#### WESTERN TELEVISION CORP.

The receiver was manufactured by the Western Television Corp., Chicago, Ill. in 1930 as the "Visionette" Televisor, price \$159.50. The set consists of a table top solid wood cabinet with hand-painted gold detailing, containing synchronous motor rotating at 900 RPM, scanning wheel with three spirals of 15 holes slightly offset from each other, and a neon lamp in series with the plate circuit of the output tube of a wideband (60-100KHZ bandpass) receiver. The image was projected on a 4" lens.

Feruary 1879, Dublin, Ireland Dennis Redmond sent picture by wire using Selenium Cells and Platinum wire.

March 1925, John Logie Baird, Public demonstration of Mechanical Disc TV.

June 1925, Charles Francis Jenkins, Public demonstration of TV in U.S.A.

1927, John Logie Baird demonstrated Colour Scanning Disc TV.

July 1928, Charles Francis Jenkins station W3XK broadcast regularly scheduled programming 8 P.M. to 9 P.M. Mon, Wed, Fri.

Sept 11, 1928, General Electric broadcast the first Television drama "The Queen's Messenger".

1929, A.T.& T. demonstrated Color Scanning Disc TV.

June 1929, Seattle, Washington, Experimental TV broadcasting

November 27, 1937, N.B.C., The first televised play by Cathode Ray Tube: "The Adventures of the Three Garridebs" by Sherlock Holmes.

#### **TELEVISION** 1939 - 1989

50 YEARS OF TV ?? comment by C.E. Clutter


This is the year we celebrate 5 decades of television. We all know that TV began in the 20's but we are refering to 50 years of Television as we know it today

The year of 1939 is when regular scheduled broadcast of "Electronic Television" began. It was also the year that most "big name" manufacturers of radios introduced their television receivers

Few of us have ever stopped to realize that (in the USA) little has changed in the basic method of transmitting, receiving and quality of our monochrome TV pictures in the last 50 years. Although color has been added, product reliability and manufacturing technology has certainly advanced, little has been done to improve the basic monochrome picture. We are still viewing a pre-wwII system. The same 525 line system that was adopted by the NTSC in 1941 is still in use today.

Much of the world has improved their television system in the last 50 years and the technology for HDTV (high defenition TV) is here now. Lets hope that legal battles and special interest groups don't keep us watching our obsolete system for another 50 years.

#### Seattle, Washington - Sunday July 16, 1989

This Meeting was attended by 26 Members, and one guest: Mr. A. Powers of Auburn, Washington.

#### Radio Waves and sheds a tear.

In the last few months we have witnessed radio's school day chums passing away. Much like a school of hard knocks, radio will see very few alive at its 100th reunion. Even the best of of radio actors from the 1950s are no longer with us.

#### Mel Blanc

In July Mel Blanc, born and raised in Portland, national personality, household, died of cancer. Where ever there was radio comedy, Mel's name was well-known: the happy postman on the Burns and Allen Show, "Remember Mrs. Burns, keep smiling;" on the Joe Penner Show, the voice of Joe's Duck Goo-Goo; on The Judy Canova Show, Pedro, "Pardon me for talking in your face senorita;" Twiggs on the Major Hoople show; on Point Sublime, Mr. August Moon; and characters too numerous to mention on shows like Tommy Riggs & Betty Lou, Camel Caravan, etc.

Mel's talents were forever being used on other people's shows. In his long-standing association with Jack Benny Mel played everything from Jack's Maxwell, to the train announcer, to the department store clerk that Jack drove crazy every Christmas season, to the polar bear in Jack's Basement. Jack Benny and many others didn't care if the audience at home couldn't see Mel, they knew he was there. Jack on one occasion said "That's funny, Polly is the first parrot I've seen with whiskers."

Mel's own show, "the Mel Blanc Show", was the culmination and compilation of all of his experiences. He used his 1,000 voices to play nearly every male part in the show and some female parts too.

Radio fans for generations to come will recognize this loss every time they hear "Train now leaving on track 3 for Anaheim, Azusa and Cuc--amonga."

#### Jim Bakus

Long before his numerous parts on television and as Mr. McGoo, Jim Bakus was another voice on the radio. In the late thirties Bakus played supporting roles in many comedies. His voices did not receive the same circulation as those of Mel Blanc but Bakus could be heard on Lum and Abner, The Penny Singleton Show, Sad Sack and the Allen Young Show. Perhaps one of his first TV roles was as husband to Joan

Davis on I Married Joan. One of his last was the millionaire on Gilligan's Island.

While he was with us and now when he's gone Jim Bakus brightens our days with his personification of the near-sighted Mr. McGoo, and the sense of humor to made all of us laugh.

#### Lyn Murray

Though another behind the scenes person that few of us will recognize, the passing of Lyn Murray marks another dark day in radio history. Lyn's history dates back to WNAT in Philadelphia in 1928, but it wasn't until 1934 when he joined CBS that his musical talents were used. He was a arranger, composer, conductor and sometimes musician.

Lyn Murray was responsible for the musical themes (as they "appeared on radio") to many shows. His most well remembered shows include his arrangements for The Adventure of Ellery Queen, The Ford Theater, Your Hit Parade, The March of Time, The Hallmark Playhouse, and 26 by Corwin.

Lyn is another one of those people who made radio what it was and what it became. His death at age 79 (last May), was not well covered by the media, and it's too bad. Some folks have no idea where their favorite radio show would have been without the music of Lyn Murray.
