



COVER STORY: THE ATWATER KENT MODEL 40 By Matthew Thornton

Probably the most familiar 1920's radio is the Atwater Kent Model 40. It must have been a best seller as well as very durable to have so many around after 60 years. The breakthroughs that made ac operation of the Model 40 possible were the development of the type 80 full-wave rectifier tube and the type 27 indirectly heated cathode triode. The rf and audio sections of the Model 40 are close relatives of earlier Atwater Kent receivers.

The Model 40 power supply is a separate potted assembly. It is connected to the rest of the receiver with an evelet board that fits on studs on top of the power supply and is secured with nuts. It would be interesting to know the reason this cumbersome method of connection was selected. In any case, it was successful because the eyelet board is almost never a cause of failure. That cannot be said of the paper filter capacitors potted in the power supply. To replace them it is necessary to melt the tar out of the power supply or (reportedly) put the power supply in the freezer until it is really cold all the way through and then heat the case so the tar block is loose. It could work but you should probably unsolder the wires to the 80 tube socket first. The leaky capacitors will still be buried in tar. It is quite evident that the Model 40 power supply was not designed for maintainability.

NEW BUSINESS: Information on California swap meets was given. The Forest Grove Concours display will consist of Art Deco radios.


A parcel of Radio and TV literature donated by Evelyn Tompkins was added to the Club Library.

Don Iverson demonstrated an operating spark transmitter which he built from original components.


LEADS and needs were given, and the Meeting adjourned at 11:45 AM. Jim Mason

Part of Radio Passing Away

Daws Butler

Daws Butler was born Charles Dawson Butler in Toledo Ohio in November of 1916. Of his early life, little is recorded. To those of us who are part of the baby boom however, our early childhood would not have been complete without his numerous accomplishments. Daws Butler was the voice behind Deputy Dawg, Quickdraw McGraw, Baba Loiey, Yogi Bear, Chilly Willy, Beannie and Cecil and many other cartoon characters.

Why is his death noted here in the pages shared by the PSARA and The NWVRS? Mr. Butler was an integral part of one of the last great radio shows. His voice talents are one of the reasons for the success of the *Stan Freburg* show which was on radio in 1957. It was near this same time (if you check your TV Guide) that many of the aforementioned cartoons were popular.

He is noted and remembered here as a part of radio which was enjoyed by all of us. As one of his biggest fans, I will miss him very much. His death in March marks another part of Radio Passing away.

Radio Waves at an "Echo of Doubt"

In Electrical Experimenter of November 1918 Mr. Godfrey Isaacs, the Managing Director of the Marconi International Company, was quoted in an address to members of Parliament, singing the praises and advancements of wireless Telegraphy. One of his audience remembered the events of twenty years prior and recorded them in the *Town Topics* of London. The statesman mentioned is William E. Gladstone, a former Prime Minister of England. There was less cause to doubt his death than to doubt radio.

"It is just twenty years since Mr. Marconi, now Senatore Marconi, gave an exhibition of his wireless invention to members of the House of Commons. He wanted to prove that a wireless message could be sent from Terrace to St. Thomas Hospital, some three or four hundred yards across the river, and members flocked to the Terrace to witness the experiment. There were considerable doubts as to the result. John Burns busied himself in the arrangement of the small instrument in one of the passages leading to the Terrace, and to fixing, to Mr. Marconi's instructions, the 8 to 10 foot pole that stood against the Terrace wall some thirty feet from the instrument.

"When arrangements were completed, Mr. Marconi invited the writer of these notes to send any message he liked to the party in charge of the machine at the Hospital.

"At that moment the news came in that Gladstone had died, and the message transmitted recorded that fact, and added a few words about the great statesman. The instrument was set to work, and scarcely had the words been tapt off when acknowledgement was announced from the other side. Hearty cheers were given for the great inventor, but still there were some present who doubted whether the invention would ever be of any practical use."

Doubt is that which flourishes in the mind of the man who lacks the foresight to be enthusiastic over even the slightest prospect of overcoming defeat.



In Memory of . . .

Dennis Day

Though his memory lives on, the human remains of that Irish tenor Dennis Day were laid to rest last month. His most well-known part was that of the band singer on the Jack Benny show. Reportedly Mary Livingstone "discovered" Dennis and brought him to an audition. According to John Dunning in his book *Tune In Yesterday*, Dennis answered the stage call with "Yes, please?", got a laugh and got the part of the "crazy kid" singer which was originated in 1935 by Kenny Baker, but was undoubtedly perfected by Dennis Day.

Dennis's voice was no laughing matter. His records, even today, are great examples of the music and memories of the forties and fifties. But his sense of humor and lines that were prepared for him by Benny's writers developed a unique character. For desert he often ordered a cucumber split, or pie a la mode, with mashed potatoes instead of ice cream. Dennis had seen this on the sound stages of movie sets and brought it into radio for the same reason: it didn't melt. Dennis's nonsense nearly always got a rise out of Benny and was culminated when Benny blew up with "Now cut that out!". It got a laugh every time it did. And because it was a long-standing gag, it got a laugh every time it didn't, too. The combination was just one part of the greatness of the Jack Benny show.

Dennis Day stayed with Benny through the remainder of show. His temporary absence was obvious during the 1945-46 season when he was away in the service. When he returned, Dennis diversified. On October 3rd, 1946 he premiered on his own show, *A Day in the Life of Dennis Day*. The Benny shows from the 1946-47 season are classics because Dennis did not appear that some reference wasn't made to his **two** shows.

From 1947 on, Dennis was also a frequent guest on other radio shows. His ability to impersonate famous people as well as his outstanding voice made him a natural. On Family Theater Dennis was a regular until it went off the air in 1957.

KVIX AM 1290 has been on the air since January 19, 1987 and wasn't expected to be in a break-even mode right away, but after a year and a half we're still runninng at a loss of about \$10,000 per month. Unfortunately the pockets aren't deep enough to continue this. Thus ownership of the license will revert to the former owner within about 90 days.

So what can be done? What are the options? Our options include 1) getting the ad revenues up 2) finding investors 3) finding a new home for OLD TIME RADIO. To even consider any options we at KVIX need to be able to prove to advertisers (especially ad agencies) that there is a significantly large and loyal audience out there that can't be reached by any other electronic media. The letters we're receiving are helping prove that but we need thousands of them!

So here is what you can do. Write to us stating what OLD TIME RADIO means to you and your family. Include, if you will the age range of listeners (the ad agencies think we are only heard in nursing homes!).




