

Annual Dues: 1991 Regular Membership \$15--Renewals are due on January First






It was a real pleasure to see so many happy faces during the January swap meet and business meeting. Could it be that the unseasonal sunshine had something to do with bringing people out in the open?

NWVRS Meeting Minutes

Oregon City, Oregon, Saturday January 12, 1991

The January meeting was called to order at 10:12 AM by our President Dick Karman. New officers were introduced for 1991 and outgoing officers were thanked. Visitors and Tex Sloat were introduced. The Treasurer's report was given and accepted. The 1990 financial report will be made available.

OLD BUSINESS: The February 10th display and sale in Salem was discussed. Kim Brickman talked about novelty radios which don't look like radios for the theme of the display. Kim will firm up details at the next meeting. If you have questions or need information Kim may be contacted at his work phone number 503/253/1156. Sonny Clutter suggested that people having novelty radios who are not planning to attend the display could loan then to a responsible individual who will guarantee their care and return. This will provide a more diversified display and more in number. The sale is from 9:30 to 4:00 PM. The admission is \$1--.

Dick Karman asked for volunteers to accept the duty of making coffee and providing pastry. Also, to set up and clean up the building after each meeting. As yet, there are no volunteers. Phone calls will be made to get volunteers.

A count of paid up members in attendance showed 27. The vote on Constitutional change was 22 in favor and 0 opposed. The vote on By-Laws change was 23 in favor and 0 opposed.

NEW BUSINESS: Jerry Talbott informed us of a tape he has for the NWVRS library. Future meetings were discussed (see 1991 NWVRS Schedule following the minutes). Sonny Clutter suggested a space or block be set aside to list future events and meetings in the Call Letter. Ed Buhite reminded members that material for the news letter MUST be in his possession by the 25th of each month. Membership dues due by Feb 1st.

Leads and Needs: Dan Howard discussed Airline wood radios, Newberrys has reproduction mike radios and Jerry Talbott mentioned a 1956 DuMont TV available in Corvallis for \$75-.

Ray Nelson announced that we now have an official photo album and an Ohm's law wheel.

NWVRS has some books and calendars remaining for sale. Ed Buhite mentioned the need to co-ordinate future book orders with PSARA, to have one person in charge. Scott McGregor mentioned different types of collectible and radio price guide books. Kim Brickman moved to adjourn the meeting, seconded by Gary Miller at 10:46 AM.

With numerous anecdotes he told about his involvement with wireless. He also told a story about how his boss once used the sewer pipes in the city to string his feed lines between his transmitter and his his remote locations. This practice was also included in "Of Mikes And Men", a fictionalized account which we have in the society library.

Tex also told how he could be attributed with driving the first nail in KQP which was then nothing more than chewing gum and baling wire, but which became Portland's finest broadcast station, KOIN radio.





The Feasibility of
Relocating the Northwest Vintage Radio Society
Meeting Place

- Five NWVRS members were commissioned by President Dick Karman to investigate the feasibility of relocating the meeting place of the NWVRS. The ad hoc committee consisted of Messrs. C. E. Clutter, Ed Buhite, Kim Brickman, Doug Davee and T. A. Moore.
- 2. The investigation was initiated as a result of an offer by Mr. Frank Rasada to make available space in his planned antique radio museum in the Multnomah district of SW Portland. Mr. Rasada suggested that the mutual relationship of the club activities and the museum would be beneficial to all concerned, and the preservation and promotion of antique radio in general.
- 3. The committee members met with Mr. Rasada collectively, and singularly, on several occasions during the past 45 days. Numerous questions and issues were raised which would have impact on any decision reached by the Society on the benefits of the ultimate move of the meeting place and the association with the proposed museum. Most of the questions and issues discussed were summarized in the notes of the meeting held on 27 December 1990 and reported to the Society separately.
- 4. It is the consensus of the ad hoc committee that the move and affiliation with the museum is a good one, and will be beneficial for the aims and objectives of the Society. We base this recommendation on the following points:
 - a. Mr. Rasada will make sufficient space available for the monthly meetings of the Society, and will not interfere in the proceedings of the Society;
 - b. The use of the building, maintenance and utilities will be at no charge to the Society;
 - Part of the museum space would be reserved for a NWVRS member display, either permanent or rotating;
 - All insurance (liability, fire, theft and contents damage) covering NWVRS activities will be provided by Mr. Rasada; and,
 - e. Building and adjacent parking lot(s) will be made available to the Society at no charge for swap meets and other outside activities.




