TWO PORTLAND COMPANIES IN EARLY RADIO

I have in my collection two items made by Portland, Oregon firms in the early twenties: a loose coupler crystal set manufactured by Myers Blackwell Co., and a variable condenser made by Portland Electric Maintenance Co. Unable to find anyone who had heard of these companies, I checked Portland City Directories of that period.

In the 1921-22 Directory, I found Myers Blackwell Co. (F.P.Myers - H.A.Blackwell) Novelty Manufacturers, 462 Hawthorne Blvd. In 1923, a more detailed listing of Myers Blackwell Co. Inc. - F.P.Myers, Mgr. Complete Manufacturing Service, including Designing, Experimenting, Tooling, Production. 462 Hawthorne Blvd. The final entry was in 1924: Myers Blackwell Co., F.P.Myers, Mgr. Machinists, 55 Union Ave. As the label on the crystal set lists the company as Myers Blackwell Co. it appears that it was made in 1921 or 1922, before incorporation.

Only a single listing was found for Portland Electric Maintenance Co. This was in 1923, as follows: Portland Electric Maintenance Co., H.F.Holkenbrink, Mgr. Manufacturers Sheet Metal Goods and Electrical Specialties, Punch Press Work, Tool and Dies. We finance and assist in development of patents and saleable articles. 262 Madison.

Radio Waves

The **Oregonian** in 1923 offered radio enthusiasts a simple method for determining the polarity of the Output lead of a DC transformer:

"In charging a storage battery it is of upmost importance that the correct terminals of the DC line be connected to the battery. The positive side of the line must always be connected to the plus post of the battery and the negative line must be connected to the minus post. If these are reversed the battery will be ruined in a short time.

"If the owner of a homemade charging outfit is uncertain as to the correct polarity of the leads a simple test may be applied to determine which is positive and which is negative. This may be done by inserting the two leads into a glass filled with salted water. In a moment or two bubbles will be seen around on the leads. This is caused by the hydrogen gas liberated by the chemical action of the electrical current flowing between the terminals in the solution. The bubbles form around the negative lead."

So much for simplified radio tips from the past.

Stan Freberg remembers Stan Freberg

For those of you who followed the slow demise of network radio shows in the 50s, a book is now on the market which will make you chuckle. It Only Hurts When I Laugh is an autobiographical work by Stan Freberg.

Stan and his irreverent troup of satirists stirred the fire hoping to keep radio (as it was meant to be) alive in the late 50s. His wonderful radio show ran only for 15 weeks (T.V. you know) but the excerpts from it released on Capitol records won a Grammy award.

The book, allows you to see Radio through the eyes Stan Freberg. A perspective that I enjoy. I recommend it highly to young and old alike. Freberg is hardly a name to be placed on the shelf. Freberg Limited, but not very, (his advertising company) has continued to entertain you for the last 30 years. From as far back as the Butternut coffee commercials (the longest recorded commercial ever to be played on radio) to more recent Jeno's Pizza spots seen on T.V., Freberg is out there. Invite him in. Set him on your coffee table, pick him up and read his mind. It's delightful!

Part of Radio Passing Away

Lucille Ball

In the hours of radio and television special which dealt with the recent passing of Lucille Ball little if any time was given to the radio career of this star. My limited knowledge cannot do justice to her credits but I can cite the notable accomplishments and acknowledge her contribution to radio.

Radio show aficionados quickly remember Lucy's first regular radio show, My Favorite Husband." It aired for the first time in July of 1948, and co-starred Lee Bowman as husband, George. The Coopers were living at 321 Bundy Drive in Sheridan Falls (no one knows what state it was in but most of us remember a state of confusion), in that year when Mahatma Gandi was assinated, the Long Play phonograph record was first released and the transistor was invented.

Lucy had been in radio before 1948. She was a panelists on **Leave** it to the Girls in 1945, and guest spots on The March of Time. Also to her credit are several appearances on **Suspense**, and **Screen Director's Playhouse**.

In 1950 the show My Favorite Husband was the inspiration behind Granby's Green Acres. Yes, it was exactly the scenario that was carried over to television with Zsa Zsa Gabor and Eddie Albert. The dingy wife on radio's "Green Acres", although it was not Lucy, in many ways layed the ground work for the part that Lucille Ball would eventually perfect in I Love Lucy.

I Love Lucy was on CBS radio in 1952 sponsored by Phillip Morris cigarettes. It had the same cast and the same scenario as the television version, with Lucy, Ricky, Ethyl and Fred. It did well on radio, but better on Television. so, when all the other shows moved away from radio so did Lucy.

As it has been said before, "we'll miss her." She has become a part of Americana and that part can not pass away even though another part of Radio is Passing away.


