



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

When we have visitors, two questions are always asked — the first, "How much are these things worth?" -- sets my teeth on edge and is tactfully ignored, but the second, "Where did you ever find all these radios?" always evokes pleasant memories and many chuckles.

One that comes to mind goes back to my school days when I haunted the old Hyland and Cameron book stores on Fourth Avenue in downtown Portland. Housed in broken-down buildings, they gave way to "progress" and a thirty-story office building twenty or more years ago. In the "good-ol'-days", you could find lots of red-covered QSTs for a dime or so at Hyland's and maybe a nickel at Cameron's, just right for a school boy's budget.

But what caught by eye was on the back cover of a catalog out of Allied Radio in Chicago. At first glance it looked like a classic Hallicrafter SX-88 -- but it wasn't. Instead it had a picture tube - of course it was Halli's little gem -- a 7" push- button TV set that even had channel 1!

Inverse Feedback in 1946



Just before WW2 a neat book called "Radiotron: the Designer's Handbook" was published by an Australian electrical engineer. At least two much needed circuits were described. One was the electronic phase inverter that avoided use of an audio transformer. The other was inverse feedback. Nowadays designers of operational amplifiers take inverse feedback for granted. In those days it was a new idea.

While repairing a General Electric Model 100 I noticed that it had a somewhat clever use of inverse feedback. If you look at the schematic you will see R15, a 39-ohm resistor in series with the cathode bypass capacitor. What that does is allow a small audio voltage (39 over 150 times the amount it would be if unbypassed) to be fed through C19 to R9. C19 and R9 form a high-pass filter so that the feedback starts at about 150 Hz. Thus whatever bass the speaker may get is not attenuated and the higher audio is cleaned up. This is a very cost-effective circuit: two half-watt resistors and a 0.1 microfarad capacitor with low voltage rating. The 50L6 output stage is about 75 per cent bypassed, which is better than most.




EDITORIAL

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


SONNY'S TECH TIPS #1

SERVICING 30'S AC SETS WITH RESISTANCE LINE CORD by Sonny Clutter

Having a hard time finding a usable resistance cord? Not enough room inside to install a dropping resistor without melting the cabinet? Well, at least on some sets I have simple solution for you. Lets take a typical 5 tube set using the following tube lineup: 25Z6, 25L6, 6Q7, 6A8 & 6K7. If you total up the voltage it takes to operate these tubes wired in series (the 1st numbers of the tube is the voltage required to operate the heaters or filiments) it equals 68 volts. Since the line voltage is 120 volts we need to drop about 50 volts. This is what the resistor in the line cord does.

In most sets we can completely eliminate a resistance cord and the need for a dropping resistor by simply changing the tubes to compatible ones with a higher heater (filiment) votage. For example: sub the 25Z6 with a 35Z5, 25L6 = 50L6, 6Q7 = 12Q7 and so on. It is important to make sure all the new substitute tubes have the same heater current rating. Current ratings and other data is easily obtainable from a tube manual.

The above modification requires no circuit changes except a jumper wire in place of the line cord resistor. See diagram.




TYPICAL WIRING DIAGRAM

* WHEN SUBSTITUTING A 25Z6 WITH A 35Z5 AND CHANGING THE THE TUBE LINEUP, ADD A JUMPER WIRE FROM PIN 2 TO PIN 3 OF THE 25Z6 (35Z5) This is the only change needed except the tube subtitutes.
