Meetings are held at 10:00 AM on the second Saturday of each month except for summer vacation in July and August. The meetings are an opportunity to exchange information and advice.







N W V R S Meeting Minutes Oregon City, Oregon Saturday June 8, 1991

Our vice president, Ray Nelson opened the N.W.V.R.S. Meeting at 10:18 AM. Ray asked if there was any question about the May minutes in the Call Letter. Because of the swap meet, there wasn't any meeting or minutes. Ray then asked for the treasurer's report. Part of the report was given and later concuded.

NEW BUSINESS: Ed Buhite asked about using the color process once or twice a year on special occasions on one page of the Call Letter at an approximate cost of \$100-- per issue. Ray Nelson called for discussion. After discussion Rudy Zvarich made a motion that we use the color

process at times. Motion seconded by Kem Sypher.

Motion passed.

Speed Feldschau mentioned the August 10th Swap Meet at his House in Kieser. A \$5-- per table seller's fee will be charged. A map is provided in this newsletter with directions to Speed's. The Sale will begin at 7:00 AM!

Frank Rasada announced that he bought the house next door to the museum. It will be used as a parking lot. It is a 50 X 100 ft. lot. Ray Nelson asked about swap meets at the new museum location. Frank said it could be in the new parking lot of the museum. Ray Nelson asked Frank about insurance at the museum. The N.W.V.R.S. board will meet and discuss it at a later date. Frank thinks the upstairs of the museum could be used in September.

OLD BUSINESS: Rudy Zvarich asked about keeping this Oregon City meeting place. Ed Charman said we were paid through June of this year. The renewal date coinsides with the school year. It is planned to renew the rent for the next year.

Ed Buhite asked if future events could be decided upon so he can publish them in the Call Letter. It was decided to have an auction in September. A swap meet in November and probably a contest in October. Ray Nelson asked for ideas on contest. One suggestion was to bring in sets that

were ugly and needed repair. Jim Mason suggested bringing home brew sets, {those not made by commercial radio companys). Rudy Zvarich suggested farm radio sets. Another suggestion was any Philco transitone radios. The December meeting to be a party and election of 1992 officers. Mrs Rasada suggested that each person bring an ornament with the persons name on it, for a decoration on the Christmas tree. This will take place of gift exchange.

Ed Buhite reminded members that items for publication in the Call Letter should be in his posession by the 25th of each month. Late items usually go in the next months issue.

Ray asked about good & welfare. There was no

response.

LEADS & NEEDS: Speed Feldschau announced he had acquired a Philco 620 set. He would like to buy back a like farm radio 6V set he sold at a previous meeting. Jim Mason announed sale at Greg Morse's house today. A Philco 16B is available at Multnomah Merchantile. Frank Rasada has obtained a 15 tube Zenith Stratosphere. Chuck Kibler needs 2 knobs for a Fada radio. Earl Hoppman said there was a sale of old radio cabinets in Vancouver WA. (206)573/1307. Frank Rasada said he had extra copies of A.R.C.

Ray Nelson announced his presentation on safety precautions for old radios and that Sonny Clutter would present restoration of tuning capacitors following the meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:55AM.
