Vista for his own show in Summerville. Seven voices left during these years. Some of them were sorely missed.

The McGee show had humor with or without voices. "Molly" played at least two parts and Fibber didn't need anyone to talk to. There were several parts played on the show that required no actors at all: Myrt, the telephone operator; Molly's Uncle Dennis, regularly referred to, but seldom seen (heard regularly for only 1 season); Fred Nitney, heard from in letters; and Sweetie Face, Mrs Wallace Wimple. The running gags were too numerous to mention (McGee's closet, etc.).

The Fibber McGee and Molly show was last heard in 1957. The Jordans continued to do guest spots on radio well into 1959. It's difficult to know how many more miles they might have gone together had it not been for Marian's failing health and untimely death in April, 1961. In that same month 27 years later Jim went to join his Leading Lady.
