



MERCURY THEATRE

A couple of items of interest abstracted from a special feature on Orson Welles and the Mercury Theater, broadcast on NPR network's "Weekend Edition", Nov. 12, 1988. The report noted the passing of Welles' estranged former partner, Jack Houseman, a week before.

Welles had stored the acetate disk recordings of Mercury Theater plays in Houseman's garage. Houseman had refused to allow the recordings to be re-recorded for listeners today, but finally he was convinced with the argument that old disks held great historical importance. The recordings were by no means "Hi-Fi", as they had been recorded off the air or over telephone lines, and some had been well worn by Welles' repeated playings. A San Francisco firm, No Noise, was hired to process the recordings with its proprietary digital noise-removing technique, with the result that very listenable recordings of the plays are now available.

One of Mercury Theater's radio actresses recalled this anecdote about Welles: One day Welles enthused to Houseman about a great idea he had in mind for the next broadcast. In fact, Welles was so determined to see his splendid idea thru, that he alone would craft the script. A day or so later, Houseman asked Welles how the writing was going. Welles responded that it was moving along fine. Couple days later, and a somewhat concerned Houseman again inquired as to the progress of the script. Welles angrily rebuffed him, maintaining that this project was his and his alone, and he was well along with it. The Saturday of the broadcast rolled around, and surprise, still no completed script! What Welles did have were some various unconnected pages. These were hurredly patched together for a last-minute workable script, and the show went on the air. Unfortunately the play as scripted ended 22 minutes before the show's allotted radio time was up. Now what to do? Welles grabbed a book of collected stories; telling his listeners that if they tuned in to the next season's Mercury Teater, they could hear such fine stories as and he began reading dramatically from the book. After several minutes he passed the book to Houseman, who in turn read from it. Taking turns reading, they managed to fill the 22 minute gap.

The end of the Welles-Houseman Partnership was later to be irrevocably sealed at an unpleasant incident at a dinner at which Welles, depending on whose account is told, either threw dishes or upended the table. Years later, mutual friends tried for a reconciliation by inviting both to dinner. Both accepted, but unfortunately a heated argument flared up from some trivial remark, with Welles hurling wild accusations at Houseman. The dinner party ended in an uproar, the former partners leaving more angry and alienated than ever.



Radio Waves at Reading Material

Wouldn't it be nice to know what the calls letters of the station in your grandmothers town was when she was a girl? What was the television station in your town in 1935? (Was there one?)

There's a book available to tell you these and other facts about radio stations. Written by Tom Kneitel, and published by CRB Research, P.O. Box 56-NN, Commack, New York 11725, the **The Radio Station Treasury: 1900-1946** will provide hours of everything from serious research to pleasant trivia. It may appear that your reporter is a little behind the times because the book was published early last year, but it is still an authoritative walk down memory lane and it covers the years that radio collectors (at least 'round these parts) like the best.

In an independent review it was found to be both accurate and entertaining. It can be ordered soft cover for \$14.95 from the publisher.

The Auto Radio: A Romantic Genealogy was released last year by Thornridge Publishing, Box 11 Jackson, Mississippi 49204. Author Donald Matteson does a splendid job of tracing the birth and growth of the automobile radio. More than just a chronology, Matteson includes hundreds of photographs, anecdotes, and copies of the original advertisements.

If auto radios are your love, this clothbound work, available for \$34.95, may seem a little expensive but worth every penny.



The January 14, 1989 meeting of the NWVRS was called to order at 10:06 AM by Vice President Doug Davee.

The TREASURER'S REPORT was given and accepted with a current balance of \$1717.60. Welcomed visitors to todays meeting were radio enthusiasts Ken and Kathy Smith of Lake Oswego and old radio man Rudy Watsig from Portland. Member Frank Rasada from Los Angeles was also in attendance.

OLD BUSINESS: Doug Davee shared with the membership his experience along-side Glenn Bricker from participating in a radio talk show about vintage radios in Cottage Grove. A motion was made to increase advertising rates to \$120— a year for a full page (\$60— for half page). Motion was passed by unanimous vote. The club radio project is near completion. The cabinet needs to be modified and a horn speaker is needed. Name tag prices have increased to \$4— (cash in advance) and a fee will be charged for mailing.

Doug would appreciate activity suggestions for the June 10 meeting. "70 Years of Radio" by Alan Douglas will be added to the club library. Norris Jackson has agreed to become the new club librarian. The club discussed a need for a combined meet of west coast clubs. No immediate action on this issue to report. The club is pursuing the purchase of business cards for members. Details will be worked out in the coming month. Sonny Clutter is looking for volunteers to participate in forming a display at the Salem Flea market on Feb. 12. He would also like to hear your display ideas.


