



COVER STORY: RCA Radiola 28 with Model 104 Loudspeaker By Matthew Thornton

In 1926 almost all radios were battery sets with dry cell B batteries and lead-acid A batteries. The B batteries had short life. The A batteries needed frequent charging and occasionally there was spillage of hydrochloric acid on living room floors. A radio that would work on household power was earnestly desired.

One of the earliest radios to do so was the Radiola 28 operating with the Model 104 speaker. Since the Radiola 28 was originally a battery set, it was necessary to reconnect the tubes in series and to have parallel resistors to keep the circuit in balance. The rectifier and power amplifier were in the 104 speaker cabinet. Two type 81 tubes were used in the rectifier and a type 10 was the power amplifier. A very large ballast resistor was in the power transformer primary. The power transformer was nicknamed the tomcat, possibly because it created so much mechanical hum.

The Achilles heel of the Radiola 28 (and other RCA superheterodynes at that time) was the catacomb, a potted-in-tar assembly that contained the RF and detector circuits. Leaky or shorted capacitors and bad or open resistors could not be repaired locally without melting the tar out. Instead, you were supposed to send the catacomb to RCA. Presumably this was to discourage superhet copiers.



He and Virginia endeared themselves to many of us in those days by writing for the Call Letter. As my memory serves, in 1978 and 1979 Hugh wrote the column *Our People* and Virginia was a frequent contributor under the heading of the *Power Supply*.

Hugh never let a job go undone either. When there was a broom to push or furniture to move around the club house, Hugh was faithful to get the job done. When nominated to serve as a board member Hugh was willing, able, and always did a flawless job.

A thankless job, well remembered, was that of host and hostess at the Georgia Pacific Historical Museum display open houses. Through inclement weather and other hardships, Hugh and Virginia, and Tom and Dorothy James loyally represented our society.

Obituary from the Oregonian, September 16th, 1988

· Hugh Rhodes Ranken

Funeral for Hugh Rhodes Ranken, a Northeast Portland resident who died Sunday of cardiac arrest in a Portland Hospital, will be be at 11 a.m. Friday in Ross Hollywood Chapel. He was 78.

He was born September 18th, 1909 in Troy New York, and moved to Portland with his family.

Mr. Ranken worked in the retail credit department for Zales Jewelers for 22 years, retiring as credit manager in the late 1970s. He previously had worked for Powers furniture Co., now Director's Furniture.

A veteran of the U.S. Navy during World War II, he served in the Philippines.

He was a life member of the Mt. Hood Masonic Lodge 157 and was a member of the Oregon Historical Society and the Troutdale historical society. He was a member of the Oregon Fuchsia Society and the Northwest Vintage Radio Society.

He is survived by his wife, Virginia H., and a sister, Jessie Ranken of Portland. Private interment will be in the Lincoln Memorial Park.

The family suggests that remembrances be contributions to a favorite charity.
